## General Intelligence.

### War News.

London, Jan. 31.—A St. Petersburg correspondent, telegraphing on Wednesday afternoon says positively that the Russian Government has received no intelligence of the signing of the armistice.

The Vienna correspondent of the Times states that an Austrian newspaper, energetically protesting against anything affecting Austria or Europe interfering being altered without the concurrence of all the signatory powers, has been altered on Monday night. The correspondent has got reasons to believe that if the answer does not meet every point early and definitely the military operations of the Russian army will be forthwith decreed and Germany will not interfere. An official despatch received in Vienna, announcing that the Russian army has occupied Bulgaria and Rumania, hints that there is a secret understanding between Russia and Turkey.

There is no confirmation of these movements from any other source. The Foreign Office publishes a despatch from Minister Layard from Constantinople on the 29th, stating that the Grand Vezir has informed him that the Porte telegraphed to Turkish Plenipotentiaries on the 23rd ordering them to accept the terms of peace.

Woolwich, Jan. 31.—A number of white-head torpedoes and apparatus for discharging stationary torpedoes have been shipped for the Mediterranean Sea, and 4,000 bags of cannon powder have been brought from the reserve magazines at Southampton to the Thames ready for shipment at Paris.

Paris, Jan. 31.—The *Gazette des Debats* declares that it has authentic information from Berlin that the three Emperors' alliance has been re-established Russia, at the request of Germany, has modified the peace conditions of the Russian ultimatum.

New York, Jan. 31.—A special cablegram from the Rotterdam Courant and other sources, under the heading of telegram from Constantinople asserting that peace negotiations have been broken off, and that the Turkish resistance to the last extreme demand of the foreign ambassadors are taking measures for the protection of Christians.

London, Feb. 1.—It is rumoured in Constantinople that the Russian ultimatum is maintained as one of the conditions of the armistice the right to occupy some point on the Asiatic side of the Straits. The Russians have arrived at Tcherkesk within thirty miles of Tebeulajda.

A Vienna telegram states there is no telegraphic communication with Constantinople from Russia. The Russian advance on Rodosto and Keshau.

London, Feb. 1.—A Constantinople official despatch of the 24th ult., says: "No news yet from peace plenipotentiaries. The Government telegraphs to its representatives at European capitals, asking for intervention. The Russians continue to advance. It is officially announced that Admiral Hattat Pasha's fleet has arrived from Batoum, bringing with it the Russian fleet. Hattat Pasha is expected at Constantinople shortly."

This implies the evacuation of Batoum entirely, in the fall of an anticipated Russian assault or in fulfilment of certain stipulations.

It is not likely the Russians would make an assault while negotiations are pending.

It is stated that the principal cause of the delay in the armistice is the difficulty about the military conditions imposed.

A Vienna paper says these conditions include the occupation of Constantinople.

It is reported the Russians are within 24 hours march of Constantinople. The Porte has decided to defend the city.

Armenia, Feb. 1.—The Chambers have voted to take action against Turkey.

Constantinople, Feb. 1.—noon. The Sultan has telegraphed to the Czar demanding that he should make an advance with all powers to oppose Russian supremacy.

The Times Paris despatch says the Ministerial Council determined to defend the city if attacked.

Woolwich, Feb. 1.—The store ship *Wye* will embark 2,500,000 rifle cartridges and a number of shells for the 38 guns at Malta, on Saturday.

A Vienna correspondent says in consequence of the reticence of Russian reply, which mentions the possibility of special Austrian interests, Count Andrassy proposes to suggest that European Conference shall meet as soon as possible at Vienna.

London, Feb. 2.—A telegram from Carlo announces that the Grand Vezir of Turkey telegraphed to the Khedive that the protocol of armistice is ready for signature. The Sultan telegraphed to the Czar accepting peace conditions, and asked the Czar to stop the advance of Russian troops. The Czar replied that he was about to give orders to that effect.

## PEACE.

Constantinople, Feb. 2.—10 45 p. m. The Porte has received the following despatch from Sever Pasha:

Adrianople, Jan. 31.—The peace preliminaries and armistice were signed at today.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 3.—Thanks for services are being held in all the churches, and salutes of artillery were fired in consequence of the signing of the armistice. Flags are flying all over the city, and preparations are making for a brilliant illumination to-night.

Riga harbor is closed by ice. Constantinople, Feb. 2.—Evening.—There is great satisfaction here at the settlement of the peace preliminaries. The following are the conditions of the protocol:

First—the evacuation of Bulgaria into its principality.

Second—a war indemnity, or territory in compensation.

Third—the independence of Rumania, Serbia and Montenegro, with an increase of territory for each.

Fourth—reforms in Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Fifth—an ulterior understanding between the Sultan and the Czar regarding the Dardanelles.

Sixth—the evacuation of the Danube between the Straits and the Black Sea.

Seventh—Pasha has received orders to hold the fleet in readiness to sail, to be believed, for the Piranes.

Eighth—Admiral Pasha has been appointed to command of the troops in Crete and Adassides, a Christian, has been appointed Governor of the Island.

Paris, Feb. 3.—A special to the *Temps* from Vienna says that all the powers have accepted Count Andrassy's proposal for a Conference which will meet at Vienna.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 3.—The total Russian loss to January 30th, is 89,304 killed and wounded.

## Another Terrible Marine Disaster.

LOSS OF THE STEAMER "METROPOLIS" AND 160 LIVES.

Boston, Feb. 1.—The steamer *Metropolis* from Philadelphia for Porto Rico, went ashore yesterday evening at seven o'clock, on Currituck beach, three miles south of the Cape. She sprang a leak about midnight, and it was found impossible to keep her free. Finally, as the only resource for saving life, the vessel was driven then in a sinking condition. There were 218 passengers on board a steamer at the time, of whom 160 were drowned.

The steamer at 5 a. m. to day was a total wreck, nothing being left above the water. It is not thought that any bodies are on board of her. The particulars are gleaned from the statement of L. M. Quellan, one of the survivors.

The state of affairs this morning is terrible. Dead bodies are lying along the beach for two miles. They are all being laid in proper places back from the beach, and the living are being cared for. About one-third of those found are dead. The two saloon women are known to be dead, with their husbands. Eight out of fourteen fishermen are known to be dead. The men were all on board of her.

The bulk of the passengers were railroad laborers of American, German and Irish descent, who were en route to Brazil as stevedores. The steamer was chartered at Philadelphia for this special voyage.

The *Fisheries Journal*.

The New York "Herald" declares that the Congress will not accept the award of the Halifax Commission giving \$5,000,000 to Canada.

The Ministerial papers are all congratulating themselves on the excellent chance they will have of making another assault on the Washington "Tribune."

We do not think so badly of the United States Government as to believe they will refuse to accept the award, and our opinion of them is not less high. But if they do refuse, they can certainly count upon a good deal of support in Canada among the Reform Party, and can declare that they are about to present a note refusing to sanction any conditions of peace which would imperil the existence of Turkey.

The London correspondent says that he has had an interview with Gen. Ignatieff, who informed him that Russia wished to open the Dardanelles only to Turkey and herself and insisted upon the cessation of Armenia.

It is known that an endeavor to obtain money indemnity would be hopeless. Russia has formally acquiesced in Romania of her intention to annex Bessarabia, giving Dobruddah in exchange. Rumania has addressed a note to the Powers claiming the right to be a belligerent, to participate in the Conference.

## The Farmer's Corner.

### Whitewashing.

The whitewash process is in order this month and next, for fowl houses and fences—inside and out. The common method of half cleaning the poultry premises, has been in vogue so many years, and farmers are so prone to adhere to the old furrow in doing these things, that they need to be reminded every spring and fall that complete cleanliness of fowl-houses and runs is essential to success. In whitewashing the interior of a poultry house do not leave a spot even as large as the head of a pin untouched anywhere. Plaster the whitewash liberally into every nook and corner, crack and crevice. If the lunny has a floor of cement, stone, brick or boards, whitewash that also.

The plan of "whitewashing" is a very good and sure, and will renovate the houses, and to purify the premises. But the use of lime alone in this work, is not so good a method as the following.

Into the whitewash pail, when the liquid is prepared for application to inside work, while the lime water is still hot, drop a tea-spoon full of soft boiled rice, and mix it thoroughly through the mass. Then pour into a quart pot of cold water ten or twelve drops of crude carbolic acid. Mix this into the rest, and scrub the interior of your hen house with it.

For outside work, use rocksalt dissolved instead of boiled rice, and dispense with carbolic acid. No other preparation of "whitewashing" ever equalled this, within our knowledge—and no one who tries this one, will ever be satisfied with any other combination, for poultry buildings.—*The Poultry World.*

SAD NEWS.—A telegram received at Pictou, on Saturday night last, conveyed the sad intelligence that James Hogg, son of William Hogg, Esq., had been drowned at sea, having fallen from aloft in the barque "Anna A. Rich," of Pictou, from Hamburg to Fort Monro. The deceased was but 21 years of age, a young man of good promise and much beloved by all who knew him. He had only been at sea a few months and was on return trip of his first long voyage. The melancholy tidings were received here, where the lamented youth leaves several relatives and acquaintances, as well as in the town of Pictou where his family resides, with much sorrow, and the bereaved relatives have the sympathy of the whole community.—*Eastern Chronicle.*
