The Larmer's Corner.

Whitewashing.

The whitewash process is in order this month and next, for fowl house and fences-inside and out. The common method of half cleansing the poultry premises, has been in vogue so many years, and farmers are so prone to adhere to the old furrow in doing these things, that they need to be reminded every spring and fall that complete cleanliness of fowl-houses and runs is essential to success. In whitewashing the interior of a poultry house do not leave a spot even as large as the head of a pin untouched anywhere. Plash the whitewash liberally into every nook and corner, crack and crevice. If the hennery has a floo of cement, stone, brick or boards. whitewash that also.

The plan of "whitewashing" is very good and servi able way to renovate the houses, and to purify the premises. But the use of lime alone in this work, is not so good a me thod as the following.

Into the whitewash pail, when the liquid is prepared for application to inside work, while the lime water is still hot, drop a tea-cup full of soft to enable all who shall require Ornamen-boiled rice, and mix it thoroughly for the HOLIDAY SEASON, I shall through the mass. Then pour into a quart pot of cold water, say ten or twelve drops of crude earbolic acid. Mix this into the rest, and swab the




