We must be ready. The Liberal Party must be ready and the only way to be prepared is to



Because they fear to face the people of the country with their naval policy, the tories have applied the gag in parliament and placed another blot upon the record of the party. The Liberals resisted the application of closure to last, and the cry of "shame" with which Sir Wilfrid Laurier greeted its application by Mr. Borden and his supporters will be echoed throughout the length and breadth of Canada. The question, however, is not settled, for there can be no reasonable doubt that the senate will throw out the bill. Mr. Borden will then be thrust upon the horns of a dilemma. Either he must go to

the country, or he must admit that there is no emergency and that the whole naval policy was a play to the galleries, which he was willing should cost the people of Canada thirty-five million dollars. There was also harmony of action between Canada, Australia and other Dominions in regard to this matter, with the full approval of the Admiralty. In the Grange Sentinel of April 10 Bryan of Gallingerton, Onario, writes as follows:

"Editor Orange Sentinel:-Your paper reaches me through a friend and I beg to state that in my opinion it would have a much wider circulation both among members of our order and among Protestants generally if you did not take such a one-sided stand in politics.
