MUCH DREDGING TO BE DONE

Dominion Government Passes Large Appropriations for North Shore Ports.

OTHER PUBLIC WORKS

OTTAWA, April 21.—In the House of Commons yesterday morning Finance Minister Fielding tabled the supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year. They amount to \$5,142,000, which brings the total of the appropriation for the year up to \$122,000,000, of which \$17,856,716 is chargeable to capital.

Part reconstruction of St. George wharf, \$37,000. Separation allowance for session 1906, when ill, \$2,500. Charlottetown exhibition, \$10,000. For 62nd Puellier Band instruments burned, \$500. For Hudson Bay Railway and Quebec Bridge, \$500,000 each. For Port Arthur and Quebec harbors, \$100,000 each. Chatham public building, \$5,000. To compensate owners of pilot boat Defender for damages in collision with government dredge scow, \$100. Additional amount for surveys and measurements on the St. John river for the international commission. Steam service from Prince Edward Island to Britain, \$7,500. Service from St. John to St. Andrews and intermediate points, \$2,000. Service from ports on the Canadian Atlantic coast to Australia and New Zealand, \$120,000.

RULES OF THE ROAD

The following rules have been adopted by the Farmers' Anti-Automobile Society: 1. On discovering an approaching team, the automobilist must step off to the side and cover his machine with a blanket pointed to correspond with the scenery. 2. The speed limit on country roads this year will be a secret and the penalty for violation will be \$10 for every mile an offender is caught going in excess of it. 3. In case an automobile makes a team run away, the penalty will be \$50 for the first mile, \$100 for the second, \$200 for the third mile, etc., that the team runs; in addition to the usual damages. 4. On approaching a corner where he cannot command a view of the road ahead, the automobilist must stop not less than 50 yards from the turn, top his horn, ring a bell, fire a revolver, halloo, and send up three bombs at intervals of five minutes. 5. Automobiles must again be seen.

Automobiles running on the country roads at night must send up a red rocket every mile and wait ten minutes for the road to clear. They may then proceed carefully, blowing their horns, and shouting Roman criers. 7. All members of the society will give up Sunday to chasing automobiles, shooting and shouting at them, making arrests and otherwise disturbing country touring on that day. 8. In case a horse will not pass an automobile, the automobilist will take the machine apart as rapidly as possible and conceal the parts in the grass. 9. In case an automobile approaches a farmer's house when the roads are dusty, it will slow down to one mile an hour and the chauffeur will lay the dust in front of the house with a hand-sprinkler worked over the dashboard.—PLAYAT JOURNAL

REV. MR. ROBINSON PLEADED WITH RESULT IN CAMPBELLTON

Says Saloon's Had Demoralizing Effect on the Town—Spent Several Days in the Fight

Rev. W. R. Robinson, of west side returned yesterday afternoon from Campbellton, where he was aiding the temperance fight for the abolition of the licensed sale of liquor. It was a remarkable fight which led up to yesterday's sweeping defeat of the liquor licensees, said Mr. Robinson. I never saw anything like the way in which the business concerns of that town showed their determination to drive the bars out of the town. They were with us to a man. Everyone got off his coat and fought tooth and nail. The condition to which open liquor selling had brought Campbellton was horrible. We may talk about it here, but what St. John has to contend with is little alongside the evil, as it was in Campbellton. The men coming out of the woods, and from work of other industries, drank in holes and the traffic's influence fell upon those who could least afford any expenditure. Mr. Robinson spent four days in Campbellton, preaching four times on Sunday and speaking to a great mass meeting in the Opera House.

GRAND PUBLIC DEMONSTRATION

Temperance Party Meeting in N. B. Day Hall on Tuesday Night.

FIGHTING SPEECHES

After the fight had been fought and the victory won the tank and the fire of the temperance workers met in the Murray Hall, the Opera House being engaged and heard stirring addresses by many citizens. Judge Borkin spoke enthusiastically of the fight for sobriety in the Middle Western States, and was warmly applauded. Rev. W. R. Robinson of St. John, complimented the temperance workers on their splendid victory and counselled organizations to prosecute the work of enforcing the law. Votes of thanks were passed to Rev. W. R. Robinson, Rev. P. J. Stockhouse, Mr. Demock, St. Andrew's Club, the W. C. T. U., the press, the Chairman and Secretary, and others who had assisted in the fight. To Rev. P. J. Stockhouse, who was unable to be present, the following resolution was unanimously passed and adopted: Moved that this meeting express its standing vote of hearty appreciation of the services rendered by Rev. P. J. Stockhouse in the campaign on sobriety carried on and gloriously won today, and while doing so, would also express our sincere regret at his untimely departure from our midst and that he be not to be with us in the carrying out of the principles for which he fought so valiantly and energetically. While regretting his departure, we will have with us the effect of his example, the benefit of his counsel and the knowledge that in his future field of labor there will be a strong power for the cause of righteousness and prohibition.

## MUCH DREDGING TO BE DONE

### Dominion Government Passes Large Appropriations for North Shore Ports.

### OTHER PUBLIC WORKS

OTTAWA, April 21.—In the House of Commons yesterday morning Finance Minister Fielding tabled the supplementary estimates for the current fiscal year. They amount to \$5,142,481, which brings the total of the appropriation for the year up to \$132,244,074, of which \$37,588,715 is chargeable to capital.

Among the items on the list are:—

1. Bathurst harbor, to dredge ship channel, \$25,000.

2. Renewal superstructure pier Black River, \$2,500.

3. Additional deep water accommodation at Campbellton, \$35,000.

4. Complete wharves at Petticoat River, \$1,900.

5. Extended breakwater at Lorneville, \$8,000.

6. Dredging ship channel Miramichi Bay at Grand Dune Point, the Horseshoe and the Lamp, \$50,000.

7. To survey the river St. John with a view to improve navigation between Fredericton and Woodstock, \$5,000.

### RULES OF THE ROAD

The following rules have been adopted by the Farmers' Anti-Automobile Society:

1. On discovering an approaching team, the automobilist must step off to the side and cover his machine with a blanket pointed to correspond with the scenery.

2. The speed limit on country roads this year will be a secret and the penalty for violation will be \$10 for every mile an offender is caught going in excess of it.

3. In case an automobile makes a team run away, the penalty will be \$50 for the first mile, \$100 for the second, \$200 for the third mile, and so on, the team runs; in addition to the usual damages.

4. On approaching a corner where he cannot command a view on the road ahead, the automobilist must stop not less than 100 yards from the turn, too; his horn, ring a bell, fire a revolver, halloo, and send up three bombs at intervals of five minutes.

5. Automobiles must again be seen.

PARIS, April 18.—The extensive manoeuvres of the French fleet, which will begin on May 15, will be based on the assumption that France is about to be attacked. In addition to all the ships of the navy the forts will participate in the manoeuvres.

### SIR ED. CLOUSTON AND W. M. AITKEN IN IRON MERGER

Report That They Headed Syndicate, Offering \$300 a Share for R. M. Stock.

TORONTO, April 19.—Though rumour had said that recent mysterious purchases of Montreal Rolling Mills stock had been made by Dominion Steel interests, it has been learned that the syndicate that has purchased the controlling interest in the rolling mill from the greatest shareholders of the basis of \$300 per share was headed by Mr. W. M. Aitken, the president of the Royal Securities Corporation, who has been through the consolidation of the various air construction companies now included in the Canadian Car & Foundry Co. and Sir Edward Clouston, the vice president and general manager of the Bank of Montreal.

Just before sailing for London the other day, Mr. Aitken made an endeavor to arrange a basis on which the Hamilton Steel and Iron Co. and the Montreal Rolling Mills would enter into a larger consolidation along with the Montreal Rolling Mills and the Canadian Car and Foundry Co. but there have recently been so many various groups that have been picking up blocks of the Hamilton Steel and Iron Co.'s stock that it was very difficult to reach anything like a satisfactory basis with this concern in the short time that he had at his disposal previous to sailing for England.

While negotiations have been suspended for the present at least, owing to Mr. Aitken's leaving for the Old Country, leading financial interests believe that it will not be long before Sir Edward Clouston and Mr. Aitken carry on their plans still further, which will finally result in the liquidation of all the companies that are a very natural one, as lamont, with its great interest in the iron and steel industry, effort to secure labor in winter for the working classes an improvement in the steel fishing regulations, and a night school.



### ITALY MAY HELP EMIGRANTS TO COME TO THE DOMINION

ROME, Apr. 18.—Italian emigration authorities have been for some time studying the possibility of encouraging emigration to Canada. So far as the authorities have been able to ascertain about 57,000 Italians emigrated to Canada between 1930 and 1933. By comparing these figures with those of the census of 1931, when the Italians in Canada numbered only 10,824, proof is afforded that Italian immigration to Canada is increasing.

LONDON, Apr. 18.—The China-Inland Mission has received a cable which states that all the missionaries who fled from Changsha are safe at Hankow. They lost all their personal effects. HANKOW, Apr. 18.—The latest news received from Changsha, where the rioters have been rising and destroying the property of foreign missionaries, is that all is quiet. The provincial treasurer has taken charge of affairs, the governor of the province having been killed by the rioters.
