When I was taken to the prison, I went again to the authorities and told them that their deed was bringing things to a most dire issue, and I beseeched them. They brought me before Alderman Ker, and called on me to put up a surety of £50 each, to come out to prison. Well, then, my friends, in contact with the sureties demanded Alderman Ker, they brought me into the King's Bench, and the sureties were released to £1000. After remaining some time in prison, and hearing that my wife was in a bad state of health, and had lost a son which she occupied, I determined to go to India, where I went at my own expense, after the lapse of five years. On arrival in India, I again pressed my claims for the release of my wife. I was told by

that nothing would be done for me, and, faced, his lordship said to me he had nothing to do with me. I told him I would lose life or obtain justice, and threatened him, pronounced him, and I suffered 12 months imprisonment in India. Sir Charles Merle assumed the role of a lawyer, assuming the role of Lord William Bentinck. On his return, he claimed for justice, he, in part, seized them, and allowed me a salary of his private resources. Lord Auckland arrived, and I took steps to submit my case to his consideration, as I was determined to have justice done me. In procuring it, I was equally intent on giving the owner of the firm company a moral lesson. And Auckland refused to do any thing for me, and after many importunities I got 5,500 pounds to bring me to England. I arrived

On November last, and renewed my application to the board. After waiting seven or eight weeks, I was referred to the auditor, whom I found to be a most courteous gentleman, and by whom I was treated with every kindness. I pressed on him the force of my claims, and the injustice which I was receiving. I asked him, were the company blind or mad? I told him I thought they were; that they would force me to ex-amine them, and they were aware of it and they would suffer for it. I was determined to win them at a national meeting, and I told him I must resign my seat, and I was asked to give me time. I said that that was enough to me, and I said, "My Carmine kindly un-derstands to interest herself, and told me to write a little piece, and she would see that I could place her name, and would go

lunatic-house. I lost my wife in India. I told her that I was not at all disposed to do any thing which should be thought intemperate. After waiting eight weeks I went again to the lunatic-house; I was again referred to a solicitor; that gentleman treated me with accustomed kindness. Seeing there was nothing likely to be done, I went to the lunatic-house and threatened them. I was brought to this bar. I was bound over in my own recognizance for £100 to keep the peace. I being interdicted I heard a report, how or on whence it emanated I know not, and it was, that if I would cease troubling them they would provide for my boy. I immediately and most cheerfully assented, and consented to relinquish my claims, for the justice of which I had contended the last nine

me to do so. I called this morning the India-house, and after some interruption, and some misadventure, I obtained an interview with the deputy-chairman. I did not intend to injure him; I only called to warn him that I was determined to do nothing unless the promise which had been made was redeemed. To see my child called for I relinquished every thing I cared for myself, if any thing had been mine. Instead of being received as a suppliant, I was treated as an enemy, and degraded personification. I told the chairman that I was determined to have justice. He called me a ruffian. I told him I carried a knife. He called me dead weight. He said, "I said no, but I would make war." "Make war!" says he, "Ay, ay, ay, and make war to the very hilt."

holding the knife in my hand, he seized hold of my arm, and attempted to turn his knife against my throat, and you may be sure that I am cut in the cheek (exclaiming) I then thought my life in danger, and I was determined to defend myself; he attempted to send me to the wall, and I prevented him; he fell and I struck him on the head. I was determined to give him a moral lesson, that he nor any
