Berlin, Jan. 8.—The death of the Empress Augusta was announced to the people by the lowering of the Imperial standard over the palace. The Empress passed away peacefully surrounded by all her near relatives and her much attached attendants. As the end came near the mourners knelt around the bed, and the court chaplain offered a prayer and then blessed the remains. Emperor William and the Empress soon after left the chamber. The Empress Augusta suffered from influenza for three days, when pneumonia was developed. The streets are draped with mourning. The court festivities, which had been resumed upon the expiration of the mourning for Emperor Frederick, are now abandoned. The remains of the ex-Empress will be laid temporarily beside those of her husband. The Reichsanzieger states that the Emperor and the whole Imperial family are in deepest affliction at the sad event. It says: The year 1888 twas one filled with heavy trials for her Majesty. The death of her beloved husband, to whom she clung faithfully in all vicissitudes of life; the death of her son and grandson, all contributed to sadden the last two years of her life. These years she spent principally at Berlin, at the castle of Babelsburg, at Coblentz and in Baden, conquering her sorrow by the greatness of her mind, and remaining to the last breath of her richly-blessed life ever active in doing good and relieving distress. The royal house and the country will forever cherish her memory.

Lord Salisbury's note was menacing and peremptory, requiring Portugal to act at once, as if the rectitude of England's position was beyond doubt. It is believed Portugal cannot concede so much, but that the Foreign Minister will intimate the Portugalese Government is willing to order the maintenance of the statu quo in Africa pending negotiations, if England will do the same. The main point of Portugal's answer will meet in part at least the terms of Lord Salisbury's demand, which was that the Portuguese Government should give its agents in Africa such instructions as would prevent the repetition of acts like those attributed to Pinto, as otherwise tranquil diplomatic discussion would be impossible.

The Admiralty yacht Enchantress has sailed for Gibraltar with sealed orders for the ironclads Benbow and Colossus. There is thought to be no doubt that the orders relate to Portugal.

The London Times reports that the Portuguese authorities have forbidden the reception by British steamers at Quaillamanne of letters from the Vice-Consul or other persons, insisting that all must go through the Portuguese postoffice.

The Lisbon papers accuse the Scotch missionaries in Africa of trumping up old stories and retailing them as news, with a view of widening the breach between England and Portugal. The Diaro, a leading journal, of moderate tone, easy it does not believe the English telegrams, but that even if they are all true it cannot refrain from approving as perfectly correct and patriotic the proceedings of the Portuguese authorities in Africa in having energetically repelled the piratical acts of foreign invaders in territory belinging to Portugal.

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





A communication from Meredith & Meredith, re claim of John Sussex, asking to have the matter settled, was left until the discussion of No. 2 Committee's report.

From James Jury—Asking compensation for [having to vacate basement of Collegiate Institute during alterations. No. 2.

From James Learn—Asking for increase of salary. No. 1.

From Miss Brock—Asking leave of absence to attend Normal School. Granted.

From Mr. S. G. Gibson—Demanding three months' notice of dismissal or equivalent salary.

Mr. Childs asked if Mr. Gibson had not been notified.

Dr. Campbell said he had given him no notice.

The Chairman did not think any notice necessary, as each teacher's appointment had to be renewed in November, and Mr. Gibson's appointment had not been.

Mr. Love—Nor have any of the teachers appointments, so we have no lawful

The matter was referred to No. 1.

The names of Misses Pocock, Trebilcock, Lizzie Johnston, B. L. Evans, Laird, McCallum, Grey, Brett and A. Johnston were balloted on. Miss Pocock was given the permanent position, Misses Trebilcock and Evans the others, while Miss L. Johnston was placed on the substitute staff.

Principal Woods stated that during De Principal Woods stated that during December nothing of consequence was to be reported on except the examinations, which had been very satisfactory. The results of the promotions from the public schools to the Institute showed very marked improvement over former years.
