LONDON, June 28.—The Queen to-day signed the decree dissolving Parliament. signed the decree dissolving Parliament, the writs for the elections of the new members of the House of Commons will be issued to-night, The Queen's speech proroguing Parliament says:

"The time has arrived when it is ex

pedient that the electoral body of the country be consulted by the assemblage of a new Parliament. I have therefore sum-moned you for prorogation at an earlier a new Parliament. I have therefore summoned you for prorogation at an earlier period than usual. I am glad to record that my friendly relations with foreign powers remain unaltered. Treaties have been duly ratified referring the differences with the United States with respect to the Bering Sea to arbitration."

Suicide of a Countess. BERLIN, June 28 .- The body of the Countess Augusta Linsingen, who disappeared from her home in Hanover a few peared from her home in Hanover a tew days ago, has been found in the River Leine, near that city. The Countess undoubtedly committed suicide, though beyond the fact that she had complained of suffering severely from headaches no reason for self-destruction is known. She is the daughter of Count Adolphus Linsingen, formerly chamberlain of the Court of Hanover in the days of King George. She was 38 years old and unmarried.

Beatification of Columbus. Rome, June 28 .- It is stated that the Pope's next encyclical will beatify Columbus. The beatification is the pre-Columbus. The beatification is the pre-liminary step toward canonization. By beatification, Columbus would be declared blessed, but his relics would not be ex-posed. One great stumbling block to the canonization of Columbus is found in one particular chapter of his life. While he was staying at Cordova in the autumn of 1487, he fell in love with a lady of good birth but in poor circumstances. His son Ferdinand was the issue of this intimacy, but whether their relation was sanctified by but whether their relation was sanctified by but whether their relation was sanctified by the church is a matter of considerable doubt. It is certain that Columbus never recog-nized her in any way. He recommends her in his will to his son Diego as "a person to whom I have been under great obligations, and my conscience is burdened respecting her."

For a time the Czar declined to give his consent to the marriage of his favorite niece to the Roumanian heir-apparent, who is a member of the Prussian house of Hohenzollern, but at last he has yielded to his sister's arguments and signified his approval of the match. The latter gives universal satisfaction, and is regarded as a powerful guarantee of peace in connection with the Balkan difficulty. It invests the court of Bucharest with ties of close and intimate relationship with that of Russia and of Great Britain, which cannot fail to impart strength and solidity to the hitherto perilous Roumanian throne. It also please the Roumanian people, who, being of the orthodox Greek faith, are giad to find in their future queen a princess of the same church. 



SINGLE TAX PLATFORM.

Adopted by the National Conference of the Single Tax League of the United States at Cooper Union, New York, Sept. 3, 1890.

We assert as our fundamental principle the self-evident truth, that all men are created equal, and are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights.

We hold that all men are equally entitled to the use and enjoyment of what God has created and of what is gained by the general growth and improvement of the community of which they are a part. Therefore, no one should be permitted to hold natural opportunities without a fair return to all for any special privilege thus accorded to hi..., and that value which the growth and improvement of the community attach to land should be taken for the use of the community.

We hold that each man is entitled to all that his labor produces. Therefore no tax should be levied on the preducts of labor.

To carry out these principles we are in favor of raising all public revenues for

To carry out these principles we are in favor of raising all public revenues for national, state, county and municipal purposes by a single tax upon land values, irrespective of improvements, and of the abolition of all forms of direct and indirect taxation.

taxation.

Since in all our states we now levy some tax on the value of land, the single tax can be instituted by the simple and easy way of abolishing, one after another all other taxes now levied, and commensurately increasing the tax on land values, until we draw upon that one source for all expenses of government, the revenue being divided between local governments, state governments; or, a direct assessment being made by the general government being made by the general government upon the states taxation.

ments; or, a direct assessment being made by the general government upon the states and paid by them from revenues collected in this manner.

The single tax we propose is not a tax on land, and therefore would not fall on the use of land and become a tax on labor.

It is a tax, not on land, but on the value of land. Thus it would not fall on all land, but only on valuable land, and on that not in proportion to the use made of it, but in proportion to its value—the premium which the user of land must pay to the owner, either in purchase money or rent, for permission to use valuable land, but on the ownership of land, taking what would otherwise go to the owner as owner, and not as user.

not as user.
In assessments under the single tax all In assessments under the single tax all values created by individual use or improvements would be excluded and the only value taken into consideration would be the value attaching to the bare land by reason of neighborhood, etc., to be determined by impartial periodical assessments. Thus the farmer would have no more taxes to pay than the speculator who held a similar piece of land idle, and the man who on a city lot erected a valuable building would be taxed no more than the man who held a similar lot vacant.

The single tax, in short, would call upon men to contribute to the public revenues,

men to contribute to the public revenues, not in proportion to what they produce or accumulate, but in proportion to the value of the natural opportunities they hold. It would compel them to pay just as much for holding land idle as for putting it to its fullest new

nolding land idle as for putting it to its fullest use.

The single tax, therefore, would—

1. Take the weight of taxation off the agricultural districts where land has little or no value irrespective of improvements, and put it on towns and cities where bare land rises to a value of millions of dollars per acre.

2. Dispense with a multiplicity of taxes and a horde of taxgatherers, simplify government and greatly reduce its cost.

3. Do away with the fraud, corruption and gross inequality inseparable from our present methods of taxation, which allow the rich to escape while they grind the poor. Land cannot be hid or carried off and its value can be accrtained with greater

and its value can be accrtained with greater ease and certainty than any other.

4. Give us with all the world as perfect freedom of trade as now exists between the states of our Union, thus enabling our people to share, through free exchanges, in the advantages which nature has given to other countries, or which the peculiar skill of other peoples has enabled them to attain. It would destroy the trusts, monopolies and corruption which are the outgrowths of the tariff. It would do away with the fines and penalties now levied on anyone who improves a farm, erects a







The first clause of Mr. Taylor's resolution was a protest against the Dominion Government's new regulations for the dispatching of Canadian reals. a protest against the Dominion Goverument's new regulations for the dispatching of Canadian mails by ocean steamers and by rail upon the Lord's day, and recommended that the Government be petitioned to make such arrangements for the mails to Great Britain as shall not unnecessarily conflict with the rest and sacred nature of the day. The other five clauses refer to the closing of the World's Fair on the Sabbath, the prevention of the Canadian section at the fair from being open on that day, the deprevention of the Canadian section at the fair from being open on that day; the desirability of early closing of stores on Saturday evenings, and the duty of the clergy and the bishop in the matter. The report of the synod's proceedings states that the first clause of the resolution was withdrawn altogether, the second clause was modified and the others passed as originally introduced. The question now naturally presents itself, Why was that first clause withdrawn? If Sabbath observance is incumbent on the people's rulers, who, according to Holy Writ, should be "a terror to evil-doers and a praise to them that do well"?

DIED IN A HAY MOW. Yarmouth Farmer's Peculiar Death Bed—He Had Been to London to

Bed—He Had Been to London to See His Only Son.

Mr. Isaac Brock Couse, better known as Brock Couse, farmer, Yarmouth, about three miles southeast of St. Thomas, was found dead in his hay mow yesterday morning. Mr. Couse, with his sister, Mrs. Brown, of Toronto, drove to London Monday to see deceased's son, Harmon, who is in camp, being a member of No. 1 Troop of Cavalry. While driving home the wagon wheel ran into a deep rut, shaking the occupants severely, and Mr. Couse complained afterwards of pain in his side and stomach. They arrived home about 4 a.m., and Mrs. Brown went into the house and the deceased put up his horse and went up into the hay shed to sleep. He usually slept on blankets in the hay mow. In the morning, between 8 and 9 o'clock, the dead body was found by Miss Cameron, who is employed by Mrs. Couse, in the hay mow, where he had gone and sank into his last long sleep. The body was quite coid when found, showing that deceased had been dead for some time. Dr. Gustin, coroner, and County Attorney Donohue were notified, and Dr. Gustin was ordered by the latter to hold an inquest. Deceased was 51 years of age and leaves several children. Harmon is the only son.
