PARIS, Sept. 26 .- The Paris tailors' tyndicate are preparing a new edition of their black book, which was originally published seventeen years ago. The book contains the names and descriptions of persons who do not pay. Once a man's name is inscribed in it he is unable to obtain clothing at any establishment unless he is prepared to pay cash on delivery. A King's Debts.

After his death 5,000,000 marks had to be added to pay for enterprises and obligations entered into before his death. That made a total of 13,000,000 marks (83,120,000) to be paid. The most pressing debts were discharged from the private purse of the mad King Otto. They now foot up about 8,000,000 marks. Another 6,000,000 marks will be spread over the next ten years. After the death of the king a public loan was subscribed to pay the debts. The outstanding part of that will be paid in July, 1804, and the repayment of the other loan will be finally attempted in 1903.

"If it comes into the hands of an American, his liberality will make allowance for the position of an Englishman who regards the American commonwealth as the great achievement of his race, and looks forward to the voluntary reunion of the American branches of the race within its pale, and desires to do justice to the mother country."

The author has a high opinion of George Washington, but he adds: "We can hardly number among the greatest captains general who acted on so small a scale, and who, though he was the soul of the war. never won a battle." Nevertheless, he is confident that but for Washington the establishment of the confederacy "would have been ten times lost." Of Alexander Hamilton the author has a high opinion, but he contends that though a great constitutional jurist and a loyal Republican, he was no Democrat. Jefferson was the popular idol, but Goldwin Smith has no great fancy for him, though he admits that "he had unbounded faith in the people, and never doubted the success of the great American experiment in demo-cracy; there lay his strength." The author does not rate Madison's statesnanship very highly, and as for Aaron Burr he is depicted as "a showy and restless adventurer with revolutionary morals and a gift of misleading youth." Henry Clay was "ardently patriotic after the war hawk fashion," but his actions were controlled by the fact that he had the Presidency always in his thoughts. A splendid tribute is paid to Daniel Webster, but the author asserts that "his moral strength was not equal to his power of mind." "As an orator of reason, he has no superior, if he has an equal, in the English anguage." 
