

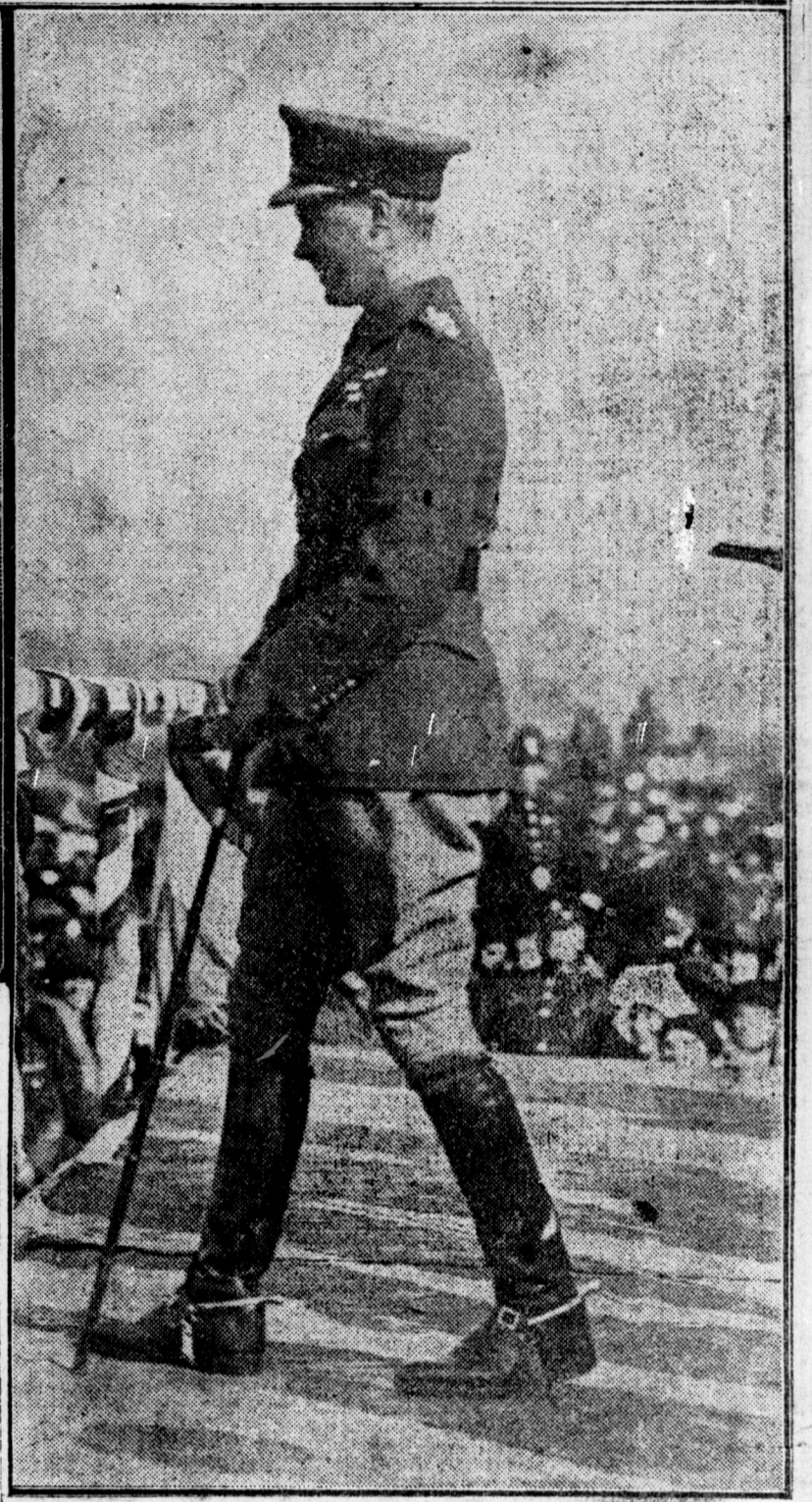
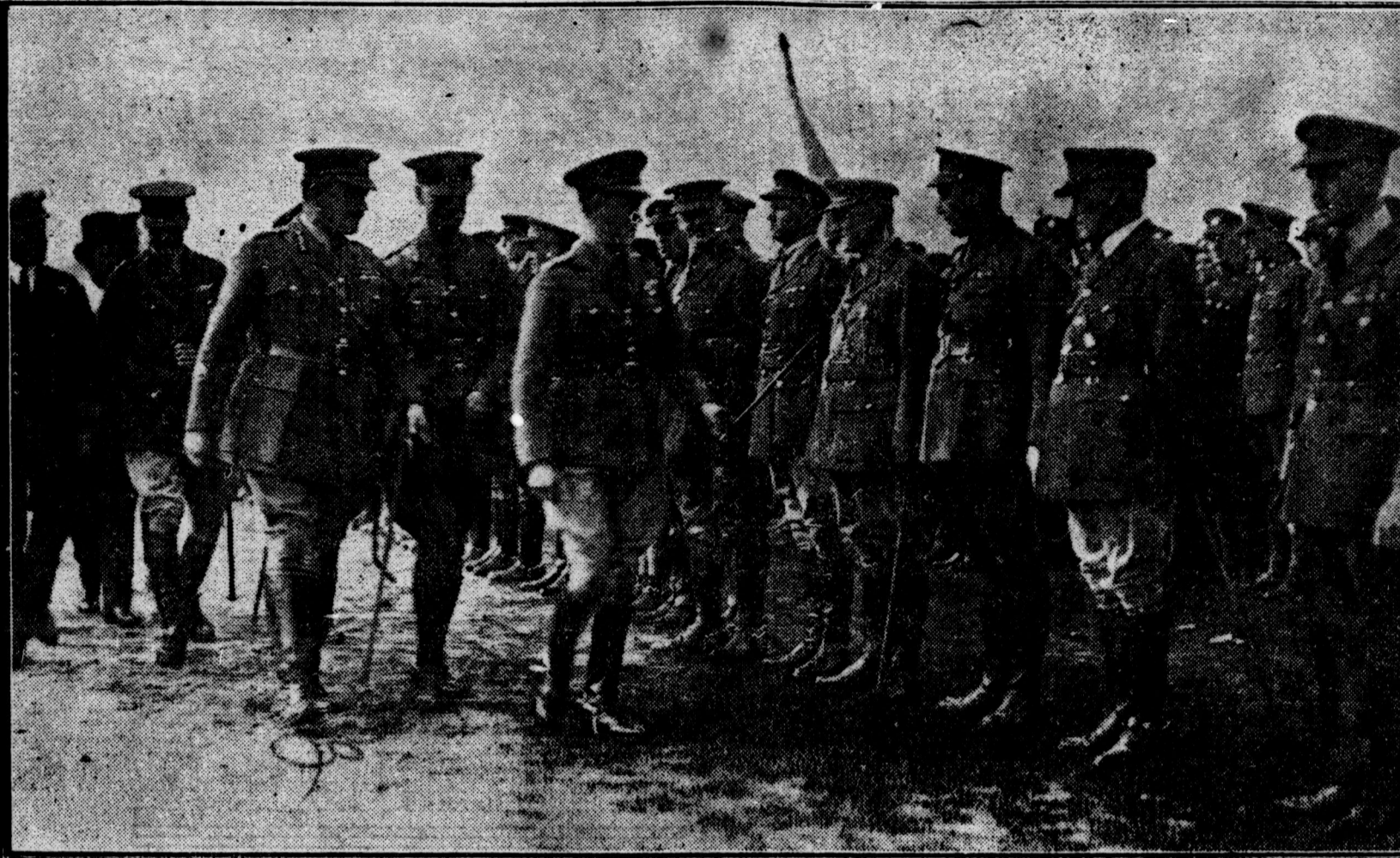

DR. GREELMAN MENTIONED AS POSSIBLE LEADER OF U. F. O.; HEARST MAY BE LIEUT.-GOV.

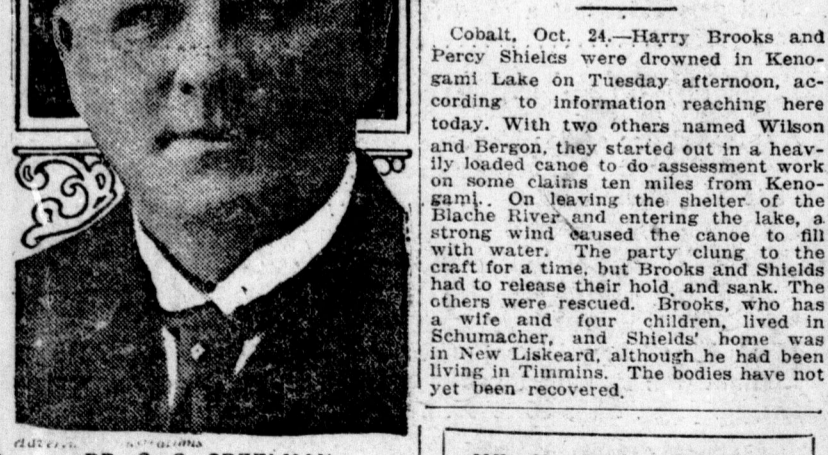
Liberals Met Today and Discussed Situation—United Farmers Will Assemble Again On Wednesday To Hear the Decision of Committee—Thousands of Ballots Spoiled.

Toronto, Oct. 24.—Watchful waiting by the four parties in the Provincial Legislature-elect, while a small sub-committee of the predominating United Farmers selects an acceptable leader, seems to be the position of things today.

Except the Liberals, who gathered under the leadership of Hartley Dewar this morning to further discuss the situation, there was no meeting of the parties today. The United Farmers "stand adjourned" and have gone back to their fall plowing, to assemble here

TWO DROWNED WHEN CANOE OVERTURNS IN NORTHERN KENOGAMI

Cobalt, Oct. 24.—Harry Brooks and Percy Shields were drowned in Kenogami Lake on Tuesday afternoon, according to information reaching here today. With two others named Wilson and Bergon, they started out in a heavily loaded canoe to do assessment work on some claims ten miles from Kenogami. On leaving the shelter of the Blanche River and entering the lake, a strong wind caused the canoe to fill with water. The party clung to the craft for a time, but Brooks and Shields had to release their hold, and sank. The others were rescued. Brooks, who has a wife and four children, lived in Schumacher, and Shields' home was in New Liskeard, although he had been living in Timmins. The bodies have not yet been recovered.

RUSSIAN REDS CHARGES MADE AGAINST ASYLUM MANAGEMENT WILL BE PROBED

Bolsheviki Are Considering Departure At Early Date.

London, Oct. 24.—The Bolsheviki are considering the evacuation of Soviet Russia, according to reports reaching Gen. Denekine, a wireless dispatch received from his headquarters says. The reported plan is for the removal of the cabinet to Tashkend, after the abandonment of Moscow and the withdrawal of the troops on all fronts to Turkestan.

FRENCH TRAITOR PIERRE LE NOIR IS EXECUTED

Sentence of Death Was Stayed On September 19. COURT INVESTIGATED Found No Reason To Further Delay Carrying Out Penalty.

Paris, Oct. 24.—Pierre le Noir, convicted of the charge of having given intelligence to the enemy, was executed at Sante prison at 7 o'clock this morning.

APPOLOGY WANTED. Later Mayor Somerville said that the Grand Trunk had agreed to accept all responsibility in connection with the change made in arrangements.

Through a misunderstanding many citizens who gathered at the Grand Trunk station to say farewell to the prince yesterday afternoon were disappointed, as his royal highness boarded the train from the south.

Thousands of people were thus disappointed in not obtaining a glimpse of the prince as he said farewell to the city. The humiliation of the city was thrust on his head by the "back-door" departure from the city.

STEPS TO RECOVER GERMAN INDEMNITY NOT POSSIBLE YET

Peace Treaty Must Be Fully Ratified First.

London, Oct. 24.—At question time in the House of Commons yesterday, Sir Cecil Harmsworth, Parliamentary secretary of state, stated that steps to recover the indemnity from Germany could not be taken until the peace treaty was ratified, but much preliminary work could be done in the meantime.

KEEP DECORATIONS UP FOR CAMPAIGN

The London executive in charge of the Victory Loan requests that all merchants leave up their decorations put in place in honor of the Prince of Wales until after the Victory Loan is concluded, some three weeks hence.

GERMAN-RUSSIAN FORCES DEFEATED IN LITHUANIA

Enemy Forces, Disarmed, Flee From Battlefield.

Copenhagen, Oct. 24.—Germano-Russian forces in Lithuania, commanded by Col. Virgoltich, have been defeated by Lithuanian troops in two encounters, according to an official statement issued from Lithuanian headquarters at Kovno. Near Soleshenki, south of Vilna, the Germano-Russian forces were disarmed, while near Kurshenez, south-east of Vilna, they fled from the field, abandoning all their arms and ammunition, according to the statement.

PRINCE HERE AGAIN FOR FEW MINUTES; WARMLY GREETED

Royal Train Stopped Quarter Hour At the C. P. R. Station.

London had one more opportunity to greet the Prince of Wales. His special train passed through here on the Canadian Pacific Railroad at 2:15 this afternoon. A stop of fifteen minutes was made at the station and Londoners who were fortunate enough to learn of this return trip crowded around and gave His Royal Highness a rousing reception.

ALLIED WAR CRAFT IN ADRIATIC IS ON LIVELY MOVEMENT

Action Is Probably Connected With Fiume Situation.

Fiume, Oct. 23.—A lively movement of Allied war craft stationed in Adriatic ports is in progress. The Associated Press correspondent was informed today by an American naval commander that the movement was probably connected with the Fiume situation.

HURRAH! LENINE IS CAPTURED AGAIN

Wireless Message Picked Up by Japanese Ship.

Helsinki, Oct. 24.—Nikolai Lenine, Bolshevik premier of Russia, has been captured by anti-Bolshevik forces, according to a wireless message picked up by the Japanese ship Tenyo in the harbor here. The message gives no further details of the reported capture of Lenine.

SIX ARE ARRESTED. Including one woman picket, are under arrest, following disorders near the United Alloy Steel Corporation plant here last night, in which hundreds of strikers took part.

U. S. TROOPS ARMED WITH TRENCH GUNS AT STEEL FACTORY

Infantrymen Are Reported To Have Been Stoned At Gary, Ind.

Chicago, Oct. 24.—Federal troops at Gary, Ind., today patrolled with "trench gun" weapons of the sawed-off shotgun type. They were thus equipped by order of Col. Mapes, commanding the strike area under military control, after he had received reports that the infantrymen had been stoned by strike sympathizers. Col. Mapes said the troops would fire on attackers.

DID NOT KNOW WAR WAS OVER

Auckland, N. Z., Oct. 24.—H. M. S. Iron Duke, with Sir John Jellicoe aboard, has picked up two white men, one a native of Christmas Island, who met a landing party with revolvers, believing them to be Germans. They did not know that the war was over, having been cut off from the outside world for eighteen months.

BULGARIA'S REPLY TO ALLIES' PEACE TERMS RECEIVED IN PARIS

Supreme Council Will Consider Answer Tomorrow.

Paris, Oct. 24.—Bulgaria's reply to the peace terms of the allied and associated powers was handed to Secretary Dutaata, of the peace conference, this morning. The time limit for the presentation of the reply expired today.

INDORSERS GARY'S ATTITUDE.

New York, Oct. 24.—More than 1,500 members of the American Iron and Steel Institute, at a meeting here today unanimously adopted a resolution indorsing the strike taken by Ebert H. Gary, chairman of the board of directors of the United States Steel Corporation, at the national industrial conference in Washington. The resolution was carried following a speech by Mr. Gary, and its adoption was marked with an ovation to the speaker which lasted for several minutes.

LLOYD GEORGE'S GOVERNMENT IS NOT EXPECTED TO RESIGN AS RESULT OF ADVERSE VOTE

Members of British Cabinet Are Discussing Situation That Has Arisen As Result of Unexpected Action—Only Part of Government Members Were Present When Ballot Was Taken.

London, Oct. 24.—Members of the Lloyd George cabinet are today considering the situation which has arisen as a result of the adverse vote in the House of Commons yesterday, when the Government amendment to the alien bill was rejected by a vote of 185 to 113.

Because of the fact that there was only about half of the members of the House in their seats when the vote was taken, it is believed the Government will not resign, but it is possible that Edward Carson, home secretary, who was in charge of the alien bill, may resign. Andrew Bonar Law, Government leader in the House, secured a majority on Monday for his colleagues by moving an adjournment until the result of the vote on the alien bill had been ascertained. Bonar Law's declaration that any subsequent action would "depend on the view of the House of Commons" is believed to indicate an intention on the part of the Government to continue in office until a date of confidence at an early date.

## G. T. R. BILL DOES NOT PROVIDE FOR PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF THIS RAILROAD

Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King Points Out This Fact to Members.

**GETS COLD WELCOME**  
 Liberal Leader, Undaunted, Makes a Fighting Speech.

[Special to The Advertiser.]  
 OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—Hon. W. Lyon Mackenzie King, Liberal leader, entered the House this afternoon, following his election in Prince, took his seat amid the plaudits of his followers and two hours later delivered his first speech. The speech in question was an expose of the Government's so-called "public ownership" proposals in connection with the Grand Trunk Railway system, and before he had finished Mr. King had demonstrated that all the public got out of it was the privilege of having never paid interest before, and some not for the past two years; and assumption of all the liabilities of the Grand Trunk and the Grand Trunk Pacific, and an option to purchase the same within a period of thirty years. Having acquired that proud honor the Government, said Mr. King, would hand over the management of the system to the men who formerly owned and undertook to operate the Canadian Northern.

It was a notable fact that when Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, entered the House two days ago he was accorded a measure of applause from the Opposition as well as from the Government members. It was quite a notable fact that this afternoon when the Liberal leader took his seat one man on the Government benches commenced to applaud and then ceased abruptly because nobody else of those around him had the courtesy to do so.

**No Whiff Daunted.**  
 It was further notable that though there were five ministers on the treasury benches, not one crossed the floor to welcome the new member. The cold-shouldered Mr. King no whiff daunted for his speech this afternoon was a fighting speech that started to finish, and quibbling questions on the part of Government members who sought to divert the attention of the Government's proposal to acquire the Grand Trunk were not in the nature of public that there was no ownership involved in the transaction. The guaranteed and debenture stocks remained in the hands of the present possessors, much enhanced in value because of the Government action, and the Government undertook to pay the interest whether the road earned dividends or not. It was in the power of any holder of the stock to sell when he pleased, and there would be no doubt be many profitable sales, inasmuch as Canada was behind the interest payments. In 30 years the Government had power to purchase that stock.

**Value Questionable.**  
 "All that is done by Mr. King, which the Government proposes to arbitrate, is the value of these stocks at the present time is questionable, to put it mildly. In fact, it is doubtful whether they possess any value at all. What does the Government propose, however? It proposes to give all that stock a value which will give it a four per cent return and send it up to par. I wonder if the people of this country appreciate this transaction."

Let us distinguish one stock from another. The first lot I would call the stock that is being retained by private possessors. The other lot is stock that is being exchanged. What does the Government get? The Government gets that stock, but what does it give? It gives a four per cent stock to take its place, and guarantees to pay four per cent interest on that stock, and also guarantees that none of it can be purchased by the country for another period of 30 years.

"My honorable friends opposite speak of this as a measure of Government ownership. Do they realize that what this measure is to make Government ownership of railways in Canada impossible for another 30 years. Under this act, the people cannot acquire the properties of the Grand Trunk from these owners who will be holding the stock until 1950. That is the position, and yet honorable gentlemen are blundering ahead in the name of public ownership and say we must get this measure through at this particular session of Parliament."

**Not Government Ownership.**  
 "I have pointed out that this measure is not for the purchase of the Grand Trunk properties; it is not even a measure for Government ownership. What is it then? It is nothing more than an agreement for the transfer of the management of the Grand Trunk railway system to the gentlemen who are managing the Canadian Northern railways at the present time, and who were controlling the Canadian Northern system before it was taken over by the Government. That is all that this measure is—plus this one other important circumstance. It is also a measure to enhance the value of the stock of the Grand Trunk railway system. That is all. These are the two things accomplished by this bill. It is simply a bill to foist upon the people of Canada all the liabilities of the Grand Trunk railway and the Grand Trunk Pacific, and to give in return to the shareholders an enhanced value for their stock."

It might be added as some comfort to the Canadian people that they secure a proxy out of the deal.

LEADERSHIP OF U. F. O. IS STILL OPEN QUESTION

E. C. Drury Is Said To Be Party's Most Probable Choice.

OTHERS MENTIONED

Several Nominated in Caucus, But No Announcement Yet.

TORONTO, Oct. 23.—There is no announcement forthcoming from the U. F. O. as to who is to be the Ontario leader of the United Farmers, and the next premier of the province. A special committee of the farmers met in caucus all day discussing the question of the most suitable man for the leadership, and tonight there was a general meeting of the U. F. O. delegates to the caucus.

Drury May Be Chosen. It is said that E. C. Drury is the probable choice of the farmers for leader. He was nominated at the caucus this afternoon, it is understood, but so were three or four other U. F. O. men.

**TURN HAS COME IN U. S. TRADE BALANCE, FINANCIER DECLARES**

Believes Exports to Europe Must Diminish.

**AND IMPORTS INCREASE**  
Such a Condition To Be Hoped For Rather Than Deplored.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 23.—The United States faces the problem of extending by next summer approximately two billion dollars in international credits to the war-torn countries of Europe. Dwight W. Morrow, of J. Pierpont Morgan & Co., declared in an address on "The Problem of International Credits" before the International trade conference here tonight. He said that the people of this country would have "to produce an 'save' to aid in this financial plan.

European countries were not coming to the United States seeking charity, Mr. Morrow said, but they were asking us, in our strength, to co-operate with them in their strength to rebuild and restore their productive capacity." In explaining that the export balance between this country and Europe vitally affects the problem of international credits, Mr. Morrow said that the excess of merchandise exports from the United States over imports from July 1, 1914, to July 1, 1919, amounted to approximately \$14,200,000,000. He asserted that this export balance was the payment of \$9,416,000,000 in gold imports, \$3,816,000,000 loaned by the United States Government, \$2,575,000,000 loaned by private enterprises of this country, and the remainder "apparently settled by invisible items."

**Demand Still Big.**  
During the first seven months of this year the excess exports totalled \$2,675,000,000, Mr. Morrow said. He explained that "indicated that the demand upon America by a world endeavoring to put itself back on a peace footing is fully as great as the demand the war itself made."

"I believe, however, the turn has come," he continued. "I believe that the exports by the United States to Europe must gradually diminish and the imports into this country from Europe must gradually increase. Neither of these results should be deplored." "At this time, when we are complaining of the high cost of living, we should welcome an increase in our imports of those things that Europe can make for us better than we can make them for ourselves."

In closing, Mr. Morrow asserted that if the United States were to extend \$2,000,000,000 in credit to Europe in a single year the people "must produce and save" that amount. He also said that private enterprise and individuals who had money to lend must "find people in Europe to whom they are willing to lend it."

**BECK, EIGHT MAYORS, TO DISCUSS BUYING WINDSOR RAILWAY**

Hydro Commissioner Says Government Authorizes Vote On Road Purchase.  
WINDSOR, Oct. 23.—Sir Adam Beck, chairman of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Commission, will come to Windsor Saturday afternoon to talk to mayors of eight municipalities in connection with plans of the commission to purchase the Windsor Street Railway System.

**Geddes Preparing Scheme of State Control of Rlys.**  
LONDON, Oct. 21.—Sir Eric Geddes, minister of transport, according to the Central News, is preparing a scheme for state control of railroads and canals. This became known at a conference of delegates of the national union of railway men with Premier Lloyd George, which was resumed today. (Conferences of the railway men with the Government regarding the future administration of the railways had been interrupted after the settlement of the recent strike.)

Paris, Oct. 24.—At the invitation of a committee of newspapermen attached to the economic and financial press of this city, Louis Klotz, minister of finance, will deliver an important address on the French financial program in the near future. It is expected that it will precede by a few days the address of Premier Clemenceau at Strasbourg or Metz.

**5,000 CIGARMAKERS TO RETURN TO WORK**

New York, Oct. 24.—Only 5,000 cigarmakers and packers will return to work Monday, ending the strike here which has been in progress for twenty weeks. By a 7 to 1 vote, the workers have accepted a ten per cent wage increase, and a compromise agreement, leaving employers the "hire and fire" right with factory committees free to insure against unfair discrimination.

**Garages Searched As Sugar Caches In New York City**

New York, Oct. 24.—Search for hundreds of barrels of sugar hidden in garage storage rooms where automobiles are kept in winter was made today at the instance of Arthur Williams, federal food administrator. He said that, in addition, millions of pounds must be stored in the city because large sugar companies with extensive offices and staffs seemed as busy as ever. Members of a retail grocers' organization, complained to him that in order to get sugar they had to buy hundreds of dollars' worth of other goods from small wholesalers, as large companies would not sell them sugar.

**TRADE CONFERENCE IS NEARING AN END**

Methods Are Being Devised To Finance War Reconstruction.

Atlantic City, Oct. 24.—The international trade conference, which for five days has been considering the financial and industrial problems of Great Britain, France, Italy and Belgium and attempting to devise methods by which the United States might aid them, entered its final stage today. Before the conference adjourns tonight, a permanent international organization of businessmen will be a reality. The tentative plan of this organization has already been unanimously accepted for 46 sub-committees and its acceptance by the conference as a whole is considered a mere formality. Virtually every problem considered by the conference has been closely associated with, if not altogether dependent upon, the question of financing the war-stricken countries. Delegates of France, Italy and Belgium—Great Britain alone, excepted—asked American businessmen to provide special credit arrangements during the period of reconstruction and for that reason the report to be submitted today by the American committee on credit and finance is eagerly awaited by all the delegates.

**MILNER PROTESTS AGAINST A CHANGE IN FISCAL POLICY**

Declares There Is No Occasion for Panicky Views.

**DEFENDS GOVERNMENT**

Says Radical Departure in Financial Methods Will Cause Untold Harm.

London, Oct. 23.—Opposition to any change in fiscal policies of Great Britain and a plea for careful consideration of the situation before the country, were expressed in the House of Lords today by Viscount Milner, secretary of state for the colonies, who replied to criticisms of the government by Lord Buckmaster, who introduced a resolution calling attention to the "gravity of the financial position" and suggesting the necessity for the imposition of additional taxes.

"I deprecate panicky views which are prevalent regarding the country's financial position," said Viscount Milner, whose statements were considered as the government view of the situation. "The position, though grave, is far less serious than that in any other great country, with the possible exception of the United States and Japan. It certainly does not justify any rash changes in the fiscal system, and no proof has been given that additional taxation is necessary. Nothing should be done until after deliberate and careful study. Irreparable mischief might be done to the recovery of trade and industry by recourse to such an expedient as a general capital levy, which has been proposed by Lord Buckmaster."

**Defends Government.** Viscount Milner warmly defended the government against charges of neglect to care for the financial status of the country. "There have been a number of adverse circumstances, such as the delay in arranging the terms of peace, troubles in Afghanistan, Egypt, and unsettled conditions in the Near East, which have prevented the curtailing of our expenditures," he said. "Our position is regrettable, but it is not catastrophic, and the proper way is to regard this year's deficit as part of the war burden. It is quite certain we shall receive several hundred millions next year from the liquidation of war debts and the debits of our dominions may be regarded as good debts. The amounts recoverable from foreign countries and Germany are certainly speculative, but it would be preposterous to suppose that foreign countries are going to default in their obligations. Such an assumption would be an insult to our great allies."

**SECOND READING OF G. T. R. BILL CARRIES BY MAJORITY OF 30**

Liberal Amendment Defeated On Division of 91 to 61.

The Government majority of 30. The second reading was then declared carried on the same division. The Opposition supporters voted with the Government. Major-Gen. McLean of Royal N. B. J. Johnson (Last Mountain, Sask.) and Major Andrews, Centre Winnipeg. The House rose at 12:30. The bill will be considered in committee tomorrow and given third reading not later than Monday, when it will go to the Senate.

**WARNS REDS PLOT WORLD REVOLUTION**

Lenine Has Aids Everywhere, Says French Trade Envoy.

Atlantic City, Oct. 23.—Warning of a world-wide plot by Bolsheviks to overthrow existing governments, and apply the torch of anarchy to all the nations of the world, was given to the International Trade conference here today by Eugene Schneider, chairman of the French delegation. "It is no exaggeration," he said, "to state that there exists at the present time a Bolshevik plot, the network of which covers the entire world. Lenine has sent out into the world numerous agents well equipped for their nefarious propaganda. 'Bolshevism embodies doctrines in which there is nothing but the old instincts of anarchy. No country today can boast of not harboring the poisonous germ of Bolshevism.'"

**PERMITS SINGING OF BOGHE OPERA**

Justice Upholds Injunction — Paterson, N. J., Bars Play.

New York, Oct. 24.—The attempt by the city authorities, backed by the American Legion, to stop the singing of German operas in New York, two performances of which have resulted in serious rioting, received a further setback today when Supreme Court Justice Gieserich refused to modify a temporary injunction obtained by the protesting company. The injunction prohibits the city authorities from interfering with the performances. On the question of permanent injunction, Justice Gieserich directed counsel for both sides to submit briefs to him Saturday. At today's hearing by Martin W. W. Littleton, representing the American Legion, referred to Otto Goritz, a member of the opera company, as the singer of a song of jubilation following the Lusitania disaster. "Should Goritz be allowed to flaunt German opera in the faces of men still smarting from the wounds of war?" he asked.

**WILL CONSTRUCT CONTROL STATIONS FOR AERIAL DERBY AROUND WORLD**

Depots Will Be Established at Prominent Centres.

Seattle, Oct. 24.—Control stations for the accommodation of entrants in the proposed "aerial derby of the world" next year are to be established at Vancouver, B. C., San Francisco, Seattle, Portland, Tacoma, San Diego, Los Angeles and Santa Barbara, according to an announcement made today by the commission now circling the globe to prepare for the flight. Seattle's control station will be the

starting point for all airmen who intend to cross the Pacific by way of the Alaskan coast, the Aleutian Islands and Japan, it was announced. This northern route, it was said, is the most feasible of all the routes across the ocean. The commission will sail from San Francisco November 3 for the far east, aboard the steamer Siberia.

**GEN. DIAZ OF ITALY'S ARMY PRESENTED WITH SWORD BY BRITISH**  
Honor Conferred Because of His Services to Allied Cause.  
London, Oct. 24.—Gen. Armando

### RAILROADS WILL MAKE IMMEDIATE STEPS TO GET HIGHER RATES

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 23.—Immediate steps will be taken by the railroad companies to obtain an increase in freight rates, it was announced today after a lengthy conference between Director-General Hines and representatives of the Association of Railway Executives.

Mr. Hines reiterated his previous decision not to make a general readjustment of rates during federal control of the roads, but offered to assist the companies with all the information the railroad administration has.

### SIX MILLION TONS OF U. S. COAL FOR EUROPE

LONDON, Oct. 23.—A dispatch to the Evening News from Cardiff says that W. H. Garner, a Swansea coal operator, on Wednesday in Paris completed an arrangement under which 6,000,000 tons of gas, steam and ordinary coal are to be shipped from America to continental ports.

### C. M. A. SAYS BOARD OF COMMERCE GIVES WRONG IMPRESSION

Demands Change in Method and Personnel.

REPUTABLE FIRMS HURT  
Objection Taken to Assumption That Profit-Making Reprehensible.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—It would appear that the board of commerce has fallen under the displeasure, not only of certain sections of the farming community, notably dairymen, but also under the displeasure of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association. Rural members in the House have raised their voices on several occasions against the board's interference with the price of milk, butter and cheese. Yesterday a deputation of the C. M. A. came to see the Government and had a somewhat lengthy conference. It was generally understood that the matter under discussion was the tariff in view of the fact that a ministerial inquiry looking toward future revision is in contemplation. But the chief subject of debate was the commerce board.

The deputation did not ask for the discontinuation of the board, so much as a change of method and personnel. The members contended that in its hunt for evidence the board frequently caused serious inconvenience to firms engaged in fair and legitimate business. They objected to the assumption that ability to make profits was a reprehensible thing. The fact that one firm made higher profits than another of equal capitalization, they contended, should not be construed as an evidence of improper practice or profiteering on the part of the first, but might very well mean that the first was conducted on greater lines of the efficiency than the latter, a condition which should be encouraged rather than discouraged.

In Camera. The public was getting the impression that any firm which made profits was bleeding the public. The selection of the board at least, should be conducted in camera, since they objected to publicity being given to the private affairs of concerns. If the preliminary hearing disclosed improper practices, then thereafter there should be the fullest possible publicity. They warned the Government that increased production would be hampered by undue interference with business affairs. They further complained about the personnel of the board, declaring that two lawyers and a labor representative did not constitute a well-balanced tribunal. A businessman of outstanding ability should be added.

The farmers on the other hand contended that an agriculturist should be added. The Government, while promising consideration to the representations, declared that the creation of the board was in response to widespread public demand. The consumer must be given every consideration, more especially in view of the fact that the consumer was not organized to the same extent as either the manufacturer or the farmer.

### URGES CREDIT PLAN TO HELP STRUGGLING FOREIGN NATIONS

U. S. Commerce Secretary Proposes Organization For This Purpose.

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Oct. 23.—Formation in this country of a credit granting organization to purchase securities of struggling foreign nations was urged at the international trade conference today by U. S. Secretary of Commerce Redfield. The organization, which would be supervised by the federal reserve board, would be capitalized at between \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000 and would issue bonds of small denomination and low interest to be sold here. The secretary said that several billion dollars would be needed by struggling nations in the next few years to place themselves on a firm footing.

"I hope and believe," he added, "that we shall open our doors much more freely than we do now, to receive goods from abroad. We cannot sell if we do not buy. We cannot get along by selling goods and asking capital in return. I hope that the time will come when the biggest men of this country will get so much vision that the system of selling goods abroad and demanding cash will not be respected."

A group of striking Serbians and Italians held a secret meeting in Brier Hill and decided, it is alleged to burn the houses of several men who continued to work, if their threats of violence were not heeded. Learning of the plan, police lay in wait for the strikers. Three Serbs had set afire one house before they were caught, and a group of three Italians was surprised attempting to fire two houses. All are under arrest on various charges.

### TRACTOR PLOW TITLE GOES TO AGINCOURT MAN

Chatham Contest Shows J. E. Cooperthwaite Champion of Ontario.

LONDON CHILD WONDER Francis Fallon, 8 Years Old, On Big Tractor, Scores 52 Out of 100.

(Special to The Advertiser.) CHATHAM, Oct. 23.—Tractor competitions were the feature at the provincial plowing match which closed today. J. E. Cooperthwaite of Agincourt, operating Case tractor, won the trophy, securing 84%, the highest number of points. Bert Kennedy of the same place, operating a Fordson, secured second prize. H. Page of Guelph, using a Giffon, won third prize. Ideal weather prevailed for today's events. The attendance was estimated by officials of the Plowmen's Association at 8,000. T. A. ### IMMEDIATE ACTION URGED TO PREVENT FEED ADULTERATION

Agricultural Committee Recommends This.

RESULTS ARE SERIOUS Donald Sutherland Says Thousands of Animals Killed

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—The adulteration of bran and shorts by Canadian millers was costing the farmers and dairymen of Canada large sums annually in loss of cattle from the effect of poisonous seeds in bran and shorts, the standing committee on agriculture was told this morning by Donald Sutherland, South Oxford, Miller, who said, had been adulterating their by-products for years by the addition of screenings and weed seeds, and no prosecution had ever been made.

He said that referring the set back to the agricultural committee after being given second reading was an unusual procedure. There should have been no hesitation in passing the bill, and there was no need for recalling the millers. They had asked to be heard, but could not get to Ottawa before Friday. The chairman, R. C. Eiders, suggested that the committee have a general discussion and then adjourn.

Wanted Full Hearing

When Mr. Sutherland began to outline the evils of the present act, the chairman asked the committee if he should allow a general resume of the situation at that time. Mr. Sutherland wanted a full hearing. He objected to bringing the millers here again, where they had already been heard. There was an attempt, he thought, to delay this bill and let the millers carry several members protesting against halting Mr. Sutherland, and John Best, Dufferin, threatened to walk out of the committee if Mr. Sutherland was not allowed to proceed.

The chairman ruled that Mr. Sutherland be heard.

Mr. Sexsmith and Mr. Best supported the passage of the amendment. There was highway robbery of the farmers, said Mr. Sexsmith, and the dust and dirt of the mills was sold to them. Fear of losing the dust at Port Colborne had led to the closing of windows which was the real cause of the explosion and endangering of lives in 1908, said Mr. Sexsmith, one firm in Canada had been allowed to grind up peat turf and mix it with molasses and sell it as dairy feed.

Up To Government

Mr. Sutherland said the amendment as provided was a guard against adulteration, which was the cause of killing thousands of livestock annually. Farmers were being discouraged, yet they must feed this stuff. The Government must make it pure for them. The amendment simply provided that nothing could be added to the bran and shorts after milling.

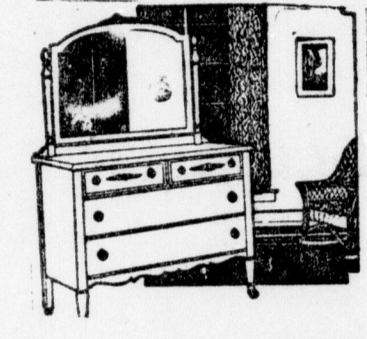
Mr. Sutherland, seconded by Mr. Sexsmith, moved the following resolution, which carried:

That in view of the serious results arising from the adulteration of bran and shorts by the flour milling companies of Canada, annually resulting in the death of many farm animals and serious injury to the health of others, this committee would respectfully request that immediate steps be taken to pass and put into effect Bill No. 7, an act to amend the adulteration act.

### ARRESTS IN NEW YORK PUTS FEAR INTO HEARTS OF LIQUOR DISPENSERS

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—It was hard to buy a drink in New York today. Arrests of federal agents accused of grafting and indicating that one of them would turn state's evidence scared cafes, cabarets and motor inns, where hitherto nothing but the price has been necessary in order to satisfy any alcoholic craving as fully as before war-time prohibition went into effect. With five men, including three federal agents, held for hearing, subpoenas were issued for a score of prominent cafe owners and several politicians to appear before a federal grand jury.

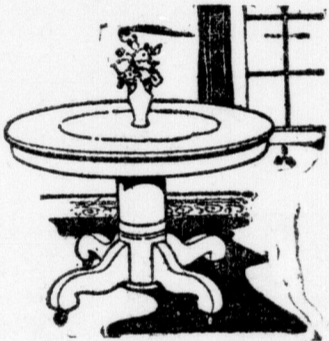

ACTING PREMIER IS CONFIDENT OF LOAN'S SUCCESS

Sir George Foster Sure People Will Do Their Duty Nobly.

SPEAKS IN TORONTO

Years of Reconstruction Ahead, Burdens Are Still Heavy.

TORONTO, Oct. 23.—Five hundred Victory Loan workers, among them 150 men who a year ago were fighting in France, met in Toronto tonight to discuss plans for the Victory Loan drive which starts on Monday, and to hear an address from Sir George Foster, acting prime minister. J. W. Mitchell presided and speeches were delivered, in addition to Sir George's, by E. E. Wood, T. A. Russell and E. L. Ruddy. Toronto's objective in the Victory Loan drive is \$20,000,000, but the workers are confident that they will raise much more than that amount. Trophies will be awarded to the teams making the highest collections as well as to those leading day by day.

The speakers referred to the splendid organization in Toronto and expressed confidence in the success of the loan. Sir George Foster informed the gathering that any fears the Government had had as to the success of the loan had been dispelled since the Government was confident that the people would do their duty as strongly and nobly as they had before. The unity of spirit which now prevailed in Canada, he said, injected and made permanent, would be one of the chief factors in the development of the country. It was worth untold millions if that spirit were here dominant in Canada. The future of Canada, he was certain was assured, Slightly Different.

Referring directly to the Victory Loan, he stated that the patriotic appeal was a little different than in previous loans. Then it had been purely human; but now it was for the success of the country. The country, he said, must function. Heavy burdens still had to be carried. Long years of reconstruction were ahead. The period of saving was not over. The gospel of thrift must be preached for many long years. Production must be kept up, not only for foreign consumption, but for foreign trade. Farming and all business must be kept going. Canada still was passing through a war period, and her obligations must be paid. Her prospects were illimitable if she kept on in the path she was going. In conclusion, Sir George stated that in order to carry on the government of the country democratic government must be upheld. Little groups of irresponsible leaders could not hope to lead Canada or to work for freedom of government. He urged everyone to unite under sane leadership for democratic government in Canada. General Motors of Canada, Limited, has arranged to subscribe \$1,000,000 to the Victory Loan.

British Govt. Defeated in a Vote Thursday

Issue Was Amendment to Aliens' Bill; Majority Was 72.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—The Government was defeated by a majority of 72 in a vote in the House of Commons on an amendment to the aliens bill.

Bonar Law immediately moved to postpone further consideration. Mr. Bonar Law said that the Government must discuss the defeat, and decide what course it should adopt. His motion was agreed to. The House then adjourned until Monday.

The vote by which the Government was defeated was 185 to 113.

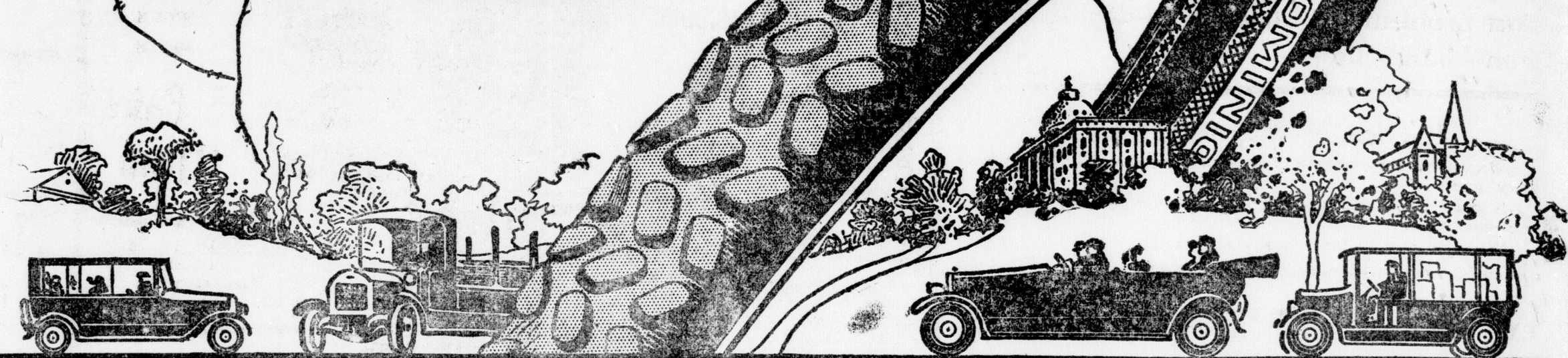
The alien bill, the earlier stages of which were disposed of during the summer session, was in a previous stage. The committee had previously inserted an amendment withholding pilotage certificates from all aliens, and today the Government sought by amendment to modify this restriction in favor of a number of French pilots, for whom special provision had been made in the existing pilotage act. This amendment, however, was defeated, although in charge of Government whips.

The announcement of the figures was greeted with loud cheers from the Opposition quarters and caused much excitement. Andrew Bonar Law immediately moved adjournment of the House until Monday to enable the Government to consider what course it should adopt. He admitted that the defeat of an amendment with Government whips was a serious matter, requiring consideration, but he declined to admit that it meant necessarily retirement of the Government. Views of the situation as expressed in the lobby are conflicting, but in view of the small attendance in the House it is thought that the Government may decide not to resign.

TWO ARE KILLED BY SEWER TRENCH CAVE-IN

SIMCOE, Oct. 23.—Two men were killed here this afternoon by the caving in of a sewer trench in which they were working. They were J. Cronk, a widower with two children, and Fred Mills, 60 years of age, a returned soldier and Englishman, with no relatives in Canada. An inquest will be held.

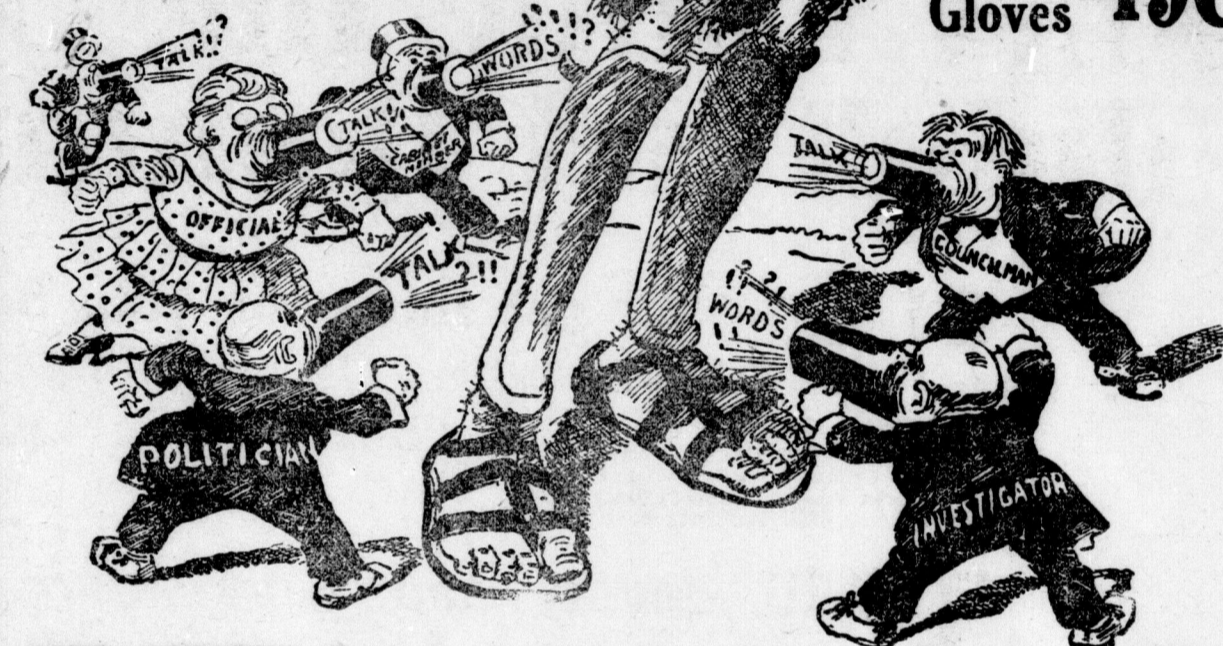

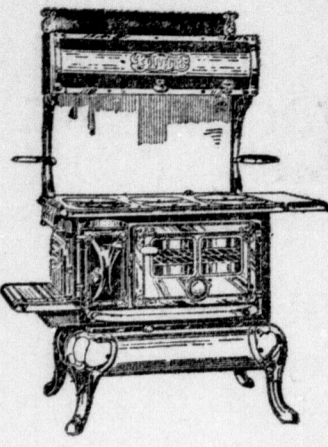

Miss Marjory Talbot makes a charming Princess Noyara, his love, and soon won the audience with her beautiful vocal numbers. The rest of the court circle are gorgeous in costume, so that every scene is rich and sparkling in color effects. Last Scene Most Brilliant. Perhaps the most spectacular scene is the closing one of all, when the whole cast of nearly 150 performers assembled in the Garden of Dragons, the queen on a raised throne, and aloft at the back, in his sparkling costume, tiny cupid relaying preme, while still higher out of a filmy mist appears the fairy godmother in her shimmering robes. Another scene with great spectacular effect and which gives scope for an infinite variety of color combinations and beautiful musical and dance effects is the carnival scene, when the queen and her suite retire to a raised dias at the back and witness her subjects at play. Several beautiful and fascinating solo dances and ensemble dances are accompanied by vocal numbers and a chorus, which was the hit of the evening. At the close of the carnival a most spectacular effect is produced by a shower of 10,000 yards of serpentine confetti, with which the dancers are entwined. "Queen Zephra," is produced by Elmo A. Drake, assisted by the Grand Opera House with A. D. Jordan at the piano. Between acts Hawaiian music is supplied. Part of the proceeds is in aid of the proposed Sick Children's Hospital, and an O. D. 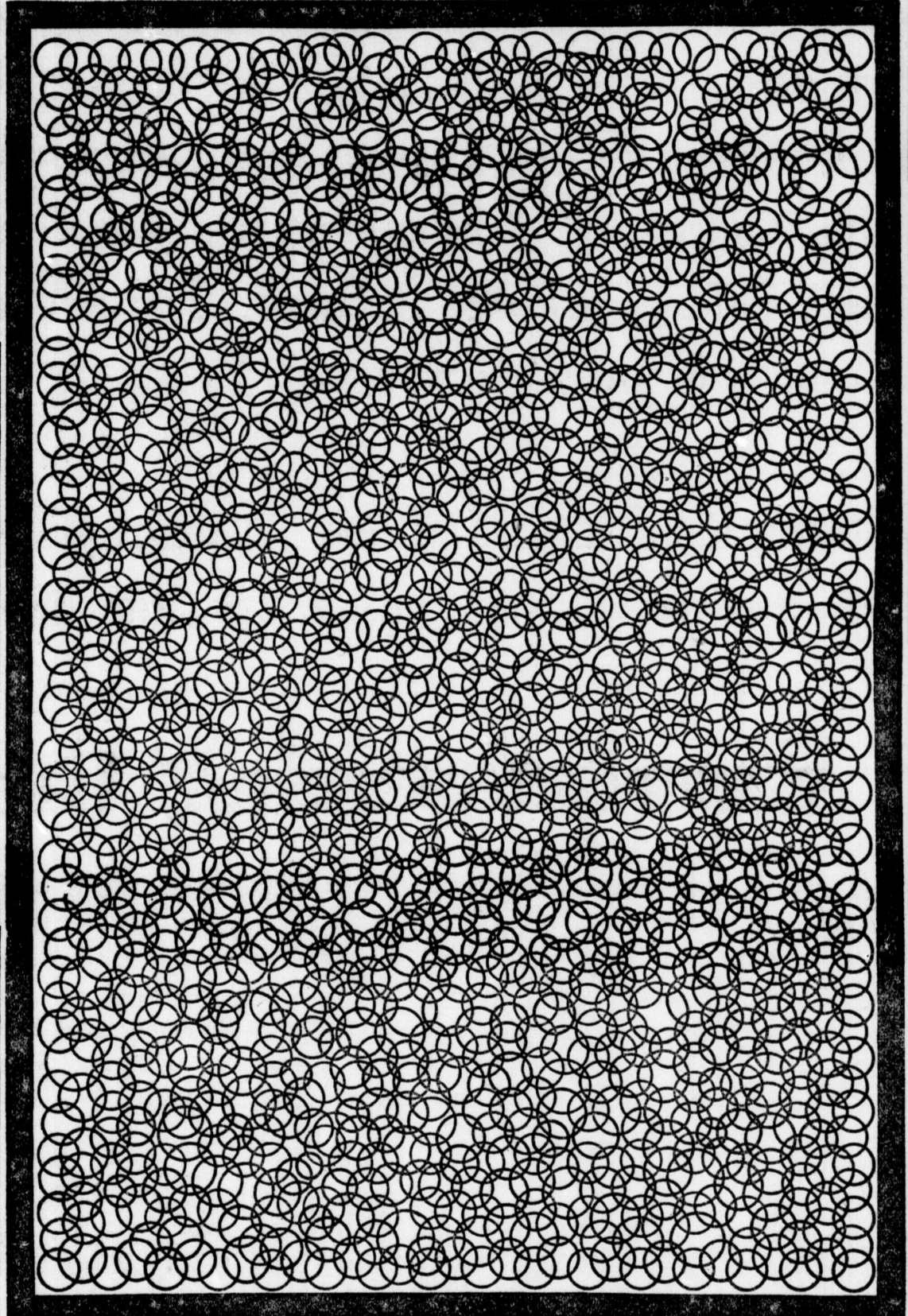

# Publishing a Great Magazine Without Typesetters

The members of the typographical union, which prints THE LITERARY DIGEST and practically all other magazines published in New York City, presented demands to the employing printers on October 1st which were so radical that they could not be acceded to. While negotiations were still pending, the typesetters, without notice, went on a "vacation" and are still out, in direct defiance of the orders of their own union chief to return to work.

The International heads of the typographical union have disavowed the action of the New

York local union men and have refused International support.

For this reason it has become necessary to issue THE LITERARY DIGEST *without the assistance of typesetters*. We believe this is the first case on record where a million copies of a great magazine of eighty pages, with handsome colored covers, have been issued without the typesetters. How the "Digest" for October 25th was published will be readily understood by those familiar with modern typographical practise. To others it will be an interesting puzzle which we will not spoil as yet by explanation.

## Revolutionizing the Publication Business

There is one phase of this experiment, however, that has deep significance, not only for the publishing fraternity, but to the public at large. As stern necessity is oftentimes the mother of invention, it is not impossible that in this age of marvels the whole future of magazine publication may be revolutionized by the elimination of what has hitherto been its costliest operation—the typesetting. The present departure, as shown by the "Digest" in this week's issue, now on sale, will certainly furnish a basis for many other experiments to this end.

Whenever any class of men or women refuses to keep faith with society, refuses to carry out the terms of its written contracts, society will somehow find ways nevertheless to get its business done.

This is one lesson of the present situation—and a wholesome one.

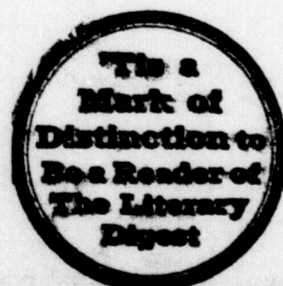

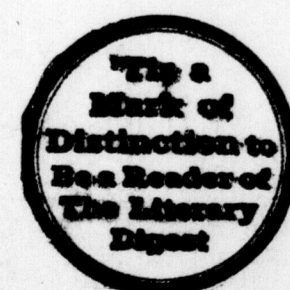

GERMAN OPERA SINGERS EGGED

N. Y. Mounted Police Fight Mob Outside Theatre Where Riot Is Staged.

New York, Oct. 23.—Rioting broke out again tonight around the Lexington Theatre, when for the second time this week the Stray Opera Company produced German opera over the protest of veterans of the world war.

With several hundred policemen posted around the theatre a column of soldiers, sailors, marines and civilians who marched from Times Square to the opera house, were hurled back and dispersed.

Defeated, the attacking party departed to get reinforcements. A few minutes later they reappeared, headed by a motor truck containing nearly two score men.

The truck dashed through the police and proceeded about a block before it was met by a squad of mounted police.

Thousands of spectators gathered at the theatre, but although the management announced that the house, which holds 1,000, had been sold out, only about 150 persons were seen to enter.

OPERATORS AND MINERS REJECT NEW PROPOSAL

Decline To Accept Suggestion To Negotiate New Wage Agreement.

Washington, Oct. 24.—Operators and miners today rejected a proposal by Secretary of Labor William C. Miller to negotiate a new wage agreement calculated to avert the strike of soft coal miners called for November 1.

REAL PRINCE COMES "OUT OF THE EAST" TO SMALL BORDER GIRLS

Windsor Welcomes Prince—Smiles, Too Tired to Shake Hands, Tours City.

WINDSOR, Oct. 23.—"Edward P." heir to the British throne, came to Windsor this evening, and Windsor—ordinarily slow to enthusiasm—capitulated and fell before the smile of the smiling prince of royalty.

Sharp on time the royal train drew into the Grand Trunk station at 8:30 p.m., and as the band played the National Anthem, and the guard of honor saluted, the Prince of Wales stepped from his car and was officially welcomed to the city by Mayor E. B. Winter, W. C. Kennedy, M. P., and Major J. C. Tolmie, M. P.

There was a little delay on the station platform before the royal party in fully decorated automobiles drove off to the armories, where the reception and welcome was held.

At 7 o'clock the reception terminated and the guest was driven to the Essex Country Club, in Sandwich, where dinner was served to a small party of selected guests.

At 11 a.m. the royal train left for Ottawa, and the prince will leave the city at 11 a.m.

FATHER OF SENATOR RATS DIES AT 92 YEARS

NEW HAMBURG, Oct. 23.—Jacob Ratz, father of Senator Valentine Ratz, died here tonight in his 92nd year. He was one of the earliest settlers in Waterloo county and carried on a large business as a sawmiller for many years.

Miss Canada Gives Account of Her Stewardship

And explains her War Financing to her citizens

Miss Canada: In humility, because of the sacrifices which have been made for me, but in pride because of the Spirit of Fortitude of your Sons, I come to enlist your most sympathetic support, as expressed by your financial aid, to enable me to meet the many obligations that still remain towards the men who fought.

Citizens: Does that include the gratuities?

Miss Canada: No. I shall need \$61,000,000 of the New Loan to finish paying these.

Citizens: Will that include the money to finance the Dept. of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, including the Vocational Training Schools, and the working out of the Soldiers' Land Settlement Act?

Miss Canada: No. I estimate \$57,000,000 for this. I have already approved loans to the amount of \$26,000,000 to soldiers already settled on the land under this Act.

Citizens: How many soldiers are taking advantage of it?

Miss Canada: Up to August 15th, 29,495 soldiers had applied for land under the terms of the Act. 22,281 applications had been approved. 9,043 men were already placed on farms, and millions of acres will be under cultivation, that might otherwise be idle.

Citizens: What do you consider the great national advantage of having soldiers become farmers, apart from increased production of food?

Miss Canada: The love of outdoor life and the resourcefulness of our soldier citizens are just the qualities to make them successful farmers, and upholders of the best Canadian tradition.

Citizens: Have you any other war obligations?

Miss Canada: Not that I foresee. I have covered the major ones.

Citizens: You purpose extending further credits to Great Britain and our Allies, do you not?

Miss Canada: Yes, to the extent that your Loan will permit me to.

Citizens: Why sell to Great Britain and our Allies if they can't pay cash?

Miss Canada: Their orders are absolutely essential to the continuance of your agriculture and industrial prosperity. The magnitude of their orders, and the amount of employment thus created will depend upon the success of the Victory Loan 1919.

Citizens: Will you explain simply this idea of credit, and why it is so necessary that we should give it?

Miss Canada: Farmers and manufacturers (and that includes the workers on these orders) must be paid cash for their products.

Therefore I must borrow money from you to give credit, temporarily, to Great Britain and our Allies.

Actually, no money will pass out of Canada.

If you do not grant this credit, other countries will; and they will get the trade, and have the employment that should be yours, to distribute amongst their workers.

And remember, you absolutely need these orders to maintain employment. If you don't finance them, employment will not be as plentiful, business will feel the depression and conditions everywhere will be adversely affected.

Citizens: What is the amount of the gratuity?

Miss Canada: I used \$59,000,000 of the Victory Loan 1918 for this purpose, and expect to use \$61,000,000 of Victory Loan 1919.

Citizens: Did you make any other disbursements under the heading of war expenditures?

Miss Canada: Yes, \$9,000,000 was spent at Halifax, to be used in reconstruction after the disaster.

Citizens: We quite appreciate the fact that these were all necessary war expenditures. Perhaps you will tell us now what you did in the way of advancing credits to Great Britain and our Allies?

Miss Canada: Great Britain's pledge to repay—backed by the resources that made her Banker, Manufacturer and Bulwark to her Allies during the war.

Citizens: That's good enough. Did you do anything for our Allies?

Miss Canada: I loaned them \$8,200,000 to buy your foodstuffs, raw material and manufactured products.

Citizens: That accounts for last year's Loan. Will you tell us now why you need another Loan, and how you purpose using it?

Miss Canada: I need another loan to finish paying the expenses of demobilization, since the proceeds of the 1918 Loan were exhausted, and to meet the obligations I still owe to your Soldier Sons. I also need money for National Working Capital.

Citizens: What are the obligations to soldiers?

Miss Canada: The cost of bringing them home. The payment of all those still undemobilized, including sick and wounded, who are still in hospital, and who of course remain on the Army Payroll until discharged. The upkeep of hospitals, and their medical and nursing staffs.

Citizens: How much will these items entail?

Miss Canada: \$200,000,000.

Citizens: Will you use the proceeds of the Loan for any other purpose?
