Mexico City, May 22 .- Venustiano Carranza, who fled from this city on May 6, and who took flight into the may b, and who took flight into the mountains of Puebla following a battle near Rinconaba, was killed at 1 o'clock Thursday morning at Tlaxcalaitongo, according to official announcement here. Carranza's companions, the names of whom are not as yet known, are declared to have shared his fate. The attack which resulted in the death of the president was led by Gen. Rodolfo Herrera, it is said.

The commandant of the Nuevo Laredo garrison last night advised the Mexican vice-consul at Laredo that Adolfo de la Huerta, governor of the State of Sonora, and recognized as the leader of the new revolutionary movement, had been elected provisional president of Mexico. Gen. Rodolfo Herrera, it is said, directed the attack that resulted in the death of the fugitive president and his followers. He belonged to the forces commanded by Gen. Francisco de P. Mariel, who accompanied Carranza in his flight from this city, but who last week deserted Carranza and joined the revolutionists.

It is generally believed possible, however, that he commanded a small guard which was with the fleeing president. Mariel, who was in command of government forces in that state. When Gen. Mariel went over to the revolutionists last week, a portion of his troops, it is known, remained loyal to the president, and belief exists that Carranza might have taken along with him in his flight toward Tuxpam Herrera's forces, which finally turned against. WESTERN PROVINCES MENACED BY PLAGUE OF GRASSHOPPERS

Extermination.

of Manitoba and Saskatchewan are fully alive to the danger of the grasshopper menace to the western crops. In Saskatchewan last fall grasshoppers laid eggs in from 40 to 50 rural municipalities. The eggs have been examined carefully during the last few weeks by the provincial field experts, who state the young are beginning to emerge. The Saskatchewan government department of agriculture, in an effort to fight the menace, has purchased 50,000 gallons of molasses, 90 tons of arsenic, 1,000 tons of bran, and two carloads of lemons, most of which have reached Regina. Large quantities have already been transported to the needy spots, and the cost is being borne largely by the municipalities and the Saskatchewan Government in equal shares. In case a municipality refuses to use the remedy, there is legislation already passed to employ others to poison the locusts, and the cost is charged to the local account.

Unless a good battle is waged, it is probable that in two weeks time the two varieties of the pest most dangerous may get ahead: these are the redlegged locusts and the clear-winged locusts, now beginning to be hatched.





The committee also reported that they had secured most of the talent for the afternoon program of the centennial celebration on June 2, but would expect the parks committee to furnish the sports, ball games, etc. It was also reported that at least two pleces of ordnance (war trophles) will be secured for the park and centennial celebration.

ABLE TO PAY NEW TAX WAR VETERANS TAKE CHALLENGE MEIGHEN HURLS

G. W. V. A. Presents Signed Sworn Evidence of Maltreatment by Officials.

Ottawa, May 21.-Signed documents attacking the administration of the Soldiers' Settlement Board have been placed in the hands of Hume Cronyn, chairman of the pensions and re-establishment committee, by the Dominion Command of the Great War Veterans' Association.

These documents, which consist of letters and affidavits by returned soldiers, concerning their treatment at oatmeal, wheatgerm, molasses, salt, sugar, syrup, stock feed, bird seed, mustard, and hemp seed. On other foodstuffs the wholesalers will charge one per cent extra on all invoices to cover the tax, which they must turn. 





Babies Should Sleep.

I slept profoundly twenty-one hours out of each twenty-four the first three days of my life and my folks didn't get het up about it because they happened to know that was normal.

A healthy baby a few weeks old should sleep as much as twenty-one or twenty-two hours out of the twenty-four, waking only from hunger.







THE CULTIVATION OF MUSTARD. THE CULTIVATION OF MUSTARD.

Experimental Farms Note.

The seeds of two species of mustard are used commercially, namely white mustard (Brassica alba) and black mustard (Brassica nigra). The common names of both species are somewhat misleading, as in both the flowers are yellow, while the seeds are yellow in white mustard and brown to dark purple in black mustard.

Both species grow rapidly, and the seeds can be sown from the beginning of May to the end of the force.

of May to the end of the lin June. The crop will, as a rule, be ready for cutting in August.

Fxperiments with both species were carried out at the Central Experimental Farm during 1916, and also to some extent during 1917 and 1918. The seeds were obtained from the United the end of the first week

States, France, Holland, Sweden and Russia The plots were of various sizes and

The plots were of various sizes and the rates of sowing also varied considerably. The yield of seeds varied and was influenced largely by the dryness or otherwise of the season at the time of flowering. The seed pods of white mustard usually remain closed when ripe, but in black mustard the pods open as they ripen and allow the seeds to escape, consequently the latter crop to escape, consequently the latter crop has to be cut as soon as the first pods are ripe.

Samples of both species were sent to one of the leading firms of mustard manufacturers in Canada, which reported as follows:

"The yellow mustard seed has a fairly good flavor, but not as good as the standard English, which we consider the best. The black mustard shows good volatile strength and good flavor, and to our mind equals the best that is grown."

OUTLOOK FOR CANADIAN TO-BACCO IN ENGLAND.

Experimental Farms Note.

The following cablegram has been received from the chief of the tobacco division, who is in England investi gating the possibilities of foreign markets for Canadian tobaccos:



This means that evidence has been secured that there is a very insignificant demand for White Burley in England. It is still uncertain if the best grades of Canadian Burley could find a market in England. The poor grades would find no market in England. The Canadian market could absorb a much larger quantity of the better grades of Burley, but the same is not the case with the poorer grades. There is an enormous demand for flue-cured to-bacco in England. It must be properly graded and packed, the same as it is in the Carolinas and Virginia, for the British market requirements. It should be bright and thin. Canadian flue-cured to-bacco will compete in price and quality with the same type from hadesia. It will also compete in price and quality with the same type from the Carolinas. Virginia and Georgia. With a preferential tariff of 32 cents per pound, and the present exchange rate. Canadian flue-cured tobacco should be able to compete successfully. If as much White Burley is to be grown and marketed in 1920 as in 1919 it seems that the quality will have to be much improved. Last year's crop was a little larger than the trade could absorb, judging from the fact that there is a large quantity of Burley leaf in the grower's hands. The good grades could have been absorbed in much greater quantity, but the poor grades limit the quantity that can be bought and set the price for the whole crop in Canada. "(Signed),



To People the Prairies With "Hand-Picked" Settlers

Big Colonization Movement Under Way

Through the foresight and determination of public-spirited Western business men, an association has been formed to grapple with a question vital to all Canada.

The Western Canada Colonization Association is a development from minor organizations, which were unable to cope with a work of such importance—that of bringing under crop twenty million acres of privately-owned land, all lying idle within twenty miles of railways in the Prairie Provinces. An adverse exchange rate bears heavily upon Canada. The only remedy is to increase our exports to the utmost. The direct way to do this is to people millions of acres lying idle in the West. A great mine of gold lies in these fertile fields, and the time has come to work it.

The West yearns for Development

The Prairie Provinces yearn for immigrants-of the "hand-picked" class. The movement now afoot is heartily welcomed and supported. From the Rockies to the Great Lakes, prominent public and business men are devoting themselves to the furtherance of the project.

A strong representative Western Committee is at present visiting Eastern cities. Their mission is to make clear that the movement is vital to all Canada.

A Partnership of East and West

The East will hold a permanent partnership and beneficial interest in the movement. The policies of the Association will not be definitely shaped until the fullest cooperation of Eastern Canada has been elicited. Then a joint executive council, representative of both East and West, will become responsible for the formation of plans mutually satisfactory, and with the one aim in view-an ever-progressing and richer Canada.

Out in the West, lie idle no less than twenty million acres of arable land-all within twenty miles of existing transportation facilities! An unique opportunity for colonization and increased food production, hitherto wasted, is now to be realized.

There is no time for further delay—this is a matter for prompt action—vigorous impetus has already been given to the movement by many of Canada's distinguished men. in both the East and the West.

Great Interest Is Being Manifested in Political Situations in U. S. Now That Big Conventions Draw Near -Wide Divergence On Platforms.

NEW YORK, May 21.—(By Canadian Press.)—With the great national conventions at which presidential candidates for the November elections will be nominated, but a short time off, political parties in the United States are at present hard at work building platforms which they hope will stand the acid test of the popular vote next fall. Final and definite platforms will be decided upon only at the June conventions in Chicago and San Francisco, but in the meantime all possible planks.

be decided upon only at the June conventions in Chicago and San Francisco, but in the meantime all possible planks have been canvassed by state party conventions and the finished structures can easily be visualized.

The chief difference existing between Republican and Democratic platforms this year is found in the attitudes of the parties towards the peace treaty and the League of Nations. After twice failing of ratification when a Democratic president presented it to a Republican Senate, the treaty was projected into the political campaign, and forms the piece de resistance of both party pronouncements. As a party, the Democrats, following President Wilson, are for ratification "without destructive reservations," but there is a rift in the lute, and Senator David I. Walsh of Massachusetts, Democrat, has openly announced that there exists a weighty group of younger members of the party who are irreconcilably opposed to the peace treaty and League of Nations as they now stand. This split in the party is not expected to make for harmony at the San Francisco convention, and there is even some doubt expressed as to the "We are absolutely opposed," continued the platform, "to Government ownership of railroads, and the so-called Plumb plan for their management. The transportation of the country should be privately-owned and privately managed under strict Government regulation that will insure the lowest possible rates to passengers and shippers, while affording the owners of the railways a fair return on their investment."

The Republicans declare for "a merchant marine manned by American seamen, owned by private capital and opermen, owned by private capital and operated by private energy." The federal trade commission, they charged, has "prostituted its proper functions, persecuting instead of promoting trade." The platform asks for a small standing army, with a trained citizen reserve, subject to call for service only in case of declaration of war by Congress. The training of citizen soldiers, it holds, should be under national supervision. Senator Hiram Johnson, Republican, of California, who has been making a grand sweep in the state primaries in the race for the Republican nomination, is one of the "irreconcilable" foes of the treaty. Many, both of his own party and on the Democratic side, point to his big vote in the primaries as evidence that there is a serious Democratic sentiment against the peace treaty in its present form, and claim that disgruntled Democrats have been invading the Republican primaries and voting for Johnson

In their preliminary announcements of record and program, both Republican and Democratic parties claim the credit for the part played by the United States in the war, the latter because there was a Democratic president and administration in the saddle at Washington when the United States entered the conflict, and the former because since 1918 the Republicans commanded majorities in illusory, plan for securing the peace of illusory, plan for securing the peace of ident's appeal for the election of men of his own party.

"Still the president persisted in his course," the platform says. "Both in his conduct of the peace negotiations abroad and in his advocacy at home of ratification by the Senate of his own individual work, he has assumed a purely personal and partisan attitude. 

Article X of the covenant for a League of Nations in its original form, cannot and should not be ratified by the Senate or accept-ed by the people of the United States. To do so would not only contract away control by the American people of their own policies and acts, but would cer-tainly embroil the country in an end-





The Munising woman, it is said, wired she would appreciate the dead man's clothes, but that she could not aid in the burial. When the question of disposing of the \$3,000 insurance came up both women hired lawyers. Saturday, they faced each other for the first time. Neither apparently was aware of the other's presence. They presented their claims and offered their statements. Middeaugh had deserted wife No. 1 several years ago. He entered into a common law arrangement, it is alleged, with the Munising woman, and left her several months before he was killed.

Commission Decides To Allow Commercial Firms To In-

crease Charges. OTTAWA, May 21.—(By Canadian Pres).-Increases averaging 32 per cent and plunged over the steep grade into in Eastern Canada and 20 per cent in Western Canada, are allowed on commercial telegraph messages throughout Canada in a judgment handed down by the railway commision today. The companies will be allowed to subdivide the existing rate zones east of Sudbury, Ont., and extend these zones to Quebec Province. Flat rates for these zones are increased from 25 cents and excess words will cost 2 cents, instead of 1 cent a word. Scaled increases from 10 cents to 25 cents a word are allowed on the \$1 transcontinental rate, with a special permission to permit the Grand Trunk Pacific to charge \$1.55 to Prince Rupert, B. C. Tariffs may be field at once based on the commission's rulings and the rates will come into effect as soon as the commission ratifies the traiffs. The increased rates do not apply to press dispatches or leased wires.



P. C. Thomas, business agent of the Electrical Workers' Union, claimed that the hydro commission had violated its

agreement; that the men should have an eight-hour day and overtime, the men to stay on the job, and the question of wages to be settled later, but, instead had 'discharged men because they had not shown up at 7 o'clock to put in a ten-hour day.

"Profiteering" in the camps among those who supplied the meals to the men was alleged by some of the men before the committee.

Assistant Superintendent Acres stated to the Canadian Press tonight that about forty per cent of the foreign laborers had quit work since the dispute began. The foreign laborers do not want an eight-hour day, Mr. Acres said, but want as much pay as they can get, regardless of the number of hours of work. It was stated tonight that there would be no strike before the special parliamentary committee's given to the Legislature.

FURNITURE FACTORY DESTROYED BY FIRE

Harriston Scene of Disastrous Blaze-Damage Is \$75.000.

HARRISTON, May 21.—Fire following the striking of the building by lightning during the electrical storm last night totally destroyed the local furniture factory early today. The local fire department, assisted by the Palmerston brigade, which responded to a call for assistance, did excellent work in preventing the spread of the fire to nearby residences, but all their efforts to save the factory were fruitless.

The factory, which only recently came under the management of Zingler Bros., was enjoying a good run of business and the new proprietors had planned some extensive improvements to the plant, but with a loss of \$75,000 only partly covered covered by insurance, the firm is at present undecided what action to take. About fifty skilled mechanics are thrown out of employment by the fire.





SUGAR INQUIRY TO **OPEN TUESDAY NEXT**

Supreme Court Decision I Likely To Be Ready Then.

OTTAWA, May 21.-Canadian Press. -The sugar inquiry, which will open in Ottawa on Tuesday, marks the first public inquiry by the Board of Commerce of Canada for some time past. The board has invited refiners, wholesalers, retailers and consumers to attend and give evidence, the inquiry being general in its scope.

The decision of the supreme court in The decision of the supreme court in the board of commerce stated case probably will come down Tuesday morning. If it affirms the jurisdiction of the board as a profit-fixing tribunal it is expected that amendments to the combines and fair prices act will be introduced in Parliament. Representations have been made to the prime minister by businessmen, notably the Relater by businessmen, notably the Re-tail Merchants' Association, that the act should be amended to define more clearly the scope of the board of com-merce. It is not likely that the board of commerce will submit some amend-ments to the act for the Government's consideration.






