Chamberlain Speaks to Crowd of 4,300 at Greenock.

WANTS FREE TRADE WITH ALL

Or Else He Ceases To Be a Free Trader-Says Present Is a Suicidal Course.

London, Oct. 7. - Continuing his fiscal campaign Mr. Chamberlain tonight addressed a meeting of 4,300 persons in the town hall of Greenock. He dealt particularly with retaliation and with reciprocity. The former colonial secretary said that he was a free trader and wanted to live harmoniously with his neighbors. but he desired free exchange with all nations. If they would not exchange he was not a free trader at any price. Mr. Chamberlain asked why all the protected nations prospered more than the United Kingdom. If the Cobdenites could satisfactorily answer he would ask to be allowed to hide his diminished head. He continued: "You are adopting a suicidal course. If you persist in the present policy, your workmen must either take lower wages or

lose their work.' Mr. Chamberlain referred to the normous output of the United States Steel Corporation and the dininishing home demand in the United States for stee! owing to financial difficulties, the reduction in railway construction, etc. He quoted from an American paper an interview with a director of a steel corporation on the falling demand, in which the director declared that they had no intention of diminishing the output and throwing out of employment thousands of American workmen. Instead they would invade foreign markets. 

Manchuria. The Corea peninsula, territorially and in every other way, belongs to Japan's sphere of influence. Japan would fight to preserve her hegemony over Corea, as she would fight to preserve her own territory.

Russia is cunningly diverting Japanese attention from Manchuria by memacing the integrity of Corea, and the latest reports indicate a very threatening situation. There is no official confirmation of the rumor that Russians are erecting forts on the Yalu River, but Japanese troops are being hurried into Corea, and the sightest aggression by the Russian forces hovering on the Ccrean border would precipitate a conflict which might hurry the two nations into war.
