

Sketch of Col. Leys. The late Col. Francis Baxter Leys was born on his father's farm in the

township of Pickering, Ont., in the year 1839. His father was one of the pioneer settlers of the county of Ontario, having immigrated from the old country in the early years of the century. Until 14 years of age, young Leys re-mained on the parental farm, and was then sent to school in Toronto. After finishing his public and grammar school finishing his public and grammar school career, the boy's education was rounded off in an eastern academy. He then entered the office of his elder brother, John Leys, ex-M. P. P., barrister, of Toronto, to begin the study of law. Shortly afterward the colonel made two voyages to British Guiana and the West Indies, and was in southern lat-West Indies, and was in southern latitudes for three years. For one year and a half he was engaged in sugarplanting. Contracting a fever at the end of that time, he was forced to re-

turn to Canada. Mr. Leys always had taken a dee interest in the military affairs of the Dominion, and he now became connected with the volunteer service. When the country was excited over the Trent affair, and forces were raised to meet threatened hostilities at the border, he

Auburn, N. Y., Sept. 12.-Henry Waverly Manser this morning was electrocuted the past, and more than will be made in the death chamber of Auburn prison. He was escorted to the chair at 6:06, and in another minute was in the chair and the mask drawn over his face.
