The sociologist thinks fondly of the past when he could explore with passion the realms of crime and morality within the society. Half of the Psychologist's patients disappear and
the Lab worker finds he can no longer corrupt animal life and the Lab worker finds he can no longer corrupt animal life and society for the betterment of Human Affairs. Yes, society is
perfect and the poor criminal must go back to the drab, unexciting ife among the citizenry.
Now lets look around and see what has happened to morality Pity the gossip and the prade, for their spark of life and their joy and fullfilment since there is no longer the need to guide young lives into the mold of Conformity. Fredericton (Special) - Premier Hugh John Flaming, speaking at last week's Convocation UNB, devoted much of his speech to discussing the relation of Business, Science and Governcontributing to the advance of economy and industry.
