COMPLETION OF L.E. AND N. A BIG JOB FOR THE YEAR

Two Months Work to Ballast Line Between Brantford and Galt-Connection With C. P. R. at Galt Not Yet Established.

That it will take the best part of the year 1914 before the Lake Erie and Northern Railway is in actual operation might be taken from an official announcement made to-day as to the progress of the work on the line. It will require two months to complete the ballasting on the road between Brantford and Galt, and there remains a whole lot of important work at the Galt end.

Just when the work at Lorne bridge will be recommenced is a matter of conjecture. It is figured, however, that the job can be completed while work in other directions is progressing. At Galt no start has been made in tearing down the McDougall factory; in fact, the property has not yet been bought. It is expected, however, that expropriation proceedings will be commenced within ten days. The removal of the factory is necessary before the L. E. and N. can reach the C.P.R. In addition, a mile and a half of C.P.R. track, with a grade at present of three per cent., must be reconstructed to meet the standard of the L. E. and N.

The Waterford bridge is rapidly nearing completion, but the Brantford bridge remains as another big job. When the ballasting is completed between Brantford and Galt the ballast trains will go to Simcoe, from which place rails will be laid both ways out of the town. During these operations the Brantford bridge can be constructed. On the whole, the completion of the road looks to be a formidable contract
