Wolfville Town Council

The regular monthly meeting of the Wolfville Town Council took place May 7th the Mayor and all councillors present.

The Streets Committee reported that damage to streets by washouts had been repaired. The committee had been convened to consider the application of Superintendent Johnson for increase in salary and had decided to increase the salary from \$600 to \$700 per annum. The committee had placed an order for a street sweeper.

The Water Committee reported the putting in of a number of sewers for new houses to be erected. The watershed lands had been visited and inspection and arrangements made for finishing the fencing of this property. The committee had made an inspection of the Earncliffe avenue service and reported it to be ample for present needs.

The Sewer Committee reported work begun in the direction of relaying sewer on University avenue and outlined other operations to begin shortly. It was suggested that \$15.00 be paid to Mr. E. C. Johnson for damage occasioned his property by overflow.

The Police Committee reported one arrest during the month and one license granted to auctioneer.

Four applications from persons, to keep pigs, outside the restricted district, were read and referred to license committee.

The resignation of Mr. A. E. Coldwell as Town Clerk, and of Mr. C. H. Borden, as assessor, were read. Applications for the former position were read from Messrs J. B. Tingley and S. C. West.

Mr. Coldwell's resignation to take effect June 1st. was accepted and the Deputy Town Clerk was instructed to write Mr. Coldwell and express the regret of the Council at the necessity of such a step. No action was taken as to his successor.

Couns. Haycock, Sleep and Harris were appointed a committee to confer with Mr. C. H. Borden and seek to induce him to re-consider his resignation as an assessor.

A number of accounts were read and ordered paid.

The Council decided to accept the offer of Mr. James Thomson of Halifax, for the town's five per cent debentures, at par, up to eight thousand dollars.

It was decided to pay Mr. E. C. Johnson the sum of \$15 for damage done his dykeland by overflow of the sewer.

After a lengthy discussion it was finally decided to pay Supt. Johnson two hundred dollars from the street construction account, in view of his superintendence of the construction of permanent streets.

A delegation from the Children's Aid Society of Kings Co. appeared before the Council with the request that some ordinance be adopted and enforced by the Council to prevent children being abroad on the streets after a prescribed hour in the evening. Addresses were given by Messrs. Percy Brown, H. Stairs, Rev. W. H. Rackham, Mrs. DeWitt, Mrs. Moore, and others. Mayor Chambers stated that the matter would have the careful consideration of the Council.

Mr. W. H. Chase appeared before the Council as a representative of the Board of Trade and presented a number of suggestions with reference to improvement needed in the matter of street lighting, ornamental trees on the streets and other subjects. The Council expressed their appreciation of these suggestions and promised to give due attention. Council Adjourned.

The Fertilizer is consigned to the United Fruit Company of the Annapolis Valley, discharging the cargo.

On Saturday last Mr. George King arrived here from New York to settle the difficulty between the quarrymen and the Company. The result of the conference is that the men returned to work yesterday, and Mr. King returned to New York. We have not yet heard the terms of the agreement, but understand that the matter has been arranged with mutual satisfaction to all concerned.

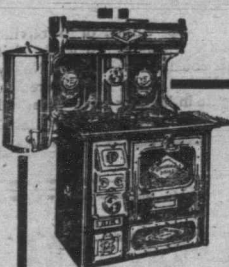

Kings County Man Will be on The Great Canadian Polar Expedition

Kenneth Chipman Joins the Steffansson Party

Kenneth G. Chipman, brother of Rev. O. N. Chipman, once pastor of Great Village Baptist Church, will accompany Vilhjalms Steffansson on the latter's expedition to the far north this summer. Mr. Chipman is a 1908 graduate of the Boston School of Technology, and following his graduation was engaged with the Dominion Coal Company at Gilace Bay. Leaving Cape Breton he entered the Dominion Government survey, and last summer was stationed in the Rocky Mountain district. After spending a season in the West he returned to Ottawa in the winter to prepare his report on field work.

The Steffansson expedition is to be financed by the Canadian Government and that is how Mr. Chipman happens to be attached to the party. Although he is only 26 years old he is assistant topographer of the Geological Survey of Canada and for several years has been engaged in mapping the Island of Vancouver on the Canadian Rockies.

Mr. Chipman was born at Berwick, N. S. where his mother still lives. He has a brother in New York and a sister, Mrs. G. Wildes Smith, who lives at 1463 Beacon St., Brookline. So it was that he came to New England for much of his education. He was graduated from the Newton High School in 1903 and then took up courses in mining engineering and metallurgy at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The Steffansson expedition, consisting of the explorer and about a dozen scientists, is expected to sail June 10 from Victoria, Vancouver Island. The craft purchased for the trip, the steam whaler Karpk, of 320 tons, is now outfitting at that port. Part of her stores will consist of a ton of pemmican a food consisting of meat, raisins, spices and a fatty ingredient for use in the Arctic.

It was originally intended that the Museum of Natural History of New York and American Geographical Society should share in the results of the expedition, but when the Canadian Government decided to finance the entire project this plan was abandoned.

The party will first sail to that part of Siberia off Behring Straits, where a landing and a brief trip into the interior will be made. Then the party will sail eastward along the northern coasts of the American continent to Fort McPherson at the mouth of the MacKenzie River.

Here the party will divide Steffansson and his ship will sail north to a mysterious land of which the blonde Eskimos told him. He will spend three years at least in exploration there.

Young Chipman and his party will debark at Fort McPherson and map the land to the eastward, including the home of the blonde Eskimos, possibly going into Victoria Island to the North. Mr. Chipman expects to have his work completed in 2 1/2 years. If this is accomplished, his party will return south overland, following the MacKenzie River across to its source a two months' trip.

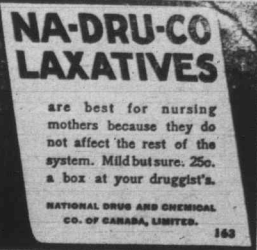
Fisherman Found Adrift of Banks in Serious Plight

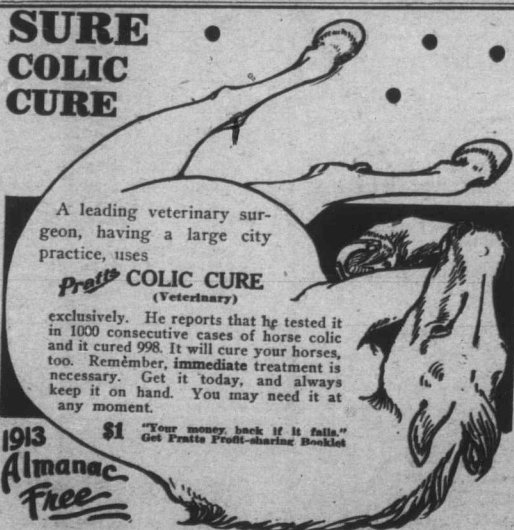
