DEATH OF JUDGE BORDEN.

Judge R. A. Borden died at Moncton, March 26th.

The late Robert Allison Borden was born Feby. Srd, 1846, at Avonport N. S. He was the son of the late George Newton Borden and Miriam Crane Borden, daughter of the late Col. Crane. He was a direct descendant of Perry Borden, the founder of the Borden family in Nova Scotia. The (late Judge Borden was a second cousin of the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert L. Borden, Prime Minister of Canada, and also of the late Sir Frederick Borden. His early covering from his injuries.

## 'CASH AND CARRY' GROWS IN FAVOR.

Reports received by the Canada food board irom all parts of Canada show that the "cash and carry" system recently inaugurated by individual grocers and other storekeepers in Canadian cities, is rapidly becoming general. The stores which have tried the plan of lower charges for customers who carry home their own purchases by allowing a rebate, thus saving delivery costs, report most satisfactory results. The food board is aiming to solve one phase of the cost of living problem by liminating as far as possible present wasteful delivery methods. It is believed the most practical way of educating both mrchants and customers as to the wisdom of saving the delivery cost is to demonstrate the practical working out of the "cash and carry" system by examples in every centre. Increased trade by the merchants who have already adopted the system, by allowing a consideration to the "cash and carry" customers, are forcing rivals to adopt the same system. carry' customers, are forcing rivals to adopt the same system.

rivals to adopt the same system. In addition to the money saving thus effected, the board looked also to a great saving in labor especially in the class of labor now most urgently needed. It is believed that hundreds of drivers of delivery wagons will thus be relieved for driving farm horses in the spring seeding operations. The greatest searcity of farm labor just at present is of men who know how to handle horses, and the best source of supply seems

# Military Service Act

Important Announcement to All

# EXEMPTED MEN

and to the Public Generally

N dealing with the very large number of claims for exemption brought forward for consideration in connection with Class 1 under the Military Service Act, it has occurred, as was inevitable, that as a result of false statements and difficulties put in the way of investigation, some individuals have secured exemption whose proper place is in the Army.

It is not the intention of the Government to allow these men to evade permanently their obligation to bear their part in the military defence of the Country and of the ideals for which we are fighting. To do so would defeat the purpose of the Act, and cause grave injustice to men in the second class necessarily called out to fill their places.

### **Exemptions Granted on False Grounds**

It is, therefore, proposed to scrutinize carefully all exemptions granted to date in order to separate those which have been granted on false or insufficient grounds from those that are well founded.

With this object in view the various Registrars under the Mijitary Service Act have been instructed to issue a series of questionnaires to exempted mea. These questionnaires must be filled up correctly and returned promptly under penalty of forfeiture of exemption for failure to do so.

Exempted Men Who Have Changed Address

It is therefore important in their own interest that all exempted men who have changed their address since their exemption was granted and who have not already notified the Registrar of such change should notify him at once. Under the Regulations it is the duty of exempted men to keep the Registrar advised of any change of address, and failure to receive the questionnaire by reason of neglect of this duty must be treated as equivalent to failure to return the questionnaire after receipt.

Citizens Urged to Assist

In many instances information has been furnished by members of the public which has led to the cancellation of exemptions obtained by false or misleading statements. Further co-operation of this character is invited. The Government regard it as the Duty of all loyal citizens, not only to the Country, but to the men at the front, to assist in this way in securing reinforcements on a just and legal basis. Correspondence of this character will be treated as strictly confidential and will receive the fullest investigation.
