Information has been received by cable from London that the appeal of the Windsor and Annapolis Railway Company to the privy council from the judgment of the supreme court of Canada has been allowed and judgment given in favor of the company for \$115,000 and costs.

SUICIDE.—Mr Richard Dickie, a young farmer of Skerton St., Cornwallis, committed suicide by shooting himself on Wednesday morning, 23d ult. He had been suffering from a mental derangement for some time past, but had almost recovered. The loss of a fine horse, which had been so badly cut in a barbed-wire fence as to necessitate its being killed, caused a relapse; and a gun which was loaded with ball to shoot the horse furnished an instrument for accomplishing the fatal act. He lived some hours in extreme suffering. The funeral took place on Saturday and was largely attended. He leaves a wife and five small children who have our sincere sympathy.

GOSSIPY ITEMS

GLEANED FROM VARIOUS SOURCES. Burglary and incendiarism is again prevalent in St. John, N. B.

The presents sent to the White House for Mrs Cleveland are worth upwards of \$100,000.

The Herald on Thursday published an extended account of the crop prospects in N.S. It is very encouraging.

The local election for Prince Edward Island took place on Wednesday. The government was sustained by a large majority.

The Episcopal church at Liverpool, N. S., was struck by lightning Sunday last, and was with much difficulty saved from being totally consumed.

Over 1,000 names have been added to the Dominion electoral list for the county of Hants, an addition of almost one-third to the list of voters for last year.

The government contract for convict labor in the penitentiary at Kingston, Canada, ceased on Wednesday last. The system has been in vogue since 1848.

An Indian who went to sleep on the railway track at Torryburn, St. John, N. B., was found on Friday last, completely cut in two and his legs and arms severed.

One vessel has sailed, and two more are expected to follow, with cargoes of tea from Japan for Vancouver, B. C., to be there shipped over the C. P. R. road.

The Wimbledon team left Quebec for Liverpool on the 24th, ult. It is an extremely strong team this year and no doubt will give a good account of themselves.

The barque Blue Bird, of Canning, Captain Dickey, from New York for Rio Janeiro, of which some little anxiety has been felt, arrived safely at the latter port, on June 18th, last.

Federic Sanford aged 16 years, of Woodville, West Cornwallis, fell overboard from Brig. Alice when the vessel was a few miles from Halifax, and was drowned. This was his first voyage.

Mayor Beaudry, of Montreal died at his residence on the 25th ult of paralysis, aged 75. He was best known outside of his native city for his action during the Orange trouble of 1877-8.

Judge Palmer, of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick, has granted an injunction prohibiting the N. B. and P. E. J. Methodist Conference of again hearing the case of Rev. Duncan D. Curry who has been charged with adultery.

Much damage was done to the streets and telegraph and telephone wires of Halifax, on Sunday last, by one the most violent thunder, lightning and rain storms that has visited the city for a number of years.

The Dominion inland revenue receipts for the month of May amounted to \$159,342, exports for same month \$5,918,252, produce of Canada, and \$603,666 produce of other countries; imports for same period \$7,894,546.

Of the 1500 cases brought before the police court, Halifax during the past civic year, one-third of them was for drunkenness. The city has been, as it has for some years past, particularly free from crime of a serious nature.

St. John, N. B., not to be out done by Halifax, is to have a dry dock 100 feet broad by 600 feet long to accommodate vessels of the heaviest tonnage, the estimated cost of the same to be \$100,000. A syndicate of New York capitalists are at the back of it.

The intercollegiate boat race between eight-oared crews of Columbia and Harvard colleges, was won by the former by eight lengths. The betting was all on Harvard. The intercollegiate base ball match between Harvard and Yale, witnessed by 15,000 people, was won by Harvard.

Cuba is agitating for home rule. Senor Montano and other Cuban deputies have presented the Spanish Congress a demand which asks for a provincial parliament and other home rule concessions. It is thought that the Madrid authorities will take a favourable view of their demands.

The enforcing of the fishing laws will be rigorously carried out by the Dominion and the fisheries will be protected from American trespassers, notwithstanding the reports that have been circulated to the contrary. The New England mackerel fisheries so far have been a total failure.

The New York Times has organized an expedition for the purpose of making exploration in their latest acquired Territory, Alaska, and has placed it under the command of Lieut. Friedrich Schwentke, a gentleman eminently fitted for the position. Prof. Libbey of Princeton will have charge of the scientific work.

The Central Baptist Association embracing the counties of Kings, Hants, Halifax and Lunenburg, was in session in Hantsport, the past week. It was largely attended. The Central Association comprises 52 churches with a membership of 8,790. Rev. J. W. Manning of Halifax was chosen Moderator, Rev. M. W. Brown and Prof. A. E. Coldwell, Secretaries and W. A. Porter and J. W. Churchill, Treasurers for the ensuing year. All the reports presented indicated a somewhat encouraging condition of affairs.

The first regular train across the continent started out of the C. P. R. depot at 8 p. m. Monday last amid the booming of cannon, and the cheers of the crowd. It was decorated by a flag made for the occasion.

The past week or two robberies and suicides appear to be on the ascendancy. Besides the unfortunate man Dickie, alluded to in another column, a man named Jackson, a Charlottetown, P. E. I., cooper, cut his throat with a razor, but is still alive.—A sad case of youthful depravity was brought to light in Halifax on Monday last. A sixteen-year old boy named Usher went on a drunken debauch, and then attempted to commit suicide by taking a dose of poison. He will recover.—John H. Liddell, commercial traveler, Montreal, and quite well known in the maritime provinces, cut his throat with a razor last Monday, and died.—Alfred Brine, of Joggins, has committed suicide by drowning from off brig. Otter.—Besides the robbery mentioned elsewhere, the residence of T. D. Ruggles, Bridgetown, was entered last Saturday and \$25 stolen.
