Canada's Banking System

Prince Rupert Empire: The Calgary Eye Opener and the Vancouver World have discovered that the Canadian banking system is not what is claimed for it by its admirers. Nearly every business centre in the West, from Winnipeg to Vancouver, has been treated to a dose of financial medicine not to its liking. The Canadian banking system is all right for the banks and for the big cities in which the banks have their head offices; but were the branches of these banks in the smaller centres and towns replaced by local banks, with capital furnished by local capitalists, and managed by local officers and boards of directors, it is not unfair to assume that there would be fewer "squeezes" and withdrawals of credit in towns like Vancouver and Calgary and Winnipeg than there are under the present system. THE BRANCH BANKS "MILK" THE SMALL TOWNS AND CITIES, AND THE MONEY GOES TO THE HEAD OFFICES OF THE INKS IN TORONTO AND MONTREAL, and these banks keep this surplus, often millions of dollars, out at interest in New York, Boston, Philadelphia and, Chicago, where it is used in stock and grain speculation. Of course, it will be said that the Canadian banking system protects the bill holders and the depositors to a greater extent than the banking system of the United States. Every piece of paper money issued in the United States is absolutely safe, as safe as the issues of the Canadian banks. If a Canadian bank fails, which does not often occur, the depositors and the stockholders take chances in getting one hundred cents on the dollar, as do the depositors and stockholders in banks that fail in the United States. The question is: Would local banks, with local capital, managed by local officers and directors, be better for the smaller towns than branches of banks whose officers and directors live in big centres like Toronto and Montreal? Had Vancouver half a dozen local banks, with capital furnished by local capitalists, and managed by local officers and directors, it is safe it would be in a better financial position than it is today with its dozen branch banks and its millions of deposits out at interest in New York and Chicago. A surplus is a good thing to have at home. Canada's surplus money is not at home, and is not likely to be under its present banking system.

SYNOPSIS OF Coal Mining Regulations

Coal mining rights of the Dowinion, in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta, the Yukon Territory, the North-West Territory and British Columbia, may be leased for a term of twenty-one years at an anual rental of \$1 an acre. not more than 2,560 acres will be leasto one applicant.

Application for a lease must be made to the Agent or Sub-Agent of the district in which the rights applied for are situated.

In surveyed territory the land must be described by sections, or legal sub-divisions of sections, and in insurveyed territory the tract applied for shall be staked out.

Each application must be accompanied by a fee of \$5, which will be refunded if the rights applied for are not available but not otherwise. A royalty shall be paid on the merchantable output of the mine at the rate of five cents per

Every lessee of coal mining rights which are not being operated shall furnish the district agent of Dominion Lands with a sworn statement to that effect at least once in each year.
