The meeting of Parliament. A Cabinet council was held at Windsor to-day to decide to summon Parliament to meet on the 6th of January for the despatch of business. Mr. Gladstone, Mr. Forster, and Earl Spencer were present.

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The action entered by the English Post Office against the Telephone Company to prohibit it from establishing a system of telephonic communication comes off next week. The company pleads that the telephone does not infringe on the telegraph monopoly which the Post Office possesses. The Post Office authorities say the use of telephones would jeopardize the right which the country paid £5,000,000 sterling.

FRANCE'S EASTERN POLICY. A Paris dispatch says—"In the Senate to-day, during several hours of the day, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, M. 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
