

## Hon. Mr. Doherty, Minister of Justice, Declares. Canada Cannot Enact An Eight-Hour-Day Law

### Beck States N. S. & T. R. Lines May Be Taken Over by the Hydro April First

#### He Says the Hydro Will Work in Harmony With the Federal Government as Regards Ownership of Railways—Will Be No Un- necessary Duplication.

LONDON, ONT., March 16.—Although he sees no reason why construction should not be undertaken as soon as possible to carry out the expressed wishes of the people for Hydro Radial on the Toronto and Eastern, Toronto Hamilton and Niagara, and Guelph, Galt, Hamilton, Niagara lines, Sir Adam Beck last night said an attitude of high-handedness on the part of the Hydro Electric Power Commission has not been and shall not be assumed.

Sir Adam referred to a statement submitted to him concerning his plans for immediate Hydro-Radial construction. "That statement would indicate a high-handedness, and that is not the impression that I wished to convey," Sir Adam said. "It is the wish of the Hydro Electric Power Commission to work in friendly co-operation with the Federal Government and to avoid unnecessary duplication by acquiring those which Dominion Cabinet Ministers have indicated to be available to the Hydro through amicable negotiations."

Little however, can be done in this connection until the railways are taken over, Sir Adam hears that this may occur on April 1. In respect to the Provincial Government, Sir Adam stated that many preliminary arrangements must be made and the full sanction of the government secured before such work as he believes should be proceeded with can be actually undertaken.

### Sergt. Fowler of Falls N.Y.C. Police Arrested On Charge of Perjury

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., March 16.—Sergeant Robert J. Fowler, 44 years old, of the New York Central railroad special police, was arrested late yesterday afternoon on a warrant issued by Police Judge Piper, charging perjury. Solomon Mokhiber is the complainant.

Last June Mokhiber and Herman Shear, who were employed by the New York Central, were arrested on charges of petit larceny. Fowler claimed that they were connected with the theft of underwear from freight cars in the north end yards. They were discharged by Police Judge Piper, but lost their positions with the railroad and were unable to get them back.

### Signs of Spring Abound; Wild Ducks Go North; Hawk Seen

Signs of an early spring, aside from the springlike weather today, are apparent on all sides, weather sharks declare. Flocks of wild geese and ducks have lately been seen flying northward, over Port Dalhousie. One man reported yesterday seeing a hawk, which he declared is an unmistakable sign that spring is here to stay. Caterpillars have also been seen. The boys are playing marbles, the girls are skipping.

### EMBARGO ON TRAVEL

#### No Secretary of State in Office to Issue Passports

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—A virtual embargo on foreign travel by American citizens was in effect today with the expiration of the 30-day period during which Under-Secretary Polk acted as secretary ad interim. No passports were issued at the department today, and while no official announcement was made as to the future, it was indicated that none would be issued until the senate had acted on the nomination of Bainbridge Colby, to be secretary of state. Administration officials held that the department technically was without a head and had as passports must be signed by the secretary or acting secretary, none could be issued.

### JACK JOHNSON NEARS THE BORDER

MEXICO CITY, MEX., March 16.—Jack Johnson, former champion heavyweight, has reached Manzanillo on his way to Tia Juana, which is just this side of the border in Lower California. Before leaving Mexico City Johnson said he had arranged a series of fights to take place in Tia Juana. He announced he was to meet Sam Langford of Boston and Harry Wills of New Orleans, and also made the statement, which sporting men here refused to take seriously, that Jack Dempsey had agreed to box him in Tia Juana.

## DOHERTY SAYS PARLIAMENT WOULD BE INFRINGING ON PROVINCIAL RIGHTS BY PASSING AN EIGHT-HOUR-DAY LAW

#### Decision of International Labor Congress Was Not Binding, He Says—Peace Treaty Pro- visions Puts It Up to the Respective Countries.

OTTAWA, March 16.—The Dominion Parliament, generally speaking has no right to enact an eight-hour day law, in the opinion of Minister of Justice Hon. C. J. Doherty. He gave this as his personal opinion when the subject was under discussion in the house last night as the result of a resolution brought in by J. H. Burnham, (Peterboro). However under the British North America Act, he believed that if Canada entered into some treaty under which it was bound to enact some particular legislation Parliament would have power to legislate for the purpose of giving effect to such an obligation.

Hon. Mr. Doherty said that on the question of legislative jurisdiction there were some very strong opinions held by those who speak for some of the provinces adverse to that which he had expressed. In view of that condition of affairs, he said it might become necessary to have the question authoritatively passed upon. Explain Treaty Provisions Both Hon. Mr. Doherty and Hon. Newton W. Rowell, President of the Privy Council, were careful to explain where responsibility of Parliament was necessary.

### British Government Sells Surplus Airplane Supplies

LONDON, March 16.—The British government has sold to a syndicate of airlines and material to the value of £100,000,000. The purchase includes the entire surplus aircraft material in Great Britain, consisting of 10,000 airplanes, 30,000 new airplane engines and an immense quantity of engine and airplane spares and hangars.

### Quarantine at Border Likely to Be Lifted Soon

It is reported that the immigration ban along the Canadian border because of smallpox in Ontario will be lifted on Saturday. A letter of Fred Mason, president of the Niagara Falls Chamber of Commerce, from the federal health department at Washington announces that the quarantine will be lifted.

### Syria Proclaims Independence and Names Feisal King

BEIRUT, March 16.—The independence of Syria was proclaimed here today by the representatives of the Syrian people. Emir Feisal was declared king, with Palestine part of the kingdom.

### WILSON IS BLAMED FOR THE RETURN OF ANARCHY IN MEXICO

CHICAGO, March 16.—President Wilson's policy in Mexico is responsible for anarchy which has existed in Mexico for years and was the direct cause of the resignation of Robert Lansing as secretary of state, Henry Lane Wilson, former ambassador to Mexico, declared in an address before the Agate club here yesterday.

### Welland Offers Site For War Memorial Hall

WELLAND, ONT., March 16.—At a meeting of the war memorial committee here, the proposition of a site for the proposed war memorial hall for Welland was accepted by a mass meeting of the veterans. The site is that of the old water works plant which the city council will donate free to the vets. for a war memorial hall and also a Veterans' club house. W. J. Hickey made the proposal to the veterans, and Mayor George Sutherland concurred in his offer.

### JONNY GRIFFITHS SAYS FRENCH BOXERS NOT TOUGH

NEW YORK, Mar. 16.—"Them Frenchies ain't up to us American scrappers. They ain't tough guys at all," said Johnny Griffiths, who arrived home today on La France after cleaning up all the welter-weight titles in France. One of his best bouts was with Albert Badou, the French champion whom he put to sleep in a twenty-round bout. Griffiths hopes to land a match with Naton, holder of the American welterweight title. La France had a rough voyage but Johnny said he didn't mind a little thing like that.

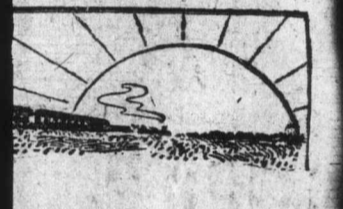

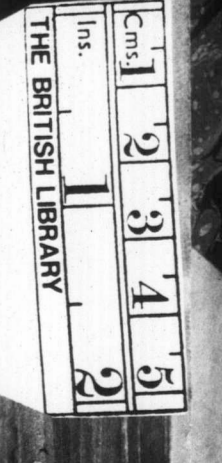

GERMANY'S PLIGHT

The sudden turn of events in Germany indicates a change of the tide toward a monarchy. Such a happening is not wholly unexpected. That it may be thwarted is more than probable but the movement has begun and will perhaps gain considerable headway. Following wars and insurrections which result in the removal of one kind of a government to set up another, there has usually been according to history, a considerable period of unrest and petty revolution. It happens also on occasion that the bureaucracy set up is as ruthless and tyrannical as the one torn down.

Things have not been going well in Hunland. The spirit of revolt is abroad. Civil war may be the only way of settling the score. It seems as though today one part of the population is bent on restoring monarchical government while the other part is equally determined to resist it. Verily the way of the transgressor is hard.

BUILDING BY-LAW

With such an insistent demand in the city for many more houses of the medium price type it would seem that the City Council might assist the situation by lessening some of the restrictions and reducing some of the civic charges that are imposed against those who undertake to build. It would be an easy and a practical way of helping the workers of the city to help themselves.

To The Journal it has long seemed that there are clauses in the building by-law that while wise in their purpose, have a restrictive influence. Builders are better able to determine this than is a newspaper, but from them, and also those offered by persistent complaints made by some of vate citizens it might be well to put the by-law under scrutiny and see if it could be amended here and there to help an acute house shortage condition.

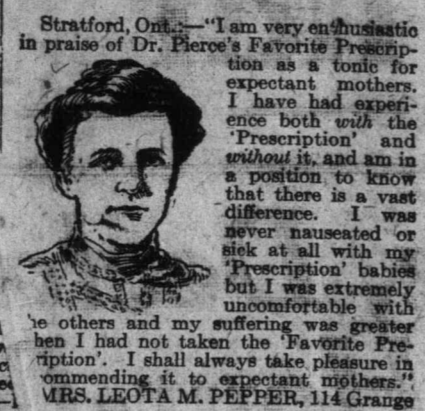

ANTWERP, Mar. 15—Twenty-four nations already have officially accepted Belgium's invitation to participate in the coming Olympic games and the Belgian committee charged with the preparations is going ahead in the face of all obstacles, determined to have everything in readiness in August.

Official notice of participation by the United States has not been received, but it is expected shortly.

15,000,000 THEFTS FROM CARS SHOWN. Doubt That in Any Pre-War Year.

Wholesale looting of merchandise transit on the railroads of the United States caused a loss of approximately \$45,000,000 in 1919, according to United States Railroad Administration statistics made public recently. This is estimated to be more than double the losses sustained in any pre-war year, but it is pointed out that the increased cost of the commodities stolen, roughly estimated to average 55 per cent, must be taken into consideration when comparing losses in the days of low prices with losses now. Nevertheless there has been a steadily increasing number of packages stolen, and the organization combatting the thieves have met an increased ingenuity in diverting goods from their owners.

A technique of robbery has been developed so highly that the methods of "master thieves" are similar in the United States, England, France, Italy and Argentina, according to a recent report of the United States Chamber of Commerce in Argentina. Detectives, however, are inclined to discredit that organization's belief that a "widespread international organization" is at work stealing merchandise. Substitution is the usual method used by the thieves. Sometimes boxes supposed to contain velvet are found at their destination to be filled with calico or other cheaper grades of cloth, but as a rule, waste paper is found. These are referred to as concealed losses, by the railway men, and are especially difficult to trace, as the shipment leaves and arrives apparently in good condition, and it is almost impossible to discover at what point the theft occurred.

The silk industry has been one of the most severely hit in the last year, and so great has the risk become that the Railroad Administration has been considering excluding raw silks from the privilege of light transportation by rail. The merchants' Association of New York, through its traffic bureau, has protested against such an exclusion, advocating some less radical measure to minimize or prevent the theft of silk in transit.

The great war had been under way since Aug. and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Port Arthur. Even in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active service in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

The Railway Y. M. C. A. provided 140,000 beds to railway men and served 238,800 meals in 1919. Its buildings are valued at \$580,000.

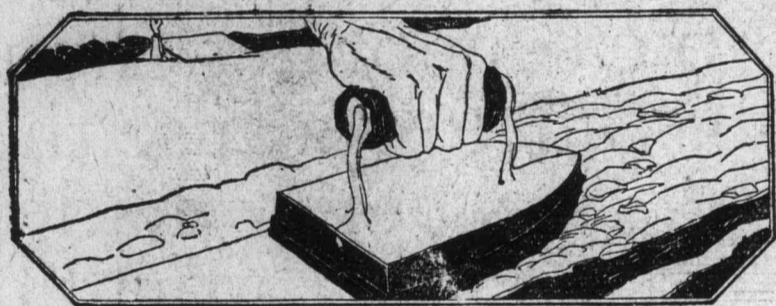

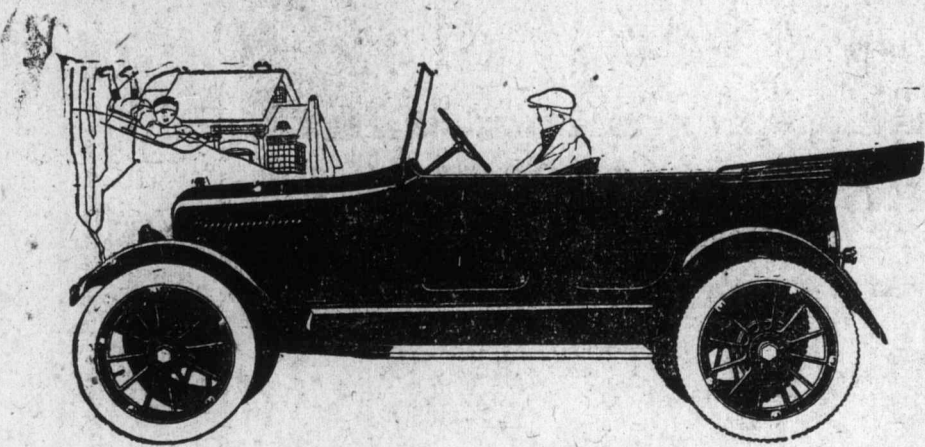

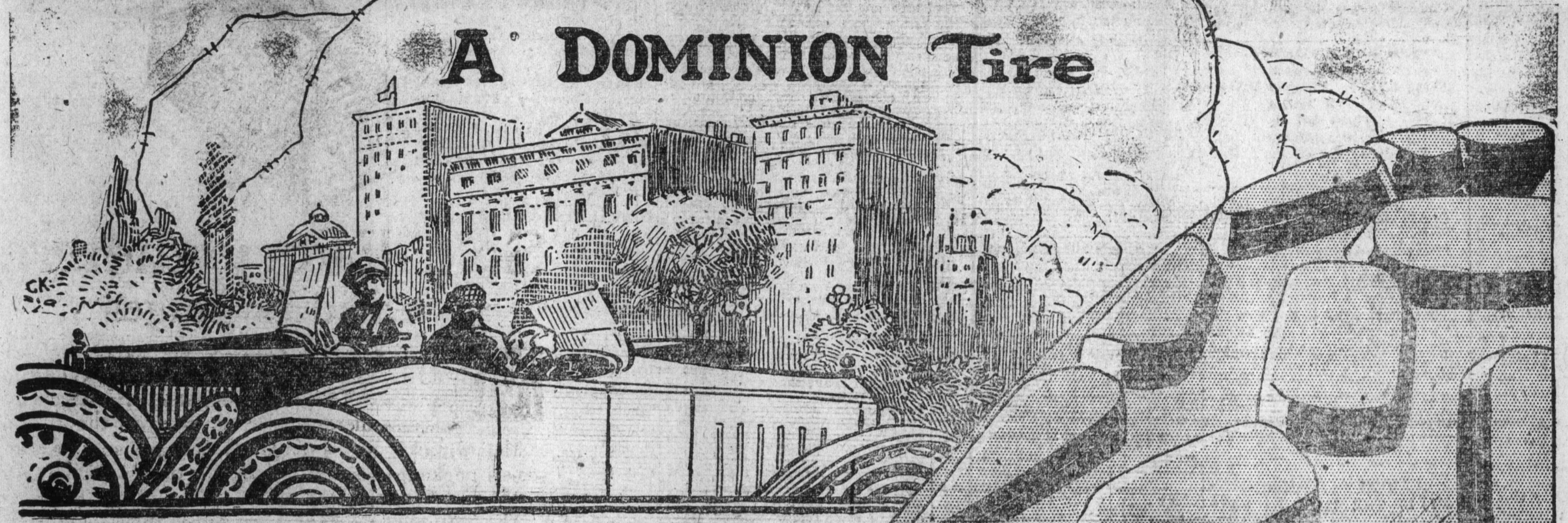

### STARTING BEEKEEPING

Suggested Outfit for the Apiary  
Novice.

Start With the Right Hive—The  
10-Frame Langstroth is Regarded  
as the Best—How to Prevent  
Swarming—Care of Freshening  
Cov.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of  
Agriculture, Toronto.)  
**E**XTRACTED honey production  
is the most satisfactory for  
beginners. Start with three  
colonies and sufficient up-to-  
date equipment and then make the  
bees pay their way. One colony does  
not give the beginner an opportunity  
to right mistakes or accidents profit-  
ably. Three colonies can be managed  
by devoting one evening weekly to  
the apiary.  
Avoid many troublesome pitfalls  
by starting with the right hive. The  
10-frame Langstroth hive has given  
the best satisfaction in Ontario. All  
beekeepers' supply houses carry this  
hive and its parts in their regular  
stock. Buy your first hives from a  
good manufacturer. It is very neces-  
sary to have all hive parts inter-  
changeable so that they may be used  
in any colony in the apiary. Uniformity  
and accurate workmanship alone,  
can ensure this need.

One complete 10 fr. Langstroth  
hive consists of:  
1. A bottomboard.  
2. A hive-body with self spacing  
frames and wire.  
3. A telescoping metal roof cover.  
In addition the beginner should  
provide for each colony one queen ex-  
cluder; two extra hive-bodies com-  
plete with frames; and 7 lbs. of Me-  
dium Brood Foundation which runs  
six sheets to the pound, to fill the  
frames with a guide and foundation  
for the future combs. All hive ma-  
terial should be mailed, wired and  
packed before the opening of the  
spring rush.  
It is advisable to commence with a  
2-lb. package of bees and queen; a  
swarm or a nucleus. Less danger-  
ous disease attends the buying of  
pound packages than the buying of  
swarms and nuclei. Pound packages  
may be secured for delivery from  
May 1st to June 30th. Early pack-  
ages will yield a surplus if carefully  
handled. Enquire of the Provincial  
Agriculturist re disease in your locality  
before buying swarms, nuclei or col-  
onies. A small colony of bees is much  
less vindictive than a full colony and  
thus offers a better opportunity for  
the beginner to grow with his bees.  
The accessory equipment for the  
beginner should consist of:  
1. A veil of black cotton tulle.  
2. A standard bee smoker.  
3. A hive tool.  
4. A spur wheel wire embedder.  
5. An uncapping knife.  
6. An uncapping box.  
7. A complete set of Department  
literature, Bulletins 213, 233 and  
256, and a good reference bee book.  
8. A small honor chest for carrying  
tools.  
With the exception of Nos. 6 and  
8 it is advisable to acquire the ma-  
terial needed from a supply firm at  
once. The uncapping box can be  
made at home, and the beginner could  
probably co-operate with another bee-  
keeper in securing the use of an ex-  
tractor. With the increase of col-  
onies, the uncapping box can be  
made at home, and then be advis-  
able to provide a store of bees and  
in handling the crop.—W. A. Weir,  
O. A. College, Guelph.

To Prevent Swarming of Bees...  
June is the swarming month and  
time of the year for the main honey  
flow which begins between the 10th  
and the 20th of the month, depend-  
ing on the season and the latitude.  
Bees are given supers enough to  
avoid any crowding which may cause  
the bees to become discouraged, quit  
work and swarm excessively. It  
should be the beekeeper's aim to pre-  
vent swarming as much as possible.  
This is done by keeping young  
queens, giving plenty of room and a  
systematic examination of brood-  
chambers to detect colonies which  
are preparing to swarm. When queen  
cells are found far advanced they  
should all be destroyed and the queen  
herself removed. After the colony  
has been queenless one week the  
combs should again be examined and  
all cells except one removed. This  
one will provide them with a queen  
and if only one is left they will not  
swarm again. Where an improvement  
of stock is desired the new queen  
may be given instead of leaving one  
queen cell.  
Nature swarms should be hived  
on the old stand after removing the  
parent colony to one side. The  
swarms should be given the supers  
from the old colony. New swarms  
will be given vigor because they  
have no brood to care for during the  
first week. Colonies held together  
without swarming gather more honey  
than those which swarm. It is the  
beekeeper's patriotic duty to reduce  
the cost of honey-production and thus  
increase the quantity he is called to  
produce as greatly as possible. They  
also cause the beekeeper less trouble  
at unexpected times. This may be  
done more by swarm prevention than  
in any other way. Bulletin 233 takes  
this matter up thoroughly and should  
be carefully studied by all bee-  
keepers. By mastering the methods  
described it is quite possible to man-  
age as many apiaries as there are  
days in the week, barring Sundays  
and rainy days.—W. A. Weir, O. A.  
College, Guelph.

Care of the Freshening Cow.  
This is the month when a large  
number of cows freshen. Both fresh  
cows and milk cows should receive  
special attention. Cows ex-  
pected to freshen should be placed  
in a box stall for a few days before  
and after freshening. Many valuable  
cows and calves are lost by neglecting  
to provide box stall accommodation.  
This should be found in every dairy  
stable; or else have a special barn  
for the purpose.

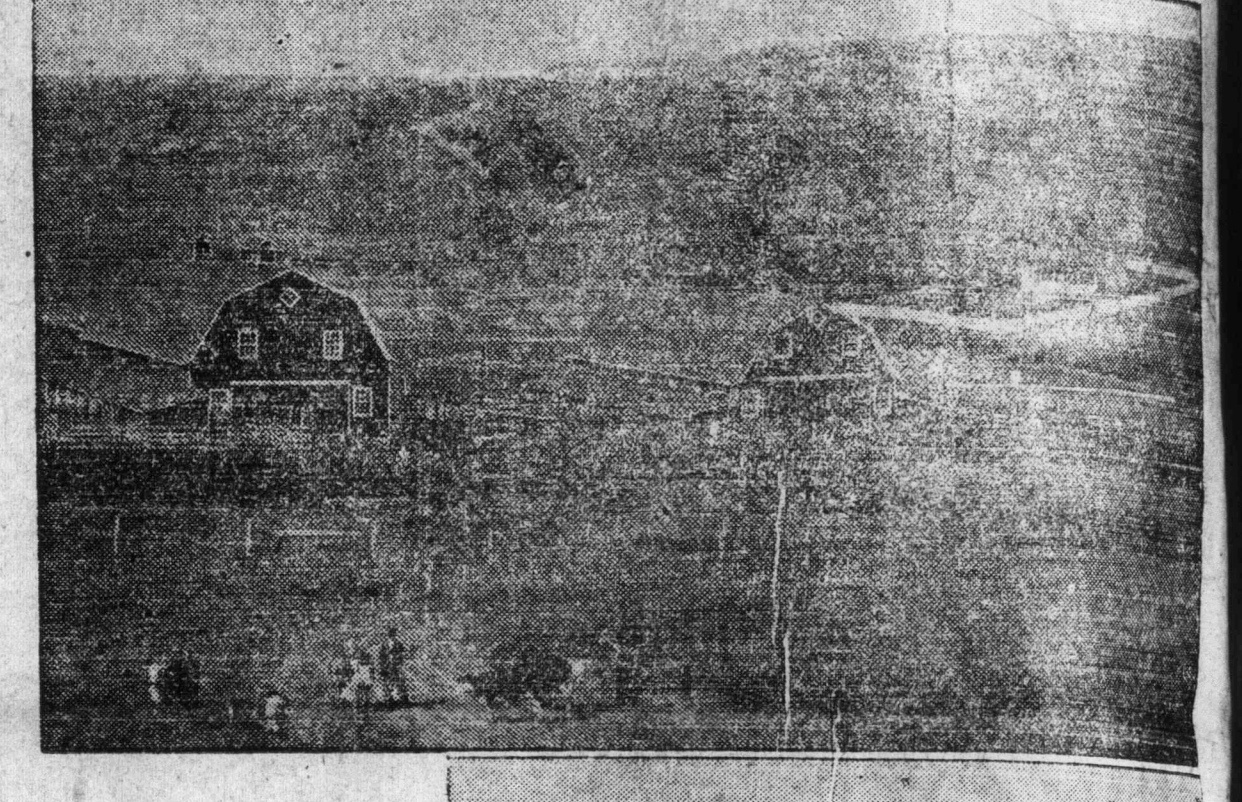

**PROMOTING PURE BRED CATTLE**



The livestock men of Alberta have adopted a novel means of promoting their industry, and incidentally of bringing to the notice of the people both within and without the province, the standing of Alberta as a livestock country.

Thirteen of the largest breeders have donated thirteen steers, mostly purebreds, to the University Farm without any charge whatsoever. These steers represent the cream of twenty-four of Alberta's leading herds, and constitute what is thought to be the finest selection of its kind owned by any institution in Canada.

During the past a number of grade steers had been bought from time to time by the University Farm for judging purposes for the students of the College of Agriculture. The best of these were shown at the local live stock shows and later sold. It was next to impossible however to secure the class of stock best suited to this purpose with the funds available, as it entailed going to the larger breeders and paying top prices for selected individuals, and the probability the breeders would not care to dispose of the animals of the age most suitable. It was felt that this work could be made more valuable to the province at large if instead of using ordinary grade steers, animals of higher merit could be obtained. In any case the cost of labor, feed and housing would be the same.

To Professor A. A. Dowell, Chief of the Department of Animal Husbandry of the University of Alberta, came an inspiration whereby the University was able to get the required animals without paying a cent for them, yet giving their owners a good return. It appears that there are a number of breeders in the province of Alberta who are not in a position to do their own advertising and showing. Consequently their herds suffer from a lack of advertisement. Prof. A. Dowell evolved a plan by which the breeders in this position would get their herds advertised at the exhibitions, and the University Farm the desired class of animals. The plan suggested was that the breeders donate five or six calves of the three leading beef herds, and the University would use them for judging purposes for any one concern in Canada today, at Chicago. Practically all of the

breeders approached were perfectly willing to assist in carrying out this scheme. The plan was submitted to the Alberta Breeders Association at their annual convention held at Calgary last May, and receiving the entire approval of the Association, twenty-four breeders offered the best calves of their herds.

Immediate steps were taken to visit the various farms, and after three months thirteen calves were selected from the twenty-four herds. Grades were not debarred, but pure breeds were preferred.

The big difficulty that Prof. Dowell had in selecting these calves was not getting the owners to consent to part with them, but rather in refusing animals from breeders who offered them. Many of the breeders actually urged the university to send a representative to their farms, and take the best of any of their calves for them, yet giving their owners a good return. It appears that there are a number of breeders in the province of Alberta who are not in a position to do their own advertising and showing.
