



HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

Yesterday's Sitting.

When the House opened yesterday Mr. Kent presented a petition from the residents of Torbay on the subject of a road in that place, and strongly recommended it to the consideration of the Government; Mr. Dwyer giving his hearty support also to the prayer of the petition.

Mr. Earle presented a petition from A. G. Farrell and others, of Gander Bay, for a very necessary road in that locality; he also presented one from the inhabitants of Fredericton and vicinity asking for the extension of the railway to that important section of the country. On this part of the coast line, Mr. Earle pointed out, there were few harbours and the extension of the railway to that important section of the country would be of incalculable benefit to the people. Mr. Earle spoke of the possibilities of this section as a prospective attraction for tourists, and that the people of the place had determined to build a large hotel there and he hoped when means would be at the disposal of the Government the granting of facilities which railroads can give would be the portion of these progressive people.

Additional estimates for \$55,115 were passed.

The Minister of Justice introduced a Pension Bill.

The Game Bill was read a first time. The Registry of Deeds, Education, Municipal and Medical Acts passed and were sent to the Upper House.

The House went into Committee on the act relating to the Survey of Steamers on inland waters. The Minister of Finance and Customs (Mr. Cahin) explained the provisions of the bill. At present there were two steamers, one capable of carrying over 100 passengers plying on inland waters, besides many motor boats, and the Government had no authority at present to survey them or see to their accommodation and fitness for the work.

Mr. Kent had no objections to the measure but had heard it stated on good authority that steamers coming from the Labrador had been overcrowded to double their capacity. He needed not to remind the House of the great risk to human life attending such a practice. The conditions, of course, he knew were unusual late in the fall when people were finished with their work of fishing on the coast. Extra means of conveyance should be procured so that such overcrowding could be obviated.

The Minister of Marine and Fisheries (Mr. Piccott) replied there was a certain amount of truth in the charge. When the fishery was over the captain and officers of the steamer plying there had been obliged to prevent overcrowding the ship. He cited the case of the Virginia Lake some few years ago.

Mr. Lapp was glad that the Bill had been introduced as it would be productive of good. When he presented a petition the other day from the people of the District of St. John's on the overcrowding of the Home he spoke very strongly on this matter and pointed out that none had wanted to see another Titanic disaster on a moderate scale. Speak to Messrs. Grant or Whiteley and they could tell of overcrowding on the ship. This overcrowding was simply criminal and if the men were willing to run the risk of such a proceeding it was unfair to allow them to do. Owners should not be allowed to take the fares from the people and the Government should find another steamer to accommodate them. He would go further and state that the vessels were not safe enough on such ships and not sufficient boats should a catastrophe occur. This conduct was not fair to the men themselves nor certainly was it fair to themselves or their families.

The Premier said that this was just what the Government was doing and what should have been done years ago by those in the Government of that time but they had not sufficient influence to bring it home. (As Sir Edward has been high in the councils of previous Governments it must have struck all present that his zeal to have a rap at those who preceded him caused him to overlook the fact that he was virtually slapping his own face.) Sir Edward held that Mr. Piccott had fully answered Mr. Kent.

Mr. Kent said what he spoke it was not to find fault because all knew that things were bettering themselves the past two years, and when another steamer was on the danger and difficulties of past years will have been greatly removed. It was not fair, however, that men about to leave the coast should be compelled to take their choice of that steamer or be left on the coast. He felt that with the new accommodation provided next summer the congestion noticed in the past will not occur again.

The Bill passed the Committee, as did the Bills relating to the Eastern and Dominion Trust Companies.

ies, in moving the second reading of the Bill for the encouragement of shipbuilding, explained its provisions. The Bill relating to Merchant Shipping, was also read a second time.

The House now went into Committee to consider Resolutions re the building of tramways and other works at Bell Island. The Premier said that in October, of last year, the people of Bell Island had petitioned the Government as to the request made by the Company, to be granted the powers contained in the Resolutions. The Company will be given the exclusive right for 50 years to build and operate ships tramways, elevators, wharf at the beach and other works on Bell Island. The work would cost \$40,000 and they asked the Government to give them a guarantee of what they would make less than 5 per cent. upon the work. The work would cost \$40,000 and they also required \$1,000 for the upkeep of the wharf to which the public will have a right. That would come out of the coal duty of \$20,000 per year.

Mr. Kent said that Beach Hill was the only proper landing place on the island, it is very steep and the main road for traffic for all persons and conveyances, and when these prospective tramways were built matters of importance for people using Beach Hill, would come up. People owning and using horses for truckage, would suffer if the tramway was not well built and kept flush with the surface of the road, particularly after the winter. Then if the tramway was used in winter there was the question of keeping the snow from the public road and some provision should be made to secure ordinary traffic over it. Referring to the Council at the Island, to which the Premier had alluded, he paid a tribute to its personnel who were men of substance and standing, and capable of looking after the rights and interests of the people. Three or four years ago, he (Mr. Kent) had presented a petition asking for the creation of such a Council. The Island, he believed, would increase in population and importance, and he contended that the sum of \$1,000 out of the coal duties collected, was not at all enough to meet the necessities of the Island at the present time. A town was now growing rapidly on the island, and it required accommodations, which \$1,000 with the per capita portions of the other grants was not sufficient. The revenue from the island was large, coal duties of \$20,000, ore royalties of \$100,000 all totalling nearly \$200,000 if not more. The whole place required to be laid out and plans for a regular town framed. At Placentia, Carboneau, St. John's, Grand Bank and other places, all such duties were given to the Councils, then why not Bell Island? The Council of the Island would put it to good use.

The Premier said that he did not think Mr. Kent was fair in asking for more money for the Island, and as for the towns he named, they only received a small share of their coal duties. He thought the Government's allotment of \$100,000 was a fair share.

Mr. Kent agreed with the principle laid down by the Premier that the revenue derived from a place should be an index of the amount of expenditure there, but he would like to point out that on the Island they had three principal sources of revenue, viz., the ordinary customs revenue, the special ore tax and the duty on coal, which was a duty appropriated in every other place, specially for local purposes. His position then was that as far as ordinary duty was concerned Bell Island should receive the same treatment as other places, but that they were entitled to a better proportion of the coal and ore tax to meet public requirements.

The Resolutions passed.

Before the House adjourned, Mr. Kent brought under the notice of the Government the fact that a large number of questions asked since the beginning of the session, have not been answered and that information required had been persistently refused. He read from a sheet of order papers dated from the opening day of the session down through the sittings to a few days ago, where important questions had been given no attention. Unless these questions are answered it is not likely that the prorogation of Parliament will occur as early as some people would wish.

Suppressing Information.

There is nothing which throws a clearer light on the fear of the Electorate, felt by the Morris Government, than the course they have pursued and are at present pursuing in the way of delaying the supplying of information asked for by the Opposition and the suppressing of it altogether.
This is by no means the first occasion we have drawn attention to the policy of the Government of keeping the country in the dark in regard to many of their doings, which the Opposition rightly think should bear the full light of day.
We have pointed out on previous occasions that the same course was pursued last year, and the most convincing proof of it is to be found in the official publications of the Government, which contain irrefragable evidence of the intent of the Government not to give the people information

asked for by the Opposition, and also bear witness of the stupidity of the Government in leaving such convincing evidence on record.

The stupidity of the Government is shown in the publication of the questions asked in the session of 1912 in three different forms of official publications, viz. the Government newspapers, the Hansard, and the Journal of the House of Assembly.

The intent of the Government to suppress the information is shown by the fact that the answers to these questions are not to be found in any one of these official publications.

The course pursued by the Government this year corroborates our statement. They have shown a disposition not to satisfy the legitimate desire of the country for information of their doings.

Yesterday Mr. Kent drew the attention of the Speaker and the House to the fact that a very large proportion of the questions which had been asked by members of the Opposition and which in some cases have been on record for weeks on the agenda of the House have not been answered.

The Morris Government seem to treat the House of Assembly as part and parcel of their party organization. They seem to forget that it is an institution representing the Electorate, and that there is an Opposition as well as a Government Party, and that it is the function of any member to ask questions as to the doings of the Administration and that it is the duty of Ministers to supply the information which has been asked for by the Opposition.

The function of inquiring is one of the most ancient and clearest rights of members of Parliament, and the systematic delaying and suppressing of information convict the Government of being recreant in their duty to the country and of fearing the exposure to the public of what they have been doing.

200 Bomb Throwers
Sacrifice Their Lives
In Capture of Tarabosch Fort.

CETTINGE, To-day.
The Tarabosch Fort, which for months held the allies off Scutari, is now practically in the hands of the Montenegrins thanks to the sacrifice of 200 bomb throwers, every one of whom lost his life in a last desperate effort to clear the way to the town for possession of which Montenegro is ready to give up everything. These bomb throwers were all picked men chosen from several battalions, climbing up mountain side under murderous fire from the Turkish guns they cut the wire entanglements, getting to close quarters to throw bombs among the Turks, thus opening the way for a storming party. Not one of the bomb throwers ever returned, but they had accomplished their object, and the Montenegrin infantry following close upon them charged the trenches. The Turks held ground and a desperate bloody hand to hand fight ensued, lasting an hour, ending in a victory for the Montenegrins, who lost three hundred men, killed and wounded. Tier after tier of entrenchments had been taken, but the troops of the southern division, under General Marinkovich, to whom the task had been assigned, overcame all obstacles.

Cable News.

LONDON, To-day.
Just as Montenegro scored her first real success by getting a foothold at Tarabosch the key to Scutari, the warships of the Powers, are gathering long the coast to compel her to give up the most precious fruits of five months' fighting. After a series of separate engagements, the Montenegrins, assisted by Serbians, have practical command of Tarabosch. Simultaneously with the arrival of this news came further information of Austrian warships anchored off Antivari and that British, Italian warships are on their way to join them for the purpose of making a demonstration which is approved by the Powers, excepting Russia. Should the demonstration prove ineffectual, it is understood the Montenegrin Ports Antivari and Dubrigno will be occupied. When the Montenegrin trouble is over of the way, it is likely the Powers will lean with Serbia. She has informed the British Minister it was impossible to withdraw troops from Scutari as Serbia was bound to Montenegro until peace had been signed and that her army drawing back at the present time would be the death knell of the Balkan Alliance. Serbia too, is reported to be preparing for a permanent occupation of Durazzo. This action would be directly against the decision of the Powers. Elsewhere matters are moving smoothly. An agreement has practically been reached with regard to the boundary between Turkey and Bulgaria, although Bulgaria is guarding against any slip in the peace negotiations and is moving virtually the whole of her Adrianople army to Tchatalja, the captured town will be left in possession of Gendarmes. A partial agreement is also reported to have been arranged between Bulgaria and Roumania, the latter getting Silistria.

Mrs. Pankhurst's Trial.

LONDON, To-day. Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, militant suffragette, from the prisoners' enclosure at Old Bailey Court house yesterday pleaded not guilty to charge of having counselled several persons whose names are unknown to place gunpowder and other explosive substances with intent thereby to damage Lloyd George's country house at Walton Heath. Frail looking and pale the suffragette leader when she looked round court room found practically all the public seats were occupied by women wearing rosettes and suffragette colors. Then she turned contemptuously to Sir Charles Montague Lush, posing to Sir Charles Montague Lush, Judge, and announced, I will defend myself. She was given a table on which to place her papers. Archibald H. Bodkin counsel for the Treasury had not proceeded far with his case when Mrs. Pankhurst interposed with the objection, I do not mind counsel introducing reports of my speeches made by Journalists, but I object to police reports. They are grossly inaccurate, very ignorant, ungrammatical conveys absolute wrong impression of what I said. The judge soothed her by promising her she should have an opportunity later of correcting them. Bodkin's speech closely followed the arguments used, during the preliminary hearing in police court, he said, it was not suggested Mrs. Pankhurst was present at the time the bomb was placed in Lloyd George's house, but the prosecution charged that she was necessary before the fact.

Special to The Evening Telegram. VERSAILLES, April 2. Ives Faure, military aviator, was killed to-day.

LONDON, April 2. The Pall Mall Gazette says that the Prince of Wales will probably visit Canada and the States this summer.

LONDON, April 2. King George and Queen Mary have accepted the Kaiser's invitation to attend his daughter's wedding on May 20.

ROME, April 2. Rev. P. Nussbaum, of Baltimore, has been appointed Bishop of the Diocese of Corpus Christi, and Rev. J. T. McNally, Bishop of Calgary.

WASHINGTON, April 2. The Progressive Party propose free use of the Panama Canal by coastwise traffic, and repeal of Canadian reciprocity.

SYDNEY, April 2. J. W. Peppett, of North Sydney, one of the best known shipping men in the Province, died suddenly to-day. He would have been 70 to-morrow.

LONDON, April 2. The Grand Jury at the Old Bailey has returned a true Bill against Olive Hochkin for setting fire to the Pavilion at the Richmond Golf Links last week.

ROME, April 2. Pierpont Morgan's pet Chinese dog, which always travelled with him, and was his constant companion, in his bedroom, has been found dead since his death, refusing to eat and displaying evident distress.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 2. A large whiskey warehouse collapsed to-day, releasing 5,000 barrels into the river, valued at \$250,000. The threatened collapse of warehouses is the only source of anxiety now, as the crest of the flood has passed. The floods are still menacing several cities, and refugees are increasing in numbers.

ROME, April 2. At Syracuse harbor two concave discs more than 2 feet in diameter, joined with a rotary apparatus, have been discovered. One disc is pierced with a circular hole in the centre. They are believed to be the celebrated burning mirror invented by Archimedes for the destruction of the ships of the enemies by focussing the sun's rays on them.

LONDON, April 2. The Navy League expresses disappointment at Churchill's reply on Monday, notably as it refers to the Dominion ships. His admission relative to the weakness of the position of affairs in 1906, the League regards as disapproving his public declaration. The League regards the employment of the ships as an imperial squadron as a violation of the agreement with the Dominions, that they should be additional. Under the proposed arrangement they would be doing, according to the League, work that belongs to the British Navy.

LONDON, April 2. Claims that radium can restore the hardened arteries of middle aged people and so prolong life, are made by Dr. Sandermann of Berlin, in a lecture at London before the Röntgen Society. If correct it will be possible for a few pounds of radium, which is placed in the bottom of a glass bottle, filled with water. The water becomes charged with radium emanations, which remain active for hundreds of years, so that renewal of the water ensures an unlimited number of doses.

ATHENS, April 2. The most impressive ceremonies that modern Greece has ever witnessed, marked the burial of King George to-day. The royal princes and representatives from the courts of Europe and America joined deputations from European Turkey, islands in the Aegean Sea, and from Asia Minor, each in their distinctive national dress. The soldiers and clergy rivalled each other in numbers, all branches of the army and church being represented at the head of the procession. The coffin was borne on a gun carriage, and was followed by King Constantine, the Crown Prince of Greece and royal princes. Then came missions from foreign states in carriages, preceding the Queen Dowager, Queen Consort and other princesses. The Greek Cabinet and ministers, members of the diplomatic corps, and practically all the members of the Greek Parliament, the municipal officials, prominent civilians, and a host of deputations from patriotic societies took their places in the procession, which was interspersed with large bodies of troops, most of whom had participated in the war. A prominent feature was the Holy Standard of the Greeks, which had never before

But, presto! a change! This self-confidence has suddenly vanished. The electorate, spite the Morrisites, are not so pronounced in their support of our party after all. Wherever shall we confirm the faithful, hearken the lukewarm and attract to our ranks him that standeth aloof? Reduce revenue, cut down taxation, for who can resist the temptation of such a bait? So the Honourable House of Assembly proceeds to shoot holes through the tariff and the revenue immediately becomes \$400,000 less. And now Morris is confident that the electorate is bound to him with bands of gold.

But is it? Are our electors such simpletons that they cannot recognize political kitting when they see it? Are they thoroughly convinced that Morris's latest move is a wise one, and do they consider the gift of \$10 to each family—as the McGrath political daily message triumphantly puts it—sufficient compensation for this hazardous paring down of the revenue? To all of which an adaptation of Kipling's famous lines is sufficient reply.

"The voter ain't no bloomin' fool— 'You bet the voter sees'."

REVENUE FINANCING. Where has Morris landed the country's finances? Pretty near that ruinous locality familiarly referred to as "the bow-wow". He has added six million dollars to our debt—and another addition of two million is in prospect—on an over-hasty policy of branch-railroad building. At four per cent per annum, we have to pay \$220,000 yearly interest on this account, computing merely at simple interest. The Government next proceeds to reduce revenue \$400,000 and we are immediately led to ask where the \$720,000 are to be made up? Certainly not out of surplus, these have now been whiped out. It is infinitely bad policy either to raise expenditure to the limit of income or cut down income to the limit of expenditure. This country has no corner on prosperity and its people would prefer seeing it with a goodly margin of surplus wherewith to assuage its solvency in times of financial stress which, sure as fate, come, sooner or later, to the individual or the nation.

"A gift of \$10 per family" then removes the generous margin that stood between our comfortable income and the "hand-to-mouth" existence to which Morris has reduced us. It takes away our great encouragement to foreign capitalists to risk money on us and our affairs. It represents a standing invitation to bankruptcy, a stumbling block to progress, a set-back to plans for the im-

A semi-invalid who lived in a large apartment house, had his sleep broken almost every night by loud noises in the apartment overhead. Again and again he would be awakened at one or two o'clock by someone tramping heavily about in the room over him and would not be able to go to sleep again that night. His wife, fearing serious injury to their health, wrote a courteous note to their overhead neighbours, explaining the state of affairs, and asking them if they would mind being a bit quieter at that time of night in the room directly over his.

Whereupon they promptly sent back word that they paid a high rent for their apartment, and felt that they had a perfect right to make all the noise they chose.

Of course that incident sets your teeth on edge just as it did mine, and yet isn't the spirit involved in that declaration of right a rather common one?

Don't we all sometimes do things that we have a "perfect right" to do in one way, and no right in another? For instance, a young girl who lived in a boarding house and had running water in her room, used to do some of her washing in the bowl. "It's

quite easy," she said, "because before I wash I turn on the water and let it run through the things for half an hour or so." "Doesn't that use up a lot of water?" she was asked. "Oh, I suppose so," she answered, "but you know I don't have to pay for it, and there's nothing in the terms to prevent my using all the water I want." Now I know this girl would have been shocked at the rude answer of the noisy tenant, and yet wasn't she showing the same spirit?

Of course one has a "perfect right" to go into a shop or a restaurant just about five minutes before closing time, when the tired shop girls are longing for an opportunity to put away their stock, and the waitresses are hoping that trade will slacken up. But isn't it a pretty mean thing to make a habit of doing? That is, unless some necessity compels one to shop or eat at that particular hour.

Of course a lady of leisure who has been shopping or amusing herself in town during the afternoon, and could have gone home at any time she pleased, has a "perfect right" to go home during the rush hour and keep a seat from some poor girl who has stood behind a counter all day long. But the really kind and thoughtful women do not use that right.

There are many other things to which one has a "perfect right" without having a moral right. I leave each reader to find out those that concern her, for herself.



Land at Three Millions an Acre.

Although it is a somewhat exceptional price, the £11,737, which works out at £1,109,000 an acre, paid by an insurance company to the London County Council for a tiny portion of ground at Charing Cross, adjoining the entrance to the Mall Archway, and comprising only 46 1/2 square ft., with a frontage of sixty-nine feet, it is by no means a record in London land values. Nine years ago some offices were sold at the junction of Old Broad Street and Threadneedle Street, the price for the freehold being £210,000, or nearly £70 per square foot. This works out at £630 per square yard, or £3,049,200 per acre.

A short time previous to this sale, the freehold ground rent of a block in Cornhill was sold at a price which worked out at £2,452,028 per acre. Land in New York, by the way, is almost as valuable as it is in London. A little piece of land at the south-east corner of Thirty-eighth Street, measuring 25 by 100 feet, changed hands for £140,000 (£2,413,224 per acre), which would make the price per square foot equivalent to about £55 8s. About the same time a piece of land in Fifth Avenue was sold at about £42 per square foot (£1,689,520 per acre).

A striking illustration of the value of land in London is afforded by the enormous rents derived from estates owned by the titled landlords of the Metropolis. At Westminster, for instance, the Duke of Westminster owns 400 acres, the yearly rental of which amounts to £3,000,000. Near Sloane Street, the Earl of Cadogan owns 200 acres, from which he derives £1,500,000 in rent annually. The Duke of Norfolk practically owns the Strand, the rental value of which is also about £1,500,000, while Lord Northampton derives not a little of his wealth from 260 acres of land which he owns in Clerkenwell, the annual rent of which is £1,600,000. On one side of Tottenham Court Road is 250 acres owned by the Duke of Bedford, £2,250,000 being the total annual rent, while on the other side 292 acres are owned by Lord Howard de Walden, the annual rent of which is £2,900,000. Mention should also be made of the 270 acres owned by Lord Portman in the St. John's Wood, the annual rent of which is £1,890,000.
