# Cable News.

MEXICO CITY, To-day. At 7.30 last evening, Francisco Carbajal, took oath as Provisional President of Mexico, before the assembled deputies and senators. The new executive, escorted by Presidential guards went immediately to the Palace and were cheered by the people.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The news of Huerta's resignation was hailed by official Washington as the first practical step towards a quick solution of the Mexican problem. Constitutionalists, diplomats and officials of the United States Government did not conceal their satisfaction over the fact that at least Huerta had voluntarily eliminated himself from the situation.

COLUMBUS, New Mexico, To-day, The annihilation to-day of the Constitutionalist garrison at Palomas, Chihuahua, by Federal regulars broke the peace of Northern Mexico and revived reports of a counter revolution. Three hundred guerillas under General Roque Gomez, attacked the little border town in view of the troops of the United States army patrol. Every man of the village and garrison were killed, it is reported.

LONDON, To-day. It required half a dozen policemen for the removal from Marlborough Street Police Court of two kicking clawing, screaming militant suffragetes, who earlier in the day had attempted to horsewhip the Secretary of State for Scotland. Only for the timely intervention of his butter, it is very probable the Secretary would have been soundly thrashed. A militant lashed him across the chest but before she could deliver a second cut, a butler seized her, threw her sprawling to the ground, leaving him free to tackle the second woman, who was shouting, "Let me get at the Scotch pig." When the police arrived they bundled both women to the police station. In court the women gave the names of Jeanette Wallace and Bertha Watson. They were fined twenty shillings. They refused to pay and were sent to jail for fourteen days.




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
