Ocean Yacht Race This Year.

Yachts of all Countries Eligible--Fire at Mount Allison University--Allies Have Formulated Definite Programme--Fresh Disorders Terminate January in Ireland--Free Gold Strike Made in Manitoba.

PARAPHRASE ELABORATE PROGRAMME.

PARIS, Jan. 31. The resumption of the conference of experts on reparations, which opened for February 7, at Brussels, allies have formulated a definite elaborate programme on a basis of discussion. The German delegates have been notified of the date and to attend.

A REAL RACE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31. Only one or more British vessels may enter the ocean race from New York to Ostend, open to all yachts of the world, to be held for a cup offered by King Albert of Belgium, according to an announcement made by the Belgian ambassador to the United States. The race will be without handicap and the start will be at 10 a.m. on Sunday, Feb. 1, from any nation's flag as well as auxiliary craft, which their engines are sealed.

FIRE AT MOUNT ALLISON.

SACKVILLE, N.B., Jan. 31. Bagley Hall, part of Mount Allison University, was burned to the ground last night with a loss of \$35,000. A man, already named by the school as also lost. The Hall was used as a gymnasium and an officers' training camp had been drilling there earlier in the evening.

MORE REPRISALS.

CORK, Jan. 31. Several stores in Williamstown were burned by the military on Saturday, in reprisal. It is declared, for the ambush near Castle Island, Kerry. It was in this ambush that Divisional Commander Holmes sustained injuries which brought about death and in which five constables were wounded.

ELECTION AND ARRESTS.

CORK, Jan. 31. The Cork Corporation to-day rejected Donald O'Callaghan, Lord Mayor of Callaghan is at present in the United States. Towards the close of the evening a police force arrived and three of the Aldermen and two Councilors taking them to the stocks.

WILL PROMOTE IT ALONE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31. The Richard will promote the heavy-Carpenter boat for the heavyweight championship of the world alone. He made this announcement today, following a conference with Wm. A. Brady, at which he agreed to take over the interests of the Richard and Charles D. Cochrane, London, England, who is seriously ill.

DEATH LIST THIRTEEN.

HOBOKEN, Jan. 31. The death list from the first which destroyed Hotel Colonial here to-day totalled thirteen, seven men and six women. The thirteenth victim, Miss Blanche Kathleen, of Jersey City, died to-day in hospital here.

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FOUR DEATHS FROM SUFOCACTION.

LONDON, Jan. 31. The wife and three children of James H. Glover, 619 Bathurst Street, are dead from suffocation as the result of a small blaze in their home about 6.45 o'clock this morning. The fire started from an overheated stove in the back part of the house.

ROBBER KILLED BY OWN GUN.

PROVIDENCE, R.I., Jan. 31. Orris A. Lane, collector for the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company, carrying the day's collection, was held up on the stairway from his house to-day, but turned the hold-up man's gun on the robber and killed him.

NEW GOLD STRIKE.

THE PAS, Man., Jan. 31. A strike of free gold in the shaft of the Rex mine, at Heber Lake, at the depth of 245 feet, is reported. Samples of the ore have been received herewith, it is claimed, gold sticking generously.

ON MAIDEN VOYAGE.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31. The Albanian, a 12,700 ton passenger steamer owned by the Cunard Line, arrived here to-day on her maiden voyage. The ship is one of several of her class to be added to the Line.

THE appeal of Joseph Murphy, who was found guilty by a court martial on October 31, against the military, and sentenced to death, the court to-day handed down a decision that it was powerless to stay the execution of the sentence, but it held that the prisoner should be given a reprieve to make further representations to the court martial.

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Saints Defeat Terra Novas.

IN POOR HOCKEY EXHIBITION.

The Saints defeated the Terra Novas in a very poor exhibition of hockey last night by a score of 10 goals to 5. Over 1400 people attended the game which was a disappointment to everybody for at no time were there any signs of real hockey. From beginning to end the Saints had the best of play and although occasional spurts were put on by the Terras, they did not look at all as if they were likely to win. At times a little combination was shown by both sides, especially by the Saints but it never proved very effective, the majority of the goals being scored from individual efforts. One aspect of this game which it is hoped will be absent from the remaining games of the series was the frequent fouling, tripping and slashing which did not in any way improve the play from the point of view of either spectators or players. Robertson as usual, was the mainstay of his team and his individual play was as good as ever. Paterson also did very well and earned his place. "Cooley" Munn gave a very good exhibition of goal-tending throughout the game. The Terras were greatly handicapped by the absence of Bob Stick through illness. His presence would have made a big difference to the game. Both Canning and Len Stick worked hard but rarely managed to get through. The game was started at 7.35 by "Coke" Cahill who was referee.

THE FIRST PERIOD

was scrappy and very slow. The ice seemed a bit too fast for the players, who did not appear able to control the puck at all. The first goal for the game was scored by Coultas from a rebound, five minutes after the start. Long shooting was much indulged in during this period, as indeed, it was right through the game. Rawlins was called upon several times and saved in good style. After ten minutes play Field came part of the way down ice playing the boards, and shooting some distance from the goal, placed the puck behind Rawlins. Some six minutes later Len Stick scored the Terra's first goal from a mix-up. Several ineffective attempts at combination were made during this period. Several penalties were also handed out.

THE SECOND PERIOD

was very much the same as the first, the brand of hockey handed out being very poor. The first five minutes of this period showed the fastest bit of play for the game, the Terras working hard and hovering around their opponents goal. After while the game deteriorated into the old scrappiness and proved of little interest. Field and Munn got in some nice play during this period. Near the end of the period Eric Churchill twisted his ankle and had to leave the ice. The Saints managed to add five goals to their score during this period, E. Munn getting two, and Field, Hennigbury and Robertson one each. Just before the gong went Fraser netted the Terra's second goal from a long shot. The period closed with the Saints leading by 7 goals to 2.

THE THIRD PERIOD

opened with the Terras pressing their opponents goal. This did not last long, however, but for some time play was of a give and take nature. A considerable amount of unnecessary slashing was indulged in during this period. The Terras added three goals to their score during this period and the Saints got three also. Len Stick, Gus Herder and Clouston scored for the former and Field (2) and Hennigbury for the latter who, when the final gong went, were the victors by a score of 10 goals to 5.

Mr. Coaker
"Loquitur."

From his comfortable cabin on board s.s. Sachem, the saviour of Newfoundland hands out his usual literary pabulum, in the ardent hope that the Coakeresque sentiments and statements therein contained will still further befoul those to whom his review of "The Year Just Past" is addressed. But northern fishermen are not so short on memory that they will have forgotten so quickly the cavalier manner in which they were treated by Mr. Coaker last November, when they were parading Water Street in an almost hopeless effort to dispose of their catch. Neither will they have forgotten the difficulty experienced by them in their endeavours to obtain short interviews with the Acting Premier and Minister of Marine and Fisheries on the— to them—all absorbing subject of fish sales. Another matter which they are not likely to put out of mind is the rude manner in which Mr. Coaker and his satellites dismissed their complaints and refused them a hearing at that "wonderful" meeting called at the instance of the President of the Fishermen's Protective Union on the night of November 18th last, at which no person was permitted a hearing save those who were down on the programme for the usual stereotyped address, and when several fishermen persisted in an attempt to query the Regulations, the police were ordered to clear the hall. These incidents are quite fresh in the thoughts of the toilers and they are not likely to allow themselves to be bulldozed or bluffed by any written statement of the man who made the price of fish.

Mr. Coaker, in his review of the past year, writes as a politician, not as a statesman, and as a hide-bound politician at that. Any person needing evidence of this statement has but to apply to the columns of the Advocate containing the article in question. Mr. Coaker defends the Fish Export Regulations. Naturally. He was their

creator, father and sponsor, and it is most unlikely that he would "round" on his own brain child. The usual old threadbare stock-in-trade arguments are revamped by the Minister of Fisheries, and his gentlemanly style of misrepresentation of opponents loses nothing in force and value by reason of writing from mid-Atlantic. If anything they are more potent and increasingly vigorous, because distance, perhaps, lends power to his ideas, and the scourge of his pen falls impartially upon all who opposed his policy in the operation of the Fish Regulations. There is nothing original in the diatribe of the "Wordy" President. His well-known style changeth not, neither do his arguments. They closely follow his former lines of thought, and convey an impression that he is writing only to while away the tedium of a voyage across the herring pond, and to kill time, because there are no passengers on the ship with whom his exaltedness cared to associate. All who opposed the Fish Export Regulations, come alike under the lash of that weapon which Mr. Coaker so well knows how to wield, though—and we say it with regret—he does abuse the power which it gives him. But so long as the doughty warrior likes to engage in a "swords at twenty paces" combat, there will be few who will find fault with his desire to once more get the Fish Regulations congestion of "langwidge" out of his system. Mr. Coaker must tilt at something, otherwise life would not contain any pleasure for him. His especial betes noirs to-day are those who fought him to a standstill on his ruinous Fish Policy, and there are other Richmonds in the field now.

A Little Bit Out.

A resolution passed at a meeting of the official board of Gover Street Methodist Church practically accuses the newspaper reporters of holding back news favourable to prohibition, and, in fact, of entering into a conspiracy with the purpose of rendering null and void the Prohibition Act. It does not matter one iota whether a newspaper reporter is in favour of prohibition or not, for his duty is to report without comment of any sort, and so far as the Telegram has been concerned this has always been done. To suggest "a conspiracy amongst newspaper reporters" is absolutely ridiculous on the face of it, and the resolution would have been rendered more forceful by the omission of the conspiracy sentence.

OTTAWA LEAVE ICE.
Following the giving of a goal against them, at Montreal on Jan. 28, which in spite of the referee's decision they claimed to be off sides, the Ottawa team after some ridiculous conduct, left the ice five minutes before the end of their game with the Canadians. The 5000 spectators created a terrible uproar, by turns, cursing the Ottawa men and begging them to finish, but to no avail. As a result of this unsportsmanlike act on the part of the Ottawa, Referee Smeaton, one of the best referees of the national Hockey League, resigned.

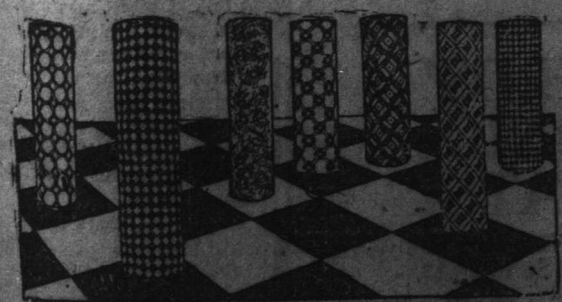

ENDORSES ATTITUDE OF REV. E. W. FORBES.

A dance held last night in the Masonic Temple under the auspices of the Masonic Hall Joint Stock Co., was attended by a large number of members and their lady friends. The arrangements were looked after by a Committee under the chairmanship of Mr. H. B. Cowan with Mr. J. W. McNelly as secretary, and the programme consisting of dances, waltzes and one-steps, etc., was thoroughly enjoyed. The music by the C.L.B. Band, under Capt. Morris, was up to the usual high standard. During the night supper was served under the supervision of Mrs. (Hon.) Tasker Cook and Mrs. J. C. Oke. The affair closed at 1.30 a.m., the participants voting it an unqualified success. This is the first of a series of Masonic dances and concerts which will be run off during the winter months.

Risk Stowaways Run.

The two lads, Kennedy and Snellgrove, stowaways on S.S. Lady of Gaspe, were arraigned before Judge Morris yesterday afternoon and pleaded guilty. His Honour sentenced both to 30 days imprisonment, or in default to pay \$20 each to recompense the ship-owners. Captain Nicholas of the Lady of Gaspe, in addressing the Court, told how the stowaways were found in the ship's chain locker, five hours after leaving port, and had the shipmet with any obstruction in the fairway after she had left the pier, and was obliged to drop anchor, the lads would have been ground to death, when the chain started to run. Several cases of this kind of death while stowaways have occurred in the past. Some fifteen years ago a man named McDonald stowed away on an Allan Liner from this port bound to England and hid himself in a coal bunker. His body was found in the bunker when the ship reached Liverpool, and it is believed that when the steamer got outside the Narrows and was tossed by the sea, he was carried down with the coal and met a terrible death. Another case of a stowaway meeting death followed the same year when an Englishman attempted to stow his way here from Liverpool, also in an Allan Liner. He got in on the cargo before the hatches were put down and when the steamer arrived here 12 days later his body was found in an emaciated condition in the hold.

Burglary at Cape Dog.

PROVISIONS STOLEN.
News has been received from Cape Dog, St. Mary's Bay, by Mr. C. Cooper, that his store there has been broken into and a quantity of provisions stolen. Mr. Cooper operates a fishing plant at Cape Dog and before returning to St. John's he had his premises closed, and the windows boarded up. The store was found broken into by the foreman who had been absent from the place for a brief holiday. The windows were smashed, furniture destroyed and a stock of provisions in the store taken away. While there is no direct evidence at hand it is believed the robbery was committed by parties from a nearby harbor who were aware of the owner's absence and also that of his foreman.

Walsh, and members of Dalhousie Council, Hr. Grace, including L. Jones, Avondale, Rev. Dr. Whelan, North River, Rev. Fr. Murphy, Conception Hr. Sunday afternoon at Hr. Grace, at Dalhousie Council, there was an exemplification of the third degree, in which the visiting brethren took part. The St. John's visitors returned to town by yesterday's shore train.

I was informed that he never makes less than two visits daily to each patient at the same time, offering them a word of cheer and comfort. Everything is carried out with precision, even their prayers are not neglected, as he sees that each nomination must have their prayers. There is no getting away from the fact that Dr. Rendell has been instrumental in making some remarkable cures. I might mention one instance in the case of Miss C. Mowbray, who is at present in charge of the night nursing staff, as an example, she being one of the first inmates of the old camps at the head of St. John's Pond. When placed in that institution she was considered by some of her friends as almost incurable, and spent five long years there, but now feeling perfectly well and a picture of health, and there are several others who have the same happy story to tell. I might also mention a young man named Kelly, who left here on Saturday feeling fine. I also met Mr. C. Hamlyn, a printer, who is feeling good since being under treatment. He too speaks in glowing terms of the kindness shown him and regrets that he did not enter the institution long ago.

Open Season for Newfoundland Sealers

St. John's.—Seal herds on the ice floes of the Labrador coast and in the mouth of the St. Lawrence River will have "no" protection next spring during the hunt annually carried on by a fleet of vessels from this port. The Newfoundland Government announces suspension for one season of all restrictions on the killing of the animals and has suggested to owners of sealing ships that they carry the same number of hunters as usual.
The owners had arranged previously, because of the high cost of outfit and the low prices obtainable for seal products, to reduce their crews by one-third. In view of the comparative failure of the fleet in the last three seasons it was thought this policy would give owners and crews a better prospect of remunerative returns. The owners have not yet decided whether they will agree to the Government's suggestion, which was made largely in the hope of providing employment for many men now idle.
The seals obtained in this region are not of the fur-bearing variety. Oil is extracted from the fat adhering to their pelts and the skins are used for the manufacture of gloves and other leather products.—Canadian Paper.

Train Notes.

THE STAMPS OF NEWFOUNDLAND
The Royal Portrait Issue.—Between the years 1897-1901 a series of stamps was issued bearing portraits of various members of the Royal Family for which reason the issue is now familiarly known as the Royal Portrait Issue. There were five values altogether ranging from 1/2 cent to 5 cents. The 3c. which bears a portrait of Queen Alexandra was issued in 1898, the 4c. with a portrait of Queen Mary when Duchess of York appeared in 1901 and the 5c. with a portrait of H. M. the King when Duke of York was issued in 1899. The 1/2c., 1c. and 2c. bearing the portraits respectively of the present Prince of Wales, Queen Victoria and King Edward VII. appeared in 1897. These stamps were engraved and printed by the American Bank Note Co., New York. The 1c. when it first

THE NEW GIBBONS.

The 1920 edition of the "Red" Gibbons has just come to hand and as I heard that some startling changes in prices were noted, particularly in the old classics, I have gone to some trouble to note a few of these alterations, thinking they might interest my readers. Before doing so, however, I want to say how pleased I was to see that at last the war stamps of the British Colonies are included in their proper place in the catalogue. There are some very startling changes in the prices of some of the early Newfoundland stamps. Here are a few of them:

In the 1862 issue there is a general tendency towards an increase in prices. This is also to be found in the 1866 issue. For instance, the 5c. brown seal has gone from 50 to 60 shillings, the 13c. orange from 7 1/2 to 10 shillings, and the 2c. green on white paper from 8 1/2 to 12 1/2. Advances of a few shillings occur in the prices of nearly all the stamps from 1865 to 1897. The 3c. deep brown of 1887 is now priced—used—at 5 shillings, the 3c. slate lilac of 1890 has jumped from 2 1/2 to 4 shillings, and there are big rises in all values of the reissue of 1896. The 4 cents violet of 1898 seems to be becoming a scarce stamp. Last year it was quoted at 80, whilst at present it is priced at 118, an increase of 100 per cent. All values of the Guy Issue, lithographed and engraved have increased considerably in value as have also the coronation, whilst the 2c. lithographed of this issue is now priced for the first time at 5 shillings. There is no change recorded in the prices of the Carillon Issue. The 6c. of this issue is still priced at 5d., whilst here speculators have been offering them at 65 cents each. I note that the Air Post stamps are now listed but not priced. In my next article I shall deal briefly with the price changes in the stamps of other countries.

ALL ARE OFFENDERS.

He has a wheezy phonograph that plays a lot of ancient soap; month after month I stand the gaff, for there's no law to make him stop. I'd play sweet music on the flute, soft, soothing chords that throbb and thrill, but when I start that fat galoot turns loose his clanking music machine. Now, you are learned in law, my man, so tell what methods one employs to get a statute that will can that obese poet and his noise." Long hours I sat there, sad and mute, then muttered, with a hollow laugh, "Before I squeal my neighbor's flute I'd better bust my phonograph."

Ireland's Black Night.

In Ireland the night is still black, and of the dawn there is scarcely a glimmer. The season of goodwill went by without a truce, and the New Year like the old, is being stained with murder and reprisals. The only change seems to be that the military are becoming more and more masters of the situation, and that the burning of houses has in some cases been officially authorized. De Valera, President of the so-called Irish Republic, is back in Ireland, and it is reported that he will not negotiate peace except on the basis of Ireland's independence. If that be so, the "war" must go on until the rebellion is exhausted; but will not moderate Irish opinion take charge and say that the waste of life and wealth for an impossible ideal must cease? Irish freedom within the free British Confederation is assured, and anything else is not worth fighting for.—Liverpool Weekly Post.

"Who won the Test match?" was one of the last remarks made by our Sergeant William E. Clayton, of Mitcham, London, a veteran of the Indian Mutiny, who has died at the age of eighty-eight says the Liverpool Weekly Post. Clayton was a great lover of cricket, and had not missed a Saturday game on Mitcham Green for fifty years. Tom Richardson, Lockwood, and many other famous cricketers were his personal friends. Known to his intimates as "Bobs II.," the sergeant served twenty-one years in the Rifle Brigade. He was severely wounded at the Relief of Lucknow. He also took part in the march from Kabul to Kandahar. The funeral, a military one, will take place at Mitcham.

O'NEILL RE-ELECTED. BURLIN, Jan. 31. Laurence O'Neill was to-day elected Lord Mayor of Dublin for the fourth successive year. Although not a Sinn Feiner, he was proposed by Sinn Feiners, and in giving thanks for his election he said that as Mayor he would be advised by those chosen by the vast majority of Irish people as their political representative.

REDUCING THE DEBT. NEW YORK, Jan. 31. Gold bars, valued at \$4,500,000, arrived yesterday on the steamship Aquitania, it was announced here today.

ON A WAGES QUESTION. CHICAGO, Jan. 31. President Wilson was asked tonight by representatives of seven Labor Unions to investigate a statement of Brig. Gen. W. Atterbury, of Pennsylvania Lines, before the Railway Labor Board, that the railroads of United States must have a wage readjustment or be in danger of bankruptcy, and if the statement were found true, to place the matter before Congress, and ask that body to enact remedial legislation immediately.

ARRESTED AND LIBERATED. DUBLIN, Jan. 31. Col. Maurice Moore, Commander of the Irish National Volunteers, who was arrested in his residence Saturday night by the military, was liberated today.

KRUGER MEMORIAL. JOHANNESBURG, Jan. 31. On the occasion of a brilliant review, Saturday, Prince Arthur of Connaught, Governor General of the Union of South Africa, amid applause, announced that at the instance of the Premier, General Jan Christian Smuts, King George had taken steps to secure the return to the Union Government of War trophies in the form of figures and plaques originally intended as part of the memorial to Paul Kruger at Pretoria.

THREE WOUNDED. DUBLIN, Jan. 31. A lorry full of auxiliaries was fired on in North Earl Street this evening, and a cadet and a boy and girl were wounded. The shots came from the street and doorways. Crown forces made several arrests at certain Dublin Council meetings to-night.

WILL RATIFY AGREEMENT. LONDON, Jan. 31. The Central News learns that the Russian Soviet Government is expected to ratify the Krasin agreement without change. According to this information it approves M. Krasin's work, and appoints him representative to London. Another Central News despatch says that Lenin, Soviet Premier, has been suffering from a cold, but is otherwise quite well.

HIGHWAYMEN! BEWARE. DENVER, Del., Feb. 1. The Delaware State Legislature, yesterday, passed a bill making the penalty for highway robbery forty lashes on the bare back, not less than twenty years imprisonment, and a fine of five hundred dollars.

POLITICAL CLASH. SYRACUSE, Italy, Feb. 1. In a conflict yesterday, between Nationalists and Socialists, many shots were fired, one man was killed and several injured.

COULD NOT REACH VESSEL. BEAUFORD, N.C., Feb. 1. Lifeguards, last night, abandoned their attempt to reach the five masted schooner Carstoll A. Deering, which winds are driving on the beach off Hatteras Shoals. The schooner was first seen Sunday night in a stranded condition, with all sails set. The

crow is believed to have been taken off by passing vessels.

SPEDDING UP. NEW BEDFORD, Mass., Feb. 1. Several cotton mills were started yesterday that had been idle for weeks. Fully twenty per cent. more operatives are working this week than two weeks ago.

VERY INTERESTING. CARSON, Nev., Feb. 1. The brief of the State Attorney General in the Mary Pickford divorce-matter, in support of his motion to set aside her divorce from Owen Moore, will be filed to-day or to-morrow, it was announced.

MORGAN HOUSE FOR U.S. AMBASSADOR. WASHINGTON, Feb. 1. Acceptance of the London home of Pierpont Morgan, as a permanent residence for the United States Ambassador to the Court of St. James, was authorized yesterday by the House.

TWO CANADIAN ENTRIES. NEW YORK, Feb. 1. The New York Times, this morning, announces a number of entries already received for the Atlantic sailing race for the gold cup offered by the King of Belgium. According to the Times, two of the entries are from Canada.

REFUSED TO TAKE OATH. ATHENS, Feb. 1. There was a stormy session in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday when Venizelist members refused to subscribe to the oath requiring allegiance to Constantine. Military and police threatened to intervene, but the tumult continued until Premier Rallis mounted the throne and exhorted peace.

BIG REPAIR ORDER. LONDON, Feb. 1. An undertaking for the repair of virtually all of Russia's locomotives, has been signed between the London firm of Armstrong, Whitworth and Co. and the Russian trade delegation. The contract is made subject, however, to the signing by Great Britain of a trade agreement with Russia.

WOMAN MURDERED. BELFAST, Feb. 1. Capt. King, District Inspector, was seriously wounded and his wife shot dead last night, near Malloy railway station in County Cork.

SIMONS MAY RESIGN. HAMBURG, Feb. 1. It is not improbable that Foreign Minister Simons will resign in reply to reparation demands of Allies, says a newspaper here.

CANT PAY SAYS KEYNES. LONDON, Feb. 1. It will be impossible for Germany to pay the amounts fixed for her reparation debt to the Allies, by the Allied Council at Paris last week, says Professor John Maynard Keynes, principal representative of the British Treasury Department at the Versailles Peace Conference.

ACCUSED ACQUITTED. DUBLIN, Feb. 1. Daniel Healy, one of four men tried by court martial for the shooting of fourteen officers, killed in this city on November twenty-first, was acquitted and discharged last night. The other three, Frank Feehan, Wm. Conway, and Edward Potter were acquitted of manslaughter on Saturday, but the court reserved judgment on an alternative charge of murder.

DON'T LIKE THE MEDICINE. BERLIN, Feb. 1. Germans regard reparation terms, decided upon by the Supreme Allied Council in Paris last week, as fantasies and impossible of execution, and it is generally the opinion that the government cannot agree to them. "Madness" is the term leaders of the Reichstag are using in discussing reparation conditions.

GIVING MORAL SUPPORT TO GERMAN. NEW YORK, Feb. 1. An attempt to force the payment of the fifty-five billion German indemnity to the Allies, by Sir Philip Gibbs, noted war correspondent, who has just arrived here to deliver a number of lectures, would mean disaster to all Europe.

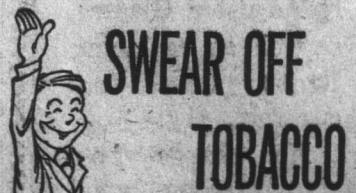
