





Risk Stowaways Run.

Captain Nicholson of the Lady of Gaspe, in addressin the Court, told how the stowaways were found in the ship's chain locker five hours after leaving port, and had the shipmet with any obstruction the fairway after she had left the pier, and was obliged to drop anchor, the lads would have been ground to death, when the chain started to run. Several cases of this kind of death while stealing passages have occurred in the past.
