The world's problem to-day is really caused by fear and mistrust. With confider restored all round improvements will result. The preacher especially welcomed the members of the C. L. B. to the old garrison church and assured them of his hearty support always, as his parish stood for the same high principle as the Brigades. He asked them all when they came to the Cross Roads in every day life to choose the best road always. He told the lads it was easy to swim with the tire and always harder against the stream.
