MARINE DISASTER. BREST, May 20. Nearly one hundred perished when the liner Egypt, bound for Bombay, collided with the French tramp steamer Lascars...

NORTH SYDNEY WANTS TEMPORARY LINE. SYDNEY, May 21. A request for a Government steamer to open temporary service with Newfoundland pending settlement of the dispute between the Reid and the Nfd. Government has been wired to Ottawa by the North Sydney Board of Trade.

AGREEMENT REACHED. DUBLIN, May 21. Agreement, making possible the formation of a coalition cabinet, reached Saturday by leaders of the political factions in Southern Ireland, and was unanimously approved by their respective followers in Eireann. A coalition panel will be presented to the electors and they will be free to say whether or not they accept the Anglo-Irish Treaty.

LOYD GEORGE OPTIMISTIC. LONDON, May 21. Lloyd George on arrival here spoke in an interview very optimistically about the Geneva Conference, declaring that the Anglo-Irish Treaty...

It was the most dramatic spectacle he ever witnessed. He repudiated any suggestion of militarism on the part of France and expressed belief that the Russians were sincere in their desire for pacification.

FRANCE AND REPARATIONS. PARIS, May 21. France, declared Premier Poincaré, today, with endeavour to come to an understanding with her Allies regarding the action to be taken against Germany if the defaults in payment of her reparations, but if France is unable to secure agreement she will insist on the right to act separately.

RETAINS CHAMPIONSHIP. LONDON, May 21. George F. Covey of England retained the title as World's professional hard court tennis champion by defeating Walter A. Kinsella of the United States to-day.

JAPAN RATIFIES SHANTUNG AGREEMENT. TOKIO, May 21. Japan has ratified the Shantung agreement negotiated with China during the Washington Conference.

WILLIAM WRITES A BOOK. BERLIN, May 21. A book by former Emperor William will shortly appear asserting that events outside of Germany brought on the war.

GUNMEN ACTIVE. BELFAST, May 21. Gunmen were active to-day. Two men were shot dead and several wounded. There were several incendiary fires at Gloughmill, County Antrim.

WINNIPEG OUT OF DANGER. WINNIPEG, May 21. Winnipeg is out of danger. The Red River is steadily falling, also the Assiniboine and the water from the flooded areas is flowing back into the river course.

IMPROVING. WINNIPEG, May 20. A marked improvement in the food situation throughout Manitoba, was reported last night.

NOBILITY NOT IMMUNE. LONDON, May 20. The Duchess of Devonshire is reported to be suffering from a severe attack of measles.

CONSERVATIVE ELECTED. LONDON, May 20. Edward Charles Grenfell, Conservative, was elected over Sir T. V. Boster, Independent Conservative, to fill a vacancy in the city of London, seat caused by the elevation of Balfour to the peerage.

GOUNARIS RECALLED. ATHENS, May 20. The new cabinet of Nicholas Stratos formed this week to succeed the ministry headed by Gounaris, tendered his resignation yesterday. The King asked Gounaris to form another Ministry.

THE FINAL COURT. QUEBEC, May 20. Hon. J. E. Caron, Minister of Agriculture, who lost his appeal to the Supreme Court, in which he denied an obligation to pay income tax on his salary as a Minister of the Crown has announced that the case will be taken to the Privy Council.

Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

CODFISH—The exports this week amounted to 2,419 qts. as follows:— From Outports—By schr. Rita M. Cluett, from Webb and Co., Renouf, 2,400 qts. to Oporto; by schr. Ethel M. Bartlett, from E. M. Hollett, Borin, 2,220 qts. to Oporto. From St. John's—By schr. Gordon M. Fudge from A. E. Hickman and Co., Ltd., 1,857 qts. to Kingston, Jamaica, and by S. S. Sable I, from A. E. Hickman and Co., and P. J. Cahin, 273 qts. to Halifax.

Oporto stocks of Newfoundland are down to 26,115 qts. with 5,143 qts. for the weeks consumption. There are five Newfoundland vessels on the way there at present. Up to the end of March we had exported 76,600 qts. more than the previous year, counting from July 1st, 1921.

COD OIL—There are some enquiries and prices keep firm at the moment but we don't think it will advance, nor will these prices continue when there is any quantity to offer.

COD LIVER OIL—There is no change in the market. Prices at the present time are low, and everyone must work in the most economical way to make two ends meet this year. There is no use to go at this business unless you see a good yield of oil from the livers. It would be better to shut up the factory altogether than to take any chances unless the yield is satisfactory. There is no doubt that Newfoundland has got a name for making real good oil, and we must keep up that standard. There are prospects in view that may still enhance the value of other countries and it would be a pity not to try and keep factories going, but they must be worked very close to even make wages this year.

FLOUR—Wheat quotations continue strong in Chicago this week with the high point of 147 1/2, was reached for May wheat, and 128 3/4 for July indicating firm prices for flour for the summer months. Flour has been selling here for several weeks under cost of importation, and future consignments will no doubt be influenced to a higher level of prices, more on a par with the prevailing wheat quotations, and experienced importers all incline to the opinion that there can be no fluctuation to lower prices till the new crop is available in late August, or early in September. The S. S. Maple-dawn brought in since our last issue 7,797 barrels from Montreal, and the S. S. Canadian Sapper 6,300 barrels. The wholesale quotation for leading brands is still \$10.25 in the local markets.

PORK—The American pork market shows continual strength this week and option pork is to-day \$3.00 per barrel ahead of the low point ruling at the opening of spring in Chicago and New York. Here May pork is now quoted at \$22.95 as compared with \$18.75 the first week of April. The effects of this advance will not be felt in the local market to any extent for some time, as large imports made earlier in the season are still held, and are still being quoted at prices based on the quotations that prevailed at the time of shipment when the United States market was a favorable minimum. The St. John's prices are still \$42.00 for Family Mess, \$30.00 for Mess and Ham Butt, \$23.00 for Fat Back and S. Cut Clear, and \$23.00 for Morris Boston Butt.

The new firmness in pork will no doubt have the effect of strengthening the prices of business all round.

Beef—So far beef has not started to advance in the producing markets, but it is no doubt only a question of a few weeks when this commodity will advance in sympathy with pork, assuming that it is a permanent move near. The St. John's quotations are still of the favorable character for the purchasers that has prevailed now for over a year. viz: Bos Flank \$26.00, Family Special \$20.50, Boneless \$20.75, Alderney and New Boneless \$20.25, and \$19.50 for Morris Boneless.

American packers of both beef and pork have recently notified local brokers that they are prepared to absorb the premium of exchange in prices now being quoted without adding the exchange. Molasses—The schr. Lily D. Young arrived this week from Barbados to Harvey and Company with 353 puncheons, 26 tierces, and 60 barrels of molasses. The quality is said to be superior to that of last year and is quoted at 75 cents per gallon, in the puncheon for Fancy and 65 cents for Choice. A decline from the April price of 48 cents per wine gallon has taken place this month at Barbados, and the prices are now 55 to 56 cents per gallon for Fancy. In Canada the price is 55 to 67 cents in puncheons. There are five vessels now either on the way, or at Barbados with molasses with molasses cargoes for Newfoundland, the Jean Donald Duff, from A. Moulton, David Richey, Isobel Moore, and Humourist.

Sugar—A decline of 35 cents per 100 lbs., took place in the price of standard granulated last week, and the quotation at New York reached a minimum of 45.45 as against 55.90 per 100 lbs. in Montreal. Despite the fact of this steep decline there were fewer offers of both raw and refined. This week the market assumed a firmer tone and the competition to all export orders for Europe at the above prices fell down considerably, and an advance of half a cent to three quarters per pound supervened. The market is expected to keep around present levels during the rest of the Spring and Summer. The St. John's quotation is now \$10.50 per one hundred pounds, for white American granulated.

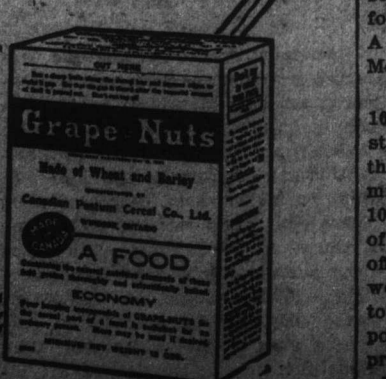

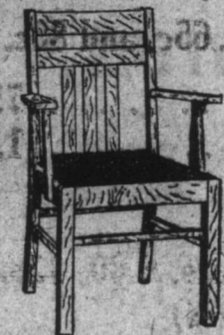

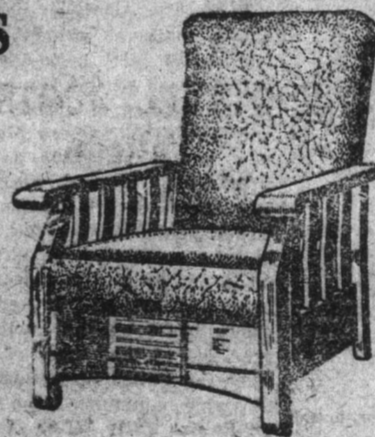

This may lead to the refusal of the Republicans to stand as candidates for any of the seats and in that event the section of the army opposed to the treaty might think itself justified in preventing the elections by force.



### THREE SECTIONS OF FREE STATERS.

The Free State party is composed of three sections. It has all the Sinn Feiners who regard the treaty as a victory, and as furnishing to Ireland, if not absolute freedom, the means of eventually attaining all its demand. The Free Staters are also supported by all the mass of voters formerly identified with the constitutional agitation for home rule and by many men who were formerly Unionists but who now gladly accept the treaty as the way to peace. The third section of the Free State party is composed of extreme Republicans who will be satisfied with nothing short of an absolute, isolated republic. They say the quickest way to an eventual Irish republic is to make use of the powers of the treaty to enforce it. They are understood to be in association with the Irish party in America which differed with Mr. De Valera when he was in the United States.

NON-UNIFORMITY OF OPINION. Though the anti-treaty party is more homogeneous than the treaty party, it, too, is not quite uniform in opinion. A determination to resist

the treaty by all legitimate means is common to the whole party. Some of it would include armed force among the legitimate means. But the whole party is not committed to the plan of De Valera for a republic externally associated with the British Empire. That plan was an attempt to make the London negotiations fruitful without sacrificing the Republican principle. But the main force of the anti-treaty party is in its assertion of undiluted and unqualified Republicanism. The most conspicuous figure among the undiluted Republicans is Liam Mellows. Though the De Valera party long remained undecided whether to consent to contest the elections, or even whether the election will be permitted, it prepared itself for election last night. Probably this was the first time when elections had been threatened with war by both sides. The Free Staters argument was that the alternative to the treaty was war with England and their opponents retorted by saying that if Griffith and Collins won the elections civil war would destroy the country. Great material for the De Valera leaflets is furnished by the speeches of British ministers on the Treaty and Lord Birkenhead's speech in the House of Lords on March 15, has been reprinted and widely distributed as an evidence that the British Government is using Griffith and Collins to "put down the turbulent population of the South of Ireland." ### A Queen of Beauty and Tragedy.

When the third of our Georges was new to his crown there was no more picturesque and remarkable figure in Scotland than the aged Countess of Stair who carried her step so lightly that she was commonly seen promenading the streets of Edinburgh with only a black servant for escort. Quick as thought, Lady Primrose stepped through an open window and dropped to the ground; and in a few minutes she was safe under the roof of her husband's mother, congratulating herself on as narrow an escape from death as woman ever had. The Viscount fled to the continent, and for years was lost to most of his relations and friends. Subsequent enquiries proved, however, that he had been living the life of an adventurer. Worn out by excesses he left his ill-used wife, while youth and beauty were still hers. She had no lack of lovers, but with such a tragic experience of wedded life she was not inclined to make a second journey to the Altar. Even when the Earl of Stair, one of the most eligible suitors in all Scotland, offered her his hand, she would have nothing to say to him, and she certainly would not have worn a wedding ring for him had he not won her

**Moorish Beliefs.**  
Superstitions Have a Marked Effect on Their Customs.  
One of the first things a traveler notices in a Moorish town are the "hands," painted or drawn, on the walls of many houses and buildings. These "hands" are to avert the "evil spirit"; five, the number of fingers, is considered a sacred number. These hands are also worn in the form of ornaments, and serve to keep off the "evil eye." As in Europe and America, the horseshoe is regarded as a sign of luck and is frequently seen over doorways.  
A Moor considers it a great sin to cut bread with a knife, declaring that our hands were given us to break it. The same idea accounts for the saying that "to tread on corn is to tread on angels."  
Offerings of food, hair, and other small articles are often placed in the trunks of certain trees, and have a quaint significance. As the makers of these offerings are poor Moors with large families, they firmly believe that Allah will be pleased and will give them means to support their family. Some Moors declare that after this offering their children eat less, and, therefore, cost less to keep.  
At another religious celebration spiked balls are thrown into the air and allowed to fall on the throwers' heads. The man who appears the most injured and ferocious is considered the most truly religious.  
Moorish marriages are performed at midnight, and the bride is confined to her room for several days after the ceremony. No Moorish woman who is truly religious is seen in the streets at any time, except in cases of absolute necessity. Life is indeed different from that in Canada!

**THE MOURNERS.**  
It's sad to mark the early doom of one whose life we prize, so on our faces there was gloom, and sorrow in our eyes, what time we gathered at the tomb of William Wadsworth Wise. It turned our blood to whay and curds, to plant him on the hill, although the pastor spoke some words that gave us all a thrill, as he said he'd know men who were birds, but none could beat old Bill. He was a great and gifted gent of virtues manifold; he never owed a man a cent but always paid the gold; and everywhere that William went he knocked the speed laws cold. To every worthy cause he gave with free and open hand; though generous, he yet could save, and with the thrifty stand; and when he scorch'd along the pave the speed laws all were canned. He treated all men just alike, as being equal made, he smiled on Pete and joked with Mike, and love for both displayed; and when he hummed along the pike he made the speed laws fade. But sterling worth will not avail when autos overture; we found him in a ferny vale hard by a babbling burn, and by his grave we raise our wail, and consolation spurn. And thus we see true merit pass, and murmur, "That is that!" and William Wadsworth Wise, alas, no more will come to bat, because he would step on the gas and knock the speed laws fat.

**Wanton Destruction.**  
Down on the waterfront Hugh Brady sits and watches the gulls of the Williams, carrying their white wings in the graceful way that bags for bread and peanuts. Many years ago, says Hugh, he brought one down with a piece of driftwood—a broken-winged, guttering sea bird that never again would coast above the harbor and meet the ships. A lounging Indian, witness to the thoughtless cruelty, turned upon the slayer and gave him grave reproof. "Why do you kill that bird?" he asked. "His life is his own. Can you eat him now? An Indian would not kill in this manner."  
The indictment of vain and cruel slaughter is a heavy one. The roseate spoonbill and the egret died because they were beautiful—because man admired them. The buffalo vanished from the plains for no other reason than that his hide brought a few dimes to the hunters. Upon bird and beast the plague of human cruelty, of disregard for the right of life, has heaped terrible toll. It is true that man is carnivorous of appetite, and that natural law bids him prey upon the lower animals for his own sustenance and industrial designs. But nowhere in printed word or in conscience is there a text that upholds him in wanton destruction.—Portland Oregonian.

**Household Notes.**  
An easy way to make a narrow string belt is to sew a string on the end and keep inside the belt while stitching. When you reach the other end pull the string and the belt is right side out.  
A crisp salad of hearts of lettuce seems quite "dressed up" when served with Thousand Island dressing to which chopped olives and pickles and a little tomato flavoring have been added.  
Delicious chicken croquettes are made by mixing together 1 cup cornmeal, 1 cup chopped chicken, and few drops onion sauce, 1 egg, salt and

pepper. Form into cakes and saute in a frying pan.  
It is a good idea to go over the gas range after each meal with a dish mop slightly wet with kerosene. This keeps the range in spotless condition and makes frequent thorough cleanings unnecessary.  
Cornmeal fishballs: Soak one cup shredded codfish in warm water until excess salt is removed. Shred, and add 2 cups cornmeal, 2 eggs, salt, and

1 egg well beaten, and a teaspoon butter. Form into balls and fry in deep fat.  
Leather upholstered furniture should be carefully wiped with oil, about four times a year. Use a light oil, such as linseed, and apply only a small quantity. Wipe well, as any excess oil will catch the dust and darken the leather.  
Tomato Bisque: Heat separately 1 can tomato soup and 2 cups milk,

when soup boils take from fire and add a pinch of soda. Add the hot milk, and just before serving add 1 teaspoon butter and a little minced parsley.  
An excellent rule for cocoa, which makes six cups, is to mix 3 tablespoon cocoa, with 2 tablespoons sugar, a pinch of salt and one of cinnamon; add this to one cup boiling water and

boil three minutes. Have a double boiler and scalded in double boiler with the cocoa mixture; heat and serve.

What a comfortable thing it is to always have a margin. I don't mean a stock market margin (from what I have seen they are rather uncomfortable) but margins in life. I have always felt that some way about a machine. **Penny Costing.**

**The Biggest Luxury.**  
In our friend's case it was the small material that the margin paid for. But there is another immaterial luxury that a margin always assures you which to me at least bulks even larger than those. If in the money you lay aside for your car, or your house, or your living expenses you will allow a margin between what you have and what you plan to spend, you can buy with that margin an invaluable asset—peace of mind.  
We all know what a curse is a mind tortured by financial anxiety and what a blessing is a mind at peace.  
Strange, isn't it, that we so often swap this blessing for a mess of pottage.

**Motor Engines and the Fishery.**

(Trade Review.)  
The question of getting fishery supplies this season is the most serious one that confronts the country at present, and considering this, we have been making a plea in recent issues of the Trade Review that the strictest economy be practised and, that items of outfit that we believe to be non-essentials, should be cut out for one year at least. Amongst the said non-essentials, we had hoped to include this motor engine, to run which so much high priced gasoline is required. During the week we made it a point to see and interview as many fishermen from the outports as we could meet at the stores and on the wharves, in order to find out their opinions on the proposal to give up the use of gasoline engines in their fishing boats, and go back to the old-time long oars used from time immemorial by their fathers and grandfathers.

We were astonished to find such a unanimity of opinion on the subject, and we did not meet a single fisherman that would favor under any consideration the idea of reverting to the long oar and rowing to and from the fishing ground. To the one argument that we adduced in favor of this, they were ready to submit two against it, and one Trinity Bay man put his answer in this emphatic way: "It would be just as reasonable to ask the fishermen to strip off all their clothes and go to the fishing ground naked. Those who have used motor boats at the fishery," he added, "will never go back to oars. If it gets as bad as that they will give it up altogether, and if they can't get out of the country they will only have to starve at home."  
"For one thing," he continued, "most of the fishermen now don't know how to row and they don't want to know, it's not work, it's slavery. The cost of gasoline is more than paid for in the extra quantity of fish that the use of the motor boat enables us to get. Instead of spending two hours in getting to the fishery ground, we can get there now in twenty-five minutes, and the one hour and thirty-five minutes that we would have to spend in pulling an oar, we can spend catching fish. One fishing day with a motor boat is as good as three with oars, and the best part of it is you can stop on the ground till the last minute and make a quick run home."  
"If you put away the motor engines now you will have to condemn the boats too, for they are built with a trim suitable to the weight of the engine, and you can't make them fit for four oar fishing boats like our fathers and grandfathers used."  
One fisherman from Bonaville who gave the same line of argument, admitted that a lot of gasoline could be saved by cutting out joy trips on Sundays and other occasions when no fishing was being done. These useless "joy rides," he said, use up fully 50 per cent of the gasoline that was used during the summer. As to asking us to give up the motor engine for the fishery, why, it would be just as well to get to the end direct and ask us to give up the fishery altogether.

Though the road looks safe, the dangers in front of a speeding car may be many. The width of the road, the curves and the traffic must be considered. Otherwise he will sooner or later learn a lesson, perhaps at the expense of his own life and limb. 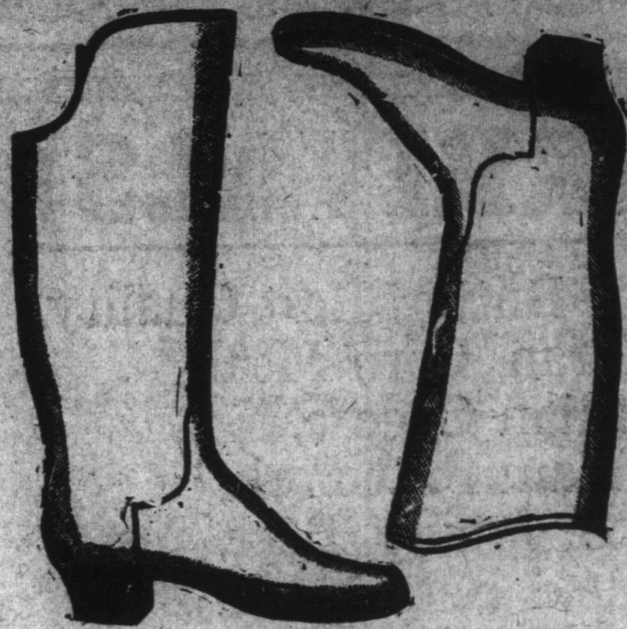

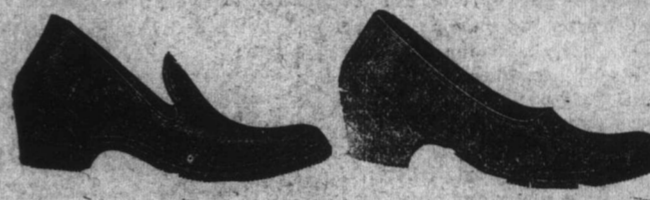
