New York, July 2 .- Judge Davis to-day slivered his charge to the jury in the Walworth trial at length. If the jury young Walworth came to New York with crime was murder in the first degree; but if the crime was committed in a sudden manner, in an instant, then it would be murder in the second degree. At 8:25 the jury returned to court, and

Judge Davis was sent for. On his arrival the roll was called, and the jury was asked if they had agreed on a verdict. The foreman answered "We have, we find the prisoner guilty of murder in the second degree." For several minutes after the verdict, neither the prisoner nor his friends uttered a word. Mr. O'Conor then whispered a word to Judge Davis, who announced that he would suspend sentence until Saturday morning at half past ten. The prisoner was then remov-to the Tombs.

New York, July 3.—Regarding the Walworth verdict the World says the severity of the verdict indicates that the re-action of the mawkish pity which for so long a time bore sway in the jury boxes has begun. The Credit Valley Railway.

We publish in our weekly edition this week the by-law introduced at the late session of the County Council, for granting a benus of \$150,000 to aid in the construction af the Credit Valley Railway. It is framed in consormity with the provisions of the Act passed by the Ontario Legislature, by which a certain number of municipalities may be grouped together for the purpose of aiding railway enterprises. The municipalities thus brought under the grouping system in this County are the townships of Erin, East and West Garafraxa, Pilkington and Nichol, the the villages of Elora, Fergus, and Orangeville. The railway, as most of our readers are aware, starts from Toronto, and the main line, as projected, is to run through Streetsville, Miton, Gut and Woodstock to St. Thomas. A branch is to start from Streetsville, and run through, Brampton to Orangeville. Still another branchestatis from some point about 10 mitos tout of Orangeville, runs through E basillage, Hids.


