Man Burned to Death

A most melancholy event took place in Caledon, a few miles from Erin village, on Saturday night. The facts of the case are these, as correctly as we can get them. Hugh Walker, aged about 47 years, brother of William Walker, Esq., a wealthy and respected farmer, and who has held a conspicuous position in the Township of Caledon, lives alone in a small house on a lot of land near his brother. He had been out fishing during Saturday with other parties, and was a little the worse of liquor. When left by them a short distance from his house he had to go through a piece of woods, and it is supposed that he lit a torch, which he was in the habit of doing, and on arriving at the house had thrown it down with himself on the floor, he falling asleep; the house, taking fire by the torch was burnt down. All that remained of him as found next day was his charred bones. An inquest was held on Sunday by Coroner Riddell, Alton, assisted by Dr. McNaughton, Erin. Verdict rendered according to facts, "Said Hugh Walker was burned to death by accident while under the influence of liquor." Erin, June 30, 1873.

We learn that a call was moderated in on Tuesday in Duff's Church, East Puslinch, which came out unanimously in favor of the Rev. Alex. Elzner, Illinois, U.S. Should that McKay, gentleman accept there is the prospect of a cordial welcome by the congregation, and of a successful ministry.

Pacific Scandal Enquiry.

The first meeting of the Select Committee of the House of Commons on this matter was held yesterday in Montreal, and much public interest was manifested in the proceedings.

The Chairman, Hon. J. Hillyard Cameron, announced the disallowance of the Oaths to Witnesses Bill by the Imperial Government.

Mr. Dorion moved that Sir Francis Hincks be examined as a witness.

Mr. Macdonald then moved in amendment that as the Oaths to Witnesses Bill had been disallowed, and as the Committee was instructed to examine witnesses before them under oath, therefore, in the opinion of this Committee, they cannot be examined until further instructed by the House of Commons.

Mr. Blake thought that the Committee had a perfect right to proceed to examine the witnesses, and it was their imperative duty to do so. Now that the Act which authorized the Committee to carry out the instructions of the House of Commons had been disallowed, he maintained that those instructions fell to the ground, especially as they were given in answer to a suggestion from the Committee of Enquiry itself.

Mr. Dorion complained that the Committee were again asked to delay the investigation, and remarked that the House of Commons and the Senate and the printing office of the Government had yesterday to be kept open when others throughout the country were celebrating Dominion Day—in order that the proclamation of the disallowance of this Act should be published before this Committee met.

Some discussion ensued as to the desirability of making an amendment to the Constitution, even though a small one, in this off-hand fashion, and the Committee then adjourned until this afternoon, to allow of the chairman's communicating with the Premier on the subject.

The Credit Valley Railway.

We publish in our weekly edition this week the by-law introduced at the late session of the County Council, for granting a bonus of \$150,000 to aid in the construction of the Credit Valley Railway. It is framed in conformity with the provisions of the Act passed by the Ontario Legislature, by which a certain number of municipalities may be grouped together for the purpose of aiding railway enterprises.

There are one or two other points of importance which we cannot take up to-day, but must leave over for a future article. Meanwhile, having no special interest to serve, we desire that the farmers and others resident in these municipalities should give this subject their serious attention, and not blindly take sides for or against this enterprise until they are well assured what they are about.
