



THE EIGHT-HOUR LAW.

WORK AND WAGE REDUCTION.

The eight hour law comes into force on June 12, and promises to be a fruitful source of trouble. The law, as already explained, makes it an offence for a man to work underground for more than eight hours in the twenty four and also makes the employer liable. The mine owners do not favor the change, and in somedistricts have notified their men that wages will be reduced in proportion to the reduction in working hours. The miners, wages, and thus the matter stands for the present.

At a meeting of mine owners and man-There are quantities of ore on agers held at Sandon, it was resolved that owing to the action of the British Columbian Legislature in enforcing the e ght-hour law in Slocan, the suver-lend mine owners of the district consider that they awe it to their employes, who are affected by the change rendered necessary by the operation of the act, to place their intention with regard to it on record"

The circular then goes on to say that the mine owners were not consulted in a y way as to this radical change in the min ing law, and that on being informed of the passage of the act, made every effort in their power to have the law held in abeyance until it could be carefully considered by those interested. It was pointed out that the standard rate of wage for miners (\$3.50 for a ten-hour shift) was as high as paid anywhere in the United States or Canada, and that tois rate was satisfactory to both the mine-owners and employes. It was further resolved that the rate paid miners in future to \$3 per the War Eagle on the 19th inst. day of eight hours. The circular, which was signed on behalf of the following mines, concludes as follows: "And they further wish it to be understood that this change in the working hours and the consequent contraction of the wage-earning capacity of the miner, was forced upon them by the act of the British Columbia Legislature, and was enti-cly ursought for by them."

At a meeting of the mine-owners of the Nelson district it was also resolved to reduce wages from \$350 to \$3 per day. In their circular setting forth their position, the mine owners state that the recent legislation "means reducing the hours of labor in the mines from 20 hours a day to 17 hours, as many of the mines are so circumstanced that three shifts cannot be worked to advantage. means a reduction of 20 per cent in the amount of production of many mines and a reduction of 20 per cent in the development work being carried on in the mines preparing for production, and a reduction in the supplies used in the mines." The circular is signed on behalf of the following mines:


