





THE amount of freight ready for the last regular steamer for West Indies, was so large that another vessel had to be utilised to take the Bermuda cargo.

Mann & Durham, lumber, Brandon, Man., have called a meeting of creditors for the 23rd inst.-Livingstone & Co., general store, Glenboro, Man., have assigned.

Bullion has been shipped from England back to New York this week as we indicated probable; while so much produce is ready to go forward, gold will not move east.

THE first cattle shipments of the season 545 oxen, 75 sheep, 28 horses, carried by the Beaver line were all landed at Liverpool in good order, except 2 cattle that died on the water.

THE crowded state of the wharves at Ottawa since opening of navigation looks well. Already close up to 19 million feet of sawn lumber have come down the Ottawa to this port, chiefly for foreign export.

Americans have secured control of the fishing fleet on the Georgian Bay which gives Canadian fish free entry into the States, and shuts off our markets from this supply except via American dealers.

UNITED States Manager Bevan of the London & Lancashire Fire Ins. Co. has been in Montreal for some days past, considering the future Canadian management, owing doubtless to the recent resignation for Ontario.

Horses are being bought up freely by English dealers, who have commissions to provide them for the London market. The demand for Hansom cabs is very large all the time, and good prices are given by the right class of animal. Medium grades are quite low.

The following is from the Herald: "A report from chief Benoit was read showing that since the adoption of the new gas-saving machine which had been placed in No. 1 fire station, a saving of \$47 had been effected during the last quarter as compared with the corresponding period of last year. Two other machines were being tested in a similar way, the result of which will be reported to next meeting."

The matter in controversy for some time past between Messrs. Reid and Middleton in respect of the Newfoundland contract, has been amicably arranged to the satisfaction of all parties concerned. Mr. Middleton has retired from the contract for a substantial consideration and it will be carried out to its completion by Mr. Reid who is entirely acceptable to the Government of Newfoundland. To all those in any degree acquainted with the high character and credit of Mr. Reid, this goes as a matter of course and his fellow citizens in Montreal wish him every success in his undertaking.

The Ontario mines director reports that 87,590 tons of nickel ore valued at \$324,240 were mined in that province last year. Over five per cent of this ore, containing about 900 tons of nickel was purchased for use in manufacturing armor plates by the U. S. government. The total value of the mineral output of Ontario last year was \$4,750,600. Other products were 14,925 tons value \$64,475, petroleum value \$1,209,558, mica value \$157,000, phosphate and gypsum value \$63,000. Of building materials there were produced building stone, lime and cement, total value \$1,344,501, bricks value \$950,000, and tiles and pottery \$561,700. The labor expended on these products is given as \$1,659,141.



Emma Charland, millinery, Waterloo and Alex. Lebrun, grocer, Fraserville have assigned.—A meeting of the creditors of Jos. Morin, grocer, city, has been called for the 20th inst.

THE very large importations of glass suggest the possibility of doing more in glass making than has hitherto been attempted here. The cost of window glass here is excessive. An ordinary sized window pane, such as are used in cellar windows, costs \$1.50 to have replaced if broken. That includes labor in glazing which would be well paid for by 25 cents, indeed half that money would satisfy a travelling glazier in England. This material is especially liable to serious breakages during transport. We have seen cases opened of window glass in which every sheet was cracked. The cost therefore is much enhanced by this liability which would be almost wholly avoided if the glass was made on our own soil. Some 15 million square feet of common window glass is imported yearly on which the duty is about \$100,000 on a value of \$400,000. Of plate glass we import over half a million square feet yearly. Of lamp glasses, globes and goods of this class the importations are valued at over \$200,000, with duties from 60 to 70 thousand dollars. Of flasks, insulators, bottles, carboys, etc., we bring in goods and value of little short of 400 thousand dollars yearly. The total value of our imports of all kinds yearly is about one and a quarter millions. The manufacture of some of these goods is not practicable at present, but we are satisfied that a very large consumption of home made glass could be secured if the manufacture of it was properly conduct-We are glad to see therefore that a firm is about entering upon this enerprise in Winnipeg, who propose to make glazing, stained, leaded, and fancy glasses. With the skill and capital they possess they are sanguine of success. If this article can be produced in Canada as cheaply as when imported, let it be proved, but if the experiment is a failure, then the sooner the heavy duties on this necessity of life are reduced, especially on window glass, the better.

PROBABLY one of the largest consignments of egg coal 3145 tons ever received in this city is that which has been carried by the steamer "Monkseaton," from Philadelphia U. S. now in port and consigned to L. Cohen & Son of this city.

Tue corner stone of a monument to Maissoneuve, the founder of this city was laid on 18th inst., the day being the 250th anniversary of Montreal's birthday. On the same day the name Custom House square was changed to "La Place Royale"-it was certainly a royal place on which to commence a great city.

Louis Chevalier whose failure is announced this week, was at one time in a wholesa'e way, representing manufacturers and keeping a retail store at the same time. He was in the habit of buying bankrupt stocks and opened out in different places. If he had attended more strictly to his business it would have been better for him.

Mr. Howe, an agent of the Continental Egg Co., which leads the trade in the old land, is in the city. He is after trade, and we may be sure a large English company, having great connections and experience, would not send out a commissioner to Canada unless there was money to be made in this business. Mr. Howe regards the prospects of a large trade in eggs with

Great Britain as highly promising, if farmers will only take due care in selecting and packing them. He will visit our chief cities, towns and wherever there is an opening for making trade connections in this line. His advice will be invaluable,

THE Dominion Millers Association have got their bill for incorporation through the committee on Banking and Commerce at Ottawa. The object is to promote, extend and improve the manufacture of flour and meal, the business of milling generally and the shipping and sale to foreign markets of grain, flour and meal, and to adjust disputes in the trade by arbitration. Objection was raised that this would become a combine injurious to farmers and to the public by the association being a monopoly that could buy and sell at arbitrary rates. A clause was therefore added to the bill stating that nothing therein contained shall be construed as constituting the said association a trading company, or empowering them to engage as a trading association in the business of buying or selling grain, flour or other merchandise, nor shall they by rule, regulation or bye-law, or otherwise fix or determine the price that the members or any of them shall pay or offer for grain. We believe the association will be of much advantage to millers.

#### A LOOK OVER THE WHEAT FIELDS.

Reports from the main wheat growing areas of this country and the States, indicate that there has been a larger acreage sown this year than last in all parts, and that the prospects so far indicate that little damage has been done by the late frosts or deficiency of rainfall. It is too early to go further, but the probabilities all point to large crops so far as the present appearances

of fall and spring wheat indicate. There is some "bearish" talk of blight in parts of the United States, but local authorities deny this; such rumours will stand a heavy discount when market prices are on the down grade.

A private report to this journal, from a prominent New York financier, states that "It looks as if there was an enormous surplus for shipping. There is a great deal of wheat in stock at Liverpool and elsewhere in Great Britain which cost 30 cents a bushel more than present prices, and there is no chance of holders getting out without loss." That is the case in Canada on a smaller scale. The bulk of our millers will lose money this season, but this is one of the ordinary risks of milling, and they must "take the bran with the flour," and look for better times.

Under such conditions there must be looked for a vigorous effort to drive prices up to give what chances thus arise to clear out these stocks at as small a sacrifice as possible. The Russian deficit is still being harped upon, but in face of exports of wheat being probable from that country, it is played out as a bulling force.

Throughout the North-West there has been a wider area sown with wheat than ever before. The large arrivals of new settlers are expected to broaden out the wheat fields, and, it is hoped, provide more help in harvesting, the want of which was severely felt last season. Several new flour mills are going up in the North-West, which are expected to afford a more advantageous mode of dealing with wheat, than its shipment as grain. Elevators, too, are being built in several localities. These will prove valuable, as there are no barns in that region, and the stacking of wheat through the winter involves serious damage by frost. the stacks often being masses of ice.

It is difficult to estimate what quantities of wheat are stored in Manitoba, and at points en route to the east, as these change daily, and doubtless very large quantities reported are of very doubtful quality that hardly can be ranked with grain for milling purposes. There is, however, a certainty that over fifty per cent. more bushels of wheat is stored, or in transit, in the States and this country than there was a year ago. The official report from the Ontario Department of Agriculture is that about 6 to 7 million bushels, or 20 per cent. of the last crop, is still held by farmers. As that crop was extraordinarily heavy it is safe to say that fully one-third of an average Ontario wheat crop is in the barns, while the owners are left lamenting over their unreasonable hopes of wheat reaching \$1.50 at

this season being displaced by chagrin at little over half this figure being obtainable. The average prices some time past have been from 25 to 30 per cent. below those of last spring, and are ranging near the figures for the three previous years.

A factor in the wheat market, not appreciated by our farmers, is,—that supplies of grain pour into Europe between our harvest seasons from fields that are ripening when ours are snow-bound. When the price of wheat is fixed, as it is, by supplies coming from such widely different countries and regions, as India, Argentina, Australia, California, Russia, the vast farm areas of America, and our own North-West fields, as well as from the harvests of central and western Europe. those growers are liable to get badly left who are guided by any local conditions in regard to holding or selling their grain.

So far as Australia is concerned, there seems little chance of much coming from there. The area under wheat is reported to be lessening. Since 1886 the number of acres devoted to this grain has gone down from 3.571,000 to 3,199,000, and that colony is beginning to realise that its chances of competing with other countries in European wheat markets are slim. A special report on the Russian crops of last year, and prospects for this, has been compiled from reports of British consuls in the wheat districts. From this we conclude that while, in some parts, the crops were a failure, in others where, we believe, the larger crops are grown, they yielded a good average, and the outlook for next harvest is promising. This month will see the unparalleled spectacle of wheat going into Russian ports to relieve a famine, and vessels leaving Russian ports laden with wheat that is not needed at home! That reminds us of a common enough spectacle of tramps begging food, and selling it to buy a drink.

Considerable discussion has been going as to the price which farmers get for their wheat compared with its price in the great markets of the world—practically at Mark Lone. It has been argued that the price a farmer ought to get is the price of wheat, say in London, less cost of transportation. That is a very crude notion, although supported by some influential papers. There are other elements in the transactions of wheat buying from a farmer, at the elevator nearest to his farm, and selling it in England, besides the price paid and transportation charges. Whoever buys has to take some risks. If he sells by cable instantly after purchasing, the English market may have declined in that brief period. He may find it advisable to keep

what he has bought until a chance of profit is afforded, and this may mean holding for some time, and it may also mean holding large stocks which eventually he is compelled to sell at a heavy loss. To assert, as is done, that the farmer ought to get Mark Lane prices, minus transportation charges, is to assert that the merchant buyer of his wheat will assume all the trouble of handling it, making sales, arranging what financing is necessary, without any margin of profit, or any payment for his trouble-which is absurd. Numbers of farmers have been holding on to their wheat because they imagined that in some way or other the buyers were offering unfair prices, as certain papers told them was the case. These suspicions have been expensive. The farmers are, however, not the only losers by the decline in wheat, as enormous losses have been incurred by operators who bought for a rising market, and have had to endure watching the price barometer dropping steadily week after week.

#### THE CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY REPORT.

The proceedings at the recent meetings of the Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific railways were singularly alike in one feature. At both of them there were earnest protestations made against the idea of an amalgamation of these great concerns being likely to be effected. Although the warmth of repudiation on both sides reminds of the phrase; "Methinks the lady doth protest too much," we are satisfied that the rumours of this union were "made out of whole cloth," as the financial and other practical obstacles are, we believe, insuperable difficulties.

The public will be gratified, however, by the assurance that these rivals are anxious to be on friendly terms. Although rail way competition has advantages it has serious drawbacks. On the whole it is better, all round, for public enterprises, as for private ones, that competition should not be carried to the extent of destroying fair profits, as a reaction is sure to come by which the public will pay heavily for temporary advantages from "cut rates."

The report of the C. P. R. has special interest from being, "for the year in which the main line was to have been completed under the contract between the government and the company." By the marvellous energy which has characterised this enterprise from its inception the completion of the contract was reached some years ago, so that instead of a report of the first year of the road we have comparative statements of its working since 1887. We give below a comparative statement of the earnings for 1890 and 1891, and with it, percentages worked out, showing the increases since 1887 for each source of revenue:

The net earnings—or difference between total receipts and expenses—have risen from \$3,504,118 in 1887 to \$8,008,659 in 1891.

The most striking feature in the above returns is the great development in freight traffic since 1887. Some portion of the increase arose from enlarged shipments from the North West, but the larger increase is in part attributable to closer connection having been made with the seaboard, and to the enterprising policy of the company in seeking for this class of business, and so energetically and wisely providing new and popular facilities for its collection, transport and delivery.

The articles of freight in which the greatest increase took place last year were lumber, which went up from 564 millions in 1890 to 630 in 1891, and grain which in 1890 was 20,168,000 bushels in the former year and 24,894,000 in the latter. The number of tons carried in 1890 was 3,378,464 at 0.84 cents per mile, and in 1891 3,846,710 at 0.91 cents per mile. So that while the per centage of running expenses fell last year from 61.82 of 1890 to 60.92, there was an increase of 12 per cent in the earnings of freight per ton per mile.

Taking then the two facts that the receipts from freight are two and a quarter times those from passengers, and are over 62 per cent of the gross receipts, we see how financially satisfactory has been the coincidence of enlarged freight traffic with an increase in the earnings of it per ton per mile.

Turning to details of passenger traffic the figures From a total of 2,792,805 persons are also striking. carried in 1890, the figures ran up to 3,165,507 last year; the increase being at the rate of 1190 extra passengers carried for each working day in 1891, beyond the numbers in 1890. That any large number of those carried by the C. P. R., are diverted from another line The large body of this passenger traffic is doubtful. is created by local facilities having been provided throughout a new section of country. It has been the universal experience of railways that traffic develops proportionately to the accommodation provided, as local facilities stimulate the taste for travelling, and create necessities for it as quickly as opportunities are multiplied.

The percentage of earnings of passenger traffic per train mile was \$1.14, of freight \$1.45, and the expenses per train mile \$0.82. Besides these receipts, the company realised net profits amounting to \$703,260 from lake steamers, the telegraph, elevators, rents, etc. The very large elevators in the North West have been of incalculable service to the wheat growers and mercahnts in that region, besides yielding a fair revenue to the builders.

Up to 1st inst. the company had sold this year 143,-693 acres for \$531,151 being 47,000 acres more than during last year.

The enormous expenditures of this, as of its great rival road, are large factors in the active business of the country. Amongst the expenditure items we find that those for construction, improvements, rolling stock, steamships and telegraph additions, amount to \$6,546,361; 224 timber bridges were replaced by stone or steel, and 94 others well advanced. These works, along with the daily activities of the lines operated for

over 6,000 miles, provide employment to thousands, the stream of whose outlays for food, clothing and shelter spreads fertilizing life over the whole area of national trade.

Between this vast enterprise and the G. T. R., President Van Horne declared that there was "sincere cordiality." The report is highly optimistic, and we earnestly trust, and the whole country hopes, that its prediction will be verified by succeeding years producing even more gratifying results than those already reached by our transcontinental line—a line which is a vital link between Great Britain and her eastern possessions and eastern markets.

We purpose discussing the report of the Grand Trunk Railway in next issue.

#### A COMIC CATALOGUE.

Auction sales are often what King Charles said of the House of Commons, "as amusing as a play." The celebrated statue of the Venus de Milo, as our readers know, depicts the goddess as terribly mutilated as though she had been in a railway smash up. A plaster cast of this figure was once offered for sale by a local auctioneer who assured the company that the missing arms were lying round somewhere, and the buyer could have them.

Catalogues are at times, also highly comical literature. One before us has in it "more fun than a picnic." We are introduced to a variety of distinguished authors, artists and places, that are wholly new, even to the best read or most widely travelled connoisseurs in literature, art or topography. We have "Chronicles of England" by a Mr. Troissart; "Notes on Ephesians," by Mr. Barne; Essays by Telfourd, Goodwin Smith and Macauley; "Elements of Rhetoric," by Whatley; these names being a comic auctioneer's version of Froissart, Barnes, Talfourd, Macaulay, Goldwin Smith and Whately. We hope our good friend the Librarian of Parliament will not see Macaulay spelt with an "e," for he once was driven into a phrensy of rage at this outrage!

When offering works of art the auctioneer and his catalogue become excruciatingly funny. They take liberties with art names and facts as freely as a bull treats crockery in a china shop,—and for much the same reason as the bovine is so sportive—that reason being, gross ignorance of, and incapacity to appreciate the treasures of art production. We have new names given to old masters, such as Dominichuro, Salvador Rosa, Raffaello Sauzio, Marland, and Michael Angelo distinguished from "Buonarrote," whoever he was. It is enough to make "Morland's pigs" grunt, to have their own artist's name twisted out of recognition.

We have some place named "Barbeinie Roma" another "Grenwich hospital." One picture is described as Guido's portrait of "Beatrice Cenci," a lady whom it does not and never did portray, this name having been given to it precisely from the same cause as the spelling of Macaulay with an "e." Dr. Johnson when asked by a lady why he gave a wrong definition to the word "pastern," replied; "Sheer ignorance, madam, sheer ignorance;" that explains the auctioneer's catalogue mode of spelling the well known names, Salvator Ross, Domenichino, Raffaello Sanzio, Morland, Michael Angelo and making the title "Barberina" palace part of the word, "Roma," or Rome. Picture buyers may well be cautions at auction sales when the guide, philosopher and friend who tempts

them by his flourishes of art knowledge proves his blank ignorance of art by miscalling the most familiar names of great artists.

Picture buyers, who do not know the shady side of art production, are often under the impression that works "bought in Italy," are necessarily valuable art treasures. Italy however exports more "old masters" every year than were ever painted by those artists so classed. Some are so excellently well painted, that they can only be told from originals by an expert. But those who fancy that, Raphaels, Guidos, and Titians, are lying round loose in Italy, waiting transcontinental buyers, need some one to take care of their purses when they are in that land of "pot boilers."

Fancy, too, the prince of colorists, Titian, being called a "clever painter"! After this we shall have Shakspeare styled a smart dramatic author. Dancing dogs are "clever," and Titian, if he heard that adjective applied to himself, might well ask: "Is thy servant a dog"? But auctioneers, and their catalogues, are famous for "a nice derangement of epitaphs."

#### A CANADIAN AGENT AT WASHINGTON.

Mr. Dalton McCarthy is generally level-headed, or clear headed anyway, in stating what he wants done. But in his recent motion to have an agent appointed by Canada to represent this Dominion at Washington he was somewhat mixed. Canada is not an independent power; she cannot therefore treat directly with a foreign government. We have before pointed out, and repeat, that there is no difficulty whatever in the way of this country placing a representative anywhere thought advisable. But, when it comes to a question of entering into diplomatic relations with foreign governments, our representatives could not be recognized, except when associated with the English embassy. We have again and again sent ambassadorial representatives to Washington, but in every case they were there more as advisers of the English Minister, and exponents of Canadian interests and feelings, than ambassadors in the ordinary sense. Even so far as Canada was concerned, they had no plenipotential powers to commit this country to any specific course of action. They had to come back and submit to Parliament whatever measure was regarded as advisable during the negotiations. We may be compared to a branch office of a great public company; we can do very much on our own judgment; but, whenever the interests of the company at that branch have to be adjusted with those of outsiders, the business must be relegated to head office. In such a negotiation, or dispute, the advice of the local manager, and his experience would be sought and valued, but his position would remain only subordinate.

To send, then, an agent to Washington to represent Canada, independently of the Mother Country, would be a mere useless vanity. It might end in getting this country, the States, and England, probably some other power, into a regular Donnybrook fair squabble, out of which Canada would not emerge without some severe raps from diplomatic shillaleghs for her presumption, when so impotent and so dependent.

There was an intimation given by the government, through Mr. Tupper, that there is every prospect that after a conference with the British government Canada would be given fuller and better representation at

Washington than she now has. He recognized that with some one at the elbow of the British ambassador, representing Canada directly, our interests would be better guarded. Mr. Tupper moved in amendment to Mr. McCarthy's motion:

"That it is expedient that communication be opened up with Her Majesty's government in order to bring about such fuller representation of Canadian interests at Washington and the capital of other countries in which such representations may be found desirable, as may be consistent with the proper relations that exist between Great Britain and Canada."

That appears to foreshadow a kind of consular service for Canada. Considering the nearness of Ottawa to Washington, and the rarity of occasions for diplomatic action between us and the States, it has not yet been established that a permanent agent is needed to represent this Dominion at Washington.

#### OWNERS WANTED FOR BANK DEPOSITS.

In compliance with an Act which has recently come into force the banks have furnished a statement to the government of all dividends which have remained unpaid for more than five years and also of all amounts or balances in respect to which no transactions have taken place or upon which no interest has been paid during the five years prior to 31st December, 1891. Of these large sums no less than 62 per cent of the unclaimed dividends, amounting to \$6,276 is held by

banks in this city, who also have 63 per cent of the total balances, amounting to \$281,380, that have remained unclaimed for five years. In Toronto the unclaimed dividends amount to only \$402, and unclaimed balances \$55,902, or 12 per cent of the total.

These statistics are a somswhat startling revelation as to the extent of these dead deposits. A very large number of them are of such trifling amounts that the banks doubtless would be thankful to have them withdrawn. The total number of these accounts is over 15,000, so that the average sum so held is about \$30. The two smallest balances are one for a cent in the Bank of Commerce, and one for two cents in the Bank of Hamilton, though others run them hard with 3 cents and 4 cents deposits. The largest ones are one for \$4987 in the City and District Savings Bank, and one for \$3148 in the Jacques Cartier Bank. enough one of the largest unclaimed deposits is in the name of a well known government official at Ottawa. In order to facilitate the identification of owners for these balances we propose to issue lists of the names in which they stand from time to time. The first instalment appears on another page in this issue of all amount for and over \$1,000.

#### THE DUTY OF EXAMINING PASS BOOKS.

A case recently decided by the Supreme Court of California illustrates what grave trouble may arise to bankers and customers from the latter's neglect to examine his pass book promptly. It also shows how desirable it is for bankers to require the endorsation of every check paid across its counter by the person by whom it is presented.

The point of law, however, involved in this case turns upon the question as to whether a bank is released from its liability to refund the amount of a forged check to the drawer by his neglect to examine his pass book and vouchers for a considerable length of time.

The facts were that the London and San Franciso bank paid on 29th May 1898 a check for \$16,700 drawn by a customer, a Mr. Janin, payable to "currency or bearer" which was forged; the pass book and vouchers were handed to the drawer on 4th Sept., and in December the bank was informed that the signature was doubtful; but not until the following February was the forgery positively affirmed. These facis disclose extreme negligence on Janin's part, and we submit, also equal negligence on the part of the bank, as immediately suspicion was thrown on this check, the question of its genuineness ought instantly to have been settled. To allow such a matter to hang in suspense for two months was a remarkable instance of loose banking. The main point was, whether by these delays the bank had been prevented from saving itself from loss, and as that was not proved, the bank was condemned to recoup the amount of the forged cheque to the drawer.

The cheque was paid without any endorsement. Had this precaution been taken the forger might have shrank from completing his fraud, as his signature called for suddenly at the bank counter would have warned him of the danger of discovery. An instance is familiar to us of a forgery being promptly discovered, traced and punished by the nervous embarrassment of an endorser exciting suspicion, and enabling the fraud to be proved against him by his own signa-The most expert forger cannot sign a signature on demand, unexpectedly, so as to disguise his proper

individual style of writing.

Had that signature been on the cheque the drawer would probably have instantly been able to declare that no such person was known to him, or authorised to draw cash for one of his cheques, so the question of forgery would have been settled much earlier.

As a general rule, cheques for anything beyond small sums, ought never to be payable to "bearer." As a general rule too, pass books and vouchers should be examined at least monthly. This is especially prudent in this country where the habit of drawing checks for round sums is much more general than in England, and the identification of its charge in a pass book is imperfect until the vouchers are returned.

Banks in the old land take the great trouble of inserting the name of each payee in their customer's pass books. They therefore find it a very simple matter to identify each item; more especially when the custom of business houses is followed, of making out each cheque whenever possible, for a mixed amount of pounds, shillings and pence, as this enables cheques that are charged to be at once identified.

It is prudent then to examine pass books frequently, to avoid giving many cheques for the same amount and it is a duty to instantly confer with the bank if the slightest irregularity is detected or suspected.

# A GREAT LAND AGITATOR ON THE NORTH

Whatever views anyone may have as to Mr. Michael Davitt's career, no one can question his clearness of judgment outside his favorite theme, who reads his article on our North West in the Nineteenth Century. We are inclined to pay much respect to his impressions as they were made on the mind of an observer whose independence was not trammelled by official associations or-we must believe-hampered by private interests.

Mr. Davitt is nothing if not bold, so he opens his article by sharply snubbing Canadians for their lack of patriotic prudence, shown in comparison with the wiser policy of "practical Americans." He points out that we are habitually injuring Canada by "representing her as a female always clad in furs and living in a land of snow shoes and ice palaces," terms that remind us of what Mr. Van Horne has repeatedly said on the subject. Americans, however, whose western climate is as cold as ours, avoid such damaging representations of their country. The rebuke is timely; though the contrast he points out between American patriotism, and our unwisdom in depreciating our own land, is a little humiliating to our pride.

The great drawback to immigration has been, and for some time will be, the dread old country people Once clear up that prejudicial have of extreme cold. feeling and a flood of settlers from Great Britain would pour into the North West, but so long as Canada is regarded as "a female always dressed in furs," she will draw few lovers from the old land. Mr. Davitt's testimony based on the reports of a number of settlers will do good service in removing this difficulty. His verdict is that the cold in the North West is far less uncomfortable and unhealthy than the "chills" caused by the damp climate of the old land.

He is very outspoken in condemning the policy of bringing out men chiefly because of their being "small capitalists," for as a rule such settlers rely on their capital for doing what can only be accomplished by

immigration agents, is the wrong man for a new country; their English experience is fatal to success, as it chiefly consists in looking to the "Guvnor," for pocket money, and loafing about the nearest city. The man who does well in the North West is the industrious farm laborer who goes on the land to subdue it, to till it, to make it pay him well for his labor.

Mr. Davitt was amazed at the friendly feeling subsisting among settlers of so mixed a class in race and He declares that Canada is more thoroughly democratic than the States, and that our homestead laws are more favorable to industry and to home life than those of the States. As the writer has strong reasons for leaning to the Republic, we accept this testimony as conclusive. It will have much weight in England in diverting immigration from the States, being as it is, the verdict of one who has studied the question on the spot, one too whose familiarity with land questions is notorious, and whose approval of our system shows that they are in accordance with advanced views as to popular rights regarding the acquisition of land and its tenure.

After declaring how radical his views on emigration are, Mr. D. strongly discountenances the idea that factory hands are adapted to N. W. settlement. He condemns also the bringing out of artisans to compete with their own class. His contention is, and it is proof of his sound sense, that what Canada needs is "landworkers to be located on good land and plenty of it," whose advent "would be directly advantageous to the interests of skilled industry in Canada."

The locking up of the richest lands in British Columbia and throughout the North West in the hands of railway companies, syndicates, corporations and speculors comes in for unsparing censure. Naturally the great agitator is wroth at so much of our land being held by "absentees;" but, we submit, that an absentee owner of land in British Columbia or the N. W., is not properly classed with the absentee landlords of Ireland. Our absentee proprietors do not deplete this country of the wealth drawn from its soil by a rent burdened tenantry, or a pauperized peasantry. are only too anxious to sell off their holdings. There are very few acres indeed in any part of the west that could not be bought for such prices as would enable a buyer to become a freeholder in the course of two or three years out of savings from his crops.

We ask our English contemporaries to note this, as we have seen comments in old country papers on Mr. Davitt's so-called "exposure of land grabbing" in Canada, which are based on an entire misapprehension of the facts relating to the absentee owners of Canadian land. England and her sister isle are so small that natives are utterly incapable of grasping an idea as to the prodigious extent of our territory. They imagine that a few thousand acres being owned by English people, is making an artificial scarcity of land in the Whereas these "absentee" proprietors Dominion. might carry away their acres and they would never be missed, so far as any effect on the prices of our lands is concerned. Canada could find a good farm for every farming family in Great Britain at the cost to each of a cart, horse or a piano, and then have vast areas left for many millions of settlers. As good land as any in England can be had for from \$3 to \$5 per acre, some indeed for less, of first-class quality.

So Mr. Davitt's indignation over the Canadian Pacific hard work, economy and farming tact. The "farmer's Railway and other "absentee" corporations owning son with means," who has been so great a favorite of large tracts of land, is somewhat artificial; he has brought the natural anger felt in Ireland at the absentee land owners to bear upon a condition of land tenure which is not in any sense akin to, or comparable with the system which disturbs the peace, bleeds the life blood, and curses socially, politically and financially the

" First flower of the earth, and first gem of the sea."

Mr. Davitt does not favor annexation, he thinks that the Republic is now a larger nation than can be well governed. He foresees, however, or rather predicts, that grave trouble is in store for Canada unless a large settlement is secured for the North West, and thinks that instead of granting subsidies to encourage certain debt-laden provinces to continue their vicious system of over spending, the public treasery should be drawn upon largely to colonise vacant lands.

It is pleasant to hear one whose record would lead us to expect anti-British sentiments, growing eloquent over the prospect of Canada supplying the old land so abundantly with wheat as to make the English market "less susceptible to the influence of American grain rings, and dealings in futures." Mr. Davitt may be what so many "at home" regard him, a troubler of Israel, but he can sing "Rule Britannia" with the best of loyalists. He speaks of the old land, from whose laws he suffered severely, with a magnaminity that does him honor, and with an affection that should make every Briton proud of the mother who, after such chastisement as she inflicted, retains the love of her erring child.

Mr. Davitt's able report on our North West, his frank counsels touching immigration, as well as his sharp rebukes of some of our failings, entitle him to the thanks of the people of Canada.

#### A LITERARY BUDGET SPEECH.

Mr. Gladstone's budget speeches were said to be as interesting as a novel. His statistics were so lucidly displayed that they were as bright as figures of speech. The recent budget speech of Mr. Goschen reads like popular literature. Having no new policy to expound or old one to defend he delivered an address on what may be styled, the curiosities of fiscal returns.

It was certainly a curious feature to present a return of expenditure \$1,670,000 below the estimate, and at the same of income \$1,820,000 in excess of expectancy. In view of the general impression here that England is an absolutely free trade country, it is also curious to note that the Customs duties last year yielded close upon 100 millions, or over 26 per cent of the total revenue, excise giving 33 per cent, stamp duties 18 per cent, and the balance of tax revenue the total of which was \$373,700,000, being chiefly from income and property tax.

The consumption of tea and coffee in England closely approximates to our own, being for the former 87 ounces of tea per head yearly, and 12 of coffee. Of spirits, the ratio is 8 pints per head. Last year the consumption of brandy was heavy, probably owing to the notion that it is a panacea for grippe, or a pleasant stimulant during the depression following an attack. Save amongst a class, happily not numerous, spirits are not generally a popular beverage in England; as a medicine, however, brandy is as popular as the quack alcoholised physic, called tonic bitters, is on this continent.

It may seem presumptious to correct Mr. Goschen, but he was wide astray in regarding tobacco as "a

luxury of the poor," and its large consumption a proof Tobacco is a substitute for solid food of good times. when times are hard; we have seen men, and women too, in England, who were literally starving for want of nutriment, killing the pangs of hunger by tobacco. In good times a pipe enhances satisfaction, in the dark darks of want, a smoke gives consolation. The consumption of tobacco has therefore no fiscal bearing. That in the last fifty years, the consumption per head of tea and coffee has tripled, while the outlay on spirits has hardly increased, is indeed as significant It does not show, however, that the as gratifying. more domestic beverages have lowered the per capita use of spirits, but that the home life of the poorest classes has been made more agreeable by cheap tea and coffee.

A remarkable section of this speech is devoted to showing certain facts that, though not new, for the data for them has been published in the journals of a scientific society, are for the first time put in popular Mr. Goschen shows that the gross incomes of form. the professional classes exceed those of the great cotton lords, colliery owners and manufacturers. It will be startling to most persons to read that of the total value of physical products the growers get the smaller, and the carriers and distributors, much the larger In a few words, the cost of production is less than cost of placing on sale. That is no mystery, however, as the case of bananas, to take a familiar illustration, well shows that their price here must be mainly the cost of transportation and handling. Oranges which now sell at \$1.50 to \$2 in Florida, bring \$4 to \$5 in Montreal.

The marvellous interlacings of commerce have been before commented upon in the press. The theme is fruitful, its illustrative evidences are exceedingly interesting and its facts instructive. The London Spectator says:

"How little does the farm-laborer, or miner or factory artisan realise that a large proportion of what he produces is destined after various exchanges to pay for a hundred thousand services all over the globe, for feeding policemen at the Antipodes, for adorning actresses in London, for clothing laborers everywhere—and that only a very small proportion of it or its equivalents will be retained by the owner for whom he works,"

In another passage that paper speaks of the products of agriculture and manufactures paying for all the services of civilisation.

But the Spectator is wrong in speaking of this being Before us is a lecture by a banker in this city delivered over twenty years ago in which this interdependency is alluded to, and some years ago we said, "the British soldiers who fought at Pekin were partly paid by money got from the tea fields of China, the guns that brought Sepastopol to ruin were provided out of the profits on Russian grain, and the lawyer's, doctor's and store bills of every Canadian town are indirectly derived from products grown in every part of the world." Neither can we agree with the Spectator classing "teachers, artists and poets," as "producers." The word " producer" has a definite, commercial meaning; it is only applicable to those who produce material products out of the soil or by manufacturing; it can only be applied to others in a metaphysical, unnatural sense, as murderers may be styled "producers," as they produce work for lawyers, jailers and hangmen.

Although we see nothing new in Mr. Goschen's interesting discussion of the marvels of commerce, we admit that when presented in a budget speech his words will teach many, by reaching many, who little

realise how, for the manifold comforts and conveniences of civilised life, all races and classes are mutually dependent on each other, a fact that proves commerce to be not only an adjunct but the main producer and the maintaining power of civilisation.

#### PROVINCIAL ESTIMATES.

The government of this Province has before it no enviable task; one which puts the stable performance of Hercules into the shade. The ship they have undertaken to navigate is rat-holed in every part; it is too big for the waters it has to float in; its steering and sailing gear are too cumbersome, needing far too much costly labor in working; the craft has touched bottom, it is only kept trom absolute wreck by artificial buoys.

The estimates presented to the Assembly on 17th inst. are a melancholy show. They however do much credit to the government whose determination to cut down expenditures is so honorably manifested in each item being lowered from the figure of last year, so that the total is about a million less. The figures are:

In regard to the items \$375,600 and \$1,180,915 in 1891-2, it is explained that the latter item was put in as "Special" by the late government, and that the proposed outlay on public works has been cut down about \$800,000.

So that for expenditures of \$6,592,000, there is only an income of \$2,671,000. True, the treasury has \$471,-852 cash on hand, and \$3,707,000 proceeds of a loan, but look at the expenditures, and no items appear for which such a sum can be legitimately applied. The expenditures outside railways and public works amount to \$3,800,000, so that fully \$1,139,000 is estimated for current outlays, for which the Province has

·Increase,

not one cent of current income. Look to at the source of our provincial income. One half of it comes from Ottawa. Of course it is originally drawn from the pockets of the people out of tariff dues. The problem for the government is how to secure an income to meet the cost of running the Provincial government. Unless they can cut down more than another million the Province must spend that sum out of loans, which is a reckless, dishonest, and ruinous policy. While heartily commending the administration on their first estimate, we say with all plainness, the pruning knife must be more sternly applied, and for work which that cannot do, a chopping axe must be used in cutting down all useless lumberers of the ground. The granting of \$355,725 for "charities," seems a strange estimate. Benevolence is most commendable, but a man who borrows money to give it away in charity is not benevolent.

#### A PROTEST AGAINST OPPRESSIVE INSURANCE LAWS.

The Superintendent of the Ohio Insurance Department, in his annual report, puts in this plea for fair legislative treatment: While the tremendous and increasing annual destruction of property by fire may properly be charged with a large part in binging about this condition of affairs, the companies are in a measure responsible therefor. An unhealthy and feverish competition, an inordinate eagerness for volume of business without regard to its class or character, involving inadequate rates, in. sufficient inspection of risks and various other departures from the principles of insurance, have injuriously affected the buslness. Doubtless many others might be specified, but unfriendly and restrictive legislation should not be overlooked in enumerating the causes leading to the situation to which reference has been made. A business so absolutely essential to the material welfare of every community should receive consideration and not annoyance at the hands of those invested with the legislative powers of the state. This is especially applicable to certain features in the Ontario Act just passed. The intention seems to have been to harass insurance business, as though it were too dangerous to be loose without a State muzzle. It is a narrow and superficial view of the subject which holds that the interests of the companies are antagonistic or hostile to those of its policyholders or patrons. On the contrary, in every properly conducted organization they are identical, and influences, hostile or hortful to the organization inevitably affect the patrons, policyholders or members in like manner.

#### NOTHING SUCCEEDS LIKE SUCCESS.

It is so constantly our unpleasant duty to record failures of business enterprises, that it is indeed a pleasant relief to have the gratification of noticing an achieved success. When Messrs. Morgan & Co., projected the erection of their building on St. Catherine St., their friends were much concerned at what was almost universally condemned as an unwise venture. The land was very costly, the clearance of it expensive, and the magnificence of the structure tells its own tale of probably as large an expenditure on a dry goods retail store as ever took place. "Morgans" has architecturally and in completeness no rival on this continent, nor in Europe, although it is exceeded in particular features in some stores of New Orleans, London, Paris and Milan. After one year's test the proprietors are more than satisfied at their enterprise. It has paid. Several causes combine to make this splendid emporium so successful. It is well placed, that part of the city affords the best stands for stores. Messrs. Birks are going there from St. James St., Mr. Douglas, an old timer on Notre Dame, has fixed himself there, Messrs. Graham of Victoria Square are about to remove there, and other leading retailers are prospecting for good sites. Then the store is well organised, a greatpoint; customers find it very convenient and pleasant to select all manner of dry goods. Then the proprietors give close personal attention to the business and to the visitors. Montreal has every reason to be proud of so palatial an establishment, and proud that it is so successful.

#### THE BANK OF MONTREAL STATEMENT.

The anticipation in regard to the results of the Bank of Montreal's business for last year were more than realised. Had this stock along with most others of the banks not stood so high, the statement recently issued would have driven up quotations. But, it is manifest that the favorable returns were discounted. Last year it was deemed advisable to write off a large amount of bad and reduce doubtful assets to their depreciated value. This year no special cause has arisen for any such policy. The profits to and of April 1891, after usual deductions were \$844.999, this year they exceed that figure by \$480,888, which is a trifle over 4 per cent on the capital. After so large a cutting down operation as was executed in 1891, there can hardly be any need for building up a contingent fund in the shape of a profit and loss account balance, in excess of what now exists, viz., \$565,615, so that there seems a good prospect of a bonus, if not this year, at an early period. The market price of this stock on 30th April 1892 was 227½ to 230 per cent, that is \$455 to \$460 per share.

#### NEWFOUNDLAND TONING DOWN.

The defeat of Mr. Whiteway's government a few days ago seems to have had a wholesale effect on the policy of Newfoundland towards this country. A reverse of that kind often brings a government to its senses. Our conviction is that the trouble which has arisen, from which Canada has suffered not a little and most unjustly was fomented by American intriguers who sought to divert the trade of that island from us to the States, and to embarrass our fishermen in order to facilitate the work of their rivals. It is stated that a modus vivendi is to be estab. lished under which free bait will be granted by the Newfoundland government, and our products will be admitted free, on condition that this privilege is reciprocated as it was prior to the misunderstanding. The native press throughout has condemned the treatment meted out to Canada by the island gov. ernment, and the home authorities have given it, and its promoters their firm disapproval. All's well that ends well, we trust that Newfoundland and Canada will never again be disturbed by ill-will on either side.

#### ADULTERATED LIQUORS.

Mr. Curran made a good point in the House of Commons when he urged that instead of samples of liquor for analysis being taken from the leading stores they should be taken from a number of smaller ones. The large stores have a class of customers who generally know "what's what" about their goods, and are independent of any store. The great mass of small buyers are

not only poor judges of what they purchase, having had so little experience of anything but a very low grade of goods, but they are usually so much in debt to storekeepers, that they have to take anything he offers at any price he fixes. A test was once made of prices paid by the very poorest people, and the result was that a tea dear at 40 cents per pound was retailed at over \$1, in small quantities, sugar at three times the rate paid in good stores and every article purchased by the indigent was found of the meanest quality, and at exorbitant prices. It is so with liquors, the adulteration is commonly only water, but water vended at the price per gallon of whiskey is a little excessive. Recent investigations in this city have disclosed the fact that coffee forms only 25 per cent of much that is sold for that article in the smaller stores, and that a mere coloring matter is being sold as coffee which is an unmitigated fraud. Mr. Curran's advice to the government is good, he wishes an analysis made of liquor dispensed in small retail establishments, the enquiry should take in all other articles open to adulteration.

#### THE GUARDIAN INSURANCE CO. IN COURT.

The Guardian Insurance Co. has recently lost a suit mainly owing to lack of business like care in drawing upon an agreement with a policyholder. The case as reported in the Mail, shows that an action was brought by a Mr. Vineberg of Cornwall against this company to recover \$2000 under a policy of insurance on his stock, which was destroyed by fire. The company entered into an agreement to submit the question of amount of loss to arbitration, under which agreement the loss and damage caused by the fire was fixed at \$904.65 one half of which sum was paid into court. The plaintiff had insured for \$2000 in another company. The plaintiff alleged that one of the appraisers was a sub agent of the company, and had a personal interest in the award, a relationship of which the plaintiff was ignorant; he also claimed that the award was carelessly and improperly made, his real loss being \$4000. Judge Rose declared the award void. The case on appeal was dismissed with costs, the original judgment being sustained. Without any wish to prejudice the appellant company, we may say, that when an insurance company gives any ground for charging that one of its arbitrators was one of its employees, it commits a fatal mistake, it is not honest and therefore bad policy. Agreements too between companies and policyholders should not be liable to be knocked into a cocked hat in a court of law.

#### LOCAL FACTORY BONUSING.

One of our aldermen has given notice of a motion to exempt new industries established in this city from local taxation. The motion should be squelched summarily. If this great city, the chief seat of Canadian manufacturing enterprise, cannot get along without giving annual bonuses to factories, it had better lower its flag to the level of the small municipalities that compete with each other for a blacksmith's shop. If an industry cannot be profitably established in this city on the same business lines of independence as all our existing ones, it is too much of a charitable enterprise for our people to favor. Capital is abund-

ant here; labor is plentiful at a price as cheap as anywhere on the continent; facilities of distribution are very great; why then should any person desirous of settling amid such favorable conditions ask the city to pay him for establishing a factory wherein to employ his capital and skill? Those things that city taxes are paid for, are as essential to a manufactory, as anything else it pays for. If a factory cannot afford to pay for police protection, for lighting, for street accommodation, for sanitation, for fire protection, it is much too sickly a plant to thrive in this atmosphere. Montreal is not a hospital for descepti industries.

#### LAYING THE CORNER STONE.

The laying of one stone to commemorate the founding of this city on one day, and the next seeing the corner stone laid of the Board of Trade building were events remarkably associated. The stone was laid by Sir Donald Smith without any ceremony. He announced, however, that a grand demonstration will be made when the building is opened. Owing to no arrangement having been made for spectators the stone laying was only seen by a dozen or two citizens, and the speeches were inaudible beyond a very narrow circle. We trust the building will be completed without any accident, and prove to be all its promoters and the citizens desire in so important a structure.



FLOUR AND GRAIN .- The breadstuffs markets continue depressed. All cable offers received here have been at disappointingly low figures. Local demand is trifling. Oatmeal continues in buyere' favor. Wheat dull, and bran and shorts quiet but stendy. There have been sales of oats, peas and feed barley at quotations. At Chicago corn has created more interest of late, being active and strong on account of heavy rainfalls in the west. Predictions of clearing weather caused a relapso. Telegrams state that wheat was active in Chicago early in the day on selling from all sources on lower cables, clearing weather in the North-West, the Russian ukase and the renewal of the French duty on June 1st. There was vigorous hummering by a strong bear contingent. Seaboard clearances keep up to the recent average,—over half a million,—and large charters are reported for wheat at New York. Lake tonnage at Ohicago is chartered for 300 -000 bushels. Euglish cables quote wheat and corn cargoes weaker. Liverpool wheat, spot reds very dull; whites firmly held. Liverpool fair average red winter wheat, 6s 10 d; white Mfchigan, 7s 2d; red American spring, 6s 9d. Canadian peas, 5s 9d. A stralian wheat off coast, 37s; present and following month, 36s; Chillian wheat, off coast, 35s 3d; present and following month, 35s Reviewing the British grain trade the Express says that there are large supplies of English wheat. Prices of fine samples are maintained, but values of the lower qualities show a decline of 6d. The prices of foreign wheats show an average de-cline of 6d. Corn carly in the week was in good demand at an advance of 6d. Later the markets were again weaker as quoted above. Ontario grain men are now complaining oflow prices and would like to sell. It appears that stocks are large, and although damage has been caused there is plenty of good wheat to sell. The prospects of the coming crop are



There is another large decrease in the visible supply, and a great deal of that now counted in the statement is en route to points where it will drop out a few days hence. Twenty per cent, of the visible is on the lakes and canals, and Duluth alone has parted with three millions six hundred thousand bushels. But this very plenty is making buyers cautious. They are so much headed towards them that they naturally look for lower prices as a consequence of its being offered to consumers. Russian advices state that the authorities there are not in favor of removing the edict against the export of wheat before the end of next month. The total quantity of whest in sight on this continent and affect to Europe is 68,538,000 bushels, a decrease of 1,896,100 bushels compared with a week ago, and an increase of 11,417,000 with last year.



Dried fruit and spices quiet, Business in Valencia raisins is possible at 3c@3\(\frac{1}{2}\)c and in currents at 4\(\frac{1}{2}\)c\ 4\(\frac{1}{2}\)c. A few more lots of low grade Japan teas have been sold at advanced prices, some at about 12c. Most of the bank teas have been taken off the market. Low grades close firm with advance sustained. A steamer left Japan on the 16th, and samples should be on the market here the first week in June. A recent private cable from Yokohama reports that the market there is active and 11002c higher Steamer and rail rate 3c per 1b, gross, Sail rate not yet fixed. This cable is also responsible for the statement that the quality of the new crop is poor.

HIDES AND TALLOW .- The competition between dealers has reduced profits on hides to nothing. We quote nominally \$5.005.50 for No. 1, but prices should be lower to put trade on a healthy basis. Refined tallow, 5c@52c; rough, 2c@3c.
