Marie, Midland, Tobermory, Sarnia, Port Stanley, Port Colborne, Toronto and Kingston. with the station at Kingston of sufficient range to communicate with Montreal. Three new radio-telegraphic coast stations were established during

-Cost of Services.

Out of an appropriation of \$8,000,000 for the naval service, there was an exditure of \$1,790,000. Many Witnesses Called by Police -Radial Project is Again in the Air.



CITY ENGINEER RUST REVIEWS WORK OF YEAR

Over Five Millions Expended on Public Improvements by Departments-Many Big Tasks:

City Engineer Rust shows in his final report to the board of works, which was tendered yesterday afternoon, that a great deal of work has been done by the department this year. Extracts from the report follow:

"The total expenditure of the department for the past year has been \$5,-267,711.04. This exceeds the expenditure of last year and gives your committee

of last year and gives your committee some idea of the immense amount of work which has been carried out.

"The filtration works at the island have been practically completed, and will be in operation in a few days.

"The electrically-driven centrifugal pumps at the main and high level pumping stations have been erected, and some of the pumps at the main pumping station have been put in operation.

"The steel viaduct over the Don, on a line with Queen-st, has been completed and opened for traffic, and the Wilton-ave bridge was finished in July.

"In addition to the ordinary work involved in the construction of sewers, roadways, sidewalks, water mains, etc., a large number of very important works at the

a large number of very important works have been undertaken, such as the main drainage, of which the high level interceptor and the sewage disposal works have been practically completed, there remaining only about 200 feet of the high level to finish. The pumping station is well under construction. The low level should be finished at the end of next year. Out of a total of 24,500 feet, 16,000 feet have been constructed.



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THREE IRONWORKERS AT ARENA NEARLY KILLED

Steel Girder Collapses and Men Fall 70 Feet-Seriously Hurt But Will Recover.

W. T. Morrison, 36 years, married, 16 Edna-avenue; Fred Moore, 30 years, single, 70 Bathurst-street, and Herbert Cox, 23 years, single, 160 Victoria-lane, Cox, 23 years, single, 160 Victoria-lane, are in St. Michael's Hospital seriously injured, as the result of the collapse of a steel girder at the arena gardens in Mutual-street, which carried the three 70 feet to the ground at 7.50 yesterday morning. The three are ironworkers and were making fast a threeton girder when it slid in the chain carrying Moore and Morrison with it and tearing thru the scaffolding upon which Cox was standing, to rivet the girder to the structure already up.

Morrison and Moore literally rode the girder to the ground and were lucky not to be killed outright by it when they struck. Morrison's left leg was broken below the knee. Moore's right shoulder was crushed and dislocated, while Cox's back was severely injured. All are severely bruised and cut, but will recover.

TRIED TO BOARD TRAIN MAN FEARFULLY HURT

When he was picked up, he was bleeding profusely from several wounds. The left foot and leg were terribly crushed and will have to be amputated should he regain sufficient strength to stand the operation. The right arm is broken in a number of places and will have to come off just below the shoulder. The right knee was smashed, and he has a severe scalp wound. He was unconscious and suffering from shock.

Other Results at Depth.

The other borings were in the centre of the south claim. At four hundred feet, the first drill hole ran into ove that assayed up to \$18.80, and at 644 feet to \$88 feet the ore assayed up to \$58. The second drill hole was put dawn 200 feet to the northeast of the first. The same mineralized band was entered at 520 feet, and continued in the same formation down to 768 feet. Assays up to \$14 were made from the core. Three distinct ore bodies have been penetrated, estimated to be 20 feet to 60 feet and 50 feet wide respectively.

The Fearl Lake Company's main shaft is now down deeper than either those of the Hollinger or McIntyre, as it has reached a depth of 215 feet. Crosscutting to open up these ore bodies will be an event of much importance.
