**TWENTY-SEVENTH YEAR**  
**TORY REVIVAL IN ENGLAND**  
**PARTY SWEEP BOROUGHS**  
**WIN BY THREE TO ONE**

Conservatives Win 1011 Seats for Council—Former Premier Balfour Attributes Result to Discontent With Liberal Administration.

London, Nov. 2.—The triennial elections of the London borough councils have resulted in an overwhelming victory for the municipal reformers, who in some of the boroughs absolutely wiped out the progressives.

The victors were formerly known as moderates and represent the Unionist party, and the progressives the Liberal and Labor parties. After several years of progressive regime, during which, it is contended, the taxes were increased to abnormal figures in consequence of huge expenditures, including palatial workhouses, Turkish baths for workmen, who did not use them, and club-houses and other similar luxuries, the borough councils are once again great strongholds of Toryism.

Complete returns show that the Reformers won 1011 seats, the remaining 331 being divided between the Progressives, Laborites and Independents. Ex-Premier Balfour, speaking at a dinner given in his honor to-night, said the result of the elections throughout the country had surprised both parties. He attributed the result to discontent with the present Liberal administration.

The provincial municipal elections have also resulted in a rout for the Liberals. The campaigns in the provinces were mostly conducted on political party lines. Incomplete results show that the Liberals have sustained a net loss of thirty-three representatives, and that the Conservatives have a net gain of fifty-nine. The Labor party has a net gain of nine.

In London the Labor party candidates seem to have fared even worse than the progressives, but they made small gains in the provinces.

**PROTECTION HAS KNACK OF RISING FROM THE DEAD**  
Henry Asquith Speaks at Manchester—Message From Chamberlain.

London, Nov. 2.—Speaking at Manchester, Henry Asquith, chancellor of the exchequer, reminded his audience that protection had an awkward knack of rising from the dead.

Asquith Chamberlain, in a speech at Canterbury, said the whole Unionist party had come into line and read a message from his father, who stated that united action would assure the success of tariff reform.

**WANT ADDITIONAL MONEY FOR IMPERIAL PAPER CO.**  
Million and a Half Necessary, Says Chairman.

London, Nov. 2.—At a meeting of the Imperial Paper Mills, Canada, Mr. Craig chairman, said if the necessary fresh capital of £200,000 was found the management of the reorganized company would make an annual profit of £45,000. The total loss sustained to date was \$290,337.

A joint committee of debenture holders was appointed to consider the question of raising new capital.

**G.T. WORK TRAINS CRASH SEVERAL CAUGHT IN WRECK**  
Two Men Lose Both Legs and Will Probably Die.  
Montreal, Nov. 2.—A serious collision occurred on the Grand Trunk near St. Bruno to-night. Two construction trains crashed together and several of the men were caught in the wreck.

James Morrison of Deseronto and Lorenzo Dansereau of Montreal were severely and probably fatally injured, having their legs cut off.

**RUSS POLICE GET WOMAN BUT STOLEN MONEY GONE**  
Sun of \$188,926 Was Stolen From Treasury Wagon.  
London, Nov. 2.—A despatch to a news agency from St. Petersburg to-day says that the woman who escaped with the \$188,926 stolen from the treasury wagon, Oct. 27, has been arrested, but the money has not been recovered.

She is described as a Jewish belonging to St. Petersburg, capital of Taurida Province.

## CARMEN TO STRIKE SUNDAY CATARACT PURSUES UNION

Street Railway Employees Say Company Has Delayed Too Long Putting Arbitrators' Award Into Effect—Mass Meeting Satur-day Night to Decide on Action.

Hamilton, Nov. 2.—(Special.)—Hamilton will have a street railway strike, commencing Sunday, judging by the talk of the men to-night. They reported their case to the Trades and Labor Council to-night. They alleged in the report to the council that the company, by bribes and intimidation, is trying to break up the union.

The company, so the men claim, agreed to put the arbitrators' award into effect 21 days after the award was given. Some 41 days have elapsed and the award has not been put in force yet.

The men will have a mass meeting at midnight Saturday and it seems to be a certainty that they will strike. The Trades Council will give them every assistance.

## Peary Gets Farthest North In His Stout Ship Roosevelt

Intrepid Explorer Reaches Point 87.6 and Turns Back After Terrible Battle—Beats Former Best Record Made by Abruzzi's Expedition.

New York, Nov. 2.—The United States now holds the record of "farthest north," 87 degrees 6 minutes.

This feat was accomplished by Commander Robert E. Peary of the United States Army. The Intrepid Arctic explorer failed to reach the north pole as he had confidently hoped to do with his specially constructed vessel, the Roosevelt, but he penetrated nearer to the pole than the Duke of Abruzzi's expedition, which had held the Arctic record, 86 degrees 34 minutes.

What Commander Peary did, and his experiences during the past year in the frozen north, are briefly but vividly summarized in a communication received by Herbert L. Bridgman, secretary of the Peary Arctic Club. This communication follows:

"Hopedale, Labrador (via Twillingate, Newfoundland), Nov. 2: "To Herbert L. Bridgman: "Roosevelt, north coast of Greenland, somewhat north of Alert's winter quarters. Went north with sledges in February via Hecla and Columbia. Reached open water between 84th and 85th degrees. Beyond 85th six days. Gale disrupted ice destroyed caches, cut off communication with supporting bodies, drifted due east. Reached 87 degrees 6 minutes north latitude, over ice, drifting steadily eastward. Returning ice eight dogs, two sledges and sledges by open water; reached north coast of Greenland in straitened conditions. Killed ten oxen and returned along Greenland coast to support the expedition. One crew member recaptured on Roosevelt sledge west, completing north coast of Greenland, and reached other land, near 100th meridian. Home voyage incessant battle with ice, storms and head winds. Roosevelt magnificent ice fighter and sea boat. No deaths or illness in expedition. "Coming Home. "After furnishing these contents of Commander Peary's message to the Associated Press, Mr. Bridgman said: "Continued on Page 12."

Morden, Man., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—Gradually the crown drawing tighter a web of evidence about Doyle, charged with the murder of Vincent Weller. Eight witnesses were heard to-day, all Americans from the dead man's home.

The most damaging evidence was given by Matthew Kartes, brother-in-law of the prisoner, who testified to having seen Doyle and Weller together on the day before the alleged murder.

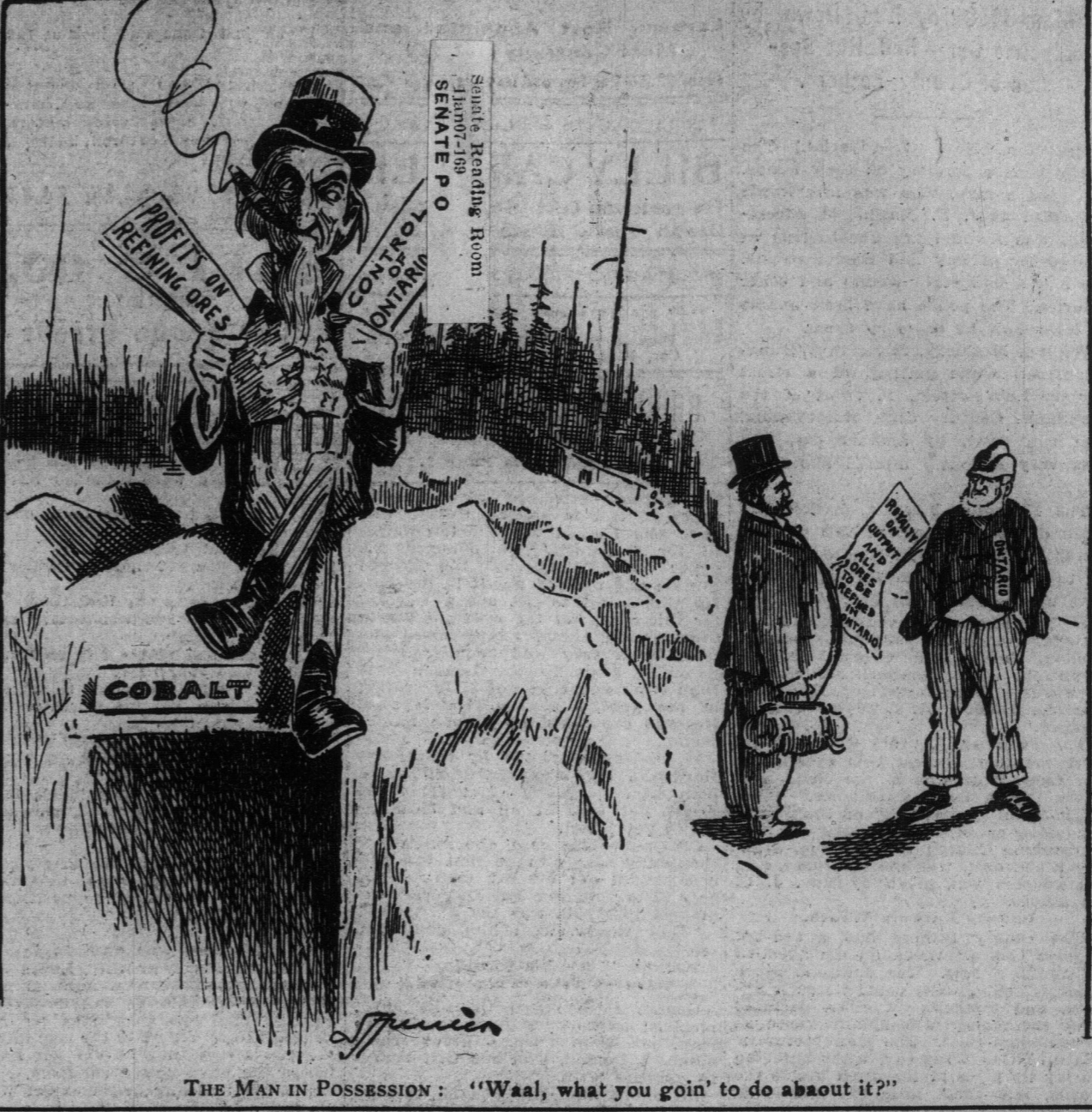
Two witnesses testified to seeing Weller and Doyle driving towards the scene of the tragedy on the morning of that date.

**TURRET STEAMER ASHORE NO FEARS SOLD FOR CREW**

Score of Fishing Boats Wrecked on North Shore of Prince Edward Island—No Loss of Life Reported.

Charlottetown, P.E.I., Nov. 2.—(Special.)—A fierce gale has caused more or less damage on Prince Edward Island, and has driven schooners to seek shelter in Charlottetown harbor.

## GAVE \$400 FOR FORTY VOTES TO GET THE "INFLUENCE" USUALLY ADVERSE

Mr. Duffield of London Was Quietly Generous With His Money for the Good of the Party—A Witness Advised to Tell the Truth.

James C. Duffield, the millionaire gas man of London, was the feature witness in the London conspiracy case yesterday. He admitted that he had given a grocer named Depper \$400 out of his own pocket if he would reduce Gray's majority in No. 10 sub-division of the third ward by forty, or at a flat rate of 10 votes. This was the only money he had contributed during the by-election. He did it of his own free will, and no one knew, about the event.

CHRISTIAN BROTHERS LOSE MUST HAVE CERTIFICATES

London, Nov. 2.—(C.A.P.)—The privy council to-day dismissed without costs the appeal of the Brothers of the Christian Schools v. the Minister of Education of Ontario.

The appeal on which the privy council has given its decision originated in the Ontario separate schools, where the question of the qualifications of the Christian Brothers for teaching in the schools was raised. Certain committees, for various purposes were in 1880 engaged in educational work in Lower Canada, and the members were at the time of the passing of the B.N.A. Act, except from undergoing an examination as teachers in the Province of Quebec.

The far-reaching effect of the judgment may be gathered from the following facts: There are three separate school districts in Ontario, which includes Toronto, there are 174 teachers of the religious community. Of these only forty-eight hold certificates, the remainder, including twenty-five Christian Brothers. In another district there are ninety-eight teachers without certificates, while of the 106 religious teachers in the other only about 25 per cent. are qualified.

THE MAYOR WINS. James A. Ellis, mayor of Ottawa, won in the appeal to the divisional court to have the judgment obtained by him against William G. Black of Ottawa set aside. It was alleged that Black published in certain Ottawa newspapers articles charging Mr. Ellis with gross misconduct in his office as mayor.

CONTROLLERS WANT REPORT ON "BLOOR STREET" VIADUCT  
Board of Works Take Up Numerous Matters Having to Do With Railways.

The idea of a "greater Bloor-street" is steadily growing in favor with the civic rulers, and is being entertained in the light of decidedly more than a mere future possibility.

The submitting of a motion by Controller Jones at yesterday afternoon's sitting of the board of control, asking for a report upon the prospective viaduct, the essential feature of the plan which the mayor has definitely committed himself, again to the fore. The board showed itself willing to consider the viaduct as a feasible proposition, the Controller Hubbard thought the present bridge at the head of Sherbourne-street might offer something of an obstacle to the proposed plan.

The motion as submitted was as follows:

"That the city engineer be requested to forthwith investigate and report upon the expediency of extending Bloor-street east on a direct line to Danforth-avenue, and that the assessment commissioner be requested to report on the land dam- ages in connection therewith and also as to the land adjacent, which might with advantage be expropriated by the city, and that plans be prepared forthwith."

"My plan is to run it right thru from Bloor-street to Danforth-avenue," explained the mover.

"Is that the bridge should be paid for partly as a local improvement, partly by the city and partly by the county," Controller Jones said, he believed the matter was one on which the city would have to obtain some legislation. The board was agreeable to having a joint report as proposed.

It would be best to enter cautiously into consideration of the big Esplanade viaduct scheme, and 500 copies of the Cunningham-Goswami report, made on the subject a number of years ago, at the instance of the board of trade, will be struck out.

The city solicitor reported on advertising the proposed bridge. The approval of the railways to the terms of the tenders would first have to be obtained, and in the event of the tenders not being accepted, the tenders would have to go before the railway commissioners.

The city engineer and wholly commissioner reported that the city lacked the needed facilities to do roofing on St. Lawrence market, and it was decided to provide debentures to meet the cost of the work, for which tenders will be asked.

In the Board of Works, the undertaking of converting Ashbridges marsh into a site for a factory was a subject of consideration by the civic board of works yesterday.

The city engineer's idea was that the bridge be supported by four or five tracks and be given the right in return therefor of leasing running rights to any other railroads, that might desire them.

The board was inclined to view the proposition with favor, and the outcome was a decision to send the chairman, Ald. Geary, and City Engineer Rust to Montreal to confer with General Manager Hays of the Grand Trunk.

The laying down of permanent pavements on all the city streets was an idea favored by the board, on the ground that better sanitary conditions would prevail, and the city engineer will report as to where operations in this direction might best be begun. Brick was favored as the most desirable material and it was considered that the procedure to be followed should be that of paving the central portion of the city and extend by degrees to the suburbs.

Ald. Harrison brought up his pet matter of the removal of overhead signs, making electrically supported signs, and making electrically supported signs, provided they did not put out over the street. Objection was taken by Controller Hubbard, who thought the plan was too arbitrary and was along lines calculated to please members of the board of trade and to subordinate against retailers. There had been no accidents from high signs as yet. He was favorable to having the city engineer regulate the signs.

Ald. Geary suggested the appointment of a sub-committee to confer with the retailers and report, which was agreed to.

The city engineer reported that a swing bridge, to be built across the western channel, would cost \$200,000. Ald. Vaughan said he thought the bridge could be built for a considerably less sum than the one proposed, and the city engineer reported that he would make a study of the matter.

Ald. Geary remarked that the gap presented engineering difficulties for bridge-building. Ald. Dunn pointed out that seven-thirds of the vessels plying in and out of Toronto harbor used the eastern gap on account of the shallow approaches to the western channel. He suggested that the city engineer get into communication with the shipping interests, and the Dominion government, as owning the northern portion of the channel, should be asked to state the cost of this.

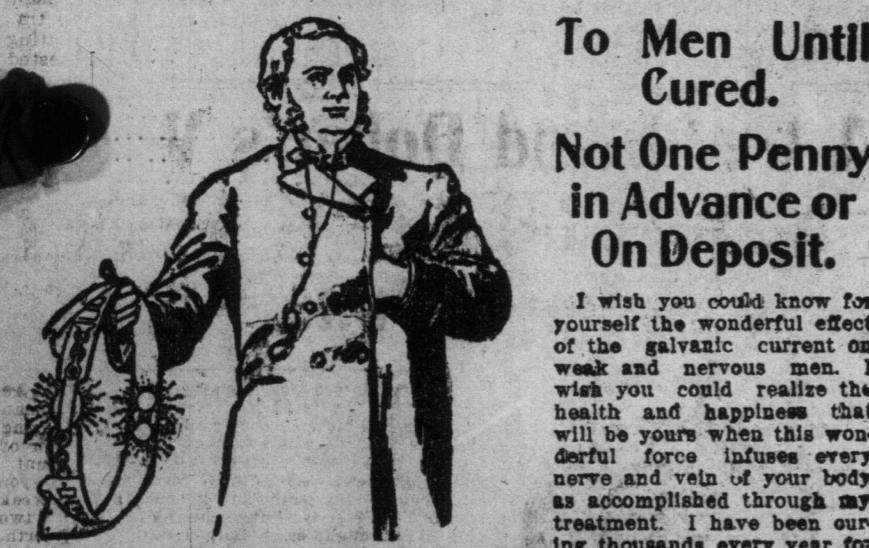

When the fire broke out in the factory building, the fire escapes were headed them one after another to comrades who had followed him. The frantic crowd in the street begged in walls an answer to their frenzied cries for help.

NO CHORUSES FROM TORONTO TO COMPETE FOR GREY TROPHY

A Montreal despatch says that Dr. Charles Harris intends taking his philharmonic chorus of 300 singers to Ottawa to compete for Earl Grey's trophy. Local musical leaders have no intention of competing, although Dr. Harris said last night that he was very glad for anything that would aid the cause of music in Canada.

DROP 8-HOUR DAY.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 2.—Committees of the Railway Switchmen's Union, who have been negotiating with railroad managers in St. Paul for an eight-hour day and a 10 cent an hour raise in wages, have dropped the demand for eight hours on orders from the Grand Lodge at Chicago to reopen the negotiations on a ten-hour basis.

English Philanthropist Dead.

London, Nov. 2.—George Herring, the noted English philanthropist, who in the course of his life contributed large sums of money to hospitals and charitable enterprises, died to-day after an operation for appendicitis. He made his first money on the race courses and subsequently became identified with a number of large businesses.

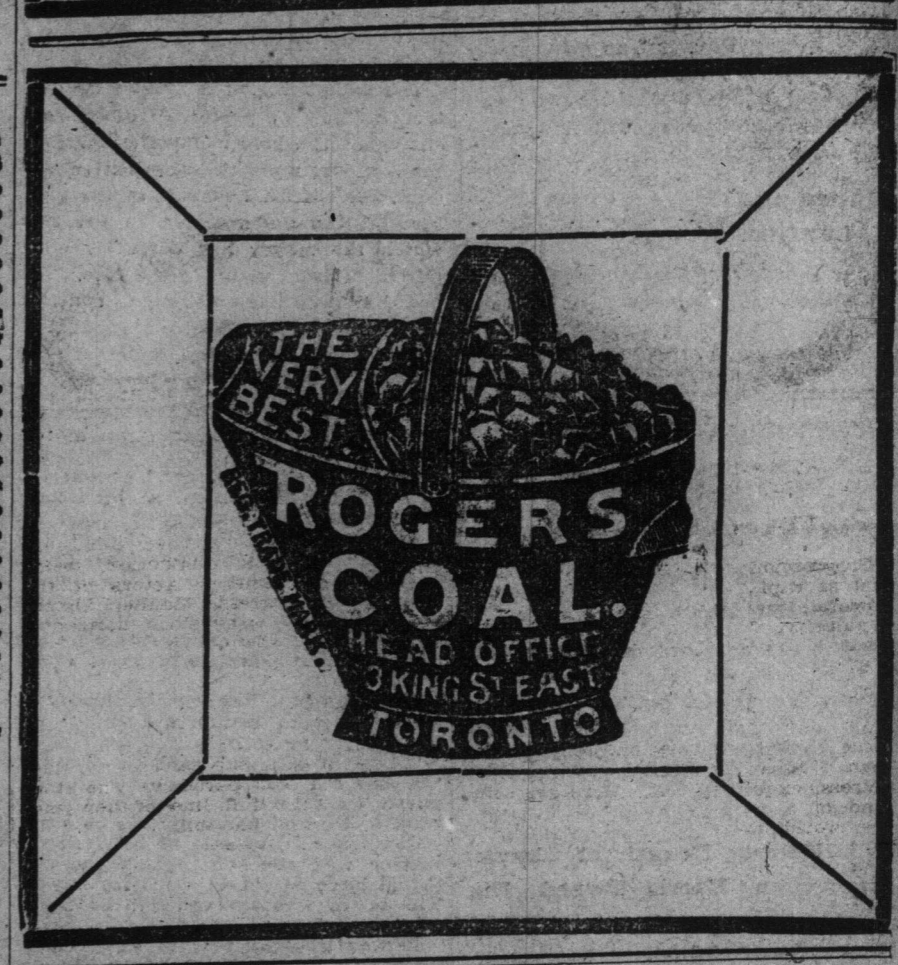

ACCIDENTS ON RAILWAYS.

Statistics Collected for 3 Months Show 16,937 Casualties.

Washington, Nov. 2.—The accident bulletin issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission for the three months ended June 30, 1906, shows the total number of casualties to passengers and employees while on duty to be 15,927, as against 12,825 reported in the preceding three months.

The number of passengers and employees killed in train accidents was 194, as against 274 reported in the preceding three months.

The total number of collisions and derailments was 3103, of which 173 collisions and 453 derailments affected passenger trains. The damage to cars, engines and roadway by these accidents amounted to \$2,378,924. The number of employees killed in coupling and uncoupling cars and engines was 63, being 16 less than the number reported killed in the last quarter.

For the year ended June 30, there was an increase of 84 in the total number of employees killed, and 10,958 in the number injured, while there is a decrease of 19 in the number of casualties killed, and an increase of 1145 in the number injured, as compared with the number reported for the year ending June 30, 1905. In coupling and uncoupling cars and engines, there is an increase of 63 in the total number killed, and of 383 in the number injured, as compared with the number reported during the preceding year.

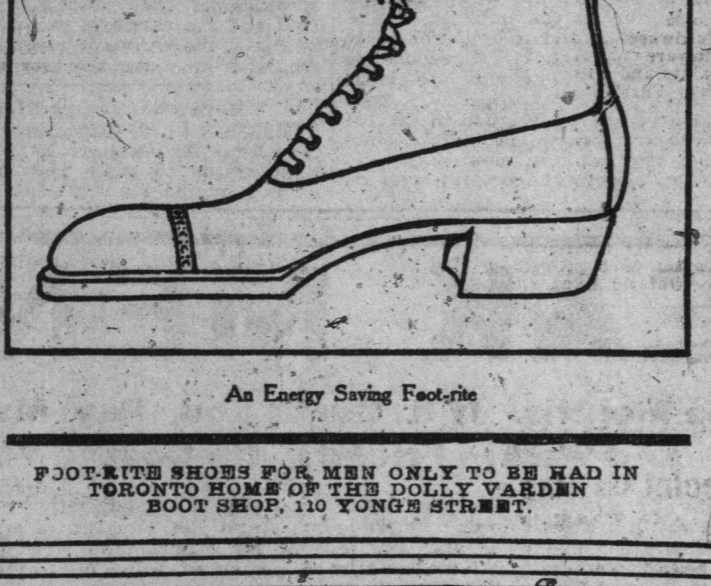

**"HOME LIFE" WINS.**

**Privy Council Decides Question of Great Interest to Insurance Men.**  
 London, Nov. 2.—(C.A.P.)—The privy council allows the appeal, with costs, of the Home Insurance Company, New York, v. the Victoria-Montreal Life Insurance Company.

The questions involved in the suit of the Home Insurance Company against the Victoria-Montreal Fire Insurance Company are as follows: To what extent does a rider in a policy of re-insurance include the conditions in the original policy?

If an insurance company, accepting a very large risk, say five millions, re-insures a part in this company and another part in that, and attaches the usual rider that the re-insurance policy is "to be subject to the same risks, conditions, valuations, privileges, mode of settlement, etc.," as in the original policy, does this include a condition in the original policy—"no action shall be maintainable unless brought within one year of the date of the fire?"

The Western Assurance of Toronto held the original risk on the C.P.R. property at Hull. A fifth of the policy of the Western re-insured with the Home of New York, just a year before the big fire of 1900, and six months later the Home re-insured a part of their risk with the Victoria-Montreal. The fire was in April, 1900, but it took a considerable time to adjust the great loss. On March 18, 1901, the Western paid their share, and on May 21 of that year the Home Company paid. But April slipped by before the Victoria-Montreal were asked to pay their small share of \$3720, and exemption was claimed under the disputed clause.

**A Sign of Winter.**  
 Windsor, Nov. 2.—John Clifton, who claimed both St. Thomas and Detroit as his home, has been sent to the Central Prison for six months for vagrancy. He was given a chance to go by an officer, who had to induce him to get aboard. Clifton returned here, apparently preferring the Central to Detroit.

**The Nursing Mission.**  
 The annual meeting of the Nursing Mission, 65 Beverley-street, held yesterday, was well attended. Mrs. Hunt-Brown presided. The report of Dr. Stenhouse showed that during the year, 634 cases had been treated on the nurses, and that in all 5840 calls and visits had been made. Of cases treated 41 were night nurses, and 201 were night calls. The nurses worked under 354 doctors. The treasurer's report, presented by Mrs. Thorne-Evans, showed a small surplus. Following the general business, the chair was taken by Rev. Dr. Wallace of Beverley-street Baptist Church, and short addresses were given by Rev. Mr. Intyre, Rev. Mr. Goggin, Canon Dixon, Rev. Mr. Hincks, Dr. McMahon and Prof. Goldwin Smith, who took occasion to commend most heartily the spirit of self-sacrifice shown by the nurses and the lady members of the institution. The want of a central association of charities being felt, and had now in a measure been met. The practice of overlapping, so common in the past, had, by the work of the Associated Charities, been in a great measure eliminated. The comfortable and well-appointed building occupied by the mission is the gift of Prof. Smith.

**Home for Incurable Children.**  
 The seventh annual meeting of the managers and friends of the Home for Incurable Children was held at the residence, 188 Avenue-road, yesterday. The report of the treasurer showed a substantial balance, receipts applied to the maintenance fund being \$4708.37, and disbursements \$3819.83. To the credit of the building fund there is the substantial sum of \$6923.22, to which was added yesterday the sum of \$1000, a bequest of the late Russell Baldwin. With a balance of more than \$7000 the board will at once take steps for the erection of a large wing to the west of the present structure. Architects have already prepared plans for a building to cost some \$25000, and it is hoped to begin active operations early in January. This step has been rendered imperative by the rapid increase in the number of patients. At present there are in the home 120 boys and 20 girls, twenty had to be refused admission. The officers elected were: Mrs. C. S. Gzowski, president; Mrs. H. Hough, vice-president; Mrs. W. S. Lee, second vice-president; A. Donald and Mrs. E. A. Heron, joint secretaries; Miss M. Buchanan, treasurer. The advisory board is composed of Justice Boyd, Stanley Osler, C. S. Gzowski, W. D. Matthews, Rev. Cameron and Walter Cassels. After the presentation of reports Rev. Canon Cayley was voted to the chair and addresses were given by W. B. McMurrich, Rev. Prof. Knapp, Rev. W. E. Wilson, Rev. A. D. Freeman and Rev. Dr. Wallace. A thorough inspection of the home was made by the management and friends, and the spotless appearance of the wards and surrounding grounds, together with the marked care shown in the treatment of the unfortunate little ones gathered there, was especially commented upon by the members. The aim of the directors, as shown in the treatment accorded the children, is to render all the comforts of a home to those who would otherwise be without assistance. The Home for Incurable Children is supported entirely by voluntary contributions, the city contributing only \$100. The managers expressed to Miss Hornbrook, the superintendents, and nurses, the thanks of the meeting for the splendid showing in every department.

**Home for Young Women.**  
 The meeting that was to have been held yesterday afternoon in the rectory of St. Stephen's Anglican Church to further consider plans for the establishment in the west end of a young women's boarding house, was postponed till Monday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock. Anglican clergymen and lay-members of the church through the city are interested in the project, and it is hoped that the meeting, and it is hoped that the meeting, will be held on Monday.

Where a workman was desirous of becoming the owner of a home some plan could possibly be evolved to aid him, but not as a civic measure.

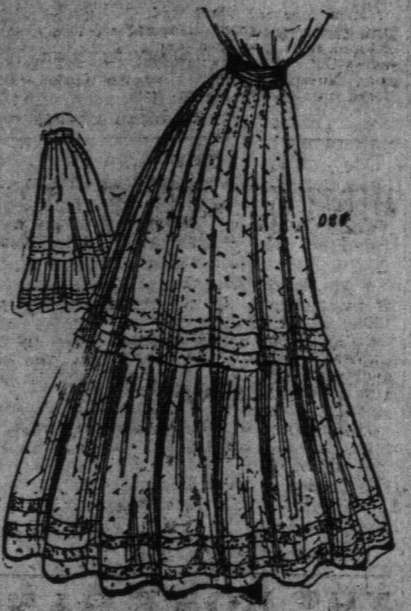

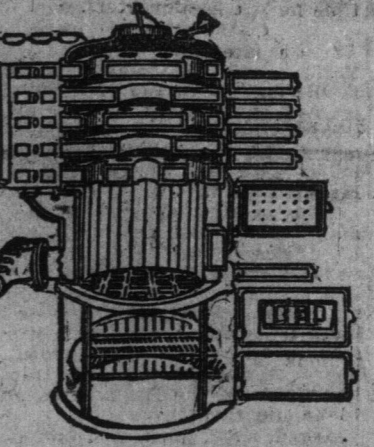

### BRYAN WISHES SUCCESS TO LEADER OF DEMOCRACY

Writes to Bird S. Coler That He is Very Anxious to See Hearst Elected.

New York, Nov. 2.—Bird S. Coler, borough president of Brooklyn, to-day made public a portion of a letter he had received from William J. Bryan, endorsing the candidacy of William R. Hearst for governor of New York. In the letter Mr. Bryan says: "I am very anxious to see Hearst elected, and would have come to New York to help him if I thought an outside speaker would have been of assistance. From indications, however, he is going to win, as he ought to. If I have any friends there, I want them to vote for him."

Mr. Coler said: "Mr. Bryan's letter should be enough for all Democrats in this state. As for independents, I cannot imagine they are going to take the advice of the piratical leaders of the old predatory political system."

Will Help Hearst.

Charles F. Murphy, the Tammany Hall leader, in an interview to-day said he believed that neither President Roosevelt's sentiments, as expressed thru Secretary Root at Utica last night, nor Richard Croker's endorsement of Senator McCarren's stand, would affect the general result of the election. "The people's minds are made up," said Mr. Murphy; "they will vote for Mr. Hearst."

"They will, I think, before voting, ask themselves why it is that every leading beneficiary of what was known as 'commercialism in politics,' is now bitterly and hysterically hostile to Mr. Hearst. Some of Mr. Hearst's newspaper opponents must think the American public has lost its sense of humor, when they solemnly quote statements of Croker and McCarren, those ideal reformers."

Several Tammany district leaders declared that the Croker cablegram would make no difference in their plans of preparation for the coming election.

George F. Scannell of the 26th district said he had been born in Mr. Croker's own district, and that the lesson the old chieflain was always preaching was one of regularity. He added that he had instructed his men to vote the straight ticket, and declared that he would be with Mr. Murphy thru thick and thin, and that he would walk out of Tammany Hall with him.

Eugene J. McGuire of the 32nd district declared that the Bronx would give Mr. Hearst the entire vote, and the biggest plurality ever given any candidate.

"I will follow Charles Murphy out of Tammany Hall if necessary," said Mr. McGuire. "Mr. Croker's cablegram makes no difference."

James J. Hagan, leader of the 19th, said that his views were those expressed by Mr. Scannell.

Approves Croker Telegram.

Mayor George M. McClellan was asked to-day for his opinion of the interview given by Richard Croker in opposition to Mr. Hearst.

"What can I say except to approve it," asked the mayor.

"Will it have any effect in changing votes?" he was asked.

"All the votes have been changed," the mayor responded. "I think it a very good telegram."

Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state convention, made this statement to-day: "There is absolutely no doubt in my mind about the election of Mr. Hearst. I think he will be elected by a plurality large enough to make unwarranted any cry of 'fraud' from the opposition, and he will carry with him the entire state ticket."

Petitions Nullified.

Four members of the board of elections, President John R. Voorhis, Michael J. Dady, Charles A. Page and John McGuire, appeared before Magistrate Whitman to-day in response to summonses issued in connection with the charges that nomination petitions filed with the board by the Independence League were mutilated and rendered void.

At the conclusion of the examination District Attorney Jerome requested an adjournment until next Monday, and the request was granted.

While making the request Mr. Jerome said he had information as to the identity of the individual supposed to have been concerned in the mutilation of the petitions.

Charge Withdrawn.

The charge against Lizzie Johnstone of manslaughter in causing the death of her child thru neglect, was withdrawn in police court.

ELLIS ISLAND SCANDALS WOMEN TERRIBLY TREATED

Imprisoned in Filthy Quarters, Insulted and Practically Starved.

The interesting communication from the New York correspondent of The London Daily Telegraph was headed, "Immigration Scandals." It stated that public attention had been called to the desirability of purging Ellis Island of various alleged abuses, and that if these abuses are proved Mr. Roosevelt will initiate the reforms which may be necessary.

The Daily Telegraph correspondent refers to the persons subjected to harsh and unfair treatment as immigrants, but the officials are giving a very wide meaning to the word if the case I am about to quote may be taken as a representative one. The story is one of interest to all intending visitors to the United States, and for that reason I set it forth in detail.

At 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning, June 27, of the present year, Mrs. Mary Ann Bully arrived in New York harbor by the Cunard Royal Mail steamer Carmania. She was paying her second visit to a married sister in America. She was eager to arrive at her destination as speedily as possible, as her sister was ill, and her brother-in-law had had a paralytic stroke and was not expected to live very long. She was a second-class passenger, and was amply provided with funds for her stay, which was intended to be one of a few weeks.

But to her surprise, instead of being allowed to proceed to her destination, she was detained with 15 other second-class passengers and kept on Ellis Island from 12 o'clock on Wednesday to 12 o'clock on Thursday. These unfortunate second-class passengers were packed in with the foreign steerage passengers in a place which was in a filthy condition. There were no seats for them and they had to sit on their luggage. There was no proper sleeping accommodation provided, and this unfortunate Englishwoman, visiting America to see a dying relative, had to sleep in a place with five foreign steerage immigrants, not one of whom could speak a word of English.

The unhappy woman, who had given every information as to her position, her means and the purpose of her visit to America, passed the night in an agony of terror and distress. She could not understand why she had been made a prisoner. The habits of the alien immigrants with whom she was herded were filthy. The place to a delicate woman totally unaccustomed to such surroundings was an inferno.

For 24 hours this unfortunate second-class passenger on a short visit to America was kept in a place without decent accommodation, and, with the exception of a cup of tea and a piece of bread and butter given her on Thursday morning, without food.

But the abominable treatment to which she had been subjected and the horror of that 24 hours, during which she had been herded with foreign immigrants of low type and uncivilized habits, had given her a terrible shock and for several days after gaining her liberty in "the land of the free" she was seriously ill.

Her luggage, which had been detained by the authorities, and in which she had all her wearing apparel, was not delivered to her until the following Saturday.

On these facts being brought to my knowledge I at once wrote to the Cunard Company at their London address asking why a second-class passenger with money, whose papers were properly filled in, and about whose inspection there had been no question, had been subjected to such outrages on Ellis Island.

To my letter of complaint I received the following courteous reply: "3 Waterloo-place, London, S.W., July 14, 1906.

Dear Sir.—We were much concerned to get your letter of the 11th inst., and have submitted it to our Liverpool people. They deplore the inconvenience suffered by Mrs. Bully, but point out that the United States government take charge of all second and third-

class passengers on arrival, and our company is utterly powerless in the matter. We have no control whatever and are not allowed to interfere. They will be very pleased, if you wish it, to forward the particulars to our New York agents to see if anything can be done.

We can only once again express our regret. Yours faithfully, for the Cunard S.S. Co., Ltd., W. and W. S. Cunard, E. D. Brenton.

I desired that the particulars might be forwarded to the New York agents and full enquiries made into the case. On Aug. 10 I received the following: "3 Waterloo-place, London, S.W., Aug. 10, 1906.

Dear Sir.—We beg to inform you that the reason of Mrs. Bully's being held back at New York was on account of the lady being afflicted by curvature of the spine. Our New York office say, of course, they are not in any way responsible for the acts of the United States authorities, and all passengers, arriving because they are third class, who are detained by the United States Marine Hospital surgeons must go to Ellis Island, and you will therefore see that the Cunard Company are not in any way to blame in the matter.

Yours faithfully, for the Cunard Steamship Co. (Limited), W. and W. S. Cunard, Pep L. Twittick.

So this unfortunate visitor to the United States, a second-class passenger, with money in her pocket, friends of respectability waiting to receive her, was thrust into a filthy hole with foreign steerage immigrants, and kept without food and comfort for twenty-four hours because she had curvature of the spine!

Imagine it! Are we to take it that second-class passengers visiting America for pleasure or to see their friends are to be packed in with steerage emigrants on Ellis Island, and detained for a day and a night amid loathsome surroundings because they are lame, or maimed, or not quite straight-backed? In what way can a woman of fifty with a curvature of the spine, money in her pocket, and friends in America affect the welfare of American citizens during a short visit to their hospitable shores?

The contention is absurd. The simple fact of the case is that the unfortunate Englishwoman did not appreciate the hint given to a number of passengers that "if their vessel the Carmania they would have to pay so many dollars."

In any circumstances a second-class passenger detained in a place to be treated like a second-class passenger, and not herded with steerage immigrants and kept without proper food.

It is no wonder that the abominable proceedings on Ellis Island have aroused public indignation in the States if this be the way passengers arriving in New York on a short visit are treated by the officials.

I should state that Mrs. Bully occupies a position of the highest respectability with me for twenty years, and that she was known to many distinguished and popular Americans. Some of them, I have no doubt, will be ready to testify to the commissioner entrusted with the enquiry that the officials subjected a delicate Englishwoman to abominable treatment without the slightest justification. It was her misfortune and not her fault that she failed to appreciate a hint as to the cost of this treatment.

I have hitherto refrained from giving publicity to this glaring instance of Ellis Island methods, thinking it might be a rare case.

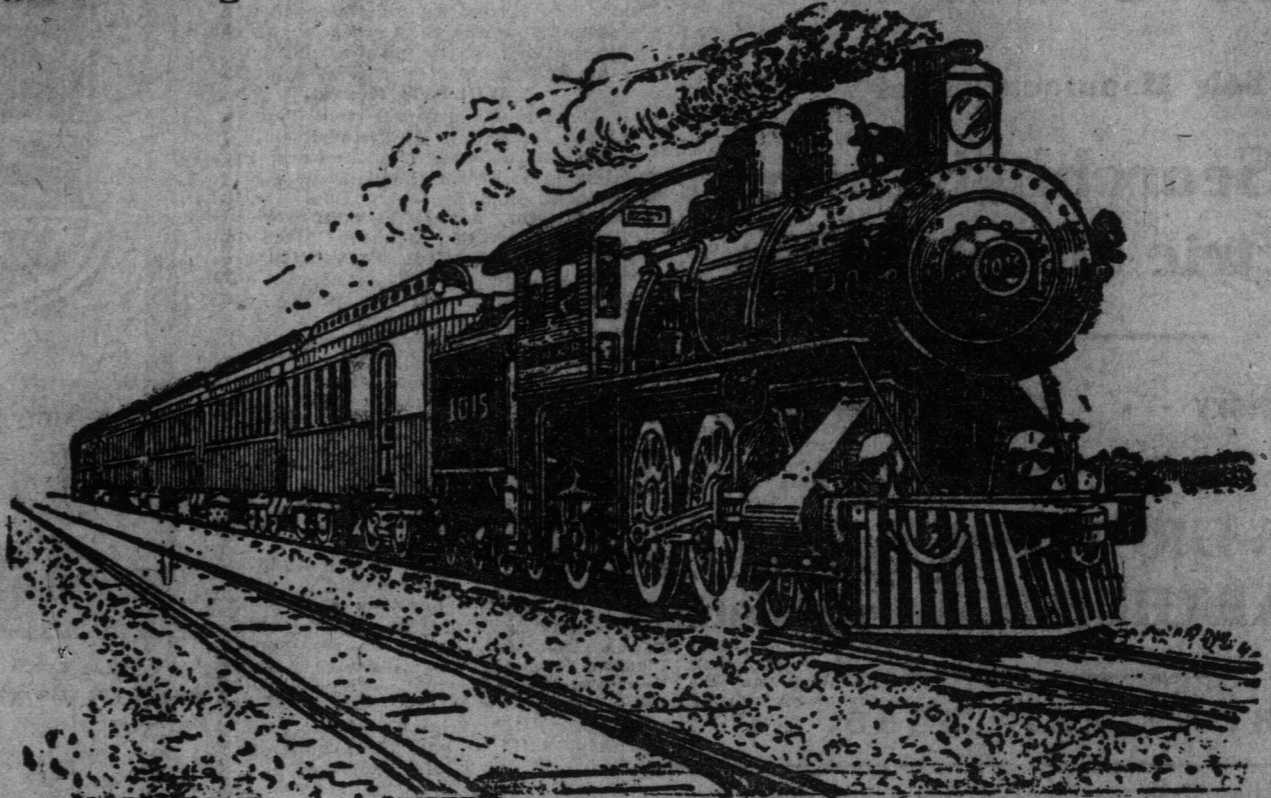
But now that the scandal is acknowledged by Americans to be sufficiently serious to demand official investigation I deem it right to tell a story which has a distinct bearing on a matter of public concern.

Another Case. A sensation has been created by the French Consul, who, after investigating complaints of the manner in which three of his countrywomen were treated by the immigration officials.

The women in question were three pretty Parisiennes, Mademoiselle Marguerite Inglese, Jeanne Bayer, and Ninon Schmitz, who arrived by the Baltic. When they started to leave the ship they were placed under arrest and sent to Ellis Island for examination as to their eligibility to enter the country. They protested against this course, Mademoiselle Inglese declaring that she could easily prove that she was a resident of New York, regularly employed in a millinery establishment, and had been on a visit to France. She begged the officers to summon her relatives. This request was unheeded. The three ladies were herded with the lowest types of immigrants, and subjected to various insults and forms of ridicule. They did not sleep, and practically abstained from food for three days. They were almost prostrated when rescued by their employers, who threaten to go personally to Washington and lay the matter before the president.

# COBALT ---Some of the new rich "Strikes" Are Being Reported Daily---COBALT

### FRESH STRIKES REPORTED AT THE COBALT CAMP

### Which Further Demonstrate the Extension of the Camp--General Mining Notes.

Cobalt, Nov. 1.---(From Staff Special.)  
The weather here is clear and moderately cold. A slight fall of snow, is a safe indication that winter is with us. Old timers say we will be able to look continually at the "beautiful" till May next. The roads are bad and will be until sleighing begins, when traveling will be easy. In the interim locomotion is difficult.  
Rich strikes are reported daily, and sales of properties are being carried out in the camp.

Barrier John MacKay of the Soo is in camp, and reports a very rich find this afternoon at the property being worked by the "Colonia Development Co." He is one of the professional directors of this company, and James F. Gillies of the Gilles Cobalt Silver Mining Co. is another. The property being worked, and where the rich strike was made, adjoins the Gilles; is north of the Columbus, and near the Beaver and Temiskaming.

This afternoon they struck on the surface an 18 inch Cobalt-silver vein, and went down on it for three feet, the vein and the width being maintained.  
This is in the extension of the camp frequently referred to in the World since the Dana-Deale finds.  
The Beaver and Temiskaming are both in that corner, and both have made a reputation for themselves and their section.  
The Beaver was originally owned by Andy and Bob Devine of North Bay, and associated with them were several Montreal men.  
P. M. Finlan, mayor of Cobalt, was the treasurer of the company, and Tom Roach and M. Quinn of Cobalt own 100,000 shares.

A controlling interest in the stock has been obtained by J. W. Jewell & Co. of Cobalt. Mr. Jewell is the president of the Erie Cobalt Mining Co.  
It is supposed that Jewell & Co. acted for a Buffalo syndicate, as Mr. Jewell left for that city yesterday, after seeing the books of the old company.  
Waldo Young and Robert Shillington have acquired a large interest in the Temiskaming, and they report a report that came in from Halleybury this afternoon. They are to place \$100,000 of this stock in the United States at 90c per share. It is selling here at 70c.  
Another rich strike was made in this end of the camp to-day at the property known as "The Big Find". This claim is owned by P. Farah, the proprietor and owner of Hotel Canada at New Liskeard. It lies on Glen Lake, and at the bottom of a 25-foot shaft a five-foot vein was found, said to run high in silver value.  
Twenty-five men are kept at work here, and are to adjoin the Nipissing and Foster, the chances are that it will soon bloom into a shipping mine.

The result of the negotiations will be the considerable increase of the holdings of the Erie Company, which are now regarded as being quite extensive and exceptional-ly rich. The Erie stock has been selling at 50c per share, and with a capitalization of one million, the company has half a million in the treasury.  
Its directors include J. H. "Hilden of the City," John Stove Company, Hamilton; H. P. Coburn, Hamilton; A. D. Whiting, of Voursberg & Whiting, Buffalo; D. C. Ralph, of the Third National Bank, Buffalo, and Mr. J. H. Jewell.

**Demand for Cobalt Stocks.**  
Fox & Ross, Standard Stock Exchange Building, report a very active week in Cobalt issues, particularly in Silver Queen, Foster, Silver Leaf, and Buffalo. A large amount of trading will also remain, viz., \$300,000. The Gilpin property has advanced in price from \$2.00 to \$4.00. Silver Queen from \$1.40 to \$2.00. Foster from \$2.80 to \$3.50, and the advances are strongly maintained. In the face of the fact that there are many who are taking profits who bought these stocks at considerably lower figures. On the same train with me was another Chicagoan, who is bound for Cobalt, bent on a similar mission."  
**Nip Will Be Called at Toronto Exchange.**  
The listing committee of the Toronto Stock Exchange have the application of the Nipissing stock before them and it is understood that the shares will be called at the beginning of the week.  
**May Increase Dividend.**  
Purchases of Buffalo are being made in the ground that the dividend on the stock is to be increased from 3 per cent. quarterly to 4 per cent. This report has only the basis of a rumor up to the present.

**Perhaps Not Riches.**  
"Talk about losing control of Foster," said a prominent New York banker to-day, "may be more a trash than many imagine. Promotion syndicates are wild down at New York to get something to satisfy the public craving for mining shares. If what I hear of Foster is right I question whether the property could not be immediately turned over at the present market value for a handsome price of \$100,000. I don't think you could buy a property in Cobalt with such prospects as this one at \$3,000,000 just now."  
**Experts Look and Admire.**  
The two samples of ore from Silver Queen now exhibited in the King Edward rotunda continue to draw large crowds. A lot of the sightseers are no amateur at the mining game. One tall man of western men passed his hand across the specimens as a Virginian would smooth a horse's coat or a gambler slip a new deck. It was no riddle to read him as a mining man. Scott was the name. Lucky Scott of Foster fame, and Scott could not conceal his admiration for the splendid specimens.  
**Nipissing's Earnings Grow.**  
From present indications the Nipissing Mining Company of Cobalt will show net earnings of between \$700,000 and \$750,000 for October, and it is the intention to continue shipments thru the winter, which will net the company \$200,000 per month at the minimum.

Barriester Wing of Chicago arrived at Toronto yesterday on his way to Cobalt. He is the secretary of a syndicate of Chicago investors interested in Cobalt shares. His work is to prepare the usual incorporation prior to issuing stock. "Chicago is not a large share of Cobalt stock in Chicago," said Mr. Wing, "and the people there are just crazy to get into the mining shares. They have heard so much about the Ontario mining district and its almost fabulous wealth that a company flotation there should be very easy. On the same train with me was another Chicagoan, who is bound for Cobalt, bent on a similar mission."  
**Nip Will Be Called at Toronto Exchange.**  
The listing committee of the Toronto Stock Exchange have the application of the Nipissing stock before them and it is understood that the shares will be called at the beginning of the week.  
**May Increase Dividend.**  
Purchases of Buffalo are being made in the ground that the dividend on the stock is to be increased from 3 per cent. quarterly to 4 per cent. This report has only the basis of a rumor up to the present.

**Perhaps Not Riches.**  
"Talk about losing control of Foster," said a prominent New York banker to-day, "may be more a trash than many imagine. Promotion syndicates are wild down at New York to get something to satisfy the public craving for mining shares. If what I hear of Foster is right I question whether the property could not be immediately turned over at the present market value for a handsome price of \$100,000. I don't think you could buy a property in Cobalt with such prospects as this one at \$3,000,000 just now."  
**Experts Look and Admire.**  
The two samples of ore from Silver Queen now exhibited in the King Edward rotunda continue to draw large crowds. A lot of the sightseers are no amateur at the mining game. One tall man of western men passed his hand across the specimens as a Virginian would smooth a horse's coat or a gambler slip a new deck. It was no riddle to read him as a mining man. Scott was the name. Lucky Scott of Foster fame, and Scott could not conceal his admiration for the splendid specimens.  
**Nipissing's Earnings Grow.**  
From present indications the Nipissing Mining Company of Cobalt will show net earnings of between \$700,000 and \$750,000 for October, and it is the intention to continue shipments thru the winter, which will net the company \$200,000 per month at the minimum.  
Earnings of \$500,000 per month are at the rate of \$6,000,000 per annum, equal to \$5 per share upon the 1,200,000 shares of stock.  
December quarterly dividend to be declared by the Nipissing company is expected to be at least 50 cents a share. The dividend payable this month was 25 cents per share, 10 cents regular and 15 cents extra.

**Anxiously Awaiting Trethewey.**  
The keenest interest since the introduction of the Cobalt securities to the public is perhaps felt in regard to the forthcoming offering of Trethewey. Reports of this property, exhibited in the camp, are of the most eulogistic nature, and the property is now rated in the public estimation as one of the most promising in Cobalt. Considerable trading has already taken place in the shape of options on the shares, and one broker to-day was reported as bidding 1.75 for the shares when available. The old stock when it can be procured changes hands at 80c or at the rate of 1.50 for the new scrip. A huge scramble is being predicted for the stock, which is not expected to be available for two weeks, and many are imbued with the idea that the price will quickly cross the \$2 mark.  
**Gilpin Extends Its Limits.**  
H. Dralney and a number of other capitalists have secured control of the Gilpin Cobalt and two adjacent properties for the sum of \$3,000,000. The total acreage of this proposition, which will still retain the name of Gilpin, is now 120,000 acres. With the retention of the name the same capitalization will also remain, viz., \$3,000,000. The Gilpin property itself has an immense coalfield, and a large amount of stripping has taken place. In one acre of the property no less than 100,000 lbs. of coal have been uncovered, all rich in silver. The Gilpin property is in the Township of Bucke, and recent discoveries give promise of paying this township rich in silver and mineral wealth to the wonderful Colman Township adjoining. The Meehan-Green and Red Rock, which has just come into prominence, are also situated in Bucke Township. The elevation is above that of Colman, but management here is being predicted close to the Gilpin claims at a depth of 150 feet. Activity in the Gilpin shares is prominent in a few days and a sharp advance in price to \$1 is predicted.

Cheaper Lights in Cities. Philadelphia Record: Along with several other municipalities in New Jersey, Camden will vote at the next election upon the question of installing and maintaining an electric lighting plant under the law passed by the last legislature.

Practically all of the concessions upon the trolley service are made in North Jersey counties, where suburban residents have been compelled to pay double fares from Newark and Jersey City, but there is no announcement of cuts in South Jersey, and patrons of the lines running from Camden to Gloucester, Woodbury and other points are wondering whether the cut will ever reach them.

What is of most interest to South Jersey, however, is the big reduction in the cost of electric light. For cities of Camden's class the rate after January 1, 1908, will be \$80 a year per lamp for arc lights. Camden, under its five-year contract with the corporation, now pays \$109.50 a year for the lights. Smaller cities and towns are to get the same lights at \$85 a year. "Dollar gas" is also promised all sections covered by the concern.
