### CARMEN TO STRIKE SUNDAY CATARACT PURSUES UNION

Street Railway Employes Say Company Has Delayed Too Long Putting Arbitrators' Award Inte Effect-Mass Meeting Satur-day Night to Decide on Action.

Hamilton, Nov. 2.—(Special.)—Hamilton will have a street railway strike, mencing Sunday, judging by the talk of the men to-night.

They reported their case to the Trades and Labor Council to-night. They alleged in their report to the council that the company, by bribes and intimidation, is trying to break up the union.

The company, so the men claim, agreed to put the arbitrators' award into effect 21 days after the award was given. Some 41 days have elapsed and the award has not been put in force yet.

### INROADS OF CONSUMPTION IN UNITED STATES NAVY Six in Every 1000 Victims, Doubling Ratio in 1895.

Washington, Nov. 2.-Tuberculosis has made alarming inroads upon the personnel of the United States navy and marine corps, in spite of the measures taken by the medical officials to

check the disease. The annual report of Admiral Rixey, surgeon-general of the navy, which was made public to-day, shows that in 1905 the number of tuberculosis cases in the service was 243, or 6.1 for every 1000 men. In 1895 the ratio was only 3,2 to every 1000.

Practically all the cases are pulonary tuberculosis.

G.T.R. Officials Assume Air of Unconcern Over Issuing of Summons.

Montreal, Nov. 2 .- (Special.) -- In the matter of the two-cent fare summons the Grand Trunk authorities take the ground that the rates charged at present are perfectly legal and in accordance with the railway law of the coun-

ent governing railway practice.
"The rates and fares imposed have all been affirmed in the duly prescrib-ed form by the governor-general-in-council, and the proper court to approach to secure the redress of any prievance of such a nature as set forth n the summons would be the railway

commissioners," they say.

The charter, to which reference has been made, reposes safely on the shelves of the legal department, and the officials do not as yet manifest any disposition to disturb it. When the summons reaches its destination it

will be looked up.

It is admitted that the issuing of the summons may cause personal annoyance and inconvenience to Mr. Hays, as well as a disturbance of official routine, but beyond that it is not considered that it can affect the established lines of policy pursued by all the railways in Canada with regard to rates.

Washington Nov. 2.—The accident bulletin issued by the interstate commerce commission for the three months ending June 30, 1906, shows the total number of casualities to passengers and employes while on duty to be 18,87, as against 13,296 reported in the preceding three months.

The number of passengers and employes killed in train accidents was 194, as against 274 reported in the preceding three months.

The total number of collisions and derallments was 3103, of which 173 collisions and 153 derallments affected glassengers rains. The damage to cars, engines and roadway by these accidents amounted to \$2,373,924. Cheaper Lights in Cities.

Philadelphia Record: Along with several other municipalities in New Jersey, Camden will vote at the next election upon the question of installing and maintaining an electric lighting plant under the law passed by the last plant under the law passed by the last legislature. That fact may not have induced it, but patrons of the trofley lines and consumers of gas and electric/energy created by the Public Service Corporation in practically every one of the 21 counties of the state were given a surprise yesterday by the announcement of general reductions of rates and better service. The announcement came in the form of immense advertisements in the local newspapers, signed by Thomas N. McCarter, president of the big corporation.

Practically all of the concessions upon the trolley service are made in North Jersey counties, where suburban residents have been compelled to pay double fares from Newark and Jersey City; but there is no announcement of cuts in South Jersey, and patrons of the lines running from Camden to Gloucester, Woodbury and other points are wondaying whether the er points are wondering whether the cut will ever reach them.

What is of most interest to South

Jersey, however, is the big reduction in the cost of electric light. For cities of Camden's class the rate after January 1, 1908, will be \$80 a year per lamp for arc lights. Camden, under its flow year contents to the content of th its five-year contract with the cor-poration, now pays \$109.50 a year for the lights. Smaller cities and towns are to get the same lights at \$85 a year. "Dollar gas" is also promised all sections covered by the concern.
