



Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, enacts as follows:

1. There shall be grented out of the Consolidated Lievenue Fund for the construction of the portions of railways hereinafter mentioned the sums following, that is to say:

(1) To the Ontario and Rainy River Railway, from a point at the westerly end of the 165 miles heretofore aided to a point at or near Fort Francis, a distance not exceeding forty miles, a cash subsidy of \$3000 a mile—\$120,000.

(5) To the James' Bay Railway, to aid in the construction of ninety miles of the said railway from Parry Sound to a point at or near Sudbury, \$3000 a mile for a distance not exceeding forty miles (\$120,000), and the unearned subsidy of \$3000 a mile for a distance not exceeding fifty miles which was granted to the Nipissing and James' Bay Railway in 1889, which said uncarned subsidy is hereby transferred to the James' Bay Railway.

3. The subsidies hereby granted shall be subject to the following conditions:

(1) Each of the said companies

shall be subject to the following conditions:

(1) Each of the said companies shall furnish such information as to the location and plans of passenger, and freight stations on the line of its railway as may from time to time be required by the Commissioner of Public Works, and in every case payment of the said subsidies shall be subject to compliance with such directions as may be given by the Commissioner of Public Works from time to time for the erection of stations and the number of, and intervals at which stoppages shall be made, at such stations for the accommodation of the public.

(5) The subsidies hereby granted shall be further subject to the condition that the companies to which the same are granted shall, as far as practicable, construct, equip and operate their lines of railway, with railway supplies and rolling stock of Canadian munifacture, whenever such railway supplies and rolling



Yorkshire Regiment Suffered Disas-

Lieut.-Col. Houghton, Lieuts. Sweing, Dow-dall, Hughes and Walker, together with dail, Hughes and Walker, together with fifteen men of the Yorkshire Light Infantry and three Sikhs, were killed; Major Earle, Lieut. Hall, thirty-one men of the Yorkshires and two Sikhs wounded; twelve Yorkshires are missing, including one who was wounded and captured by the enemy. Major Earle's injuries are serious.

General Sir Power Palmer (who succeeds Sir William Lockhart in the chief command) is preparing to make reprisals. Sir William Lockhart will arrive here to-day.

Further particulars of the disaster are to hand, from which it appears that a combined movement was plauned to cut off the retreat of a number of Afridis who had been driving their cattle to graze on the Kajurai Plain, west of Bara Fort. Two columns marched from Ali Musjib and Jalrud to block the way north; a third column from Bara marched westward over the plain toward the hills; while a fourth, the Yorkshire Regiment and a regiment of Sikhs, advanced from Mamani with a view of getting to the rear of the Afridis and preventing their escape towards Baya Vailey. The first three columns performed their allotted movements without loss, meeting with very few of the enemy. The fourth, under Col. J. Seppings, left Mamani early Saturday morning. day morning.

The leading troops reached Shinkumar
Kotal at half-past 10, and finding no op
position, Col. Houghton, with the Sikhs
proceeded about a mile to search the caves.

Sikhs Became Detached.

On the arrival of the main body at Kotal it was discovered that a company of Sikhs had somewhow been withdrawn from the high ridge on the west, the key of the position, which the enemy forthwith occupied. To retake this involved heavy losses. Lieut. Dowdall was killed while conarging at the north of the pass. The enemy's losses were severe, as they charged to within thirty yards of the troops.

About midday the troops began to return to the camp, the enemy harassing the rear guard and left and causing many casualties. The rear column cleared the pass about 5 o'clock with the assistance of Gen. Westmacott, who came up with two guns and four hundred rifles on receiving Col. Sepping's message that the force had become entangled.

The retirement was conducted admirably, the officers speaking in the highest terms of the gallantry of the troops. Lieut. Col. Houghton's body had been recovered and search parties have started for the others. The column has been reinforced by 725 men from Barn, and Col. Sturt with fifty infantry, two guns and a squadron of cavalry will move to the north of the pass.

The Act provided that an offender upon conviction should be confined for three hours in the stocks, but, stocks being obsolete, the punishment was changed to seven days' impreson-

Ment.

A policeman last Sunday arrested three players. On the witness stand he admitted that the accused had not been disorderly, and that the grounds where they were playing were practically pri-

The defendants, lawyers argued that if they were convicted the result would be the prosecution of bicycle riders, golf players and oarsmen. The court decided that there was no concourse of people, nor were the defendants disorderly. The prosecution was, therefore, dismissed.


