



Gets the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce to Endorse His Georgian Bay Canal Scheme. Liverpool, April 27 .- McLeod Stewart, former Mayor of Ottawa, Canada; who is

former Mayor of Ottawa, Canada; who is in England endeavoring to obtain Governmental backing for the Montreal, Ottawa & Georgian Bay Canai project, addressed the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce on that subject to-day. Much interest was aroused by his presentation of the advantages of the canal, which, he said, would save 1000 miles over the present route, and would result in the enormous development of the cattle trade and the wood-pulp industry. 
