

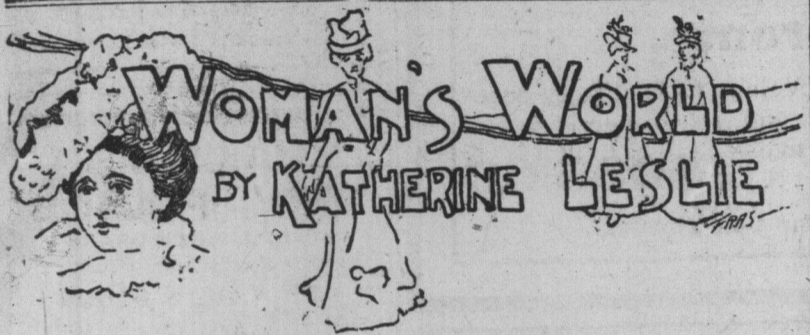

CONTROLLERS IN SESSION

Board Refused to Grant Extra Pay to Caretakers of Schools for Work Done on Polling Day.

IT IS HOLD-UP PURE AND SIMPLE.

Ald. Hubbard Says—Changes in City Engineer's Department—City Hall Plumbing Satisfactory.

City Treasurer Coody wrote to the Board of Control at its meeting Saturday morning, asking that he be authorized to purchase and acquire such lands as may be deemed advisable in the city's interest at the forthcoming sale of lands for arrears of taxes, to be held on the 10th inst. On motion of Ald. Sheppard, the Assessment Commissioner will be instructed to act for the city.

The secretary of the Municipal Committee of the Trades and Labor Council complained that the Toronto Electric Light Company were not living up to their agreement with the city in the matter of employees' wages.

Ald. Frame said he knew positively the company were not paying the wages they should.

The board wanted the names of some of the men who can give evidence to prove that the company are not living up to the terms of the agreement, and the matter was referred to the City Solicitor to report at the earliest possible date.

Deciding the slips, Ald. Frame moved that the caretakers of the Public Schools be given 50c. each for the extra work they did in connection with the last municipal election, because the polls being kept open two hours later.

Hubbard opposed the granting of the extra money, it was a hold-up pure and simple, he contended that the city should not be called upon to pay for the extra services.

Ald. Lamb and Ald. Sheppard and Hubbard against, and it was carried.

City Engineer East recommended that Mr. Smith of his department be given an increase in salary of \$200 per year. He has handled in an officer authorized.

Another effort will be made to induce the Ontario Government to pay a share of the cost of a water supply.

Hubbard's motion was carried, and the City Engineer has been authorized to apply to the Ontario Government for a loan of \$100,000.

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TROLLEY FELL INTO CANAL

Thru the Breaking of a Bridge at Syracuse Forty Persons Were Injured.

FIFTY PEOPLE WERE ON THE CAR

The Fall Was Thirty Feet and Yet There Was No Loss of Life.

Syracuse, N.Y., April 6.—While a car on the old East Side suburban line of the Syracuse Rapid Transit Company was crossing James-street bridge over the Oswego Canal in the heart of the city late this afternoon the bridge suddenly gave way, dropping the car and its 50 passengers to the canal bed 20 feet below.

At the time went down with the car, while a horse and loaded lumber wagon piled on top of the heap.

About 40 persons were injured. It is not believed that any deaths will result, since there are reports of several of the worst injured being dangerously hurt.

The list of the seriously injured is as follows: Mrs. A. W. Arnold, severe scalp wound and shock.

Mrs. H. Masters, severe gash in chin and badly bruised.

Miss Anna McGarry, right leg broken and arm hurt.

Mrs. M. H. Hamilton, spine injured, right ear nearly severed, bruised about the body and severe shock.

Miss Minnie Johnson, right leg broken and head bruised.

Had the canal been filled with water, the result of the accident would have been terrible.

The water would have been deep enough to cover all but a few windows and the roof, and many of the passengers would have undoubtedly perished.

Horror-stricken scenes.

When the crash came, persons on the street called the fire department.

Police quickly lowered and the injured carried up and sent to their homes or to hospitals in carriages and ambulances.

A YEAR AND EIGHT MONTHS

The All-British Pacific Cable is to Be Laid and Working by December, 1902.

LANDING PLACES BEING CHOSEN.

Canadian End Will Be On the West Shore of Vancouver Island.

Vancouver, B.C., April 6.—The R.M.S. Mowara sailed for Australia yesterday.

Among her passengers was W. B. Zeebe of the firm of Clark, Torner & Taylor, the firm responsible for the selection of the route and landing places of the Pacific cable.

Interviewed by your correspondent, Mr. Zeebe stated that he had selected the landing place for the cable on the west coast of Vancouver Island, and was now en route for Brisbane, Queensland, to select a landing place there, afterwards proceeding to Sydney, N.S.W., to join the steamer which had been sent out to aid him in selecting suitable landing places, and in the survey of the route from Queensland to New Zealand, to a point about 70 miles north of Panama Island, the remainder of the route to Vancouver having already been surveyed by H.M. survey ship Esperanza.

The manufacture of the cable will be completed next month. The first expedition in connection with the laying of it is expected to leave the Thames in January, 1902. This will carry out the laying of sections from Queensland to Norfolk Island, to New Zealand, and Norfolk Island to Fiji Islands.

The second expedition will leave about August, 1902, and will carry out the laying of sections from Norfolk Island to New Zealand, and New Zealand to Fiji Islands.

The length of cable, 38,845 miles, will be laid in sections, each section being laid by one ship, which is now being specially built for the purpose.

The contractors undertake that the whole of the cable shall be laid and working by December, 1902.

ONE CARNegie SCHEME KILLED.

Morgan Steel Trust Squeezes the Pittsburgh to Parallel the Pennsylvania.

Pittsburgh, Pa., April 6.—Plans of Andrew Carnegie to parallel the Pennsylvania Railway system and construct a trunk line to the seaboard have been ordered stopped by the United States Steel Corporation, which now controls the Carnegie Company.

The number of surveys have been working upon the line for some time, and these men were all recalled and discharged. The plan was planned by Mr. Carnegie and the Carnegie Company, and was to be used as an outlet for the steel produced at the Carnegie works.

The road was started within a few days after Mr. Carnegie alleged that the Pennsylvania Railway had been established with the 12 per cent. rate on manufactured steel.

EIGHT NEW TARGETS.
