GLORY WHALEN A PRODIGY AT BRANTFORD

Eight-Year-Old Girl Assaulted and Murdered.

WHOLE CITY AROUSED BY FIENDISH DEED

Irene Cole, Daughter of Peter Cole, an Employee of the Massey-Harris Company, Found Dead by Her Own Father Shortly After 7 p.m., Having Been Missing Since One o'Clock—Joseph Kennedy, With Blood on Shirt, Arrested.

Brantford, Ont., (Special)—Between 1 and 2 this morning the police arrested Joseph Kennedy, a coachman, as being the perpetrator of the crime. The arrest followed information received from Jesse Willoughby, a resident near the home of the victim, who upon hearing the man described, notified the police of seeing Kennedy in the vicinity of the tragedy all afternoon. Kennedy was arrested on the outskirts of the town when he was examined the police discovered blood stains on his shirt. He will say nothing further than to stoutly deny having committed the crime.

Joseph Kennedy, who answers in every detail to the description of the man wanted, came to Brantford about eight weeks ago from his home in Belfast, Ireland. He has been employed as a coachman by several people in Brantford, but his unsteady habits and love of drink has resulted in his discharge from all his positions. The Brantford police are satisfied they have the right man, but until the dog is examined his clothing and the bloodstains, no definite assertion can be made. A man was also arrested in Welland.

FROM DREAMING CONSUMPTION

Passes Away Suddenly in Switzerland Where He Had Gone to Recover Health.

London, Sept. 30.—Sir Michael Herbert, the British Ambassador to the United States, died suddenly to-day at 1:30 p.m., at Davos-Platz, Switzerland, after a long and plucky fight against consumption. The first announcement was made at this afternoon's session of the Alaskan Boundary Commission.

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

STRANGE HOW IT HAPPENED
BUT THE PROOF IS THERE
Team Ran Away and Tongue of Oil Tank Went Clean Thru Telephone Pole.

Hamilton, Sept. 30.—(Special)—Something occurred this evening at the corner of King and John streets that does not happen once in a thousand years. A big team attached to a heavy tank of the Oil Co. ran away near the corner of King and John streets.

On King-street they dashed into a big telephone post at the postoffice. The tongue of the oil tank went clean thru the post office and struck a pole, and the tank was hurled to the ground.

The tongue could not be driven out and it had to be sawed off on both sides of the pole. The incident is the strangest occurrence on record.

CAPT. BERNIER'S SCHEME
Minister and Members Endorse the Project to Purchase Ship "Fran."

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—(Special)—John Charlton placed before the House to-night the advisability of aiding Capt. Bernier's polar expedition. He paid a high tribute to the captain's persistence in the scheme of organizing a Canadian expedition and his ability as a navigator. He mentioned that he had a command of 46 ships and had commanded a vessel at the age of 17 years, had been in command of 46 ships and had crossed the ocean 174 times. His plans had been approved of by such notable Arctic explorers as Sir James Ross and Sir John Ross.

Canada Should Have the Honor.

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World War No More.
A significant feature which may bear heavily materially on the success of the reorganizers is the statement of the different gangs of men that they would refuse to go back into the logging camps of the company for employment, even if they did pay off to-morrow and resume business. With the scarcity of labor in Canada this phase of the case may develop into a dangerous factor a little later on. This is a fairly conservative view of the situation in the Canadian Soo to-night, four-eight hours.

RAILROADS MEET ANXIOUS TO TAKE JUBILEE PRESENTS

For Two Weeks Departure Has Been Delayed—May Leave To-day, Under Armed Escort.

The Queen's Jubilee presents, packed in the 28 caskets and placed in three box cars tightly sealed, with two military and armed guards patrolling up and down night and day, are still in Toronto, lying on the C.P.R. siding into the Exhibition grounds. For the last two weeks the management of the Exhibition and railway officials have been negotiating for their transportation, but the peculiar nature of the consignment destined for the St. Louis fair has been the cause of no little trouble to the Exhibition management.

The presents were placed in the freight cars the early part of last week. The trouble of getting them moved arises from a variety of sources. The Canadian roads must be held responsible for hauling them as freight. They prefer having them sent by express, there are no express coaches with doors large enough to admit the caskets. As to the above objections, they have been overcome by the management consenting to express them and in furtherance of which the proper sized coaches have been sent for. A guard consisting of six men will also be sent.

The only difficulty now existing is the question as to whether or not the American road will be held responsible under the same conditions when they reach the Canadian terminus. They will be held responsible by the Canadian road as a thru shipment. To do this the American Consul was seen by the Exhibition people, who put things in communication with the Canadian road who would take charge of them. As yet, tho, it has not been definitely decided whether the C.P.R. or Canadian Pacific Railway will carry them. In the event of the Grand Trunk taking them they will be handed over to the American road at Chicago. If by the C.P.R. they will be changed at Detroit.

There is a great deal of secrecy being observed in connection with the exact time of departure. Fear is expressed lest undue publicity would expose the valuable treasures to attack. Tho, consequently, they have been decided to leave by departure will not be made known, although it is more than likely they leave to-morrow.

He declared that no affirmative evidence had been produced to show that the negotiators of the treaty of 1825 had Vancouver's narrative before them. He was willing to assume that they had quoted Vancouver as to the styling of Portland Channel as "arm of the sea," and Observatory Inlet "a branch." He argued, therefore, that Vancouver considered the whole estuary as Portland Canal.
