ANNUAL REPORT.

The present season has opened rather inauspiciously, as will be seen by comparing the amount of relief granted from January 1st to January 31st, 1883, with that of the twelve preceding months:

This increase may be attributed to many causes, among which may be noted an unusual influx of indigent immigrants, the depression of certain industries, the high price of provisions, and, perhaps, the indirect action of various strikes, which here and elsewhere have, from time to time, affected the condition of the working classes.

The resources of the House, aided by subscriptions from the citizens, have hitherto sufficed to meet all demands. The Managers trust that the kind Providence which for forty years has so manifestly blessed their exertions, will not be wanting to them and their successors in the future conduct of the Institution.

Removal from the city, death, and other causes have effaced from our list of benefactors many familiar names; but when one door is shut another is usually opened—the places of our old friends have been taken by new ones, who, in time, may emulate the good deeds of those who have passed from among us.

The Managers thankfully acknowledge the receipt of \$200 from the Provincial Government, through His Worship the Mayor, and a like sum direct from the Government; also, \$300 from the "Combined City Charities," which sums are now being disbursed by the Board in accordance with the obligations imposed upon them by the donors. The Managers desire to thank the Consumers' Gas Company also for their accustomed liberal gift of 1000 bushels of coke.

To provide for a recognized want, by the erection, in connection with the House of Industry, of an asylum and hospital for the Aged, a meeting was held in November last. The attendance at that meeting was very limited—in fact, so little encouragement was given to the proposed scheme that no further action has been taken, and the project remains in abeyance,

The Managers regret the loss sustained by the House in the departure of the Rev. Dr. King for a new field of labor. During the few years of his connection with this Board, Dr. King proved himself a valuable associate. He was a man of great resource, unobtrusive, yet always ready by advice and action to further the legitimate objects of the Institution.

The Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. North, have discharged their duties to the satisfaction of the Board.

The usual Reports of the Superintendent, Treasurer, and Medical Officer are on the table and await inspection.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

A very large number who apply for admission to the House of Industry, belong to the Incurable class, and have served long terms in the Toronto General Hospital, whence they are finally sent out to make room for others, who are more likely to be restored to a condition of usefulness and self support. These must then be received into this institution, or allowed to die in the streets. It is sometimes said we should not receive incurable cases into the House of Industry, but as all cannot gain admission to the Home for Incurables, we are forced to take them; and I hope it will be a long time before the Committee finds itself compelled to refuse shelter to any poor distressed son or daughter of Adam, because he or she is afflicted with incurable disease.

During the year 1883, eight men and two women have died, five between sixty-two and seventy, four between seventytwo and seventy-five, and one at eighty-three years of age. All of chronic disease of long standing.
