District No. 3.—Hon. E. H. Bronson: From Concession Street Westward to Hintonburg (not inclusive), and from Richmond Road and Wellington Street (not inclusive) Southward to the Experimental Farm (inclusive).

District No. 4.—Mr. Wyld: From Concession Street Eastward to Bay Street, and from Sparks Street Southward to Isabella Street.

District No. 5.—Mr. May: From Bay Street Eastward to Bank Street, and from Sparks Street Southward to Maria Street.

District No. 6.—Mr. Allan: From Maria Street Southward to Maclaren Street, and from Bay Street Eastward to Bank Street.

District No. 7.—Prof. Macoun: From Maclaren Street Southward to Isabella Street, and from Bay Street Eastward to Bank Street.

District No. 8.—Mr. Gibson: From Sparks Street Southward to Slater Street, and from Bank Street Eastward to the Canal.

District No. 9.—Dr. Gibson: From Slater Street Southward to Nepean Street, and from Bank Street Eastward to the Canal.

District No. 10.—Mr. Alexander: From Nepean Street Southward to Cooper, and from Bank Street Eastward to the Canal.

District No. 11.—Mr. Orme: From Cooper Street Southward to Maclaren Street, and from Bank Street Eastward to the Canal.

District No. 12.—Mr. Chrysler: From Maclaren Street Southward to McLeod St., and from Bank Street Eastward to the Canal.

District No. 13.— : From McLeod Street Southward to Billings' Bridge, and from Bank Street Eastward to the Canal.

District No. 14.—Mr. Larmonth:—From Rideau Street Southward to Stewart Street, and from Canal Eastward to Janeville.

District No. 15.—Prof. Robertson: From Stewart Street Southward to Ann Street, and from the Canal Eastward to the Rideau River.

**REPORT OF ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH CHOIR.**

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During the past year the Choir has sustained its part in several notable services. In March, Gounod's "Gallia" was sung. On Good Friday the fifth annual performance of Stainer's "Crucifixion" was given. On Thanksgiving Day Garrett's "Harvest Cantata" was sung. At the Easter and Christmas services, a number of appropriate anthems were given, the choir being effectively supplemented by the Sunday School Choir.

The number of new anthems studied during the year gives the Choir a singing repertoire in Anthems, Motets, Choruses, etc., actually in practice to the number of 107. Besides these the library includes many others more or less familiar to the present members. The whole comprises a collection representative of the best efforts of Church Composers,—probably one of the most complete in this respect to be found in Canadian Churches.

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## PASTORAL LETTER.

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*To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church :*

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

The new century calls to progress in every realm of achievement, and nowhere more than in the realm of practical religion. Amid the inevitable changes which are wrought by time, the Gospel of Jesus Christ still maintains its supreme power, and still seeks for fuller illustration in human life and character.

As subjects of the British Empire, we have reason to rejoice that the tedious war in South Africa is nearly ended, and that the sacrifice there made on the altar of patriotism is not likely to be in vain.

The queenly presence, from which radiated all that is noblest and best, has been removed from us. But wherever human sorrows are soothed by human sympathy ; wherever truth triumphs over intrigue and subterfuge ; wherever faithful hearts are welded in a bond of mutual helpfulness ; wherever the angel of peace appears hushing the cruel discords of strife ; wherever darkened souls are illumined by the glorious Gospel of Jesus Christ ; wherever the current of modern affairs sets towards the channel of a deeper faith and a more abounding righteousness, there will be manifested the best gifts which *Victoria* bestows on future generations ; and she, being dead, will yet speak with a voice whose strong and tender appeal causes others to follow in her footsteps, and to render thanks to God for the ideals to which she has given imperishable enthronement before Britain and the world.

We unite in the expression of our deep sympathy with the Royal household in its bereavement, and in the earnest prayer for the welfare of our gracious Sovereign King Edward VII. and his Consort, Queen Alexandra.

The various Reports now presented for your examination bear evidence of faithful work on the part of the various Societies of the Church, and ought to stimulate each one of us to ask ourselves in what way we can best help still further to increase their efficiency.

The response of the congregation to the appeal made by the Century Fund has been most gratifying, especially when account is made of the loss sustained by some of our number in the great fire of April last.

I desire to acknowledge with gratitude the diligent attendance of most of you at the Sunday services of the church, and the constant evidence afforded me that I do not preach in vain. I think, however, that we might show considerable improvement on Wednesday evenings, and I confidently look for growth in numbers and interest at these mid-week services.

My pastoral effort is directed chiefly to those in sickness and trouble, and it has always been one of my greatest delights to serve them as best I can. In addition to this, I have been able, during the past year, to visit the whole congregation. This work has been most enjoyable to me, and, I think, not without benefit to you.

Your personal kindness grows with the years, so that our relations have no touch of formality about them, but are the natural outcome of mutual esteem and confidence. And while my ministry falls far short of the ideal, I can say with absolute sincerity, that, as long as I have health and strength, I am prepared to devote all my energies to the enthusiastic discharge of the trust which God has committed to me.

We have every reason to be thankful for the past ; but I pray that more earnest faith and effort may cause our beloved church to become an increasing power for good, and that the blessing of God may still more abundantly rest upon us.

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## KIRK SESSION REPORT.

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In humble acknowledgment of the many mercies vouchsafed in the providence of God, the Kirk Session herewith present the report of another year, touching some of the more important features in relation to the work of St. Andrew's Church.

Before entering upon congregational affairs, the Kirk Session desire to express their deep sense of the loss sustained by Great Britain and the world in the passing of Queen Victoria.

While her sympathies went out towards every form of sincere belief, they feel that Presbyterianism owes much to the keen interest which, as a member of that Church, she always displayed in its service and ministry. The memorial sermon preached by our pastor and published by the Kirk Session, expresses our common sentiments of reverent devotion; and we earnestly pray that His Majesty King Edward may long be spared to follow in her footsteps.

The pastor has ministered faithfully to the spiritual needs of his people during the year just closed, as can be amply testified by very many who have experienced the benefits of his helpful and sympathetic words and acts. No one knows as does the minister the joys and sorrows, the hopes and fears, and the varying and insistent demands of a congregation, yet in all these calls upon heart and hand the response of the pastor has been prompt, willing and efficient.

During the absence of Dr. Herridge at the Meeting of Assembly, in Halifax, in June, the pulpit was supplied by the Rev. Dr. W. G. Jordan, of Queen's University, for one Sabbath. He was also engaged for the month of July and the first of August, being succeeded in August for three Sundays by the Rev. E. A. Wicher, B.D.

Both of these ministers proved to be most acceptable to the worshipers in St. Andrew's during the summer months, and a very satisfactory attendance at church services was the gratifying result.

The Session note with special regret the resignation, in September last, of Mr. William Hamilton from his office as Clerk of Session. They desire to record their appreciation of Mr. Hamilton's faithful and painstaking labors, since the time of his ordination, the first December, 1856, in seeking to further by example and precept the welfare of St. Andrew's Church, and the higher interests of the Master whom he delights to honor.

As a Sunday School and Bible Class teacher, as Representative Elder, as Session Clerk, and in other branches of Christian work Mr. Hamilton has always been most active. The office of Clerk of Session was held by him continuously for many years, until his recent resignation.

Previous to his departure for the south of England all the members of Session at the time in the city waited on Mr. Hamilton at his residence, where an engrossed address was presented to him and fitting words were spoken by Dr. Herridge and others, to which Mr. Hamilton made reply in most feeling terms, speaking of the pleasure past service had given him, of his attachment to St. Andrew's Church, and his desire to continue a member of the Session, since there remained a possibility of his returning from England at a future date to renew his residence in the City of Ottawa.

By referencé to the last Annual Report it will be seen that it was the intention of the Session to proceed without delay, a year ago, with a thorough canvass of the congregation for subscriptions to "The Twentieth Century Fund", in aid of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. In the month of April, however, the cities of Hull and Ottawa were visited by the devastating fire which called for the generous aid, financial and otherwise, of the people to relieve distress and want; the time was, therefore, not opportune for the prosecution of the canvass, and the work was mostly delayed till the fall and early winter. The Rev. Mr. Milne, of the Glebe Church, had been specially appointed by the Presbytery to assist in the canvass in Ottawa, and, in company with elders, he visited many of the members of St. Andrew's Congregation.

He was most actively assisted by Lt.-Col. Macpherson, and the Session desire to record their appreciation of the careful attention and the great amount of time and labour which have been so

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cheerfully given to the work by the Rev. Mr. Milne and Lt.-Col. Macpherson, who have also signified their readiness to co-operate further in the completion of the work.

Thus far there has been subscribed in the congregation about \$20,000.00, and it is earnestly hoped that a total of \$25,000.00 will be realized before the month of May next, when subscriptions are expected to be handed in.

The Century Committee look for the larger amount from St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, and the Session trust they will not be disappointed.

Upon the first Sabbath of the New Century the members of St. Andrew's Church, in common with many other churches throughout the land, united in celebrating the holy communion of Our Lord.

The service, conducted by the pastor, was most appropriate and impressive, and a large number of the members of the church and visitors from other congregations took part in the same.

During the year the sacrament of the Lord's Supper has been celebrated four times with an average attendance of 279, showing an average increase of 43 over last year. This is exclusive of the visitors who have been pleased to partake in these services, of whom there have been 113 during the year as compared with 96 the year previous.

In this connection it may be noted that the additions have been in excess of last year, by profession, 10 ; by certificate, 19,

with 2 readmitted, making 31 ; and the chief reason why the net increase shows but 14 is because by action of the Session 34 names have been removed as compared with 9 last year. Names have been dropped from the roll mostly on account of absence from the city for two years or more. In many cases it is impossible to ascertain the location of those who have been absent for some time ; the Session would, therefore, urge the duty of members to obtain letters of disjunction to be used, where possible, in uniting with other churches in places where they may be residing.

It is most gratifying to know that many of those who have professed faith in Christ are from the young people, particularly from the Sunday School, and in this fact must be recognized the debt of gratitude which the church owes to the faithful workers in the Sunday School who strive from week to week to supplement the teachings of the pulpit and the home with sound doctrine and worthy aims.

The various organizations of this Church have been doing good work throughout the year, as will be seen by a perusal of their reports. Much has been done in charitable and mission work to assist the needy temporally and spiritually, at home and in distant places ; much, too, that never finds expression in reports and figures, but, nevertheless, brings its own reward.

The Session note with pleasure the harmony and zeal which characterize the work in the different branches carried on.

There is scope for many kinds of talent, and any one so disposed may find a fitting place for its exercise. Exacting duties in other directions prevent many from doing much, but are there not some who might do more than heretofore to assist in the important work of the church, even though it were only in a more faithful attendance upon the Sabbath and mid-week services of the Sanctuary ?

The Wednesday evening prayer-meetings have been conducted by the pastor as usual, and while they have been fairly attended and much appreciated, the attendance has not been commensurate with the privileges offered for the study of God's Word and the spiritual advantages to be obtained.

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While the ordinary and special collections at the Sunday services have been about \$300.00 in excess of last year, the contributions to the Schedule Fund have fallen off somewhat, making the funds available for allocation about \$250.00 less than a year ago.

This shortage is probably due to the generosity of the congregation having been more than usually taxed after the disastrous fire already alluded to, and the canvass for the Century Fund, although it was hoped that the latter would in no way conflict with the usual contributions.

As will be seen by the Statement of the Treasurer of the Schedule Fund, the total amount at the disposal of the Session, after adding the small balance of \$6.17 from last year, is \$3,192.57.

Some of the above "Schemes" are of course supplemented, as usual, by the Mission Societies of the Church, as set forth in their reports.

A steady growth is reported from the Glebe Church, in the welfare of which this congregation naturally feels a very strong interest. The Session have been informed that the grant of St. Andrew's toward the stipend of their minister can be again reduced, and at this time by \$50.00, making the amount for the coming year \$250.00.

In closing their report the Session would express the hope that the many encouraging signs which have attended the Christian work of St. Andrew's Church in the past may be continued in more abundant measure in the future, and that all the earnest effort put forth for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom may be richly blessed to this congregation by the Great Disposer of Events.

### By-Law No. 37.

A By-law of the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland :

NOW, THEREFORE, the said Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland, doth hereby enact and ordain as follows :

THAT the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, be required, and they are hereby required and directed to pay to the said Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars, to be paid on the mortgage on the Manse, 293 Somerset Street, Ottawa.

AND that this By-law shall be sufficient authority to the said Glebe Trustees for the payment of the said sum of money as aforesaid.

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### REPORTS.

Reports were received as follows :—

Kirk Session, Schedule Fund, Temporal Committee, Glebe

Trustees, Home Missionary, Foreign Missionary, Ladies' Aid Society, Poor Relief, Sunday School, Ready Circle of King's Daughters and Choir, with the Financial Statement from each.

Moved by Mr. Jas. Gibson, seconded by Mr. F. H. Chrysler, That the reports just read, including the Financial Statements, be received and adopted.—Carried.

Mr. L. Crannell read a letter that the Temporal Committee received from Mr. J. W. McRae, resigning his position on the Temporal Committee.

Moved by Mr. Crannell, seconded by Mr. W. W. Wyld, That the resignation of Mr. J. W. McRae be accepted, and that Mr. W. D. Hogg be nominated to fill the vacancy created by such resignation, and that suspending all rules to the contrary the Secretary be requested to cast a ballot for the election of Mr. Hogg—Carried.

The Secretary cast a ballot and the Chairman declared Mr. Hogg duly elected.

Moved by Mr. G. L. Orme, seconded by Mr. G. Allan, That Messrs. A. W. Fleck and T. Workman be nominated for the vacancies on the Temporal Committee, and Mr. E. H. Bronson for the vacancy on the Glebe Trustee Board, and suspending all rules to the contrary the Secretary be requested to cast a ballot for the election of the above-named.—Carried.

The Secretary cast a ballot and the Chairman declared them duly elected to the positions.

Moved by Mr. F. H. Chrysler, seconded by Mr. P. Larmonth, That the Glebe Trustees be empowered to set apart such portion of the Glebe property under their control as in their judgment they may think proper, for the use of the Associated Charities during the coming season.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. J. W. McRae, seconded by Mr. Duncan, That the thanks of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society for their valuable services during the past year.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. A. W. Fleck, seconded by Mr. J. W. McRae, That the thanks of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church are hereby tendered to Mr. Jenkins, Organist and Choir Master, and

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to the members of the Choir and Sunday School Orchestra for their valuable services rendered during the past year.—Carried.

## REPORT OF TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee herewith submit their statement of receipts and expenditures for the church year, duly audited, showing a balance of \$14.08 on hand, the accounts of the year having been paid, with the exception of \$605.79, being interest on mortgage and balance due on electric wiring.

We must again draw the attention of the pewholders to the By-law, which states that the pew rents *shall be paid quarterly in advance*. As a matter of fact only a very small portion is so paid, with the result that your Committee is under the necessity of borrowing money from the bank, at the very outset of the church year, to pay salaries and other expenses which can be paid only from pew rents. Such a condition is not at all desirable, and we hope that the pewholders will in the future endeavor more nearly to comply with the provisions of the By-law.

We have further to report that Mr. J. W. McRae, the senior member of the Temporal Committee (having served nearly sixteen years), has thought it necessary to send in his resignation. Your Committee did not act upon it at once, hoping that Mr. McRae might be induced to re-consider the matter; but we could not prevail upon him to do so. We regret his decision very much as he was a valuable member and always took great interest in all matters pertaining to church affairs.

It will be necessary to elect some one to fill the vacancy caused by Mr. McRae's resignation in addition to the regular vacancies.

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## REPORT OF GLEBE TRUSTEES.

*To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa :*

The Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, beg to present the following report for the year ending 1st March, 1901:—

During the year, payments have been regularly made upon the lots sold by the Trustees, and the total amount collected was \$4,497.03, of which \$3,651.50 has been paid on account of the principal arising from sales of property.

The lots in Spenceville have nearly all been sold. Sales in the City of Ottawa have not been numerous. The construction of a system of drainage has been actively proceeded with, and the subsidiary drain has been nearly completed and will be ready for use as soon as the main sewer is completed to the Ottawa river. With the advancement made in the construction of a system of drainage for the southern part of the city, the sales upon the Glebe property should be made more rapidly and at better prices than heretofore. Sales of property all over the city were last year almost at a standstill on account of the fire which occurred in April, and no great advance is expected during the present year.

The Trustees desire to expend a sum of money in levelling and improving the low ground on the west side of Bank Street, and they think that a moderate amount so expended will considerably enhance the value of the lots.

The balance due on sales and mortgages is \$16,720.31, being about \$900.00 less than the amount at this date last year. Three thousand three hundred has been paid to the Temporal committee for the use of the congregation, of which \$2,000.00 was paid on account of the mortgage on the Manse and \$1,300.00 for other purposes, under two several by-laws of the congregation, passed at the last annual meeting, and which were printed in full in the annual report for last year.

The number of lots remaining unsold in Spenceville is 5, and in the city about 528.

A statement of receipts and expenditure is submitted.

Very special efforts were being made by the different committees to ensure the success of the evening, and the hope is expressed that when the invitation is again given the Society's efforts will be repaid by seeing a large and representative gathering of the other members of the congregation.

We cannot close this brief report without expressing the regret that the membership is not larger—a large attendance conducing not only to the efficiency of the Society, but also to the promotion of a friendly feeling among the ladies of the congregation.

## Thirteenth Annual Report of the Home Missionary Society.

---

If figures denote success then assuredly this closing year must mark an epoch in the history of our Society, as our present membership list shows 65 paid up members, and a large average attendance at the monthly meetings, which have been held regularly on the first Friday of every month, and the letters from the missionary listened to with deep interest.

The thank-offering meeting, in April, realized \$66.75; and Mrs. Ahearn gave a most interesting address on India, illustrated by curios and photos, which added very much to the pleasure of the discourse.

In May, a garden party was given by Mrs. Gemmill, as a means of raising money, and on this occasion the Society was privileged in having present the Rev. Mr. Johnson, who was returning to his labors in Swan River after a lengthened holiday in Halifax, where he had been sent to recuperate from an attack of fever. Mr. Johnson gave a short address, telling of his work at Swan River, which, during his temporary absence, had been undertaken by Rev. Mr. Lowry. Mr. Johnson dwelt particularly on the need of a suitable church building, and of the inability of the people to meet this requirement. In the social hour that followed the address, many were glad of the opportunity of meeting this young missionary, whose labors have been so successful, and with whom personal contact led to a deepening of interest. The sum of \$27.50 was contributed at this garden party.

In June, the sum of \$160.00 was sent to Dr. Robertson towards paying the missionary's salary, and was gratefully acknowledged.

In September, Dr. Herridge expressed a wish that some means should be adopted to secure the co-operation of the young ladies of the congregation in Home Mission work, and as a result of this timely suggestion, the President sent out letters to all, inviting them to the October meeting. Fifteen responded, and it was decided to hold a bazaar for the purpose of assisting Mr. Johnson

with the building of his church at Swan River Town, which was to cost \$1,200.00, \$300.00 of which had already been promised by his own people.

On October 25th, Mrs. Crannell kindly gave an evening reception for the benefit of the Society, and the sum of \$46.00 was realized.

Meanwhile active preparations were going on for "The Household Fair," and on December 13th and 14th it became an accomplished fact, with results far beyond the most sanguine expectations of even the most hopeful. The Sunday School Hall was transformed by willing workers into various booths for the sale of useful and fancy articles, refreshments were served in the adjoining parlors, and during these two days the hall presented a busy scene and was well patronized by the public. Where so many rendered valuable assistance it were invidious to emphasise any one, but that the results were so gratifying is due to the fact that all worked together with a will, and the spirit of harmony and good will that characterized the whole proceedings was especially dwelt upon by the President when acknowledging their services.

The magnificent sum of \$900.00 was realized by this bazaar. Those who heard Mr. Johnson's letter, written on receipt of the joyful news communicated to him by Mrs. Herridge, must have been more than repaid for their efforts. He wrote that he had announced to his people, at the close of an evening service, the valuable donation received from this Society, which would not only enable them to pay off their indebtedness of \$600.00 to the Church and Manse Building Fund, but also give them the necessary funds to make the church ready for occupation. He said that the news had filled the congregation and himself with an ecstasy of delight and had drawn them more closely together, and he felt sure that, like mercy, it would bestow a double blessing, "it blesseth him that gives and him that takes."

We know from Mr. Johnson's letters what a promising field Swan River Town has become and how his work there has been blessed. The surrounding country is one of the most fertile and picturesque districts of Manitoba. The valley is sheltered by hills on three sides with a beautiful lake to the east, and less susceptible to frost than a more exposed region, and thus makes it a desir-

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able place for settlers. From a small settlement of a year ago the valley now contains three good towns: Swan River, Minitouas, and Thunder Hill, and it is in Swan River that Mr. Johnson's labors have been principally directed, although he has overtaken many of the outlying districts, and has brought comfort to many lonely homes, and speaks of the kindness shewn him everywhere, even from strangers. Swan River Town has now a population of over 400, and contains over 85 buildings.

In December, the customary box of Christmas gifts for distribution among the children was sent out free of charge by an old friend of the Society. It contained a varied assortment of toys, books and warm clothing, and the Society added a personal contribution to Mr. Johnson of heavy blankets and flannels instead of the fur coat offered by the ladies and which he did not at present need.

These facts cover the actual working of the Society for the past year; and while setting out on a new year, let us do so with fresh resolutions to be zealous and active, while bearing in our minds, amid the solemn hush that pervades our nation, the noble example of her who after a long life of self-sacrifice and devotion, has now exchanged her earthly crown for one that "fadeth not away."

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We have again to report a year of steady, quiet work in the Sunday School. We have welcomed several new teachers to our staff, and have parted from others with regret. The number of scholars on the roll is 240 ; teachers and officers, 30 ; total, 270, being about the same number as reported last year. Average attendance of scholars, 155 ; teachers and officers, 24 ; total, 179. The Primary Department continues to prosper under Miss Scarth's care. The Bible Class teacher, Miss Ross, would gladly welcome a larger number of young ladies to join in Bible study. The class meets in the Ladies' Parlor at the same time as the Sunday School.

In April, the Century Fund was explained to the scholars, and banks were distributed to those who desired to collect. Sixty were taken. In October, a number were brought in, and the amount collected, \$24.13, shewed a good deal of interest in the Fund.

A special collection was taken for the India Famine Fund, when \$14.54 was contributed.

Children's Day was observed on 30th September, when the scholars attended service in the church, and Dr. Herridge preached on "Thanks be unto God for His unspeakable gift."

On the Sunday before Christmas, gifts and money were brought in abundance, and the teachers had a busy time distributing the parcels which brought good cheer to many homes.

On February 8th. the yearly Festival was held and heartily enjoyed by the scholars and parents. Two of the scholars, Lulu Botterell and Mary McFarlane, having recited the whole of the Shorter Catechism received each the Superintendent's Bible and the Assembly's diploma.

We are glad to report that during the year a number of Scholars have joined the Church.

The attention of parents is called to the fact that the Assembly's S. S. Committee have issued cards, with Scripture selections to be memorized by pupils, and diplomas will be given to those who recite these verses correctly at the end of the year. It is hoped that the young people will be encouraged at home to take up this study, for we all realize the importance of laying up a store of Scripture truth in the minds of the young so that of them it may be true that "from a child thou hast known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus."

*Victoria*

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*"Great mourning and weeping."*

Esther 4 : 3.

It is with sad hearts that we assemble here to-day. From palace and cottage alike is heard a sob of sorrow. In the stately homes of England, in the bungalows of India, from the far-off island-continent, through the length and breadth of this Dominion, amid the clash of arms in southern Africa rises the voice of lamentation. A hush falls over our busy toil as the tolling bell peals forth its requiem. A whole Empire mourns, and the civilized world mourns with it. The greatest monarch of the greatest realm has answered the last summons. The Victorian era is ended. The Queen is dead !

And the blow comes with a startling suddenness. Though our Sovereign had lived more than four-score years, yet her splendid vitality and her close connection with everything which concerned the welfare of her subjects had almost made us forget that she was mortal. Our earliest memories of public events have been associated with her illustrious name. We have marked the unerring insight which always led her to do the best and wisest thing. We have revered the personal influence which was so quietly exercised and yet so potent throughout her wide domain. It seems impossible to separate the history of the last sixty years from the queenly presence which has left such an impress upon it. And even though, of late, her spirit was crushed by private afflictions, and by the slaughter of her sons in cruel war, we hoped that she would have been spared yet awhile to rule over us. God has willed otherwise. The busy brain has reached the end of earth's labours. The kindly hands are still. The great heart beats no more. We are a bereaved nation. The Queen is dead !

It may be doubted whether any death since the world began has created such universal sorrow. And this is not simply because of her exalted station. It is true that as Empress of Britain's realm she was the most outstanding figure of modern history. Her girdle of rulership encircled the globe. Her subjects were found in every land, and her policy of government, in greater or less degree, affected all the nations of the world. No potentate has ever had such a wide field of responsibility as Queen Victoria ; and now that her sceptre is laid aside, the verdict cannot but be that she has held it with firm, impartial hand ; that her reign has been not only the longest in British annals, but the most beneficent ; and that, amid all the serious and perplexing events of her royal career, she has always shown a fine judgment which made her great in the counsels of the nation, and a ready kindness which will cause millions to remember her as Victoria the Good.

For it is not the Queen alone whom we mourn, but the woman whose sweet, pure life is the best inheritance she leaves behind her. We feel that our loss is a personal one. Our tears are the tribute to a noble character. Though most of us have never seen her, yet outside our own family circle, there is no one in all the world whom we had learned to love so well. In the truest sense she was related to us as the mother of all her people. Her sympathies went out in every direction, especially towards the desolate and oppressed. Her solicitude was constantly bestowed upon the lessening of human pain and the increase of human happiness. Many a humble peasant will recall the soothing voice which knew so well how to speak a word in season, and the winning smile which lit up the darkened home with a ray of benediction. Even though burdened with the weight of years, she maintained to the end her anxious regard for the welfare of her subjects everywhere, and amid all the splendours of royal station refused to shut out the awful spectacle of suffering and death about her. Sharing alike the joys and the sorrows of others, she linked the monarchy to the people in a tie which cannot be broken. And therefore, though in one sense her reign is ended, she does not abdicate the throne which belongs to the queenly nature, around which grateful hearts have twined a wreath of immortelles to keep her memory green forever.

The constitutional freedom which, broadening "from precedent to precedent," has been gradually built up for British subjects through the course of centuries, prevents any sovereign, even if so inclined, from pursuing a policy which is at utter variance with the will of the people. But though our nation is too old to have its destiny determined by any single person, the bulwark of law which now surrounds the meanest subject of the realm does not lessen the effect of good influences from the throne, but rather gives them greater prominence. While the Queen understood her subjects thoroughly, and showed due regard for all their reasonable wishes, her own magnetic personality was the most powerful force in guiding popular sentiment. It is hardly possible to overestimate the value of the ideals which she unconsciously impressed upon the mind of the whole nation. She was the good genius of Britain. Her name was the synonym for all that is just and kindly. She repressed the turbulence of passion and the greed of aggrandizement, and encouraged the growth of reverence, sincerity, and self-control. In any station, her example would have been a blessing to others. In the fierce light which beats upon a throne, it was almost omnipotent in creating a love for truth and righteousness.

She was the Queen of the home. Children and children's children rise up and call her blessed. Her union with the lamented Prince Consort was a union of mutual affection; and when his death made the crown "a lonely splendour," the Queen's chief solace was found in cherishing his dear memory, and in training

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her children to the practice of industry, unselfishness and the fear of God. The homes of Britain, whether humble or illustrious, might well follow the example set by the royal wife and mother. She desired to see pure love crowned everywhere, and her inmost soul abhorred intrigue and licentiousness. There can be no doubt that the high regard for home which, amid many disintegrating tendencies of the age, still remain so strong among the English people, has been fostered, to a greater extent, perhaps, than anyone suspects, by the blameless home life of Queen Victoria.

And yet that home was not without its deep afflictions. Over and over again, Victoria has been the queen of sorrows. But so far from allowing private grief to interfere with public duty, the heart that mourned for loved ones snatched away has been all the more quick to understand and sympathize with the woes of others; and the chequered experience of Britain's ruler has only increased the tactful wisdom which served to guide the ship of state past dangerous rocks into a haven of safety.

When a mere girl, sixty-three years ago, she was called to rule over a great Empire, in her first speech from the Throne, she said: "This awful responsibility is imposed on me so suddenly, and at so early a period of my life, that I should feel myself utterly oppressed by the burden were I not sustained by the hope that Divine Providence, which has called me to this work, will give me strength for the performance of it, and that I shall find in the purity of my intentions, and in my zeal for the public welfare, that support and those resources which usually belong to a more mature age and to long experience. I place my firm reliance on the wisdom of Providence, and the loyalty and affection of my people; . . . and I shall steadily protect the rights, and promote to the utmost of my power the happiness and welfare of all classes of my subjects." It was a noble promise, and no one can deny that she has amply fulfilled it. She has never stood aloof in royal isolation, but has entered into every question which touched the interests of her people at home, and has brought an industrious zeal and a rare insight to bear upon the relations of Britain to the rest of the world. She has been a tranquilizing force in modern history. She has unravelled difficulties which threatened disturbance; she has sought to broaden the intelligence and dignify the manners of every subject of her realm: and most of all, she has illustrated the supreme authority of Christian principles in the actual conduct of life. It is true that her reign has not been free from bloodshed; and it is a pathetic circumstance that her last days were embittered by the horrors of war. But it is not to be doubted that she accepted war only as a stern necessity, and that her personal influence has always been for peace with honour. Is it too much to hope that though she has passed from earthly scenes, her sacred memory will help soon to extinguish the last embers of strife, and gradually build up in Africa a united com-

monwealth which has buried the past, and learned to appreciate the equal rights and liberties which, without distinction of creed or race, are the indestructible basis of British citizenship the wide world over?

The passing of Victoria naturally recalls that marvellous expansion in almost every department of human activity which makes her reign without a parallel. Whatever glories have been won by British arms upon the field of battle during the last sixty years, they are excelled by the results of peace. The victorian era of literature has nothing like it since the days of Queen Elizabeth; and it surpasses even that illustrious period in the variety of the intellectual wealth which it is destined to bequeath to future generations. The patience of scientific research has found its ample reward in a clearer understanding of the laws of nature and the subtle mechanism of human life; and so far from placing a ban upon the progress of religions thought, the church has to thank many of the *savants* for giving to her a wider appreciation of the manifold wisdom of God. In the midst of the absorptions of practical affairs, there have not been wanting some latter-day prophets to keep open the road towards the ideal. Never has the English-speaking world enjoyed greater freedom, nobler opportunity, more widely diffused knowledge, or more equable adjustment of the conditions of existence than at the dawn of the twentieth century.

It may be said that progress of some sort is to be looked for in the natural course of human evolution. But real progress does not come of its own accord. There must be effort behind it, and a proper understanding of the chief duties of life. It is the crown of human achievement to fear God and work righteousness, and no people that ignores His laws can ever hope to attain true strength and stability. While eager to consult for every kind of human interest, and to appreciate the results of the best culture, it is in this highest realm, most of all, that our departed Queen gave a pure example to her people. Whatever else is forgotten in the lapse of time, the wonderful spread of religious truth, the contagion of a royal influence which made for what is good, the unifying power of a Christian faith, and the beneficence of a Christian charity will be sufficient to immortalize the name of Queen Victoria.

And though her last days were not without their storm-cloud, the cloud has a silver lining. It does not become us to speculate upon what passed in that sick room at Osborne when those who were dearest to her gathered in awe-struck silence watching the approach of the last dread messenger. But while, to our poor thought, he came all too soon, the Queen lived long enough to behold the splendid spectacle of a whole Empire united in the indissoluble bonds of love and sacrifice. The reality of the joy which marked the Queen's Diamond Jubilee has been demon-

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strated beyond the shadow of a doubt in the trying days since then, by the devotion of her sons who have gone forth with ready will from every quarter of her realm to fight the battles of Britain, and in many cases have laid down their lives on the altar of patriotism. Canadians can never forget the Queen's personal solicitude for their welfare, her unstinted praise of their valorous achievements, and the tears she shed for the wounded and for those who had found a soldier's grave. And if, beyond the mists of strife, God was pleased to vouchsafe her in those last hours, a fairer vision, surely it was the vision of a people widely scattered in many lands, and differing in many ways, yet joined in the enthusiasm of a common loyalty, and ennobled by the splendour of a growing purpose to realize, in this new age, the best results of political and religious freedom, to raise to still more glorious renown the name of Britain, and to extend the priceless gifts of high civilization and genuine Christianity among the nations of the world.

The Queen is dead, but her works follow her. It may be that no other sovereign will ever rival either in length of rulership or in breadth of influence the marvellous record of Queen Victoria. But His Majesty King Edward VII, ascends the throne under good auspices. He brings to his great task a ripe experience in public affairs, a genial temper which has made him beloved by all classes of the community, and an excellent common-sense which will prove most valuable in the solution of national problems. He enjoys also the priceless example of his illustrious mother, to whom he has always shown himself most dutiful and affectionate. In his Queen Consort he will find a right noble ally whose winning grace has enshrined her in the affections of the English people. There is a fine tone in His Majesty's first public utterance, and it is not the King alone but the sorrowing son whose voice is heard in it. "I know how deeply," he says, "you and the whole nation, and I think I may say, the whole world, sympathize with me in the irreparable loss we have all sustained. I need hardly say that my constant endeavour will be always to walk in her footsteps." We can cherish no more loyal wish for the new monarch than that God will give him grace to do so! In taking up the full burden of royalty, His Majesty may be assured of the goodwill of his subjects everywhere, of their profound condolence with him in his great affliction, and of their complete confidence in his sincere desire "to work for the good and amelioration of his people," and to continue that policy of enlightened justice

"Which keeps the throne unshaken still,  
Broad based upon the people's will,  
And compass'd by the inviolate sea."

"The Queen is dead! Long live the King!" Therefore, though our hearts are full of grief, let us front the future with hope

and confidence. What His Majesty well calls an "irreparable loss" has befallen Christendom ; but the Ruler of all the nations still holds sway, and if we seek his guidance, we shall not seek in vain. It is not by the outward pageantry of mourning, appropriate as we feel it to be, but by a life of more earnest purpose and more exalted character that we shall best show our reverent love for Queen Victoria. For she being dead, yet speaketh ; and as the wide Empire over which she ruled enters upon the tasks of another century, she is calling us to put away everything which is vile and valueless ; to be sober in our joys and heroic in our sorrows ; to be at peace with all men as far as lieth in us ; to seize with ready insight the best opportunities which life affords ; to succour the weak, and guide the erring, and bring the angel of pity to darkened homes and careworn, broken hearts ; to find our best inspiration in the wisdom which cometh from above ; amid the insolence of evil passions, and the overmastering lust of gain to prove that the destiny of man is not measured by the seen and temporal ; to rise to the stature of moral greatness, and learn, through all the shifting scenes of earth, to bear about with us everywhere the marks of the Lord Jesus. This, it seems to me, is the message which comes from behind the veil. And as long as we listen to it, the dead Queen will live again not only in the personal immortality which is now her rich and inalienable guerdon, but in the diffused beneficence which her memory inspires, in the sweeter and more pacific conduct of the nations, in the spread of God's evangel over all the earth, in the homage which time will only deepen, because it shows itself perpetually in the ungrudging service of pure and upright hearts.
