South America Blockades.—The merchants of Liverpool have at length resolved to make such energetic remonstrances on the ruin occasioned to our country by the wanton aggressions of the French, as even Lord Palmerston shall be compelled to hear. We trust the commercial interests throughout the country will second the appeal.

The French Ministry have appointed Commissioners to be present to their West India Islands to report on the best means of drawing up a law for emancipating the negroes. The French and Dutch Governments are negotiating a treaty of commerce, one of the chief articles of which has for its object to admit French colonial sugars into Holland at a lower rate of duty than sugars of any other nation.

Russian Observatory.—The Russian National Observatory, which has been five years erecting, is at length completed. It is in the neighbourhood of St. Petersburg, on the hill of Pultova, which is about 240 feet high, being the most elevated point of a chain of heights enclosing on the south the vast basin of the Neva.

PRINCE ALBERT.—There is a good deal of misconception on the part of the unlearned public as to the particular position of his Serene Highness as consort of the Queen in England. There is a very curious anomaly in this respect in comparing the position of a Queen-Consort and the QUEEN'S Consort. The Queen's consort has rank whatever she may be. The Queen-Consort has by common law many high immunities and valuable privileges.

The following is the substance of the news from Constantinople, the principal event being the ceremonial attending the promulgation of the law before mentioned.

The whole nation has long been in anxious expectation as to the fundamental law, which was generally known to be the intention of the Sultan to grant. On Thursday last, after a Council, at which all the members of the Divan were assembled, with the Ghelki Imam and the principal Ulama, and another held on the following day, it was decided that the law should be promulgated on the succeeding Sunday, with the Imperial sanction.

When all were arranged, His Paisha, Munshi of the Palace, delivered the Hatti Scherif to Reschid Paisha, who read it with a loud and clear voice from an elevated stand raised at the centre of the plain.

Lord Hill, Commander in chief of the Army, has severely reprimanded Col. Thomas, Major Maclean, and other officers of the 20th Regt., for attending a party political meeting, which Captain Glegg highly offensive to the Queen was used by some of the speakers.

The following paragraphs are extracted from an account of a recent excursion from Fredericton to St. John, by the Editor of the Fredericton Sentinel.

THE OBSERVER. ST. JOHN, TUESDAY, JANUARY 21, 1840.

The English December Mail arrived in the city this morning. The packet had a passage of 41 days to Halifax, where she arrived on Friday last.

Thursday and Friday of last week were the coldest days experienced in this city the present winter. On Thursday morning the thermometer was down to 15° below zero, and on Friday morning it was as low as 16°.

Melancholy Accident.—A lad named Jas. Taylor, aged 17 years, was knocked overboard from the pilot boat Teazer by the gibing of her main boom, and drowned, when in the act of putting the pilot on board the ship Brothers, on Sunday morning.

Supreme Court.—The Sittings of the Court of Oyer and Terminer for the City and County of Saint John commenced on Tuesday last. Judge P. A. S. presiding. His Honor, in charging the Grand Jury, stated that the number of criminal cases were fewer than he had hitherto been accustomed to witness.

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE CHANCELLOR OF KING'S COLLEGE.

Report of the late Examinations of the College and Collegiate Schools.

The Examination of the College took place on Monday the 16th December, and was conducted in the usual manner. Among the Visitors, who were fewer than on former occasions, I observed the Master of the Rolls and the Hon. J. S. Saunders;

It was especially gratifying to me to hear the conduct of the students had been uniformly regular and correct, so that no punishment had been inflicted or required throughout the term.

The number of Under-graduates on the College Board, I believe, sixteen, but five of them were not present because they were preparing for their Degree, and two because they had resided only part of the term.

In the Greek Testament and in Natural History the remaining eleven were questioned, as they had been taught, all together. The classical studies had been carried on in three classes, which were separately examined, the first in Fingar and Theophrastus; the second in Herodotus, Juvenal, and Livy; the third in Xenophon and Livy.

There was not time to look over the Weekly Exercises which each student had composed, but the Vice-President declared himself highly pleased with what he had seen in that way. I brought away with me some specimens which were particularly commended, and having since looked over them at my leisure, I am able, so far, to testify to the justice of the commendation.

The Collegiate School was examined on the day following, with the assistance of Dr. Robb and the Rev. J. M. Sterling, who had also assisted at the occasional inspections of the School, appointed by the College Council. On this occasion the Examination was more than usually exact, as the extent of the new school system was held allowed of its being carried on in several subjects at the same time by different examiners, who all expressed the same satisfaction with the part which came under their observation.

HALIFAX, JANUARY 14.—BANK STOCK.—On Saturday, 14th inst., before the opening of the Bank of Nova Scotia, the stock of the Bank of Nova Scotia was sold at the rate of 100 per cent.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY, JANUARY 4.—A message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor was announced, and read in the House of Assembly.

THE CLERK then commenced reading the despatches, the most important of which was one addressed to the Lieutenant-Governor of Nova Scotia by the Marquis of Normandy, which replied to all the subjects contained in the last Session's Address of the House of Assembly to the Throne.

RESPECTING the question of the Council, the despatch stated that the Marquis of Normandy had adopted the views of Lord Glegg as expressed in his despatches of the 30th April and the 31st October, 1837.

With reference to the School Land, passed last session, and reserved for Her Majesty's consideration, the despatch stated that Her Majesty's Government would not consent to have the Church of England deprived of those lands they had improved, but to give the Church an exclusive right to them, and also a fair share of the unimproved lands.

THE PRAYER of the Address of the House to have the principal ports of the Province made free ports, was accorded to so far only as to open the ports of Digby and Arichat.

From the Quebec Gazette. LORD JOHN RUSSELL and SIR JOHN HARVEY.—In so far, at least, as the Canadas are concerned, Lord John's researches into the records of the Colonial office, must have been very superficial, to enable him to say in the Despatch of the 16th October—"I cannot learn that during the present or during the two last reigns, a single instance has occurred in the charge of subordinate (to the Governor) Colonial Officers, except in cases of death or resignation, in capacity or misconduct."

We think the case of the Attorney General and Solicitor General of Upper Canada in 1832 or 1833, for opposing the policy of Lord Godefrich's despatch of that year, is in point; and we believe that the case of the Solicitor General of Lower Canada, in 1809, or ten, makes for the existence of the general practice. We believe that several other instances could be pointed out in both Provinces of Canada and in the other North American Provinces.

Lord John's new notification of the practice of an established theory, will, therefore, not produce the results which it is supposed are intended. It will only further degrade official stations in the eyes of the people, or cause such a use to be made of the elective franchise and the privileges of the representative assemblies, as will force public officers on the Governors, independently of them and the Imperial Government, and finally establish a Republican Government of the worst sort in the Colonies; one in which the representatives of the people and their nominees will be the Government, and the officers of the term of their election, supporting themselves by deception and corruption, and the use of the public revenue for these purposes, as long as they can.

Lord John Russell ought to have made himself better acquainted with Colonial affairs, before he intimated his despatch, and ordered it to be published. Sir John Harvey's circular can only be accounted for by the habits of that honorable profession to which he belongs, and in which, during the last war, he first turned the tide of American invasion, for which none feel more grateful than the inhabitants of Canada.

THE STATE OF GOVERNMENT.—We are persuaded, that in so far as the inhabitants of Quebec, generally, are concerned, the seat of Government being amongst them is rather detrimental than otherwise. It is a seaport and a commercial town, that Quebec must prosper, and the habits of some of the Government people, who usually give the tone to society in the colonies, are inconsistent with those of men of business. One shipbuilder at Quebec, who attends diligently to his business, circulating more money than all the Government officers who would remove with the seat of Government. Whatever may happen, Quebec has nothing to fear for its future importance. It is the Gibraltar of the Mediterranean of North America; the healthy shipping port of the most extensively navigable river in the world. These are advantages which no one can take away, and if we can rear up a moral, industrious, intelligent & peaceable population, their prosperity is certain, and there is no one that they need envy. As our southern brethren, of "the Saxon race," have heretofore chosen a time for quarrelling with England when the Canadas were badly prepared, we think it would be prudent, at all times, to keep a clear passage down the St. Lawrence, as all future Governors may not be so fortunate as was Sir Guy Carleton in escaping to Quebec in 1775.—Here, at least, they will always find a safe place of refuge within the reach of England, unless, indeed, her sons "do off the lion's hide and haul a calf skin on their receding limbs."—Quebec Gazette.

CANADIAN COMMERCE.—It is gratifying to learn, notwithstanding the political troubles which have affected the Canadas, the commercial prospects of the country are bright. The value of the exports of 1839 were nearly double those of 1838, and as a matter of course, the provincial revenue has been very materially augmented. In 1838, the value of the exports was about £750,000, and the revenue arising from all the imports was £300,000; so that we may calculate on the revenue for 1839 being about £1,000,000. It is true that the Custom House order respecting the trans-shipment of goods at Quebec for Montreal without being previously entered, has added much to the revenue of this port, and deducted from that of Quebec, but notwithstanding all that, there cannot be a doubt that more business, of a healthy description, was transacted in the Canadas during the past year than in any former year. The number of imports at this port, of merchandise, has been left this year for England, it is probable that the imports during the approaching business season will greatly exceed those of the past year. When we receive the official statement of imports from the Custom House, we believe it will fully justify our remarks.—Montreal Herald.
