

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MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN THE

DOMINION SQUARE METHODIST CHURCH

IN THE CITY OF MONTREAL, PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

Organization of Conference, June 6th, 1888.

THE FIFTH SESSION of the MONTREAL CONFERENCE of the Methodist Church was opened in the Dominion Square Methodist Church, in the City of Montreal, on Wednesday, June 6th, 1888, at 10 a.m.,—the Rev. WILLIAM I. SHAW, LL.D., in the chair. (The Conference Prayer-meeting had been previously held, from 9 to 10 o'clock, conducted by the Rev. W. I. SHAW, LL.D., President of Conference.)

The President gave out the 753rd hymn, the Secretary read the 4th Chapter of the Epistle to the Ephesians, and the Revs. G. MCRITCHIE and WILLIAM JACKSON led in prayer.

The Secretary, Rev. DR. SAUNDERS, called the Roll, which is as follows. (See Appendices Nos. 1 and 2.)

The President directed the Conference to proceed to elect, by ballot, a President of the Conference, whereupon the Rev. JOSEPH W. SPARLING, M.A., B.D., was chosen, who suitably acknowledged the honor.

The Conference then proceeded to the election of a Secretary; Rev. 8. BOND being elected.

The Secretary nominated Rev. C. R. FLANDERS, B.A., and W. H. LAMBLY, Esq., Assistant Secretaries; and Rev. WILLIAM PHILP, B.A., as Journal Secretary. These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

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OBITUARIES.

REV. JOHN BORLAND.

The Rev. John Borland was born in Ripon, Yorkshire, England, Sept. 23, 1809, and came to this country with his parents in 1818, in the minth year of his age. His father being a military man, the family lived at different places between Niagara and Quebec. In the seventeenth year of his age, he went to live in the family of Mr. Martin Ray, of the ancient city of Quebec, in whose house an earnest type of piety prevailed. Here he was brought under deep religious influences, which led to his conversion to Christ and his consecration to God's service. Having found the great blessing of the forgiveness of sins and the peace of God, he was moved to seek the spiritual welfare of others, and held religious services in destitute places. In 1835, he offered himself for the work of the ministry in the Methodist Church in Lower Canada, then in connection with the British Conference, and was employed on the old St. Armand Circuit, under the supervision of the late Rev. John Tompkins, and at the end of the year went to another field of labor. He filled out forty years of active service in the itinerant work on thirteen Circuits, embracing some of our hardest fields of toil, and also some of our leading cities, such as Quebec, Montreal, Toronto. He was Chairman of several important Districts, and for some years had charge of the French Work, and of the Oka Indians, and earnestly sought their deliverance from bondage and persecution. In 1878, he was President of the Conference. In 1875, he took a superannuated relation, but continued to work and preach with cheerfulness and fidelity as he had opportunity. His whole ministerial life proved how fully he believed the doctrines and approved the Discipline of the Methodist Church. In defending the truths of the Gospel, whenever or by whomsoever assailed, he was fearless and uncompromising. He was a man of wide reading and good conversational powers. was plain and earnest, able and faithful, and eminently successful. His preaching of his Circuits he had great satisfaction of witnessing deep and extensive revivals of religion. He excelled in the gift and abounded in the spirit of prayer. He walked with God. He was a transparent man, and despised all tricks and double-dealing; an Israelite, indeed, in whom is no guile. He was an honorable man, and in his keeping the character of his brethren, whether present or absent, was always sacred. He was usually calm and self-possessed, although of remarkable energy. In many respects he was a noble example to the young and rising ministry of the Church. While he could rebuke iniquity whether in high or low places with the boldness of one of the ancient prophets, he was of a meek and humble spirit, and in the chamber of suffering was a son of consolation. Pleasing in personal appearance, gentlemanly in bearing, genial in manner, devout in spirit and practical in piety. The affliction that terminated his long and useful life was severe, and continued through several months, but was borne with uncomplaining fortitude and patience. He died in the city of Montreal, March 31, 1888, in the seventy-ninth year of his age, and the fifty-third of his ministry. "They that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars forever and ever."

REV. DAVID KENNEDY, S.T.D.

David Kennedy, son of Jacob and Martha Kennedy, was born in the Township of Gainsborough, on the 2nd of August, 1838, and died at Stanstead, of typhoid fever, after a short but severe illness, on the 4th of September, 1887.

No brief obituary notice can do justice to the life of our departed brother, but the few salient facts which follow are cited for the information of a wide circle of sorrowing friends, and as a tribute of respect to his memory.

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At the early age of fourteen years, under the holy influence of Christian parents and a faithful ministry, he decided to give his heart to God, and through all the years that followed he lived a beautiful Christian life. Very shortly after his conversion he felt called of the Spirit to the work of the ministry, and he at once responded to the voice of the Church, and was received on probation in 1860, and received into full connexion and ordained in 1864. During the ensuing ten years he was appointed to several important fields of labor, on all of which he was successful in strengthening and edifying the Church, and in leading souls to Christ.

In 1874 he was appointed Principal of the College at Sackville, which position he filled with great ability and singular success until the summer of 1885, when he assumed the charge of Stanstead College, the interests of which he faithfully served unto the day of his death. As a preacher Dr. Kennedy was a clear and vigorous thinker, and a most accurate expositor, and at the same time he always kept distinctively prominent the important duty of consecration to God.

But it is in the educational work of the Church that our departed friend has won his most signal success. He graduated at Cobourg in 1863, took his B.D. at Evanston in 1870, and in 1878 he won the honorable degree of S.T.D. Added to these scholarly attainments was his ability to impart instruction to others, his sanctified, common sense, and his sympathy with the young life of the student, together with his successful record. These justify the statement that he was one of the ablest educators the Church has ever had, and his death has created a vacancy which it will be most difficult to fill.

Concerning his death, we can only say that it was triumphant; no cloud, no darkness, nothing but confidence and heaven.

The funeral service was held in our church at Stanstead, conducted by the Rev. Dr. Shaw, President of the Conference, who was assisted by several of the brethren. The attendance was large. The surroundings were marked by the most convincing proofs of widespread grief on the one hand, and tender care for the suffering family on the other. The Father help us to say, "Thy will be done."

REV. GEORGE STENNING.

Rev. George Stenning was born in Guildford, England, in the month of June, 1827.

In early life he was converted to God, and became a member of the Methodist Church. While still a youth his gifts and graces impressed those with whom he was associated, and he was licensed by the Church to preach as a local preacher, in which capacity he earnestly preached Jesus during the last eight years of his life in England.

In the year 1858 he came to Canada, and entered upon the active work of the ministry. For the most part his ministerial life was spent in the eastern townships of the Province of Quebec, where he cheerfully and zealously labored on some of our most difficult Circuits and Missions for the glory of God in the salvation of men. While on the Marbleton Mission he was subjected to a greatmental and physical strain, owing to the peculiar condition of the work on that Mission, from which he never fully recovered up to the time of his death, which occurred in Kingston on the 3rd day of September, 1887.

Brother Stenning was a man of faith and prayer. His brethren, who will readily remember the unction that rested upon him in his public ministrations, as he led the people in their devotions, will not be surprised to learn that much of his time in private was spent in the study of the Bible, and in communion with God.

As a minister of the Gospel he was laborious and faithful, quick in sympathies, and especially tender and helpful in relation to the poor and degraded. His distinguishing traits of character were gentleness and extreme conscientiousness. On the 3rd day of September Brother Stenning heard the voice of God calling him out of the shadows into the light, and now we believe it is given to him, whose life had many mysteries, to know even as he is known, "in the dawning of the morning, when the mists are cleared away." Brother Stenning leaves a wife and five children, who receive the sympathy of, and find an interest in, the prayers of his brethren.

REV. WILLIAM ENGLISH.

The subject of this notice was born at Ely, Cambridgeshire, England, February 2nd, 1819. His parents, who were connected with the Baptist Church, brought him up in the fear of the Lord, and he was graciously kept from many of the common follies and sins of youth. When seventeen years of age, under the preaching of a Rev. Mr. Edwards, a Methodist minister, he was led to seek the pardon of his sins, and experienced the renewal of his nature by the Holy Ghost. He at once united with the Wesleyan Methodist Society, and in the fulness of his first love began to be useful.

His talents and zeal soon attracted attention, and he was duly authorized to exercise his gifts as a local preacher. Soon after this he resolved to devote his life to the service of God in the Church of his choice, and, with this end in view, he went to London, and took a course of training in the Theological Institution. His heart was set upon becoming a foreign missionary, and as the Fiji Islands were then attracting a great deal of attention, he offered himself to the Wesleyan Missionary Society for that mission. This, however, was not to be the scene of his life-work. Men were wanted for Western Africa, and he received an appointment on the River Gambia. It was in 1839 that he was formally received on probation for the Wesleyan ministry, and received his first appointment to the Dark Continent. At the expiration of two years he was removed, owing to impaired health, to the West India Islands. In proceeding to his new home, he spent a short time in New York, where prominent members of the M. E. Church held out to him strong inducements to remain and spend his energies in the great Republic; but love for his mother Church, and loyalty to the "old flag," outweighed all other considerations, and he went his way to his island home.

For fifteen years he exercised his ministry in the West Indies, successively and successfully laboring in St. Vincent, Tobago, Barbadoes, Demerara, Turk's Island, New Providence, and Harbor Island. Here, while stationed at Tobago, he was married to his now sorrowing widow. During his protracted stay in the Islands, he took a furlough of about a year and a half, which he spent in England, for the renewal of his strength, which the hot climate had undermined.

In 1857, feeling the need of a cooler climate in order to prolong usefulness, he came, with the consent of the Missionary authorities, to Canada, and was stationed at Napanee, Ont. He subequently labored at Bradford, London, Exeter, Morrisburg, Lyn, Granby, Dunham, Pakenham and Farnham. For nine years he held the responsible position of Financial Secretary of the District in which he resided, and 1874 his brethren honored him by electing him a member of the first General Conference of the Methodist Church in Canada. In 1879, having completed forty years of active service in the ministry, he was superannuated, and came to spend the evening of his days in Granby. Here he occasionally ministered when he was able, and as his services were required; and on the 8th of January, 1888, he preached on a neighboring circuit, for a brother who was ill, what proved to be his last sermon. He could not have chosen a more fitting text had he been sure that it was to be his last. His text was Rev. xxii., 20: "He which testifieth these things saith, Surely I Amen. Even so, come, Lord Jesus." His last illness was short come quickly.

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-a little over four days—days of great spiritual peace. His disease (bronchial congestion) threatened to be fatal within an hour when it first came on; but relief was obtained, and recovery seemed probable, when on the fourth day, the heart began to fail, and in the early dawn of Wednesday, Feb. 1st, 1888, without a struggle or a pang, he peacefully fell asleep in Jesus.

As a preacher, our departed brother was above the average. His sermons were scriptural, methodical, carefully prepared, richly experimental, and were delivered in language that was chaste, clear, and oftentimes elegant. As a husband and father, Bro. English was tenderly affectionate and indulgent, guarding with loving vigilance the interests of those whose natural guardian he was.

In the social means of grace our brother was eminently at home. His prayers were marked by great reverence, and yet by great familiarity. They abounded with apt and felicitous quotations of Scripture, and there was an unction of voice and manner that made them very impressive. Three daughters and a widow remain to cherish his memory, and, we trust, to follow in his footsteps.

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ANNIVERSARY SERVICES.

Dr. Potts, Secretary of the Educational Society, gave addresses on the subject of Education, and the progress of the University Federation scheme, especially in relation to the securing of funds for building and endowment.

RECEPTION SERVICE.

Conference opened on Friday Evening, at 8 o'clock, with the singing of hymn 684, and prayer by the Rev. Jacob Freshman.

After introductory remarks by the President of the Conference, the Secretary read the names of the young men to be received into full connexion with the Conference. The President called on four of the young men to relate their Christian experience and call to the ministry.

The Chairman called on Rev. W. H. Sparling, B.A., to read the report of the Sabbath-school Committee, after which Rev. W. G. Henderson and Rev. G. S. Eldridge, B.A., gave suitable and eloquent addresses.

Resolved,—That the cordial and sincere thanks of this Conference are due, and are hereby presented, to Rev. W. I. Shaw, M.A., LL.D., for the very efficient manner in which he has discharged the duties of President during the past year; and beg to assure him that his urbanity, fairnes, and dispatch have been not only matter of observation, but of admiration and joy, and we desire to assure him of our increased appreciation and regard, and pray that he may continue to serve the Church for many years in the arduous and important position to which it has appointed him

Resolved,—That the cordial thanks of this Conference are due, and are hereby presented, to the Rev. J. B. Saunders, M.D., for the manner in which he has discharged the arduous work of the Secretary of Conference during the past year.

Resolved,—That the very cordial thanks of this Conference be tendered to the families of this city and vicinity for their generous hospitality in entertaining the members of this Conference; and that this resolution be read from the Methodist pulpits of this city next Lord's day.

Moved by Rev. W. Scott, seconded by Rev. W. J. Crothers, M.A. and

Resolved,—That the thanks of the Conference be and are hereby presented to Rev. D. C. Sanderson and A. P. Bradley, Esq., for the valuable services rendered by them as Assistant Secretaries of the Conference of 1887.

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MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

Rev. S. Bond introduced his motion of which he had given notice, when it was ordered, on motion, that it be printed in the minutes and its discussion postponed until next Conference.

Moved by Rev. S. Bond, and seconded by Rev. T. G. Williams,

Whereas the provision of the Basis of Union, that the examination of ministerial character and qualification shall be by ministers only, still remains the law of the Church, subject only to appeal on questions of law. (See pp. 264-5, and par. 139.)

Whereas the power of the Court of Appeal extend only to determining questions of law on appeal, except only as relates to disputes on boundaries of Annual Conferences. Par. 128 (d).

Whereas the administrative powers of the Appellate Courts, referred to in paragraphs 235 and 236, are not conferred on the Court of Appeal, thereby limiting its decisions on appeals relating to questions of character to determining what the law requires, or forbids.

And whereas the Court of Appeal, in the case of Rupert versus the Guelph Conference, has decided "that the accused, having been found guilty on his own admission, the Conference had no power to alter the penalty of expulsion imposed by paragraph 229 of the Discipline; that the appeal be allowed under paragraphs 139 and 128, 3 (c); and that the minutes of the Guelph Conference be amended by entering the name of the accused, as deposed from the ministry, and expelled from the Church."

And whereas such judgment, by proceeding beyond deciding what the law requires, or forbids, to the work of administration assigned to the ministers in special session of Conference only, deeply affects the rights of ministers of all Annual Conferences by encroaching upon their rights as provided by the Basis of Union; therefore be it

Resolved,—That, while we readily concede to the Court of Appeal, as the highest interpreter of law under the General Conference, the power to declare the said Act of the Conference in placing the name of the accused in the list of those who "cease to be recognized as ministers among us," unlawful, and to declare also what the law did require, yet we regard with regret and disapproval the decision claiming the right to amend the Conference minutes, and to depose a man from the ministry and expel him from the Church, as exceeding its rights and encroaching upon the rights of the ministers in having final power in determining questions of character, and imposing specific penalties. Page 7, par. 13; par. 152, 16, 17.

Moved by Rev. W. Jackson, seconded by Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL D.,

That, in view of the far-reaching influences exerted by the teachers in the common schools of our country, the honorable position of the teachers, and the importance of the work, this Conference requests the ministers on all our Circuits and Missions to urge upon all young people in our Church, who have suitable gifts for this useful position, to devote themselves to this work which is second only to that of the Christian ministry.

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Resolved,—That a committee of three be appointed to examine and report the probable necessities and requirements which the Sustentation Fund should provide for the coming year, and report to the next Financial District Meeting.

Committee was appointed as follows: Dr. Antliff, W. Jackson, T. G. Williams.

Moved by T. G. Williams, seconded by R. Whiting,

That this Conference desires to express its great pleasure in listening to the very cheering report submitted by the Trustees of the Stanstead Weslevan College. The Conference is thankful to learn that, as the result of skilful financial management, the income of the College is equal to the current expenses. While we mourn the great loss our Church has sustained in the death of our esteemed and beloved brother, the late Rev. Dr. Kennedy, we gratefully acknowledge the guiding hand of a kind Providence in enabling us to secure the services of the Rev. Dr. Henderson to fill the very important position of Principal of this College, and affirm our fullest confidence in our beloved brother, whom we rejoice to welcome among us as one fully qualified to render the most valuable services to the educational work to which he has been appointed. We also pledge ourselves to give our most cordial support to the Rev. Dr. Henderson in his efforts to bring the Stanstead Wesleyan College to a still higher degree of success in its very important work.

MINISTERS CHANGING CIRCUITS.

Resolved,—That all the Superintendents removing from one Circuit to another be responsible for the supply of the pulpit on the Circuit they are leaving two Sundays following the rising of Conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Upon examining the returns made by the various Circuits and Missions in the Montreal Conference, your Committee is unfeignedly thankful to the Head of the Church that there has been a net increase in the membership of the Church of two thousand two hundred and forty-seven.

Great success has attended the earnest and prayerful efforts that have been made to reach the hearts and influence the lives of the young people now, in most cases, in the Christian homes of our people, or under the godly and faithful care of our Sunday-school teachers, as we now have in our membership two thousand four hundred and eighty-five young persons under the age of sixteen years.

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end zea thu dif ho' sta rec thu and The cause of temperance in our Sabbath-schools, if it has not received all the attention it deserves, has not been forgotten or overlooked, as six thousand six hundred and four scholars are returned as having taken the Total Abstinence Pledge.

With the exception of the General Conference Fund, which shows a falling off in our connexional collections, are in advance of last year, the missionary income especially showing a considerable increase; but your Committee is fully persuaded that until proportionate giving shall be the general practice of the Church, the Lord's treasury will never receive what ought to be freely cast into it, while its immediate adoption would supply abundant means to sustain and extend all her enterprises.

Continued prosperity has attended our Book and Publishing enterprises; and we trust that when the new premises on Richmond street, Toronto, are entered upon, still greater results may be achieved. The importance of a sound, healthy, religious literature in this age of general reading cannot be over-estimated. The maintenance of the Book Room in Montreal we belive to be a most important benefit to this part of the work, and we trust all our ministers and people will continue to give it a loyal and generous support.

Your Committee rejoices that the cause of Education has been promoted by the labors of another year. We are glad the Secretary of Education reports that good progress is being made in forming an Endowment Fund for Victoria College, and we trust that those who have the educational interests of our Church committed to them may be divinely guided and abundantly prospered.

The French work has shown signs of increased vitality and spirituality, and we pray that a gracious revival may soon take place upon every missionary's field of labor.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

In the history of great moral reforms we learn that hopes and fears, encouragements and discouragements, have always alternated. Earnest zeal, which is the natural fruit of strong convictions of duty and philanthrophy, is sometimes checked, not by decay of love, but by the growth of difficulty in the way of attaining our object. One of the characteristics, however, of true Christian greatness is to overcome difficulty when it stands in the way of human progress and Divine rule. To get Christianity recognized by our world as a thing which ought to exist required over three hundred years of hard battling on the part of those who loved God and their race. We regret that there still exist in our earth hindrances

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immeasurable to the complete triumph of those principles which $\cos \alpha_{ij}$ Christian fathers so much to establish. Chiefest among these hindrance in Christian lands is the liquor traffic. Much has been done in past year in Canada for the restriction and abolition of this evil. We are glad to know that the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church has been an important factor in the production of the wide spread sentiment which already prevails against the manufacture and use of intoxicating bever Her motto of past years still is, "Total abstinence for the ind ages. vidual, and total prohibition for the state." To reach this end your Committee beg to recommend:

1. That each minister throughout the Conference be requested to pread a sermon upon temperance at each appointment on his Circuit, on or about the second Sabbath in December next, and as often thereafter during the year as he may deem advisable.

2. That while we are gratified to believe that in our Sabbath-school the moral and religious grounds for total abstinence are taught, we recommend that the physical evils of alcohol also are taught, and that it be a urgent recommendation to the Sunday schools of our Conferences to estab lish in connection with the schools Juvenile Temperance Societies.

3. That the chairman be requested to inquire at the May Distric Meetings if the foregoing recommendations have been complied with.

4. That the following resolutions of last year be affirmed:

Resolved, --- "That we, the minsters and laity of this Conference, solemn pledge ourselves to oppose, by all constitutional methods, any Government political party or individual members of Parliament who shall directly a indirectly oppose the existing prohibitory legislation."

Resolved, — "That as the ultimate power of the people to influence the Legislature is found in the ballot-box, we declare our purpose by the pulpit, by the press, and by every legitimate means to inculcate the responsibility of all Christian men and good citizens to subordinate politi cal party alliances to the great work of securing the abolition of the accursed liquor traffic."

5. Your Committee beg also to recommend that immediate steps be taken to communicate with the Quebec Legislature, now in session respecting the new license bill now under consideration by that body, and that by document or deputation the Legislature be made acquainted with the views of this Conference in reference to the same.

That as the Government of the Province of Quebec has, at its present session, presented a new license law, and, as the said law contains very many provisions which are obviously in favor of the liquor interest d the province;

We do hereby protest against the provisions creating a vested interest granting to licensed persons a right to a renewal of their licenses, and depriving a majority of the electors of the right to oppose after a license has once been granted. We demand the continuance of the right d

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rivate prosecution as provided in the present license law, but refused nder the David bill.

We heartily commend the provisions abolishing grocers' licences, and multiplicity the sale of liquor to minors.

6. Your Committee beg further to recommend that a delegation, conisting of five of the members of this Conference, be appointed to repreent the Conference at the approaching Temperance Convention to be held in Montreal early in July next.

REPORT OF SABBATH-SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee are pleased to note that although there is a very light decrease in the number of schools, there is an increase of 2,998 cholars. It is an encouraging fact that there have been during the year 413 conversions, while 6,604 have taken the total abstinence pledge. Your Committee are of opinion that there is a misapprehension of the meaning of this item in the schedule—it being understood by many that t is the number who have taken the pledge during the year instead of the otal number of pledged abstainers—as out of 26,912 scholars the Comnittee think there must be more than 6,604 pledged abstainers—and would recommend that, instead of reading in the schedule "Number who ave taken total abstinence pledge," it should read, "Number of pledged bstainers in the school."

Your Committee are pleased to observe a slight increase in the numer of scholars who are learning the Catechism, but would earnestly urge he necessity of increasing the number.

There have been \$7,400 raised for Mission purposes, and for Sundaychool purposes \$10,412.08, being an increase of \$507.43 over last year.

Your Committee would respectfully direct the attention of this Conerence to the resolution of the General Conference respecting the formaion of Conference and District Sabbath-school Associations, and would aggest that Sabbath-school Conventions be held in every District during he year; and that the Chairman of the District be responsible for the olding of such Conventions, and also be required to furnish a report of he same to the next Conference.

Your Committee regret to find that out of 430 schools, 172 are not ept open during the entire year, and would urge the ministers of the onference, so far as possible, to see that all schools be kept open the hole year.

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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CONSTITUTION FOR A SUSTENTATION FUND.

To the President and Members of the Montreal Conference, now in session, in the City of Montreal, June, 1888.

HONORED BRETHREN—The Committee of ministers and laymen appointed by the Montreal Conference, held in the city of Kingston one year ago, "to prepare a permanent scheme" for a Sustentiation Fund, hereby respectfully submit the following as a

CONSTITUTION OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

1. The name of this fund shall be the Sustentation Fund of the Montreal Conference of The Methodist Church.

2. The one object of this fund shall be to supply those fields in our Home Work which are now and shall hereafter be known as "Domestic Missions," or "Dependent Circuits on Stations;" so that ministers and preachers duly appointed to those fields shall be regular claimants on the fund, and shall be entitled to supplemental grants therefrom whenever their "total income" from other sources shall actually fall below the following scale of minimum allowances, viz.:

For a single preacher on probation \$300 per annum; for a single ordained minister, \$400 per annum; for a married minister in full connexion, \$500 per annum, with \$25 for each subsequent year until his allowance reach \$600 per annum.

N.B.—The term "allowance" or "allowances" shall be understood as including only the items of ministerial support, viz., salary, board and fuel, exclusive of and in addition to any necessary charges for house-rent, horse-keeping, travelling, removals, and circuit incidentals.

3. The income of this fund shall consist of moneys raised within the bounds of our Conference: (1) By collections and subscriptions on all the various Circuits and Missions, excepting the French and Indian; (2) By such local associations as Ladies' Aid or Ladies' Home Missionary Societies; (3) By special donations.

4. The general management of the fund shall be entrusted to a Sustentation Fund Committee, composed of one minister and one layman elected by ballot by each annual district meeting, and a Ministerial Secretary-Treasurer elected by a ballot vote of the Annual Conference; and this Committee shall transact the necessary business thereof at each Annual Conference in accordance with the regulations following:

1. With a view to raising the income needed, the Committee shall annually make a careful estimate of the prospective aggregate deficiencies on dependent fields, and suggest the amount desired from each District in order to meet such deficiencies.

In making grants from the Fund the Committee shall have strict regard to the aforementioned "Scale of Minimum Allowances," and also to such actual "net deficiencies" of claimants as their Quarterly Boards

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espectively declare themselves unable to meet, and especially when the applemental grants requested are likewise recommended by the District feetings, and also any other necessitous cases recommended by the nual District Meeting.

3. Should the income of the fund in any year prove insufficient to neet the claims thereon, then the grants shall be so distributed as to nake up the allowances of claimants to the same percentage according to he aforementioned "scale;" but should there a surplus over the claims s per said "scale," it shall be carried forward, and included in the noome of the year next following.

4. A report shall be presented by the Committee to the Conference early, while in session, including a summary of business transacted, an addited statement of receipts and disbursements, and any suggestions eemed necessary in the interests of the fund; said report, as adopted by he Conference, to be published in the Minutes.

In order to secure the efficiency of this Sustentation Scheme it is also provided :

1. That each Financial District Meeting shall arrange yearly for rrying into effect such measures as the Conference may direct for raising augmenting the income of the fund.

2. That the Superintendent of each Circuit, Station or Mission, shall the treasurer for this fund on his own charge, and shall report to his hairman, as District-Treasurer, all moneys received for the fund, with ames of donors of one dollar and upwards; and the District Treasurers all make returns to the general Secretary-Treasurer, as in the case of the Missionary and Educational Funds.

Two Evangelists, Revs. D. Winter and R. C. Horner, have been boring under the auspices of the Society during the year. Cheering ports of sanctifying and soul-converting power have come from the Cirits where they have labored. The large increase of 2,272 members in e Conference during the year is in some good measure due to the earnest ad God-honored assistance given the pastors by the Evangelists. We k the Conference to give their approval to the continuation of the weiety (in case 100 members will unite with it, each becoming responsible r at least \$2.00), and the re-appointment of the Evangelists, Rev. D. inter and Rev. R. C. Horner. Respectfully submitted.

CONSTITUTION OF EVANGELISTIC SOCIETY.

1. Name.—The Evangelistic Society of the Montreal Conference.

2. Objects.—To provide Evangelists of our own Church for the assistce of pastors in revival work. 3. Membership.—Any person becoming responsible for \$2.00 towards the funds of the Society, shall be a member, and have a right to vote.

4. The Evangelists shall labor under the direction of a Committee t_0 be appointed annually by the Society, and approved by the Conference.

5. The Society shall ask the appointment by Conference of the ministerial Evangelists they may select, and shall make a yearly report to Conference of the work done by the Society during the year.

6. Appropriations for the salaries and expenses of Evangelists shall be yearly made by the Society.

7. Every Circuit upon which any Evangelist may labor, shall make earnest effort, by taking collections and subscriptions, to raise as much as possible for the funds of the Society.

8. Any Evangelist, not submitting to the direction of this Society, shall have no claim upon its funds.

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVES ON A JOINT COMMIS SION ON CHURCH CO-OPERATION RESPECTING WEAK FIELDS OF LABOR.

The Representatives of the Methodist Church on a Joint Commission charged with dealing with the subject of co-operation with the Presby terian Church within the bounds of the Montreal Conference, beg leave to submit the following records of a meeting of the said Joint Commission, held June 5th, 1888:---

At Montreal, and within the Presbyterian College, this fifth day d June, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-eight, which day and place there met at the call of the respective conveners, by agreement, the committees of the Montreal Conference of the Methodist Church, and of the Synod of Montreal and Ottawa of the Presbyterian Church in Canada forming a Joint Commission on ecclesiastical co-operation between the two Churches.

On motion, duly made and seconded, the Rev. Dr. Shaw took the chair, and opened the meeting with devotional exercises. The Rev. Prot Scrimger was appointed Secretary.

There were present: the Revs. Dr. Shaw, R. Whiting, G. McRitcha G. G. Huxtable, H. F. Bland, T. G. Williams, J. Scanlon, W. J. Jollin H. Cairns and S. Huntingdon, Messrs. S. Finlay, John Torrance, W Tees and Dr. Lavell, representing the Conference; and the Rev. Pri Scrimger, Rev. James Hastie, representing the Synod.

The minutes appointing the two committees were then read, showing that both were authorized to act on the basis of the scheme agreed up by committees of the two Churches in 1886.

After conference as to the mode of procedure, it was moved by the Rev. Prof. Scrimger, seconded by the Rev. R. Whiting, and carried:

"That this Joint Commission report to the various courts having jund diction over the arrangement of missions, that it is organized for the comsic ar su as pu

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sideration of special cases, where ecclesiastical co-operation is desirable, and invite them to lay before it such cases as they may judge proper for such consideration, with such information as they may deem necessary, as to the number of members and adherents, amounts raised for all church purposes, value and position of the church property, priority of occupancy, and any special features of the work being done, *e.g.*, the language spoken.

"That on receiving the names of any such places, with the necessary information, it shall be the duty of the Secretary of the Joint Commission to notify the proper court or committee of the other Church, and request from it any such statement as it may feel disposed to submit, before action is taken by the Commission."

For the better carrying out of this resolution, it was agreed that the Rev. T. G. Williams should be appointed joint Secretary with Rev. Prof. Scrimger.

The Commission then adjourned, to meet at the call of the Joint Secretaries, and the meeting was closed with the benediction.

EVANGELISTIC WORK AMONG THE NON-CHURCH-GOING POPULATION IN CITIES AND TOWNS.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

The Special Committee appointed to consider the resolution of Rev. H. F. Bland, beg to report as follows :---

Moved by Rev. Dr. Saunders, seconded by Dr. Robins,

1. That whereas the need of increased evangelistic and benevolent effort in our centres of population is most apparent and pressing,

We recommend the Conference to urge upon our societies in those centres of population, the absolute necessity of immediate organization for this purpose; and that our ministers be requested to call the attention of their membership to this matter at their first communion service, with a view to definite and immediate action, inasmuch as no existing organization reaches the classes that are outside the churches, and lead them up to membership in the Church of Christ.

Moved by Rev. J. T. Pitcher, seconded by G. Bishop, Esq.,

2. That this Committee recommend the Conference to appoint a minister and laymen to be a committee to register the names of all persons, male or female, who may be prepared to engage in this work, to whom application for assistance in evangelistic work may be made. All such persons so registering their names must be members of the Methodist Church, and be recommended by their own pastors and their Quarterly Boards, after certifying themselves as to the soundness of these workers in our doctrines. This resolution is intended to include aid in singing, as well as exhortation and prayer.

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Moved by Rev. Dr. Saunders, seconded by Rev. W. Jackson,

3. That we recommend the Conference to make arrangements for carrying into effect the resolution moved by Rev. H. F. Bland last year, relating to Christian nurses. (See Minutes of Conference, p. 73.)

All of which is respectfully submitted.

Maberly.—That the trustees be permitted to sell parsonage and lot, proceeds to be applied on a new parsonage in Maberly. Adopted.

NIPISSING DISTRICT.

North Bay.—We recommend that the Conference grant permission to the trustees of North Bay to sell church lots 133 and 98, village of North Bay, proceeds to be applied to purchase of new lots and the erection of new buildings for church purposes. Adopted.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF STANSTEAD WESLEYAN COLLEGE.

The Trustees of the Stanstead Wesleyan College beg to present their Annual Report, and are glad to say that, although the work of the year has been grievously interrupted by the death of the late lamented Dr. Kennedy, by which the College has suffered an almost irreparable loss, yet we feel that we are to be congratulated upon securing so promptly the services of the Rev. Dr. Henderson, to fill the vacant principalship. He has discharged his duties with great efficiency, and his administration will, we feel quite certain, be a distinguished success.

The Trustees are brought face to face with the fact, however, that adequate provision for the indebtedness of the College must speedily be made. We therefore beg to nominate the following gentlemen as a com mittee, who shall take into consideration during the year the whole finan cial condition of the Institution, and report to our next Conference: Rev Messrs. Pitcher and Cairns, Mr. Sidney Stevens, the President of the Conference, and the Secretary of the College.

The Governor reports the following statistics:—Lady boarders, 29; lady day students, 43; male students, 58; total enrolment, 130.

Seven young ladies will this year complete the collegiate course and graduate, four of them taking the degree of M.L.A., and three of them the degree of M.E.L.

We rejoice to say that the Musical Department has been conducted with unusual success, there being this year a graduating class of five young ladies, three of whom will receive diplomas in instrumental, and two in both instrumental and vocal music.

In the Commercial Department there have been in all twenty-three pupils, including five ladies. It is probable seventeen of these will complete the work required for a diploma.

Seven of our students have taken the examination required for the A. A. course.

Religious meetings, Bible classes, and interesting social gatherings have been held weekly, with the most gratifying results.

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As it is impossible to close the school year for some time yet, the Governor cannot present any financial statement that will exactly present to us the final results of the financial operations of the year. It is, how. ever, hoped that the showing will be as favorable as in the years of the past.

It will be seen that the Debt Fund shows a deficiency on Interest Account of \$230.00, and a corresponding increase in the College Debt, which now stands at \$17,623.51. Last year the deficiency amounted to \$360.30; but by a generous effort on the part of the Conference this was fully provided for, and has since been wiped out. But the revenue from the Interest Guarantee Fund is not sufficient to meet the interest charges; and so long as this is the case, a special effort is necessary to control the consolidated debt of the College, and to prevent it from becoming annually larger.

The Guarantee Fund, even though insufficient, has nevertheless thus far answered a splendid purpose, but we may remind the Board that the subscriptions of the original subscribers lapse, and will no longer be binding after the next June payment.

At the time the Interest Guarantee Fund was established, it was believed that at the expiration of the three years the College would be not only self-sustaining, but would, by its surplus revenue, be able to create a sinking fund for the gradual extinction of its indebtedness. Our expectations were not too sanguine. This position was actually reached last year. Dr. Kennedy's accounts for 1886-87, as finally audited, show that during that year the College paid off the deficiency on current expenses account of the previous year, amounting to \$279.41, and brought forward a cash surplus of \$80.36, besides a considerable amount of uncollected accounts, many of which have since been paid. And this result would no doubt have been repeated this year, but for the large additional expenses unavoidably involved in the change consequent upon the sad death of our late Principal, Dr. Kennedy.

The Trustees desire also to assure the Conference that the change suggested last year, in regard to reserving the building as a residence for young ladies, has been eminently successful, and we believe will prove still more successful in the future. Suitable and comfortable homes have been cheerfully supplied in the neighborhood for the young men, and we recommend that the same plan be continued this year.

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The reduction of fifty per cent. on the tuition charges of the children of our ministers has not been so largely made use of and appreciated as we would have expected, but we trust that our ministers will carefully examine the advantages thus presented to them, and avail themselves of them to the utmost.

The Trustees feel that they have been most fortunate in securing the services of the Rev. Dr. Henderson and his gifted wife to take charge of the Institution; and we believe that the time has come for united action on the part of our ministers and laity, and that with such co-operation the Institution may be made a grand success, and prove an ornament and a blessing to Methodism in this Province.

GENERAL CONFERENCE FUND.

Report of Treasurer for the year ending August 31, 1887, for publication in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences.

As Treasurer of the above Fund I think it important that a Report of the Fund should appear in the Minutes of the several Annual Conferences for the information of those concerned in its management and success.

An *interim* Report was sent to the Conferences last year, but as the year closes on the 31st August, this is the first regular Annual Report that could be published in the Minutes since the last General Conference.

The following are the receipts and expenditure as they stood on the 31st August, 1887:

According to the estimates of the Financial Committee of the General Conference it will require \$7,500 to meet the claims on the Fund. This, I think, is a moderate estimate in view of the expenses of the past year.

The actual amount received from the Conferences during the year is only \$1,552.33. I am aware that some of the Conferences had paid a large proportion of the collections for the then current year, just before the General Conference, but the collections for the following year should have been paid in before the 31st August. After making all due allowances, the amounts paid by the Conferences during the year were shamefully small.

If this state of things should continue till the close of the Quadrennium there will be no funds to pay the expenses of the delegates to the General Conference of 1890. The officers appointed by the General Conference are forbidden to "disburse more than the amount in hand." The question, therefore, is assuming a serious aspect, and it becomes my duty to lay the facts before the parties interested, at this early date, that they may govern themselves accordingly.

The Fund, at the close of the year, was indebted to the Treasurer \$7,921.70. It is scarcely necessary to say that this state of things cannot be continued. Some provision must be made, evidently at a very early date, to meet the expenses of the Fund. I know of no available method of doing this, unless the Conferences provide in some way for the prompt payment annually of the amounts allotted to them by the Financial Committee of the General Conference.

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MODE OF EXAMINATION FOR THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

Candidates for our Ministry and Probationers shall be examined by means of papers prepared by the respective Examiners.

There shall also be an oral examination if required.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his studies and general reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year, and at such place as the Chairman shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairman not later than the second Wednesday in April in each vear. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman District Meeting. of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and further, the standard qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conference as Probationers shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the preliminary course of study in the aggregate, and thirtythree and one-third per cent. in each subject. Also a standing of thirtythree and one-third per cent. shall be required in order to pass in each subject of the subsequent course, and the Conference directs that existing regulations relating to the time and manner of examinations be imperatively observed, and more especially that it be deemed absolutely peremptory that the examinations be held on the same day throughout the whole Conference, and that all the young men in any District writing on any given subject, write at the same hour.

In presenting this Report of the Eighth Session of the French Methodist Institute, it may be well to refer to a few facts connected with our French Educational Work generally. Although the Methodist Church was the pioneer in French Canadian evangelization, having sent the Rev. John de Putron, of the Channel Isles, to Canada in the year 1817, he was, after three or four years, induced to take up English work, and for nearly forty years nothing was attempted by the Methodist Church in this department of Christian effort.

During the long parenthesis other Churches commenced operations, and wisely combined educational with the other means of evangelization. Hence, Grande Ligne, Point aux Trembles and Sabrevois Mission Schools rose to importance. An unfortunate effort was put forth at Sherbrooke, which was fully terminated by the burning of the school building in 1883.

But the last few years have seen a cheerful change in our French Educational Work. The French Institute was originated under the superintendency of the lamented Rev. John Borland, in the year 1880.

The Woman's Missionary Society has a successful girls' school at Actonvale, and has recently established a day school in the west end of the city of Montreal.

Mission schools are being conducted at Caughnawaga among the French and Indians, and two at Oka.

At St. Jovite, for two years, a school has been taught by students of our Institute.

Our day school connected with the Institute in Montreal is still in session, with Miss A. E. Mathieu as teacher.

In the boarding department of our Institute we have received thirtyfive applications during the last session.

We have admitted but twenty-one of these as students.

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At the commencement of the session, within a week of their reception, it was found necessary to expel three.

This prompt action had a very salutary effect on those who remained, as the conduct of the remaining students was remarkably good.

Dr. J. B. McConnell has placed the Institute under further obligations by his faithful and skilful services gratuitously rendered during the year.

The illness compelled the closing of the Institute for a short time.

Some of our students came to us with very meagre attainments, though all could read either in French or English.

Of the twenty-one admitted to the Institute only two are not of French origin.

Three are at present colporting. And two more expect re-engagement in some French mission fields this summer.

One of our students sent to us at the opening of the session was intercepted by Roman Catholic relatives, and only after desperate efforts, including bringing his father from home, a distance of 200 miles, was he secured. He is one of the brightest of our pupils, and leaves us with the expectation of returning in the autumn.

Towards the end of the session one boy who had made more proficiency in the French Methodist Catechism, was taken away under false pretences by his Roman Catholic relatives, and we did not recover him.

None of our students made any objection to the study of the Catechism. The Roman Catholic boys in every case asking permission to enter the Catechism class.

Our place is very unsuitable for the conduct of a school, but we are hoping soon to see such buildings at Côte St. Antoine as shall be a credit to our Church and of great service in the work.

The site which has been secured by the Missionary Society contains ten building lots at the corner of Stayner Street and Greene Avenue. The building soon to be erected is to accommodate 100 pupils, sixty boys and forty girls. The girls' department is to be placed under the direction of the Woman's Missionary Society.

Previous to this year the school work of the Institute was left largely to the care of assistants or monitors, in consequence of the many duties of Mr. Beaudry taking him frequently out of the city.

At last Conference the services of the Rev. Ernest M. Taylor, M.A., were secured as Governor and Principal.

Mr. Taylor has no pastoral charge, and his daily attention is given to the work of the Institute.

Mr. Taylor's long experience as an educator gives new ground for hope. We trust that a large-hearted liberality will, in the immediate future, be manifested towards this very important department of our work.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF

THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

"Grace be unto you, and peace, from God our Father, and the Lord Jesus Christ." Once more assembled in our Annual Conference, in the great commercial metropolis of Canada, we turn to you with loving words of greeting, to express our unchanging regard for your welfare, to stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance, and to invite your special attention to the strategic points of our position as a Church at this time.

Coming to you in the midst of the Quadrennium we have no new legislative enactments, no changes in the constitution of the Church, to report. We have been happily absorbed in the one great business for which the Church exists-saving men and building them up in the most holy faith. In this transcendent work we have been upheld by the Master's presence and power; we rejoice with you in a good degree of success. Through the abundant blessing of God we are able to announce that we are closing a year of remarkable evangelistic activity; that a large number of souls have been converted to Christ; that after deducting all losses by death, removal and other causes, the membership of the Church, within the bounds of the Montreal Conference, has been increased by 2,247; that our beloved people have been favored with many seasons of refreshing revival, and that all the religious and material interests of the Church have been steadily advancing. We joyfully acknowledge that these victories have been won by the blessing of heaven upon your faithful cooperation, and we humbly join you in the song of thanksgiving, "Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name be the glory."

While we crave the wisdom that winneth souls, and rejoice to garner such an abundant harvest, we would earnestly remind you that the rathering of large numbers of God's "little children" into the churches imposes upon you additional responsibility. Those who are thus entering upon the new life of faith look to you, "fathers" and "young men in Christ," for warm sympathy and pure example. By a brotherly concern for the young converts; by faithful attendance upon the class and prayer-meetings; by raising up in every congregation leaders competent to watch over souls; by the skilful consolidation of the work among the young ; by entering the Sabbath-school, either as teachers or learners ; by strengthening the bonds that unite the Sunday-school to the deepest and most mature spiritual life of the Church ; by graduating the scholars from the Sunday-school, through the catechumen and the society classes, to the Lord's Table and the full communion of saints, you will do much to retain in the fold of Christ the vast majority of those promising young persons who are moved to repentance and faith by our evangelistic agencies. If you love the Lord Jesus Christ, you will feed His sheep and His lambs.

We would further admonish you to maintain a warm and vital per-

While you take an intelligent interest in the sonal and family religion. public life of the Church, do not neglect the cultivation of your own vine. yards. Upon the heart and the home altars let the sacred fire burn bright and unquenchable. In private prayer, in the perusal of the Holy Scrip. tures, in the pursuit of holiness, in using all the appointed means of grace, and in shunning every appearance of evil, keep alive the flame of devotion. Let it be your daily habit to assemble your households for family worship, allowing neither business nor pleasure, nor any influence whatever to in. terfere with this delightful and profitable exercise of the Christian home. In times when certain sports and pastimes engross so disproportionate a share of public and popular attention, we trust you will not suffer any insidious form of worldly amusement to encroach upon your time, and unfit you for the highest and holiest duties of religion. When we consider that the Christian man's value as a worker in the world depends upon his personal holiness, and that no outward activity can compensate for the lack of close communion with Christ, we are the more urgent in pressing upon your attention the prime necessity of vital godliness in the economy of the Christian Church.

Intimately connected with the maintenance of the higher life is a pure In this age of cheap and multifarious reading, there is need literature. for a careful and judicious selection. You will wisely place in your homes such books and periodicals as are not only free from all taint of moral poison, but also, by their harmony with pure and undefiled religion, thoroughly adapted to promote the growth of an intelligent and manly Chris-With unfeigned satisfaction, we recommend the publicatian character. tions of the Methodist Book Room, where you will find a supply of all those books which have proven most helpful in unfolding the most beautiful and exemplary lives of our good and great men. We trust you will be constant readers and patrons of the religious journals published under the sanction of the Church, especially the Christian Guardian. No secular newspaper, however invaluable in its own sphere, can supply the want of our own denominational organ, to the progressive and liberal-minded The better you are informed concerning our operations. church member. the more confidently will you support the schemes of the Church.

Among the philanthropic schemes of the Church, the missionary enterprise has a first claim upon your generous co-operation. The motto given us for the present year is, "A revival on every Circuit, and a quarter of a million for missions." This transcendent movement is in exact harmony with our history and genius. For this let your prayers be ever fervent, let your contributions be ever cheerful, and let not your enthusiasm diminish as the romantic age of missions slowly fades away. You may safely confide in the management of this branch of our work. The movement toward economy, on the home mission field, by the union of small congregations of different churches under a common pastorate, deserves your study. We challenge your deepest sympathy with our French-Canadian Mission, which lies within the bounds of this Conference. The slow progress of this Mission, the stupendous obstacles placed in its path, the paucity of laborers properly qualified for this difficult field, and the overshadowing influence of Romanism upon the present and future prosperity of this Province, demand undaunted faith, and patience and hope. Since, in the evangelization of this people, the Church and the school are both found r d

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necessary, we look to you to sustain any and all institutions founded to disseminate the light of Christian knowledge, and a pure Gospel among our French fellow-countrymen.

Suffer, at this point, one word upon our Educational work in general. Our schools of learning, by the excellent service which they have rendered to the Church and country, still claim your support and patronage. During the coming year, in all likelihood, you will be called upon to contribute to the endowment of the University of Victoria College, prior to the completion of the scheme of confederation with the Provincial University at Toronto. The Albert College at Belleville, and the Stanstead Weslevan College, open their doors for the instruction of your sons and The Wesleyan Theological College in Montreal continues its daughters. good work in training young men to go in and out among you as devout and capable ministers of the New Testament. In all these departments of education we report progress, and we shall continue to confide in the lovalty of our people to our own institutions of learning, believing in the union of knowledge and vital piety.

In the leading social movements of the age we rejoice to behold you marshalled on the side of truth and righteousness. Most prominent among these movements is the Temperance reform. The problem of intemperance, as the most malignant enemy of Christian civilization, still presses for solution. The most deadly antagonist of the Church is the The results of the liquor traffic are the most fatal hindrances to saloon. The bugle-blast is heard louldly calling our work of redeeming men. every Christian man to arm himself for this conflict. The recent repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in several counties confirms the conviction of many that this is only a tentative measure. It now remains to discover and adopt the broadest and most statesmanlike policy, to enter upon the final campaign against the hideous vice, to utterly abolish and destroy this pernicious liquor system, and thus confer an inestimable blessing upon the generations yet unborn. This battle may be long; some of us may be scorched in the flames; some may be slandered by the foe; some may be misunderstood by our friends; we may, ere the contest is ended, become involved amid the carnage of the dread Armageddon of these latter days; but the Methodist Church will throw the whole weight of its influence and energy into the scale, on behalf of this great reform-"For God and home and native land."

In conclusion, we would gently exhort you to cherish a steadfast loyalty to the ecclesiastical system of polity and doctrine in which you have There are not wanting, in these days, some persons to been taught. trouble our Israel with fables "which no man ever has or can prove." We hope to commend our ministry to you by its apostolic order, sanctity Those young men whom we send forth to you, "with the layand zeal. ing on of the hands of the presbytery," you will lovingly receive as the ministers of Jesus Christ, duly qualified and called. And we are persuaded, brethren, that, shining as lights in the world, by holy and beautiful lives, and by constant activity in the cause of God and humanity, you will demonstrate the apostolic origin and authority of that ministry which has instrumentally led you into the Church of Jesus Christ.
