Petrograd, June 11-Suddenly assuming the offensive, the Russian forces in Galicia, south of Lem berg, have defeated the Austro-German forces upon the Dniester River, capturing 6,500 men, 188 officers

Official announcement of the victory was made by the Russian War Office today. The Austro-German army of General Von Linsengen has been driven back across the Dniester the Russians, and the Austro-German drive against Lemberg from the south has been checked.

Geneva, June 11—A despatch to the Tribune from Innsbuck says:

The Russians bombarded the Austrian positions from Stanislau to Berlank on the left bank of the Dniester. They have driven the Austrians across the eiver, making a large number of prisoners. The Austrians have also been obliged to fall back across the Dniester at Bukazowice. The Russians stopped the advance of an Austrian column marching on Kolomea. 



"It is simply hell out here. The dead are lying in heaps, many of them lying unburied since October. The Germans have even built shields with the bodies.



THAT PEARY SAW? McMillan Says it Was Mirage

or Illusion - Could Find No

New York, June 10—Whether or not Crocker Land, which Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary believed he saw at a distance when in the Arctic regions north of the western part of the American continent is a myth, an illusion and a mirage is the subject of discussion among scientists. The argument arose over a letter from Donald B. Macmillan, now in the Arctic regions at the head of an expedition sent there to assertain whether Crocker Land really existed. In a letter to The New York Pribune, Mr. MacMillan said that Crocker Land does not exist, but that from the heights of Cape Thomas Hubbard and for several days on the Polar Seathere was every appearance of an immense tract of land with hills and snow capped peaks in the northwest. As they marched toward it, Mr. MacMillan reported it shifted its location, and eventually disappeared.

marched it shifted its location, and eventually disappeared.

Dr. Henry F. Osborn, president of the American Museum of Natural History, one of the institutions which supported the MacMillan expedition, was quoted as saying: "It seems to have been demonstrated clearly that there is no land there." Dr. Osborn said that Rear-Admiral Peary did not claim to have actually discovered the land, but that from the data he furnished in regard to the probability of its being there it seemed quite likely that he was right. "It is apparent in MacMillan's letter, that he saw the same mirage that Peary noticed," said Dr. Osborn.

Herbert L. Bridgeman said that Rear-Admiral Peary recently repeated to him that he saw what he believed to be land. 'Admiral Peary said to me several times before, 'I never say that a thing is land until I have my foot on it," added Mr. Bridgeman. Bridgeman.

Rear-Admiral Peary was at his summer home on Eagle Island off the Maine coast, and his views on the MacMillan report could not be obtained.






