U.S. To Have 183 Speedboats To Hunt Rum-Running Vessels

BIG ARMED FLEET WILL BLOCKADE ATLANTIC COAST

First of New Vessels Will be in Operation This

COST \$25,000 EACH

One-Pounders, Rifles and Lewis Machine Guns to be Carried.

New York, Oct. 29 .- The first of a fleet of 183 gian illicit liquor trade off shore has arrived at the United States Barge Office at the Battery and

The new boats have a speed of 30 knots. Each is equipped with three one-inch rifles and a complement of Lewis machine guns. They are stocked liberally also with small arms, including rifles and pistols, and are prepared in every way to enforce the prohibition blockade.

The new boats will practically all be in operation in time to sweep the seas and enforce an actual blockade against rum-runners during the Christmas holidays when the liquor smuggling trade is briskest. The new speed boats are manned by members of the Coast Guard.

Already three destroyers, manned by members of the Coast Guard are hatrolling the waters off Montauk Point, L. L., where bootleg and rum-running activities are reported recently to have come to a standstill.

The aew speedboats in the prohibition service are being built at a cost of \$25,000 each. They are equipped with radio apparatus for transmission and receiving. Tests are now being made to determine with what success the new boats will be able to use both telephone and telegraph instruments in message transmission. Because of these tests, it was explained, the first of the new boats probably will not be sent on patrol duty off Atlantic City before the end of this week.

The new boats are classified as the CG-100, They are equipped with special commission of neutrals which will investigate the problem as a whole and make recommend elsewhere. He will assume office next week. It is understood his salary will be \$15,000 a year.

Mounties Kill Immigrant Who Shot

At One In Resisting Arrest

Winnipeg, Oct. 29—Escaping from custody after being arrested on last Monday by immigration authorities at Emerson for illegal entry into Canada, John Pearson, a Swedish laborer, 28 years old was later shot and instantly killed by constables of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police when at the police of a revolver he resisted their efforts to apprehend him.

Pearson was just about to cross the border into the U. S. when Constables J. H. Gabert and F. G. Lopper, of the R. C. M. P., who followed him in a car, sighted him and challenged Pearson to surrender. Constable Gilbert percached him with extended hands to indicate that he was unarmed. The fugitive in turn drew his revolver and fired point blank at the constable's head. The bullet missed its mark. Gilbert, drawing his own revolver, fired a full round at Pearson. Lopper also opened fire and Pearson fell dead.

SUN RAYS FOR THE SICK, THOUGH THE SUN OBSCURED

London, Oct. 29.—Artificial sunray treatment was one of the many novelties shown to doctors at the recent British Medical Exhibition. It was shown how patients who needed the valued rays of the sun may become sunburnt even in the dullest weather. The apparatus for producing the sunray is a hemispherical aluminum reflector and a silica mercury vapor lamp, and it is so adjusted that, when the arc of light is directed upon the patient, a characteristic sunburn appears in four to six hours.

This, of course, is produced by the rays penetrating the tissues, and it is asserted that it is as efficient in many respects as sunlight, and that exact doses of sunlight can be measured out. There were tabloids for all the diseases which can be cured, and the latest in tabloid form is insulin.

The question already has been brought before the Crimean Councie of Commissars, who regard the matter favorably.

The Crimea has huge stretches of free land and the question of colonization has for a long time been discussed by the Crimean Government. The Crimean Tartars themselves are peaceful and rather favor the Jewish element as neighbors, considering them sober and industrious. A hundred thousand families it is expected, will be able to rettle in the Crimea during the most few years as a result of the presennegotiations.

Absence of funds is the only drawback to the great scheme, as the Government is unable to find funds to put the land in a condition suitable for immediate settlement. Jewish organizations are looking to their American friends to come to their relief.

Meantime the Ukraine Government has apportloned 80,000 acres of land in the Ekaterinoslav district, where 3,000 Jewish families will move this spring, thanks to the support of the American Joint committee, which has advanced a loan of \$100,000 to carry out the plan. Similar Jewish agricultural colonies will be organized in Kherson and
