The Papal Princess, whose title was bestowed by Pope Benedict XV., was formerly Sallie Britton of St. Louis, and later the wife of State Senator James Mackin of New York. After the death of her husband she was converted to the Catholic Church and was received with special honors at the Eucharistic Congress in Paris in 1908. She was an intimate friend of Cardinal Vanuitelli's niece, and the entree she obtained to the Vatican was said to be largely due to the cardinal's influence.

Being a beautiful woman and reputed to be wealthy, hardly a year went past that she was not reported to be engaged to some member of the nobility of France or Italy, but she always denied the rumors and never married after Senator Mackin died. At one time she was reported to be engaged to the Duke del Monte.

The residue of the estate, the value of which is not given, is left in trust for the support and maintenance of her nephew, Robert L. Nisbet of White Plains. The Princess was 78 at her death.

Judge Crocket spoke as a lay member of the executive of the Presbyterian Church Association to voice his earness and confirmed disaproval of the so-called Church Union movement, and what tens of thousands of Presbyterians regarded as an unjust coehcive legislation by which its promoters wished to establish it. He dealt with the various clauses of the Enabling Bill, explaining that it would blot out of existence in Canada the three churches, Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational, as it was the intention of the promoters that it should. Further it would set up a new and independent church which would have a name that was an implied falseñood, "The United Church of Canada." The name was as presumptuous as it was fictious, he deelared, as there was no attempt to unite all the churches in Canada. The Bill would further invest all the property of the trace churchs in a new church, giving to its general council the control of funds which had been provided for the teaching of Presbyterian doctrines in Presbyterian colleges. These funds, if the Bill were enacted, would be used for teaching the new church.

That clause should interest every free citizen he considered, as if it passed it laid down the principle that religious belief and conviction were subject to parliamentary control. He would not object to the members who wished to withdraw to form a new church doing so, but by the clauses providing that six months after its enactment on a majority vote any congregation might withdraw and in the meantime the Presbyterian church would have been swept out of existence. By far the largest number of cases in defective hearing result from the conditions brought about by inflammation of the mucous membrane of the nose and pharynx. Adenoid in the nasopharynx is another chief cause. Especially is this true in the time of childhood and youth.



### HE FEARS END OF **COLLEGE FOOTBALL**

Dr. Paton, Princeton, Speaks of the Growing Spirit of Semi-Professionalism.

Princeton, Nov. 26.—Unless the semi-professional spirit that permeates intercollegiate football today is checked the game will reach the point at which it will have to be abolished within a few years, Dr. Stewart Paton, professor of neurobiology in Princeton University, said here today. Dr. Paton lays most of the blame to the insistent demands of alumni, although he believes the faculties are also at fault for dodging the issue. He feels that the presidents' agreement among Princeton, Harvard and Yale was a step in the right direction, but that it did not meet the issue.

"Football when played by amateurs and in the spirit of amateurs has many excellent characteristics and deserves a high rank among athletic games," said Dr. aton. "But unfortunately we have not been able to retain the amateur spirit. The semi-professional spirit which permeates the sport is having a marked effect upon colleges and universities.

"The initiative in the matter of or-
