



# Lord Peel, India's Secretary, Approves Sukkur Gorge Plan

New System of Canals on Banks of the Indus Contemplated in Engineering Project for River's Irrigation.

London, April 15-(By mail)-Lord Peel, the Secretary of State for India. has finally approved of the Sukker barrage scheme, says The London 'Times' Simla correspondent.

From time to time during the last

From time to time during the last seventy years projects for control of the Indus for irrigation purposes by means of a barrage or weir to be built across the gorge at Sukkur have been drawn up, hotly debated, and abandoned. The engineering experts who opposed these schemes all feared that artificial obstruction would cause the liver to change its course and desert artificial obstruction would cause the river to change its course and desert the Sukkur George altogether. Another point of contention was whether the barrage should be constructed before the new canals through which it was to benefit the land, or whether the canals should be constructed before the barrage. A third was whether the barrage should be built above or below the gorge.

Eventually, in 1920, a scheme was Eventually, in 1920, a scheme was elaborated with the object of meeting all the objections raised, and was sanctioned by Mr. Montagu, Secretary of State for India, subject to reconsideration of the financial prospects. While all the experts at the disposal of the Government approved the scheme, the critics were not satisfied, and they have not ceased to predict disaster and press for a reconstruction of the whole project.

The cost of carrying out the whole scheme, which is said to be the largest work of its kind in the world, is estimated at about £18,500,000, of which work of its kind in the world, is estimated at about £18,500,000, of which £3,500,000 will be required for the barrage itself. Mr. Montagu stated in Parliament in August, 1921, that the completion of the scheme would bring into cultivation an area, roughly speaking, the size of Wales which is now more or less desert. Past efforts to grow Egyptian and American cotton in Sindi have been unsatisfactory owing to the uncertainty of the water supply. The barrage is intended to provide an assured and ample supply, not only in the flood season but all the year round, and the value of one year's crops for the areas, largely cotton, produced with the irrigation anticipated under the scheme, is estimated at £15,000,000 to £20,000,000.







# To Reopen Diamond **Cutting Works Soon Britain Now Plans**

Plant, Started to Give Employment to Ex-Soldiers, and Closed by Depression, to Be

London, April 20.—(By Mail)—"I understand that an important decision has been arrived at by the cabinet as a result of which it is confidently hoped that the diamond cutting works for disabled soldiers at Brighton will be reopened in the very near future," writes a "London Times" correspondent.

dent.

It will be remembered that during the war the late Sir Bernard Oppenheimer created a new industry in this country by opening a diamond cutting factory at Brighton. In July, 1907, he submitted to the principal of the Brighton Technical College his scheme for employing disabled ex-soldiers and the work was begun soon after in an extensive building on the Lewes Road. By 1920 the factory had grown considerably and branches were started. By June, 1921, about two thousand men were employed and hundreds of thousands of pounds' worth of brilliants from the factory had been sold. The average earnings after two years' experience were over £5 a week, and the filling of vacancies was arranged by the Minister of Labor. Later, however, the abnormal business "slump" in the diamond trade and the death of the criginator of the idea brought the enterprise to an end and the factory, was closed at the beginning of the year.

Since then strenuous efforts have been made by the Minister of Labor and others interest in the project to secure a reopening of the factory, which at the time it closed its doors, was employing about two hundred and fifty disabled soldiers. The two Dutch experts who had been employed as managers of the factory reported that the yhad little doubt that the factory could do the work quite as well as it had been done in Amsterdam, with its centuries of tradition begind it, and that the stones cut at the Brighton factory could be disposed of in the foreign markets, and particularly New York, without the slightest difficulty. The value of the factory buildings was put at £70,000, and it was announced in March that a scheme had been arrived at which, with a comparatively small government guarantee, would save the situation. The proposal was that the whole of the factories and plant should be transferred to guarantee a debenture issue to be secured on all the assets.

This proposal was recently submitted to the Cabinet by the Minister of Labor, and it is now understood that the Cabinet has agreed to guarantee the amount required, subject to the fulfilment of certain conditions which will protect the taxpayer, and which, it is felt, there will be little difficulty in adopting. Directly the conditions laid down by the Cabinet have been agreed to, it will be possible to reopen the factories and to find immediate employment for 250 disabled men.

Berlin, April 15.—(By mail.)—Foreign tourists, especially those from North and South America, are so wearled and annoyed by the passport, police and housing regulations in Germany that only the most resolute are remaining in the German cities. The influx of outsiders is so slight that the German press, backed by complaining hotelkeepers, merchants, restaurant keepers and theatre managers, is criticizing the central government for the difficultties it has played in the way of obtaining passport vises and the municipal government for its heavy tax on foreigners and the exacting police regulations.

ist agencies no longer refer visitors to hotels, but send them to boarding houses. Only wealthy visitors can afford to live in hotels.

In Hamburg and Bremen there is as much complaint aabout overcharges in hotels as there is in Berlin. During the recent Leipzig Fair American buyers were charged such extortionate hotel rates that many of them left in disgust without making any purchases. The troubles of foreigners begin when they attempt to get vises to enter Germany. For a time only persons with documents proving they were coming for business reasons were granted permission. Students and tourists who desired to visit Germany were curtly refused. Complaints poured in from Americans in London, Paris, Rome and Vienna who had come to Europe with the intention of visiting Germany, but who had failed to get vises in New York before leaving.

There apparently has been some relaxation in the vise policy. Business men now realize that by requiring for eigners to limit their stay in German cities and by preventing others from entering the financial situation has been made worse than ever. Prices on practically all manufactured articles in Germany were up to the world level, so there was no reason to keep visitors out on the ground that they would profiteer if admitted.




