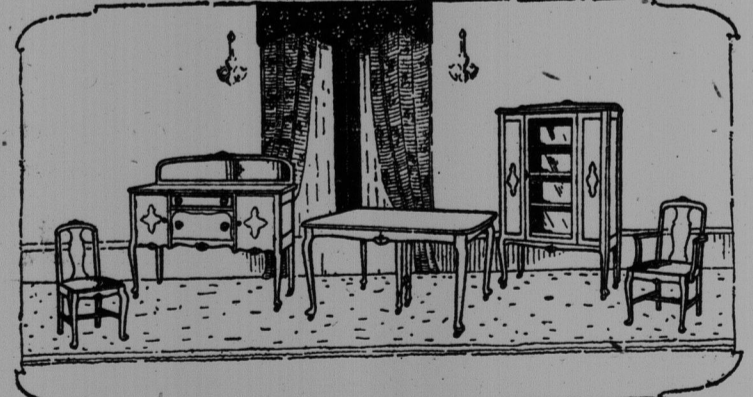

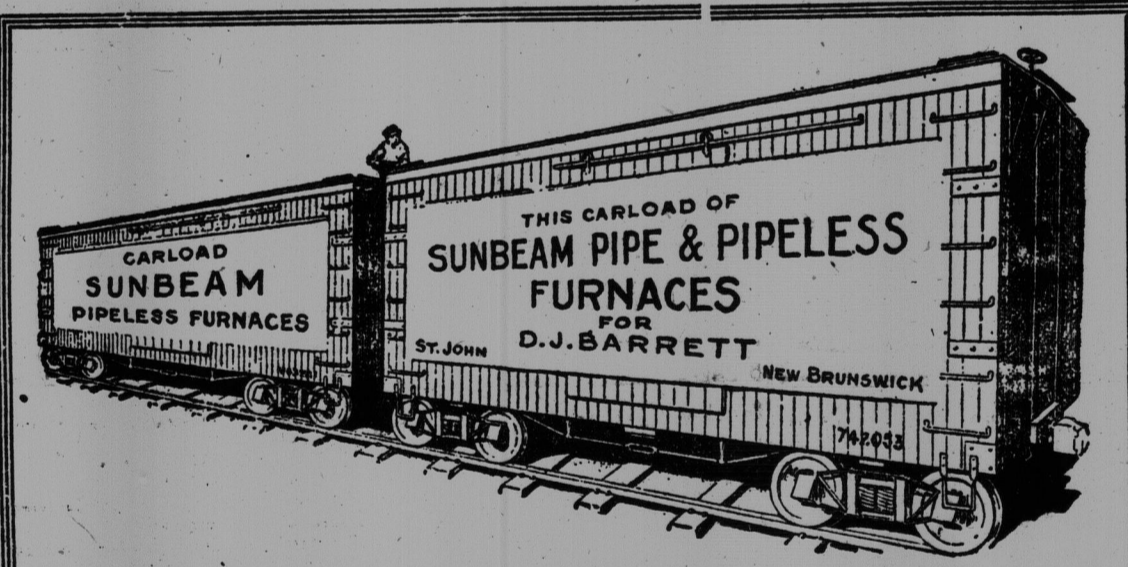

**Rule of Neutrality Shown in Animal Life by Scientist**

Johannesburg, April 10.—(By Mail.) "Far too much has been made of the old tooth-and-claw theory of nature," said Professor J. Arthur Thomson, in a lecture quoted by "The Johannesburg Star."

Professor Thomson thought that no matter what had done anything like justice to the way in which creatures worked or no immediately profitable or pleasurable end, but for the good and safety of their progeny, of their kind and race.

His lecture was concerned with "The Drama of Animal Life" and first he drew a vivid picture of the changing stage on which the drama was played out: the smoking, hot, cindery crust of the earth, an impossible home for any living creature; then the water vapor condensing into depressions; then the making of a great sea, teeming with microscopic organisms—the primeval flora and fauna; then the dry land appearing with the budding of life from the sea to the land. The life that appeared was not a blackout at the pivot of its drama was love and hunger.

From his great knowledge of the ways of living things—a knowledge that ranges easily from the white to the black—Dr. Thomson told stories illustrating these two aspects of the drama of animal life: the ant-lion trapping its prey; the blackcock and their love jousting; the courtship of the fireflies; the staid dancing and anticking for the amusement of the migrating larks; the time should come to jump in and seize his prey.

He also told the wonderful story of the migration of eels, and of the leaf-cutting ants. These ants for many years have been known to go out in unburdened squads and to come home in squads, every member of which brought a certain piece of leaf bitten from a tree. Only recently, Dr. Thomson said, had the use of the leaves been discovered. An ant-hill was broken open, and it was found that the ants were chewing the leaves into a paste. On the heaps of paste grows a particular kind of fungus, quite unknown elsewhere, on which the ants live. When the queen ant flies away to start a new community she takes a pile of the fungus underneath her chin, so that on the chewed leaves in the new home she may start a new growth.

**British Angler Has Trout in 2 Years in Converted Fishery**

"Very few anglers need despair of the possibility of setting up a productive trout fishery on their holdings—always provided that there is a spring, or even a mere trickle of running water to be found thereon," says Harding Cox writing in "The London Daily Mail."

"No need either for despair should the supply dry up occasionally so long as it is renewed from time to time. I have in mind a certain ditch which meandered through a certain property situated in one of our home counties. On an average it was not more than two or three yards wide throughout its length, but in its extreme southerly limit it ran through a miniature valley or depression which most conveniently lent itself to the purposes contemplated. For the most part of the year a trickle of water was supplied by a spring which rose in the centre of an adjoining wood.

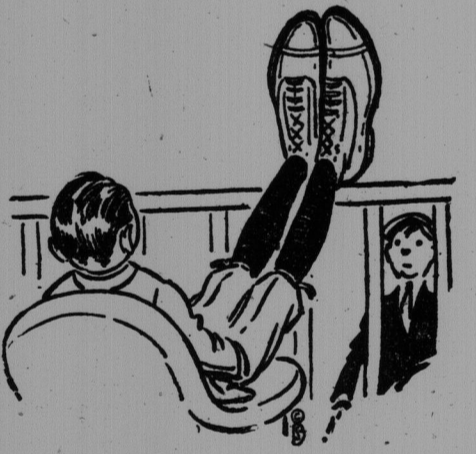

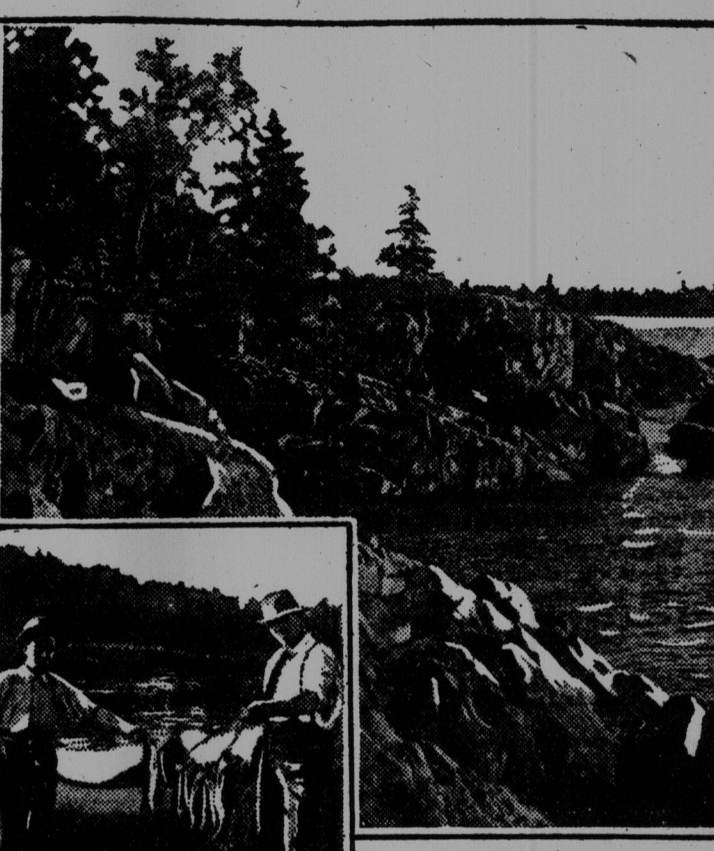

## Half The Cost Of Memorial Raised

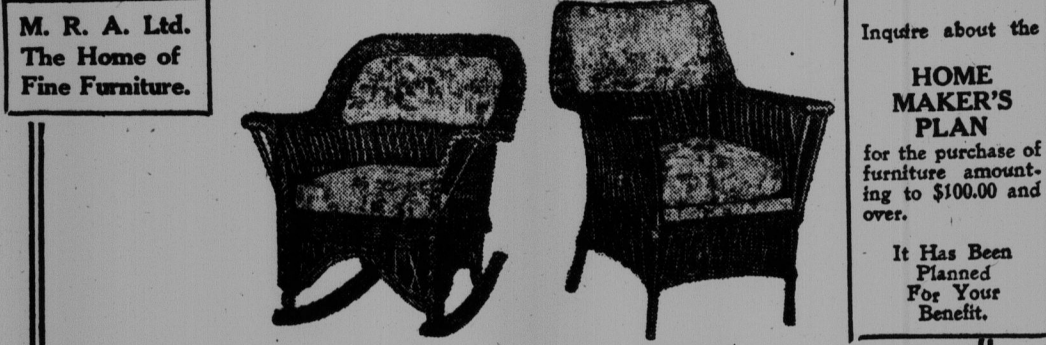

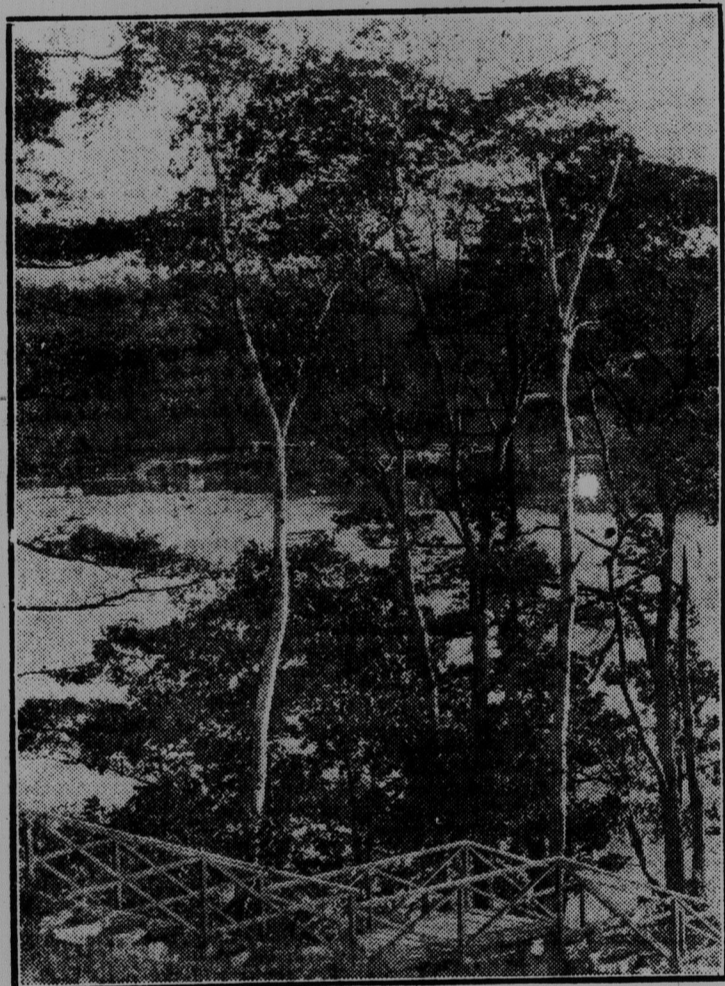

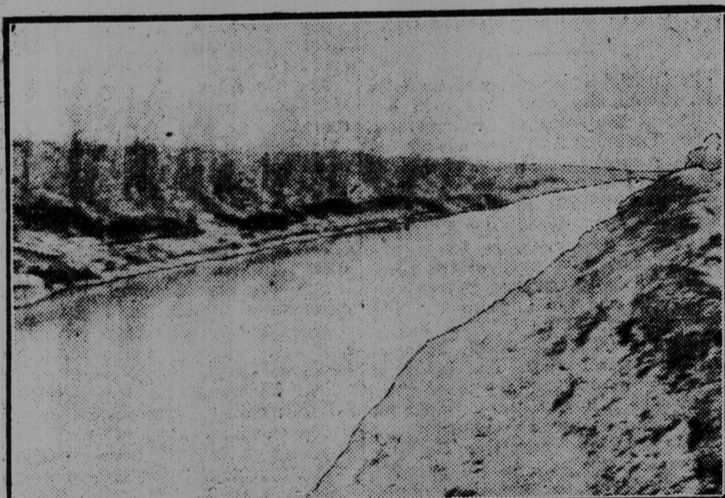

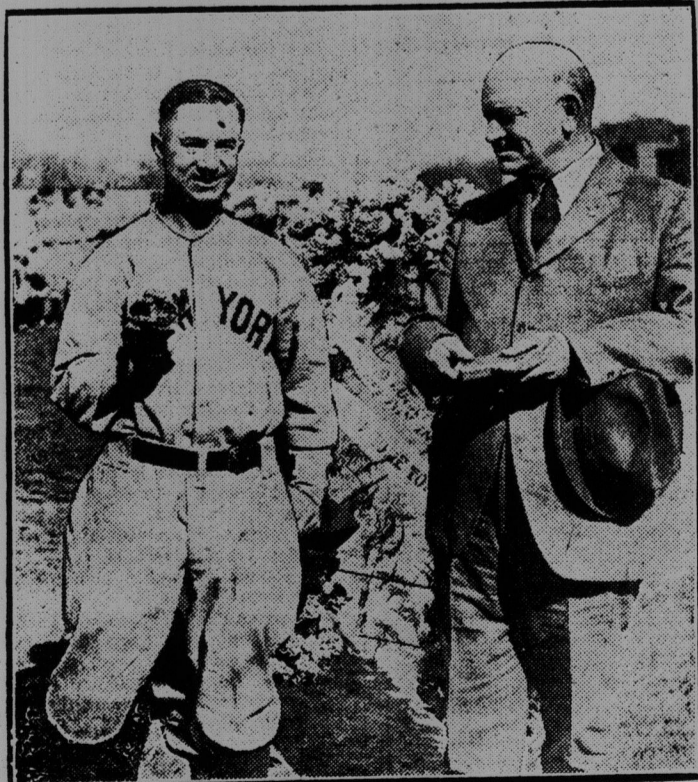

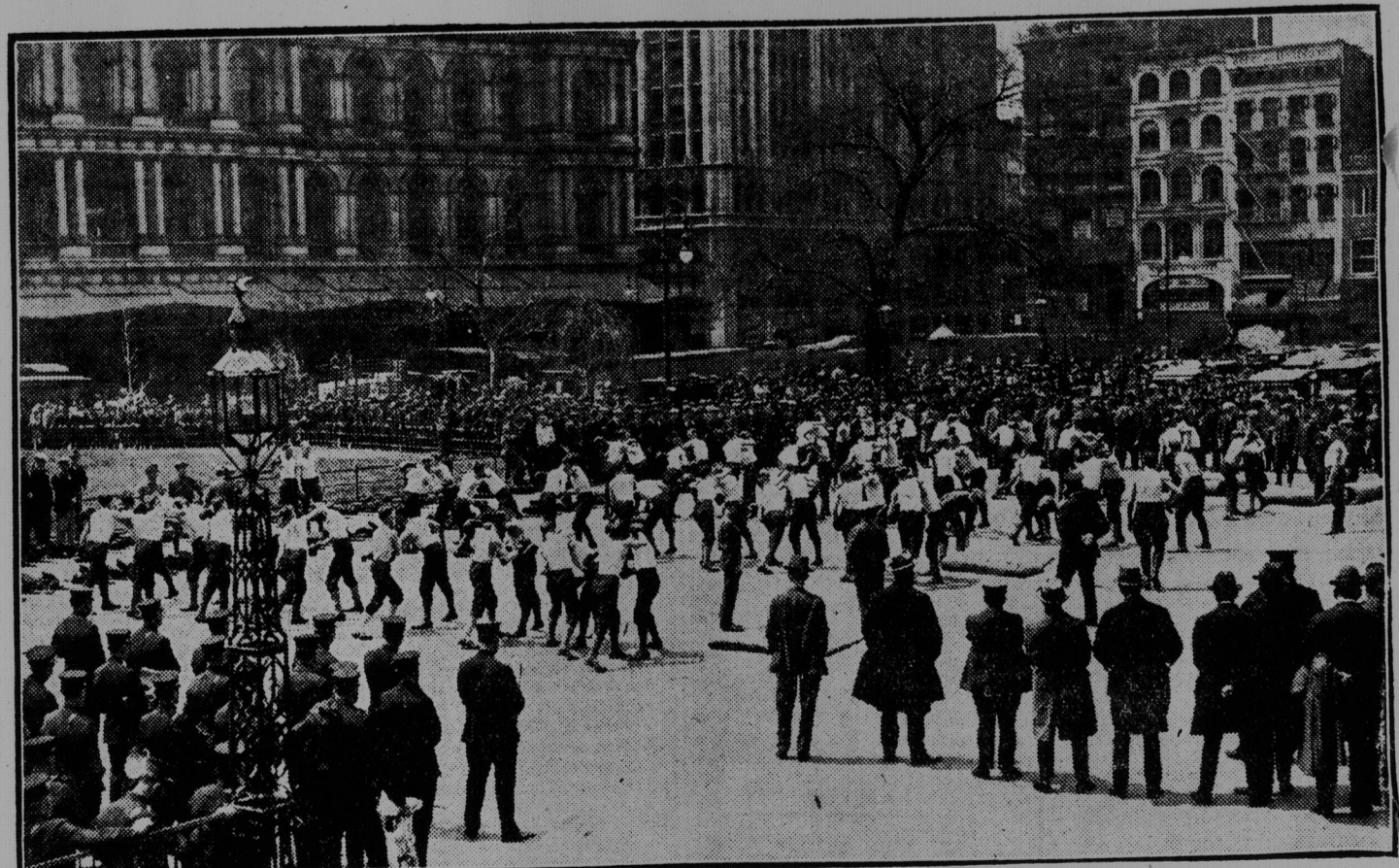

Berlin, April 15.—(By Mail).—Foreign tourists, especially those from North and South America, are so worried and annoyed by the passport, police and housing regulations in Germany that only the most resolute are remaining in the German cities. The influx of outsiders is so slight that the German press, backed by complaining hotelkeepers, merchants, restaurateurs and theatre managers, is criticizing the central government for the difficulties it has imposed in the way of obtaining passport visas and the municipal government for its heavy tax on foreigners and the exacting police regulations.

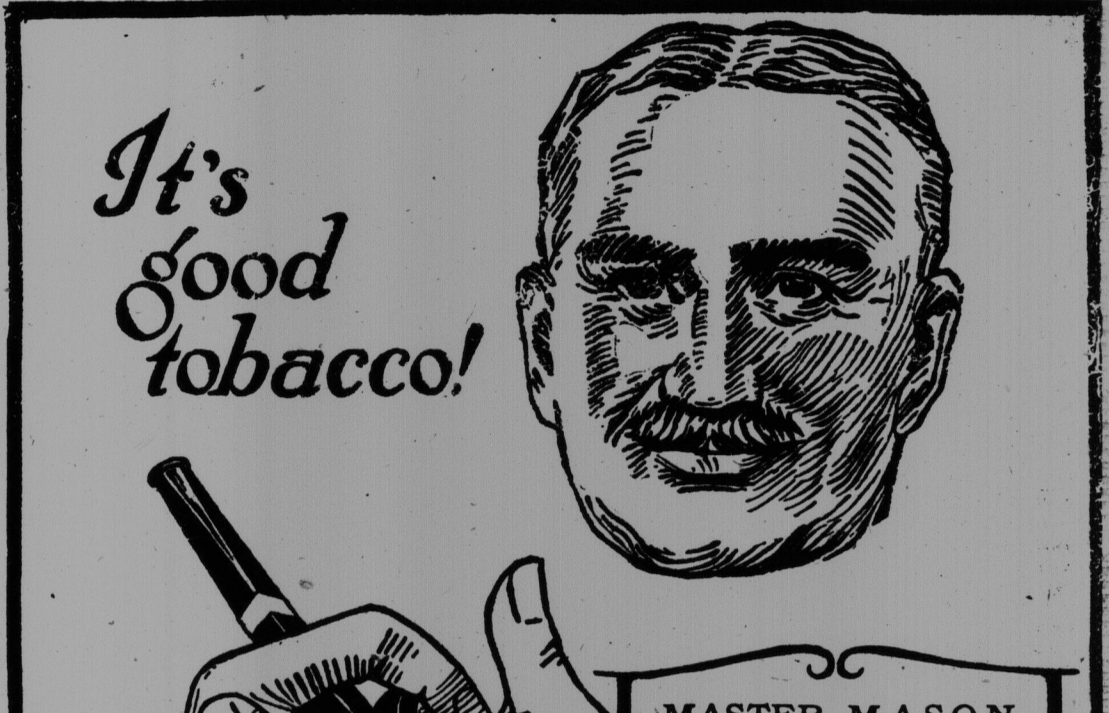

### MR. THORNTON AGAIN HOLDS UP HYDRO BOND ISSUE

#### Votes Against Bond Issue for Distribution System

#### All Other Commissioners Favor It—Repairs to Ferry Approach Authorized—Bond Issue for New Ambulance.

The programme of power at cost was interrupted again yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the Common Council when Commissioner Thornton refused to vote for the bond issue of \$63,746.04. This was a recommendation from the power commission that the tender of the Stephen Construction Company, Limited, for the construction of the system on a unit basis be accepted by the Mayor and the other commissioners were in favor. It was decided to spend \$25,000 on repairs to the north wing of the West Side ferry flats. Mr. Thornton was given authority to purchase a new motor ambulance.

The first recommendation from the power commission concerned the award of the contract for the construction of the distribution system to the Stephen Construction Company, Limited. Mr. Thornton voted against the tender, which was below the Kribs estimate. The Snooks' tender, which did not include the item for guy wires, was \$66,000, while the Flood tender was for \$77,000.

Mr. Thornton said he had looked Mayor Fisher for a detailed statement respecting the amount of \$10,000 voted some time ago for the construction of the distribution system. Mr. Thornton wanted to know why the commission was depending on Mr. Kribs. He had an expert now in the person of Mr. Yates and he presumed that he had sufficient ability to draw up an estimate.

Mr. Thornton said he would like to know how long it would take to do this. Mr. Yates replied that it would take from six weeks to two months to do the work properly. The engineer, he explained, had used the Kribs estimate in figuring and in checking the work. He thought it wise to follow the Kribs estimate.

Commissioner Frink said that if he asked him on the street "how much the power commission had expended to date," he said, "I don't know." Mr. Thornton moved an amendment that the motion lie on the table until the information was furnished him.

Commissioner Wignome said he could not see how that information was connected with the tender. The council, he pointed out, had voted all bond issues for the construction of the system. He said that he had read which showed that to date the sum of \$228,000 had been expended by the Commission, including the sub-station.

Women do get blamed for all sorts of things. Now it's the barbers' strike, or, if one is a stickler for precision, the bobbers' strike. Nevertheless, down on Broome Street and the Bowers they are one and the same thing.

John Arena will tell you about it. He owns an aristocratic parlor at 160 Broome Street, which used to be the place where all the sweller gents went. Now, he says, it's the place where all the swell ladies go as well, in consequence of which he has had to learn all the intricacies, not only of shearing off tresses but the psychology located under those tresses. He says he used to have some leisure, but what with the women his leisure has been cut as short as the hair.

They all have the same complaint. Even over in the Brownsville section of Brooklyn barbers walked out, ostensibly for more pay, something for which people have walked out before, but in reality because the female of the species has been so trying on the nerves of the barber. Before the day is over it is expected that more than 1,000 harassed members of the profession will be idle.
