MARCH GAVE TORONTO ITS COLDEST WEATHER

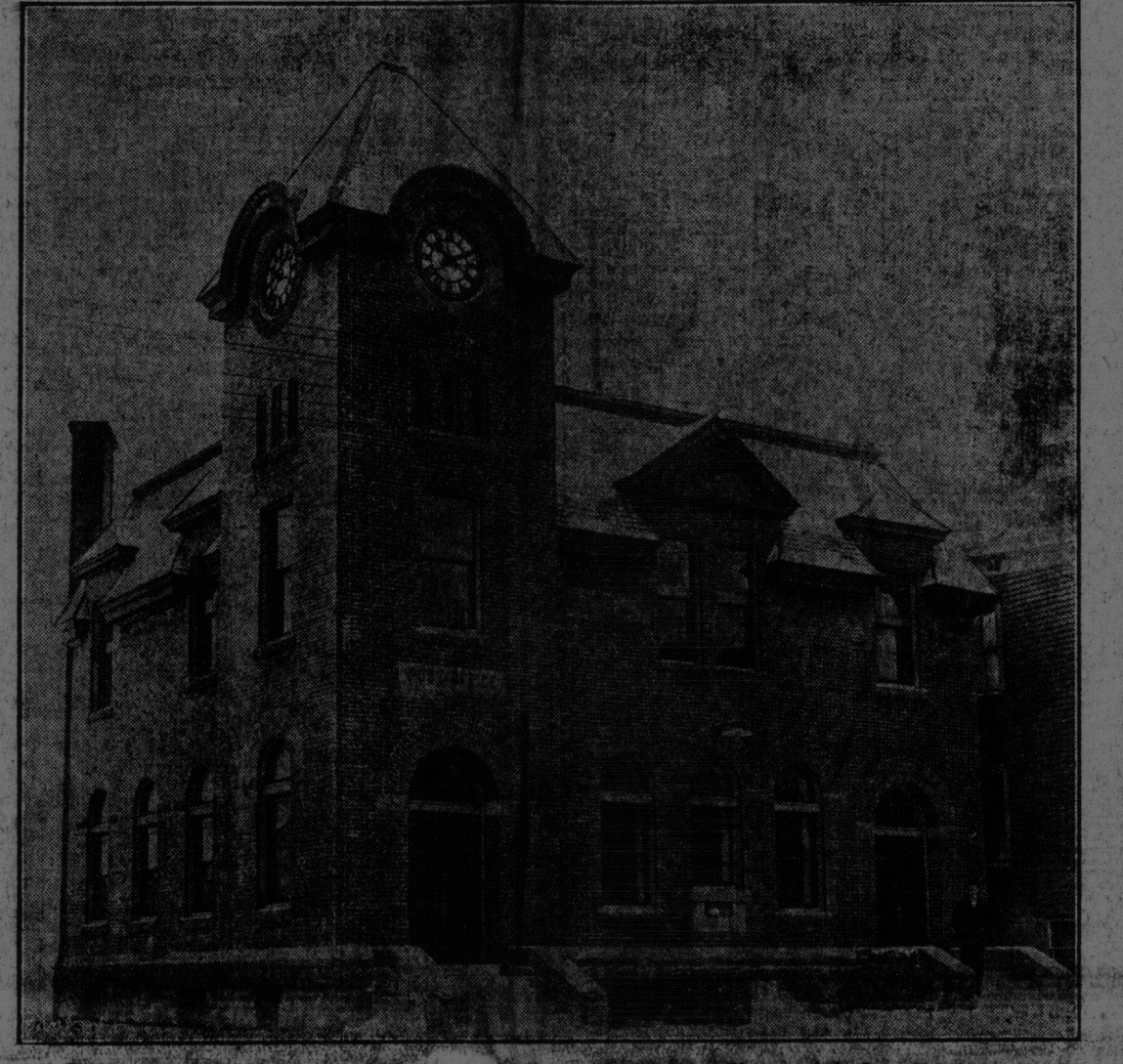
Toronto, March 7.—It is very unusual for March to afford the lowest temperature of the winter, but it has done it this year in Toronto at least.

FAIRVILLE'S NEW POST OFFICE FINEST FOR ITS SIZE IN CANADA

Hon. Mr. Pugsley Has Given People of That Section Building to Be Proud of—Most Modern Equipment, Attractive in Design and Credit to Growing Community



What is regarded as the finest equipped post office in Canada, taking size into consideration, is that which is giving good service to Fairville, the handsome new building recently completed according to the scheme first put forth by Hon. Mr. Pugsley when minister of public works. It is a credit to Fairville, and would be a model in office in the new building, and is assisted by John Cameron and Miss Reid. The accompanying picture presents a fine view of the exterior of the building, but it has to be noted in order that its modern equipment and arrangements be understood. It is two stories in height with basement, and is of brick, with a very graceful tower at one corner, and two sets of stone steps. TIT FOR TAT MOTTO OF LONDON LEAGUE TO FIGHT SUFFRAGETTES

Attack Militants' Homes Whenever Others' Property Is Damaged

ALREADY IS 500 STRONG

Hon. Mr. McKenna Tells About The Suffragette Prisoners Who Refuse Food - Arrests Since First of Year Number 55

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, March 7.—Active measures in retaliation of the acts of militant suffragettes are threatened by members of a new league formed for the purpose of opposing violent tactics. Every act of violence perpetrated by the militants, says a league circular, will be answered by attacks on private houses or properties of militant suffragettes.

This league does not quarrel with women on account of their desiring the enfranchisement, but because of their unwarranted criminal attacks upon persons and property. If any member of the league is summoned for damage done or fined for destruction while performing the work of the league, the cost will be met by a levy on the members.

Right Honorable E. McKenna, home secretary, has furnished figures showing that out of fifteen suffragettes now imprisoned ten have taken food, one has been fed by a tube. Another jailed on Wednesday night, has refused to take food. Seven prisoners are in the infirmary on account of illness, two for purposes of observation and four in order to facilitate forcible feeding.

The prisoners since the beginning of the year, have numbered fifty-five. Of these, seven have been released, not in the ordinary course, but because they refused food, four of them having been diseased, one pleurisy, one tuberculosis, and one a weak heart. Two of the released prisoners had not been tried and could not be released.

CITY AND THE CHIEF

May Be Power to Appoint Future Heads of Police

THE OUTLOOK CHANGES

FREDERICTON SAYS CHIEF CLARK WANTED FULL SALARY PENSION IF HE RETIRED—MORE FAVOR FOR STEEL PLANT FINANCING THAN IN THE DRY DOCK MATTER

FREDERICTON, N. B., March 7.—St. John bills were before the committee on municipalities this morning and received consideration. Most of it was favorable. That concerning the appointment of the chief of police was taken up again by the law committee. It was provided that in an additional section was considered, it provides that when the present chief of police dies or is removed from office, in any case, the appointment of his successor shall be made by the council composed of the city of St. John.

A great deal of influence has been brought to bear to provide against any action on the part of the commission to interfere with the status of the present chief of police. Some consideration was even given to the question of his being given a modest retiring allowance but it is understood that nothing would satisfy the chief but a full salary for as long as he lives. This proposition was not submitted to all by the commission, so it is a more candid feeling towards the steel plant and consideration was given. Since then, it has no doubt been discussed by both the government and the members. There seems to be a feeling in this quarter that the province should be expected to assist in an undertaking, particularly the dry dock, which seems to be the work of the federal government. There is a more candid feeling towards the steel plant building proposition. In the present state of provincial finances it is very doubtful if the mission of Mr. Palmer will meet with great success. So far as assistance from the city goes, the people themselves would probably be asked to contribute a special plebiscite upon so important a financial undertaking.

Daily Hints For the Cook

SCRAMBLED EGGS.
The Peggy Bradford and 1874—One cup of cooked rice, 1/2 cup of milk, salt and pepper to taste and 2 well-beaten eggs. Put plenty of butter in frying pan. When good and hot add the above and stir until the milk is absorbed.

SOUP MILK GRIDDLECAKES.
One and one-fourth cups of thick sour milk, 2 eggs, salt, tablespoon melted butter, 1 even teaspoon of soda sifted with 1 1/2 cups flour 3 times, little nutmeg, about 1 tablespoon of molasses or just enough so the cakes will cook nice and brown.

Grease griddle pan with fat pork. Do not make batter too thick as the thinner the batter the better the cakes as long as you are able to fry them.

Little Beauty Chats

A Little Bunion Lore

A DAINTY foot is one of the greatest attractions that a woman can have and it is generally admitted that the Amazonian girl possesses fully as pretty feet as the woman of any other realm. So far, so good. Now we will look on the reverse side of the shield, so to speak, and see what can be done to prevent the misshapen feet as do the Americans.

Especially as we subject to bunions, due to our habit of wearing shoes a wee bit too tight or a trifle too short.

To begin with, the foot must be henceforward seen to it that the aching joint is relieved of all pressure as continued friction on the joint will increase the inflammation to such an extent that a surgical operation will be necessary. If it is at all possible, a practice of exercise will protect the bunion from pressure by covering it with a large ring of piano felt.

A local treatment for bunions consists in painting joint several times a day with the lotion given below:

BUNION LOTION
Glycerine..... 2 drachms
Carbolic acid..... 2 drachms
Tincture of iodine..... 2 drachms

If the thought of applying a carbolic lotion to the tender joint dawns the fearful woman she can substitute for it a tincture of iodine, applying it to the bunion at night with a camel's hair brush.

Do not neglect to do something and at once for your grumbling joint, as otherwise you may fall heir to a deformed foot and lifelong suffering, as it is a serious matter when the synovial membrane—lining the joint—becomes diseased. Only constant care and attention will prevent the bunion from reaching an acute stage.

WOMAN FOUND DEAD IN WRETCHED HOME

Aged Mrs. Donovan Evidently Dead Several Days in St. Patrick Street Before it Was Known

In a wretched hotel in the rear of 82 St. Patrick street, where she had lived in seclusion for more than six years, the dead body of Mrs. Margaret Donovan, 70 years old, was found yesterday afternoon by a neighbor, Mrs. William Nichol. Every morning Mrs. Nichol was in the habit of taking a supply of water to the old woman, but on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday mornings, when she went and rapped at the door, she received no response from within. Yesterday afternoon she became alarmed and investigated. She pushed open the door and saw the body stretched across the room. It was found that the woman had been dead since Monday night when she was last seen.

It would seem that the cause of her death from natural causes, as she had been suffering from an incurable disease. It is believed that the sufferer died in her dying hours.

Mrs. Nichol notified the police and Patrolman Corbett, who arrived and gave permission for the removal of the body to the morgue. The condition of the rooms in which the woman lived was such as to make it impossible to live in them. There was little furniture and much dirt and on the bed there were several ragged bedclothes to cover her body.

Little is known about the woman except that she lived alone. She was a native of the town of St. John, and she had two sons, sometimes saying they were still alive and at other times that they were dead. It is said she once lived in Carleton.

FIGHTING WHITE PLAGUE IN SISTER PROVINCE

When introducing the bill for the establishment of municipal sanatoria in Nova Scotia, Hon. Mr. Armstrong said that instead of Nova Scotia having a large number of sanatoria scattered over the province there will be several large ones established serving certain districts, which system, under the limited revenues of the province, was better adapted to its needs.

These districts or divisions will be so regulated as far as possible, to equalize the population and the percentage of cases to be treated. There will be five sections giving approximately 100,000 population to each district.

Regarding the matter of financial aid, and initial expenditure in establishing these sanatoria, Mr. Armstrong gave a full explanation. The government will borrow \$100,000 on capital account, out of this half the cost of the sanatoria will be paid, the other half being met by the municipalities, towns or cities by which they are to be supported. The measure embodies medical supervision, district nurse, county clinic, and the supervision of the provincial health officer. With regard to the latter, Mr. Armstrong is strongly in favor of the appointment of the very best expert that is procurable.

LABOR MEN TAKE UP STREET RAILWAY AND FERRY SERVICE MATTERS

Street railway matters were discussed by the Trades and Labor Council last evening and a resolution calling upon the city government to take over the present railway facilities was adopted and ordered sent to the city commissioners. If a company is to take over the road the council asks that they be required to provide workmen's tickets at special rates during certain hours.

The council also asks that the workmen's tickets on the ferry boat should be accepted until 7:30 instead of until seven o'clock as under the present rule and request that three of these tickets be accepted for one fare during other times of the day.

The matter of arranging for labor time which would house all the local unions was discussed but no action was taken.

two sets of steps at either side in the front of the post office there are two small stone steps directly in the centre and these are beneath a letter box opening to the inside for the receipt of mail when the office is closed. While it is possible for adults to reach the box in question without the aid of the steps approaching it, the latter are designed for use of children whose little arms would not permit reaching the slot, were it not for the steps.

Both inside and out the new post office is finished in up-to-date manner. The furnishings and equipment are the latest and most modern, and tend to make the building superior to many business structures about the city. In the tower a large clock is set and can be seen from some distance, and this is proving a matter of great public convenience.

Inside the office the lobby is clean and roomy and nicely finished in mural and floor arrangement. There is accommodation provided for the writing of letters, addresses, etc., and there is both plenty of room and light, artificial and natural. The

ASHBURNHAM'S TO OLD COUNTRY

Plan to Leave Fredericton in May or June

DETAILS OF THE WILL

Late Earl Made Various Bequests to Relatives and Others—Diamonds and Other Gems Are Bequeathed as Heirlooms

(Fredericton Gleaser.) The Earl of Ashburnham, who will arrive on Saturday from England, where he has been assuming his new title and estates will remain here for several months.

The present arrangements are for the Earl and Countess of Ashburnham to leave in May for the old country to take up their official residence there. There is a possibility, however, that their departure may be delayed until June.

During the last few weeks friends of Lord Ashburnham have received hangings containing pheasants and other highly prized English delicacies which have been much enjoyed.

The Will

The Yorkshire Post, published at Leeds, England, has the following regarding the probate of the will of the late Lord Ashburnham:

The estate of the Earl of Ashburnham has been sworn (provisionally) for probate purposes at under the value of £250,000.

The testator made various pecuniary legacies, including: To the three children of his sister, Lady Margaret Bickersteth, £5,000 each; to the two children of his sister, Lady Mary Holland, £5,000 each; to his grandchild, the Countess Lucrezia di Campiglione, £200; such sum, as, when invested in consols, will produce £150 a year free of income tax to the priest serving the Roman Catholic mission at Battle; and certain legacies to servants.

He also bequeathed the following annuities: Lady Margaret Bickersteth, £300 for her life should she survive her husband or until she becomes tenant for life of the testator's settled property; to the Countess of Ashburnham such an annuity to commence from the death of the present earl as will make her income from all sources to the yearly sum of £300; to Marjory, Lady Huddleston (the daughter of Henry Huddleston-Huddleston) an annuity of £50 for her life and to his widow, Edwin Jones, an annuity of £120 for his life, all legacies and annuities to be free of duty.

Lord Ashburnham instructed his trustees to give free of duty to Don Jaime de Bourbon, Duke of Madrid, the gold and enamel collar of the Order of the Holy Ghost conferred upon the testator by the late Don Carlos de Bourbon, Duke of Madrid. He bequeathed, free of duty, all the Ashburnham family diamonds and other jewels and the settings thereof, and also the large cut, eye ornament bequeathed to him by his mother and the large star ruby which he inherited from his father, to devolve as heirlooms.

The testator devised his real and personal estate upon trust (in the event of his daughter and only child, Lady Mary Catherine Charlotte Ashburnham, returning to secular life) to her for life, with remainder to her issue in strict settlement, then successively to the present earl, Lady Margaret Bickersteth, and Lady Mary Holland, and their issue in strict settlement, with remainder to devolve with the baronetcy of Ashburnham, and failing such remainder, with an ultimate limitation to the testator's own right heirs. In the event of the testator's said daughter remaining in the religious life, the trust in her favor does not take effect, other provision being made for her by the will.

BUSIEST OF CANALS

Modest "Soo" Carries More Freight Than All Others Combined

More than 72,000,000 tons of freight passed through the Saint Ste Marie Canal during the season of 1912. Traffic through that waterway has doubled in two years, and still is increasing. At the height of the season 124 vessels passed through the canal in twenty-four hours—a ship every twelve minutes, day and night.

The "Soo" carries more freight than all other ship canals of the world. Suez figures for 1912 are not available, but they will be well under 30,000,000 tons. Manchester and Kiel together may reach 12,000,000 or 15,000,000 tons. By comparison with these other ship canals are negligible.

Suez carries and Panama will carry more valuable freight than that which goes through the "Soo." But it is doubtful if anyone now alive will see the two great ocean ditches carry as great a bulk of traffic as now moves through the humble fresh-water channel between our inland seas.—Chicago Journal.

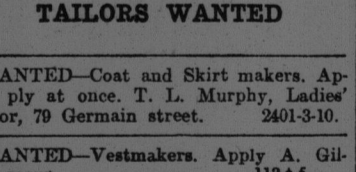

BREACH OF PROMISE SUIT BRINGS \$500 FROM WEALTHY MAN

Elderly Irish Farmer Had Strange Ways of Conducting His Courtship-Recent Heir to Quarter Million

Dublin, March 7.-An action for breach of promise of marriage against an elderly retired farmer, Patrick Duggan, of Dublin, who had received a legacy of close on \$250,000 was heard in the Irish Law Courts. The defendant is between sixty and seventy years of age, and the plaintiff, Miss Emily Sheerin, a governess, is thirty-one. In cross-examination, she said she knew the defendant had filled her water, but thought it was her sister's fault because she asked for a settlement. Counsel for the defence declared that the object of the action was to extort money, and nothing else. "Having failed with Lizzy, they tried to impose Emily on the defendant." On cross-examination the defendant said he was married on January 7, his wife being twenty-three years old. Mr. Justice Wright (in surprise): Is he married? That is the first I have heard of it. The defendant said he proposed to his wife by writing to her mother and was married a week afterwards. "And you did not know her Christian name?" "She had two daughters, and I said it was the tallest I wanted."

A Blow at Easter Business in Department Houses—Iron Workers to Raise \$50,000
Boston, March 7.—A strike of the alteration hands' union, designed to tie up the cloak and suit departments of all the department stores of the city for the big Easter trade, as to be called within a day or two, according to Vice-president Abraham Mitchell, of New York. All the 1,000 members of the union will go out together after the case has been decided finally by the arbitrator. The iron workers' convention here passed a resolution to raise \$50,000 with which to carry the fight, and the men convicted of a conspiracy in the dynamite trial, and also voted to raise whatever amount of money needed to defend the convicted men in case a new trial is granted them. FRENCH OF ONTARIO OBJECT TO SCHOOL REGULATIONS

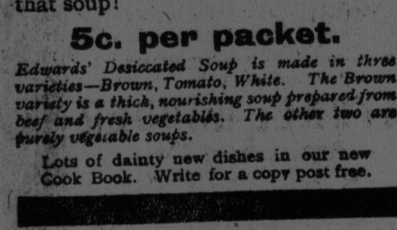

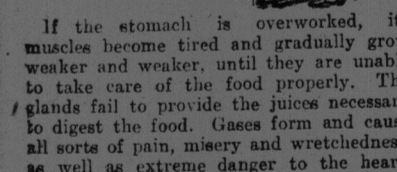

announced as to the renewal of the mail contract from Liverpool, but White Star officials say they are hopeful of the contract being divided between more than one line.

The New York Journal, Shipping Illustrated, has caused some amusement in local shipping circles by its statement that the conference related to the establishment of a mail service between Canada and the West Indies as a result of reciprocity treaty. This was had enough, but Shipping Illustrated goes on to say that the conference was fruitless because the maritime provinces insist that ships on the West Indies service make no United States calls, such as Boston, and White Star people insist on the privilege of calling at United States ports.

The truth is, of course, that the White Star line has not tendered for the West Indies mail service at all. It is thought locally that the latter contract will likely be awarded either to the Western Steamship Company or to a company for which the Elder- Dempster people are the Canadian agents.

THE RHODES SCHOLARS

Two New Brunswickers in Honors in Last Year's Report

The statement for 1911-1912 in connection with the Rhodes scholarships shows that during the academic year the number of scholars in residence at Oxford was 190, of whom seventy were from the colonies of the empire, ninety-three from the United States, and eleven from Germany. There were also in residence at ex-scholars (colonial) engaged either in teaching, reading for examinations, or philanthropic work. Two ex-scholars held fellowships in Oxford College, one of whom was also a tutor of his college.

In the examinations for the year the B. Litt. degree was awarded to C. B. Martin, of New Brunswick, first class honors in jurisprudence to J. K. Boyd, of Nova Scotia; second class honors in jurisprudence to D. Fraser, of Alberta; J. G. Higgins, of Newfoundland; and J. Thomson, of Manitoba; second class honors in modern history to A. L. Burt, of Ontario; third class honors in mathematics to L. Dixon, of New Brunswick; third class honors in natural science, physiology to J. Daly, of Prince Edward Island; third class honors in jurisprudence to L. J. Beaudry, of Quebec; and third class honors in theology to M. K. Parry, of Nova Scotia.

MOUNT ALLISON APPEAL

Canada cannot afford at this crisis in her history, when the yearly index of foreign-ers is equal to four per cent. of her population, to weaken the centres where intelligent, loyal and cultured citizens are produced. The fact that Mount Allison is a Christian college, and has always entertained moral values, give her special claim upon all classes of patriotic citizens.

The fact that no religious tests are applied and young people of all religious views are made welcome, has given her such a wide patronage that nearly one-third of the students in attendance belong to other denominations than the one by which the university is controlled.

An increased expenditure for the coming year has been made necessary by the expiration of the subscriptions which have paid the salary for the past four years of one of the theological staff. An additional professor has been appointed to the chair of philosophy to take up the work done by Dr. Allison and relieve some of the present staff, whose burdens are becoming intolerable, thus increasing prospective deficits by two salaries. Owing to the large attendance upon the arts classes and the increased needs of the science faculty, the present class room accommodation is quite inadequate. A new science building which would provide two large lecture rooms for the largest arts classes is fast becoming an urgent need. Such a structure would require \$30,000. At a meeting of the Alumni Society held in May, 1910, this enthusiastic and loyal body of old students, anticipating the needs above outlined, passed a resolution inaugurating a movement to raise \$200,000 as an addition to the endowment fund. This amount with the \$30,000 for a new science building is considered the least that will be necessary to place the institution on a sound financial base.

PROTECTION OF THE CHILDREN

Act is Introduced By Mr. Grimmer in House

STREET RAILWAY BILL

Suburban Matter Off Till Tuesday and Meantime Present Company Asks Legislation to Extend To Kings County

Fredrickton, N. B., March 6.—The House met at 3 o'clock.

Mr. Carson presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act incorporating the New Brunswick Hydro Electric Co. Mr. Black presented a petition in favor of a bill to consolidate and amend acts relating to the University of Mount Allison.

Mr. Wilson introduced a bill to amend the act relating to the city and county of St. John.

Mr. Munro presented a petition in favor of a bill to amend the act relating to the village of Bath.

Mr. Dickson (King) presented a petition of a country store and shelter and for proper regulations of handling and caring for children. Children who would come under the jurisdiction of the act were those found begging, sleeping, wandering about at night, associating with a third, habitual drunkard or vagrant, those found in any house of ill fame, destitute, or patronizing a saloon, pool room, show house or moving picture house, those who habitually used profane, obscene or indecent language or guilty of immoral conduct; those employed in any brewery or shop where intoxicating liquors were made, bottled or sold; those who had been unlawfully arrested or treated with neglect by parents or those who committed any offence punishable with fine or imprisonment or both, or whose home, by reason of neglect, cruelty or depravity, was unfit places for such children.

Honorable members would find very careful protection had been made for all classes of children. The legislation was strongly recommended by various religious denominations in the province and the municipality of St. John city and county passed a resolution on Jan. 21 last expressing their approval of enactment of such legislation.

Today the province had no place except the Boys' Industrial Home for children who needed protection. The experience had been that confinement in jail was not the most effective cure and it would seem that if the act were adopted it would meet a long felt want in the province of New Brunswick.

The suburban street railway bill will not be considered by the corporation committee again until next Tuesday.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced a bill to amend the succession duties act. He said that the bill provided for the enlargement of the interpretation of several words and expressions of the act specifying what certain things would mean and also provided for a change of time in which succession duties were payable, and furthermore if succession duties are paid within six months no interest shall be charged.

Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to incorporate the Cedar Hill cemetery, parish of Lancaster, St. John county.

Hon. Mr. McLeod introduced a bill to provide for a fair wage schedule.

Mr. Grimmer moved that the third reading of the bill respecting conditions in fire insurance policies be discharged and that the bill be referred back to the committee of the whole house.

The house went into committee, with Mr. Woods in the chair, and took up consideration of the bill respecting conditions in fire insurance policies.

Mr. Tilley said that the board of fire underwriters had asked him to review the act with them and they had arrived at the conclusion to ask the attorney-general to carry out the suggestion of his honorable friend from St. John county and adopt the bill as it stood.

Mr. Grimmer said that while the act as originally stood was perfectly satisfactory to him, a number of amendments had been presented to him which, if the honorable members decided, he was prepared to submit. He was perfectly willing either to adopt the measure as it stood or to submit the proposed amendments to the honorable members.

Mr. Baxter's motion to agree to the bill as it originally stood was defeated, and the committee went into consideration of the proposed amendments.

The first section was amended to provide that when persons wilfully omitted to communicate any material circumstance to the insurer the insurance would be of no effect in respect to property to which the claim was made.

Section 11 was amended to read so that "lack of good and substantial brick, stone or concrete chimneys shall be reason for non-liability on the part of the insurer only when it is with the knowledge of the insured."

Section 16 was amended to read that a false statement in relation to particulars of a claim to vitiate it must be "wilfully" false.

The bill was reported as agreed to with amendments.

The time for the introduction of private bills was extended until Monday next. The house adjourned at 6:15 o'clock.

Abbotsbury Castle, the seat of the Downer Countess of Debeser, near Weymouth, has been burned down. The late Countess, who was a visitor at the castle, which contained priceless Italian paintings, none of which have been saved.

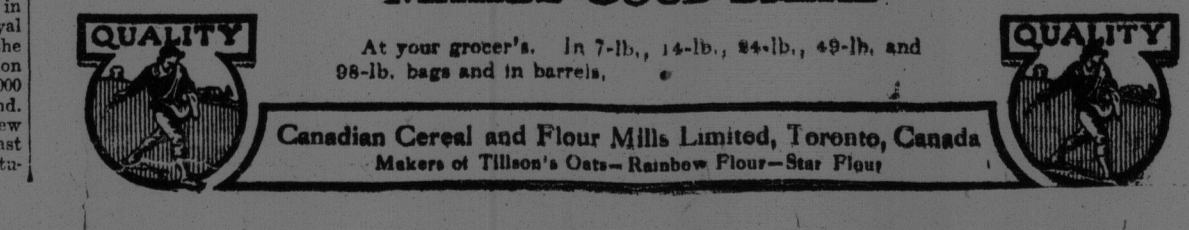
