

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Jan. 7—A new protein food made from beef serum which has the characteristics of and can be used as a substitute for the white of eggs has been developed by Professor J. W. M. Bunker in the biological laboratories of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Announcement of the new product will be made in The Technology Review.



The fight was to be from balloons, the survivor to claim the hand of the lady in marriage. A day and place of meeting were arranged, and on the appointed day the duelists met. The gentlemen were Mm. Grandpre and Le Pique.
