

#### DISTRICT NO. III.—Mr. JOHN TAYLOR and Mr. T. A. GIBSON. From Bleury street and Park avenue (inclusive) to McGill College avenue (not inclusive) and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Sherbrooke street (inclusive).

#### DISTRICT NO. IV.-Mr. COLIN MCARTHUR.

From Bleury street (inclusive) to University and St. Genevieve streets (inclusive) and from Craig and St. Antoine streets (inclusive) to St. Catherine street (inclusive), also Longue Pointe, Cote Visitation and Outremont.

#### DISTRICT No. V.-Mr. P. S. Ross.

From McGill College avenue (inclusive) to Peel street (not inclusive), and from St. Catherine street (not inclusive) to Sherbrooke street (inclusive).

#### DISTRICT No. VI.-Mr. ALEX. MCFEE.

From University and St. Genevieve streets (inclusive) to Mansfield and St. Margaret streets (not inclusive), and from St. Antoine street (inclusive) to St. Catherine street (inclusive).

#### DISTRICT No. VII.-Mr. G. M. KINGHORN.

From Mansfield and St. Margaret streets (inclusive) to Mountain street (not inclusive), and from St. Antcine street (inclusive) to St. Catherine street (inclusive).

#### DISTRICT No. VIII.-Mr. J. A. CANTLIE.

From Mountatn street (inclusive) to Guy street (not inclusive), and from St. Antoine street (inclusive) to St. Catherine street (inclusive).

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## Memoranda.

PUBLIC WORSHIP on the Lord's Day, at 11 A.M. and 7 P.M.

WEEKLY SERVICE, Wednesday Evening at a quarter past Eight o'clock.

THE SABBATH-SCHOOL meets every Sabbath at Three P.M.—except in the months of July and August, when the School is closed.

THE MINISTER'S BIBLE-CLASS for Young Men, meets every Sunday afternoon at Three o'clock.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is usually administered on the last Sundays of January, April, and October.

ORDINARY MEETINGS of the Kirk-Session are held on the first Sabbath of each month, immediately after the Morning Service.

THE MISSIONARY AND BENEVOLENT SCHEMES of the Church are under the management of a Committee, consisting of the Minister, three members of the Kirk-Session, three members of the Board of Trustees, and four members of the Congregation appointed at the annual meeting.

- THE ANNUAL MEETING of the Congregation for the transaction of business is held in the School-room of the Church, on the second Monday of January in each year.
- THE DORCAS SOCIETY and LADIES' AID ASSOCIATION meet at half-past Two o'clock on Tuesday afternoons during the winter months.
- APPLICATIONS FOR SITTINGS may be made to Mr. ALEX. F. RIDDELL, the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, or to the Sexton, 77 Monique St., near the Church.

MEMBERS changing their residence are requested to notify the Minister, or the Elder of the District in which they reside.

CASES OF SICKNESS should be made known to the Elder of the District and reported by him to the Minister with as little delay as possible.

THE MINISTER can be seen usually any morning between the hours of nine and ten.

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## Missionary and Benevolent funds.

THE following are the purposes for which the General Assembly has appointed collections to be made annually in all the Congregations and Mission Stations of the Church:—

I. Home Missions :- The important work of providing religious services to those of our fellow-citizens dwelling in remote and sparsely settled districts, and in some of the older settlements, where groups of Presbyterians are found not sufficiently numerous to enable them to assume the responsibilities of self-supporting congregations, has been carried on systematically during the past year under the careful supervision of the several Presbyteries-now 43 in. number. Owing to the vast extent of territory over which the work is spread, it is found convenient to conduct the business by the agency of two distinct committees, one for the Western section of Church, and the other for the Eastern, the latter including the eleven Presbyteries in the Synod of the Maritime Provinces. The former is, of course, much the larger, comprising, in addition to the ordinary mission stations to be found in every Presbytery, the extensive fields of the Muskoka region, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia. Muskoka is itself a large territory, 150 miles in length and 100 in breadth-a little Scotland, in some parts almost as beautiful, minus the heather! Much of it is unproductive, but in some parts the soil is good. The population is chiefly Presbyterian. Including the adjoining district of Algoma, there were 44 groups of stations supplied last summer, at 130 preaching places. In Manitoba and the North-West there were 426 preaching places, and in British Columbia, 57. In all, 920 preaching places (exclusive of regular congregations) in the western section of the Church, while in both sections some 350 missionaries were employed for periods of varying length in sowing the seed of the Kingdom at a cost of \$63,000, in addition to which about \$35,000 were provided otherwise than through the Home Mission Committee. The estimates for the current year call for \$62,500 for the West, \$10,000 for the East, in all \$72,500.

**II.** Augmentation of Stipends:—In nearly all of the Presbyteries there are congregations which are unable to provide a suitable maintenance for their ministers. Last year there were 158 such in the Western, and 50 in the Eastern Section. The amount paid to these 208 congregations to supplement their ministers' stipends was \$33,917. Every year the progress of the Church is marked by a number of aid-receiving congregations assuming the entire responsibility of their own support, while on the other hand a corresponding number of new congregations, requiring aid, are placed on the roll. 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In the existing state of the country, with the prospect of a large increase to the population by immigration, it is evident that, for many years to come, the older and wealthier charges must be appealed to in order to secure for the ministers in the newer and weaker congregations a minimum income of at least \$750 with a manse.

III. French Evangelization :-- The work under the care of the Board of French Evangelization during the past year embraced 36 congregations and mission fields, 95 preaching stations, with 942 Protestant families. The average Sabbath attendance was over 3020, of whom 941 were Roman Catholics. 143 were added to the Church, making a total membership of 1423. 1118 scholars attended Sabbath-Schools. Thirteen colporteurs were employed, and 1860 Bibles and Testaments, and 26,000 religious tracts and papers were circulated. 4292 visits were made. 790 scholars-of whom 365 were from Roman Catholic homes-attended the mission day schools, with an average attendance of over 500. Seventeen Frenchspeaking students attended the Presbyterian College, Montreal, during the winter, three of whom graduated in Theology and have since been licensed. 188 pupils attended the Pointe-aux-Trembles Schools; 114 attended Coligny College, Ottawa, The total number of labourers employed was 79, of whom 24 were ordained ministers and four were licentiates. The total receipts were \$56,514.23. Good work was done in the various fields, affording encouragement to the missionaries, and calculated to stimulate the faith and quicken the zeal of the Church in her efforts to give the Gospel of the grace of God in all its fulness, simplicity, and purity to our French-speaking countrymen. The amount required for this year, including school and buildings at Pointe-aux-Trembles, is \$60,000.

The Colleges :- These are six in number. The Presbyterian College, Halifax; Morrin College, Quebec; The Presbyterian College, Montreal; Queen's College, Kingston; Knox College, Toronto; and Manitoba College, Winnipeg. Each has a certain amount of Endowment, but all require some assistance from the congregations of the Church. In 1888 the General Assembly decided that the common College Fund heretofore in existence should be terminated, and that congregations be left free to contribute towards the support of one or other of the Colleges, as their judgment might dictate. The sum required this year for Knox, Queen's, and Montreal Colleges, is \$14,500, and for Halifax and Morrin Colleges, say \$8,000 more. Sixty-four students completed their theological curriculum in these colleges last year, and the number in attendance this winter is larger than in any previous session-Manitoba excepted, which this year is to hold its session in summer instead of winter, in order to facilitate mission work in the North-West. Several very handsome donations and legacies have been received during the year for some of the colleges. Gifts of this kind, as well as of books for the libraries are always acceptable.

V. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Funds:—The annual amount required to supplement the revenues derived from investments is about \$10,000. The number of annuitants is about 150, and the average annuity only \$150—a pittance that is certainly not creditable to such a large and wealthy constituency as the committees have to appeal to for support.

VI. The Assembly Fund :-- The sum of \$5,500 is asked for this year to defray the cost of printing and distributing the printed minutes and other necessary expenses immediately connected with the Assembly, as well as the draft made on this fund by committees that have no funds of their own, such as the committees on Sabbath Schools, Sabbath Observance, State of Religion, Statistics, &c. There is also an annual charge on account of the general expenses of the Presbyterian Alliance which has to be met from this source. It is very important that the sums allotted to each of the Presbyteries and congregations in this behalf be provided for. The burden is not a heavy one when each congregation takes its allotted share.

VII. Manitoba College :—Although rapidly improving in its finances and general efficiency, is not yet beyond the need of generous support. The exceptional circumstances of this—the youngest of the Colleges—requires a special contribution of 5,000 this year. (Last year, the amount similarly asked and received, was 10,000.) The great benefit of Manitoba College, to the western part of the Church especially, was never more apparent than now, and the institution of the "Summer Sessions" in Theology, to be inaugurated this summer in accordance with the deliverance of last General Assembly, must necessarily involve a very considerable increase of expenditure.

VIII. Aged and Infirm Ministers' Fund :— The committee makes an urgent appeal this year for \$15,000 towards its ordinary revenue. A strenuous effort is being made, and with an encouraging amount of success, to create an Endowment Fund, from the revenues of which, added to the annual contributions of the congregations, something approaching to an adequate provision may be made for the ministers of the Church, who, from age or infirmity have retired from active service. There are at present 94 beneficiaries on the roll. The average annuity is less than \$200. Clearly, there is a call for greater liberality all over the Church in support of this most deserving fund. A few generous donations towards the Endowment Fund would be very acceptable; and it is one of the benevolent things that might be suitably remembered by wealthy individuals when they come to make their "last wills and testaments."

IX. Foreign Missions :- Upon another page is given the names and addresses of all the missionaries of our Church, so that

The number of new appointments was larger during the past year than in any previous year -- 12 in all, of whom 7 were ordained missionaries and 5 ladies. The whole number of ordained missionaries is 39 (including 2 medical) and of these four are native ministers. The number of Canadian ladies abroad is 18, of whom 6 are fully accredited Doctors of Medicine. A new feature in this department is the recent appointment of a missionary to Palestine, who is to take up work among the Jewsin their own land-under the auspices of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Mr. Webster, the missionary, is already in the field, but the precise locality of his future labours has not yet been determined. The amount required for this Jewish mission for the present year is only \$3000. Towards this object many of our people will be happy to have the opportunity of contributing. The whole amount required by the western wing of the F. M. Committee this year is \$102,645, and by the Eastern Section, \$27,000, in all, \$129,645, which is about \$15,354 more than was received last year. The Church cannot afford to neglect its duty to the heathen. The Church

HONAN is one of the eighteen provinces of China proper, between the provinces of Shansi in the north, and Hupeh in the south. Its eastern extremity is about 200 miles from the Yellow Sea. In the language of the flowery kingdom, Honan is "the garden of China." Its area is 65,104 square miles. The population is variously estimated at from 18,000,000 to 22,000,000, giving over 300 inhabitants to the square mile. The climate is said to be on the whole salubrious, and the soil in many parts is very productive. Cotton is grown extensively. Hemp and silk are also produced. Coal and iron are found in abundance. It only wants the Gospel and the railway to make it "boom."

The Canadian Mission to Honan was instituted under somewhat peculiar circumstances. The offer of the alumni of Knox College, Toronto, and of the Missionary Association of Queen's College, Kingston, to sustain each a missionary in the Foreign Field, coupled with the offer of St. Andrew's Church, Toronto, to do the same, induced the Foreign Mission Committee to ask leave from the General Assembly to extend their work in China by occupying another

field in addition to Formosa. Leave having been granted by the Assembly of 1887, Mr. Jonathan Goforth was ordained and designated as a missionary to the foreign field, October 20th, 1887, by the Presbytery of Toronto, and Dr. James Frazer Smith, by the Presbytery of Kingston, in January following. Honan was selected as a suitable field for this among other reasons, that no permanent missions had hitherto been established in that province. There were no resident missionaries in Honan. No sooner was the commencement of the mission announced, than St. James' Square Church, Toronto; Erskine Church and Crescent Street Church, Montreal, and the alumni of the Presbyterian College, Montreal, came forward with offers to sustain each a missionary in Honan, and, to crown all, an individual member of Erskine Church, Montreal, and a gentleman in England, Mr. Morton of London, made a similar offer! In a short time, the perfect number of seven ordained missionaries, all deriving their support otherwise than from the funds of the Foreign Mission Committee, had gone to China, and were engaged in studying the language and laying their plans tor locating a mission in Honan. One of the seven was obliged to return to Canada on account of his wife's health, but another missionary has already gone to take his place. Before the missionaries had obtained permission from the local authorities to acquire mission premises, when they had scarcely learned enough of the language to drive log out of the back-yard in the vernacular, the PRESBYTERY OF HONAN was erected !

Honan is not yet "the garden of the Lord." The people do not want to have the Gospel preached to them; and they have shown this in their own way, by deriding the "foreign devils," and looting their premises. The latest accounts, however, state that order has been restored, that the missionaries have effected a lodgement in Honan—where they mean to stay; that the message of salvation is being preached, and that the work of the medical missionaries is already so extensive, and so highly appreciated by the people, that there is good reason to anticipate grand results in the near future.

The Session trust that the appeal recently made from the pulpit in regard to the envelope system, will meet with a general response from the members of the Congregation.

The Kirk-Session also earnestly hope that the recommendation which was unanimously agreed upon at the Annual Meeting with regard to free seats to strangers at the Sunday evening services, will meet with the approval of the seat holders.

The Session cordially approve of the appointment of four additional members to the present Board of Trustees.

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## The Innual Meeting.

## Minutes of Annual Meeting of St. Paul's Church, held within the School-room of the Church, on Monday, the 9th of January, 1893, at 8.00 o'clock p.m.

The Rev. Dr. Barclay was called to the chair, and Mr. E. B. Greenshields was appointed secretary.

The meeting was opened with prayer.

The minutes of the last Annual Meeting, held on 11th January, 1892, having been printed and circulated among the members of the Congregation, were taken as read, and confirmed.

The report of the Trustees, and the Treasurer's financial statement, having been placed in the pews on the previous Sunday, were taken as read.

Mr. E. B. Greenshields, in moving the adoption of the report, congratulated Dr. Barclay on the honour conferred on him in receiving the degree of Doctor of Divinity from his *Alma Mater*, the University of Glasgow.

He also congratulated the Congregation on the good financial statement shown, and spoke of the advantage that would be derived from the proposed addition of four new members to the Board of Trustees. As the constitution of this Board was now to be changed, he wished to look back for a moment over the past nine years, and to notice what had been done. There had been collected almost \$18,000.00 for a guarantee fund, a manse had been built, costing over \$14,000.00, all paid for, and the Church had been decorated and the basement improved at a cost of \$3,500.00. The caretaker's house had also been built, and although this had not yet been paid for, it was a very important and necessary work. The pew rents have increased from \$5542.0c in 1883, to \$9274.00 in 1892, and the collections from \$2516.00 in 1883, to \$3990.00 in 1892. In 1887 the envelope system was commenced, and it has proved successful. It entails a great deal of work on the Treasurer, and he deserves the hearty thanks of the Congregation for the manner in which he has performed his difficult duties. All this shows the life and growth of the Congregation during the nine years past, a period co-incident with the ministration of Dr. Barclay, and the Trustees look forward to still greater evidences of prosperity in the future,

and hope that the Congregation will soon be in a position to pay off (1) the floating debt of the Church, and (2) the debt on the caretaker's house, and (3) make some very much needed improvements to the organ.

He moved, seconded by Mr. J. C. Watson:

That the report of the Trustees be approved and adopted, and that it with the Treasurer's statement and the minutes of the meeting, be printed for circulation among the members of the Congregation.

In putting this resolution to the meeting, Dr. Barclay said, that looking over the time he had been minister of St. Paul's, he felt that he had great cause for thankfulness. He came here, knowing, he might say, only one member of the Congregation, but in all his work he had been ably assisted by the Trustees, the Kirk Session, and the members of the Congregation, and he thanked them, one and all, for their help. He was glad to see the prosperous state of the Congregation, and the good statement of the Treasurer, showing a surplus of ordinary revenue over ordinary expenditure.

The motion was carried.

The chairman submitted the report of the Committee on the Missionary and Benevolent Schemes of the Church.

It was moved by Mr. A. Mitchell, seconded by Mr. James Tasker, and carried:

That the report of the Schedule Committee be printed with the other reports for distribution, and that the Committee be thanked on behalf of the Congregation for the manner in which it managed the funds contributed during the year, and that

be elected members of the Committee for the current year, and that the thanks of the Congregation be given to Mr. R. S. Kinghorn for his efficient performance of the duties of Secretary-Treasurer of the Committee.

It was then moved by Mr. Alex. Ewan, seconded by Mr. T. H. Newman, and carried:

That the thanks of the Congregation be tendered to the Trustees for their able and satisfactory management of the financial affairs of the Church during the past year.

The chairman announced that in accordance with the By-laws, two of the Trustees, Messrs. Alex. Mitchell and J. C. Watson, retired by rotation this year, but were eligible for re-election. Where-

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upon it was moved by Mr. R. Macfarlane, seconded by Mr. P. S. Ross, and carried:

That Messrs. Alex. Mitchell and J. C. Watson be re-elected Trustees for the usual term.

Dr. Barclay explained to the meeting that the Trustees, as mentioned in their report, desired to have four new members added to the Board. He quite agreed with this decision of the Trustees. They thought that the size of the Congregation needed this addition, and that it was very desirable to interest as many of the members of the Congregation as possible in the work of the Church.

Mr. Jas. A. Cantlie moved, seconded by Mr. J. Larmonth:

That Article III of the Rules, Regulations and By-laws of St. Paul's Church, Montreal, be hereby amended as follows, to wit:—"The Board of "Trustees shall consist of twelve members instead of eight. Of the four new "Trustees to be elected under this an endment, to increase the number from "eight to twelve, one shall retire (in the order named in their election) each "year for the next four years, with the two to retire in usual course from "the old Board existing previous to the passing of this amendment, and at "the end of said four years, three Trustees will retire in regular rotation "from the Board at each subsequent annual meeting. Any provisions in "said Article III inconsistent with this amendment are hereby repealed."— Carried unanimously.

Mr. T. Samuel then moved, seconded by Mr. John Ross, and the motion was unanimously carried:

That Messrs. Alex. Ewan, Hugh Andrew Allan, Hugh Graham, and W. W. Watson, be elected Trustees of St. Paul's Church, and that in accordance with the amendment to Article III of the By-laws, Mr. Alex. Ewan's term of office expire in 1894, Mr. Hugh Andrew Allan's in 1895, Mr. Hugh Graham's in 1896, and Mr. W. W. Watson's in 1897.

The following resolutions were put to the meeting and carried:

Moved by Mr. A. T. Drummond and seconded by Mr. A. Mitchell:

That Mr. P. S. Ross and Mr. John McDonald be thanked for their services as auditors for the past year, and that they be requested to continue in the office for the present year.

Moved by Mr. R. S. Kinghorn and seconded by Mr. W. A. Doig:

That the thanks of the Congregation are due and are hereby tendered to the organist for the attentive and able manner in which he has conducted the musical services of the Church, and to the members of the choir for their valuable assistance. Moved That t to Mr. John successful

That the thanks of the Congregation are due and are hereby tendered to Mr. John L. Morris and to Mrs. Morris, for their very zealous and very successful work in connection with the Sunday-School of the Church.

The chairman stated that the next business before the meeting was the consideration of the question of giving greater facilities to strangers to attend the evening services of the Church. He said this matter had been considered by the Trustees and the members of the Kirk-Session, and they were all of the opinion that it would be advisable to make the sittings free at the evening services, due regard being paid to the opinions of any pew owners who wished their pews kept for their own use.

The feeling of the meeting was decidedly in favour of making this change, and the following resolution was moved by Mr. E. B. Greenshields, seconded by Mr. A. Mitchell, and carried:

That Dr. Barclay be asked to announce from the pulpit, that with the consent of the owners of the pews in St. Paul's Church, Montreal, the sittings will be free at the evening services, and that if any pew owners do not wish their pews to be occupied in this way, if they will let the caretaker of the Church know, they will be reserved for their own use.

The loss the Congregation had sustained in the death of the late Mr. C. D. Proctor, who for many years had ungrudgingly given his services as a Trustee, and an Elder, and in many other ways to further the interests of St. Paul's Church, was feelingly referred to, and the following resolution was unanimously passed:

That the Congregation desires to place on record its sense of the great loss sustained by it in the death of Mr. C. D. Proctor, one of its oldest members, and for many years an active, faithful, and valued elder, and to express its heartfelt sympathy with his widow and family in their bereavement.

Mr. A. Mitchell being asked to take the chair, a very hearty vote of thanks to Dr. Barclay for his able conduct in the chair was proposed by Mr. J. Larmonth, seconded by Mr. James Tasker, and carried.

Dr. Barclay thanked the meeting for their kind resolution, and spoke of the work done for the Congregation by Mr. J. L. Morris and Mrs. Morris in the Sunday School, and by Mr. J. Larmonth at the Victoria Mission, both of these important works being carried on in the most energetic and efficient manner.

There being no further business, the meeting was closed with prayer.

## Report of the Trustees

of St. Paul's Church for the year ending 31st December, 1892.

In submitting their Annual Report to the congregation of St. Paul's Church, the Trustees wish to express their thankfulness for another year of prosperity, and their satisfaction with the large attendance at the Sunday services during the year, and the signs of life and growth that are visible in the work of the congregation.

The Trustees notice with pleasure that the Rev. Dr. Barclay has this year received the degree of Doctor of Divinity from the University of Glasgow, and congratulate him on the honor conferred on him, assuring him at the same time of their continued and cordial support.

During the year, the entrance to the basement of the church has been very much improved, by making a door from St. Monique Street entering on the level of the street, and the interior of the basement has been suitably decorated. A sounding board has also been put over the pulpit, and it has made a marked improvement in the acoustics of the church. A special collection was made for this, and \$790.00 received. Of this \$664.92 has been expended, and there remains still to pay about \$200.00 for accounts not yet received. This improvement was very much needed, and the Trustees are glad to have been able to make it. A special assessment had to be paid to the Corporation of the City of Montreal this year of \$150.29. This matter had been in abeyance for some time, but the amount was paid this year on the advice of the legal adviser of the Board. The insurance on the property for three years amounting to \$543.00 has also been paid during the year.

It will be seen from the statement of the Treasurer accompanying this report, that the amount received from the pew rents this year is 9,274.92 against 7,910.10 last year, an increase of 1,364.82, and the ordinary collections shew 3,990.45 against 4,030.54, a decrease of 40.09. It will also be noticed that the balance due the Treasurer this year is 4,304.95, shewing an apparent deficiency in the revenue of 122.96. This is increased by the amount collected for the repairs to the basement and not yet spent, 125.08, making 248.04. On the other I two-thirds properly c that the C diture mee special ass be allowed

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 the other hand, as the insurance has been effected for three years, two-thirds of the amount \$543.00 paid for this, or \$362.00 is not properly chargeable to this year's expenditure. It will thus be seen that the Congregation has made its ordinary revenue and expenditure meet. No notice need be taken of the amount paid for the special assessment, as there will always be extras of some kind to be allowed for.

It is very gratifying to the Trnstees, and will also be to the members of the Congregation, to find that the proposals made last year in the annual report have been carried out so successfully, and the Board feels very much encouraged by the result. It is very important now, that the amount due to the Treasurer should be reduced, and it is earnestly hoped that this will be done during the coming year. The Rev. Dr. Barclay made an urgent appeal recently from the pulpit asking all the members of the Congregation to help in this matter, by giving a fixed sum each Sunday or once a year if they preferred through the envelope system adopted some years ago, for the ordinary expenditure of the Church. The Trustees hope that this appeal will meet with a hearty response from every member of the Congregation, as they know it is the wish of everyone that there should be no debt owing by St. Paul's Church.

As was well stated by the committee appointed at the annual meeting to assist in this matter, in the letter addressed to the members of the Congregation in January last, the two great advantages of using the envelope system for the ordinary collections, are (1) it enables those in charge of the finances of the Church to know to a great extent what they can count upon from the Sunday collections, and (2) it enables those who are temporarily absent from the city to continue their contributions towards the ordinary expenses of the Congregation which are going on all the time. Envelopes have been addressed this month to every pewholder, and it is hoped that a strong effort will be made this year to increase the ordinary collections, so that a substantial payment may be made on the amount due to the Treasurer.

The Trustees feel that the Congregation has suffered a great loss in the death of Mr. C. D. Proctor, one of the elders of the Church, and they wish to put on record their very high opinion of the services he rendered to the Church during a long period. For years he was an active member of the Board of Trustees, and afterwards as a member of the Kirk-Session he continued to give willing and valuable assistance in promoting in every way the welfare of the Congregation.

The Trustees recommend to the Congregation that four new members be added to the Board of Trustees at the annual meeting, making the Board to consist of twelve in place of eight Trustees as at present.

The Trustees and the Kirk-Session also recommend to the Congregation the advisability of giving greater facilities to strangers to attend the evening services of the Church.

The Trustees who retire by rotation this year are Messrs. Alex. Mitchell and John C. Watson. They are both eligible for re-election.

The average attendance during the year has been 24 teachers and 197 scholars, the highest average since the organization of the School.

The missionary collections for the year amounted to \$126.27 being an increase of \$35.42 over last year, and the largest in the history of the School.

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At a me the Reveren was unanim name of the consisting of consisting of During the year the following severed their connection from the staff of teachers, viz :--Mr. Norman Finlayson, Mrs. H. N. Chauvin, and Misses F. Roberts, Maud Lewis, Clara Lewis, K. McKay, F. Davis and E. Downey, but we are pleased to say, that their places have been all filled, principally by advanced scholars from the Bible-Class.

We regret to have to record the death of one of our most promising young men, Mr. Geo. R. Byrd, who died on the 10th of April 1892, after a short illness, and at the early age of 21. He had been Organist for both the Sabbath-School, and Church for a number of years, yet was never known to have been absent from his duties, excepting through sickness. He was of a quiet and retiring disposition, yet a true disciple of the Master. His dying message to the young people of the school has helped many of them since to decide for Christ.

The Society of Christian Endeavour still continues to prosper and now numbers 75 members, apart from the juniors who number 25.

The work done by the Finance, Social, Lookout, Missionary, Temperance, Sunday-School, and Visiting Committees, is most thorough, and has resulted in enlisting the services of almost every young man and young woman in the congregation, in doing faithful and efficient work for Christ, and that must in time add many members to the Church. The Christian Endeavour movement has evidently come to stay, and is already acknowledged as a power in the Church and in the world, and evidently destined in time to solve the problem that has often perplexed many good Superintendents, of how to keep the grown up scholars in the school after they had reached the age of sixteen or over. A Christian Endeavour Society has almost become a necessity to every Church that cares for the spiritual welfare of the young people connected with it, and that desires to see them connect themselves with the membership of the Church.

The Church Prayer Meeting, held every Wednesday evening, is largely attended, the average being from 60 to 80 throughout the year.

At a meeting held on the 12th of January last, presided over by the Reverend W. R. Cruikshank, B. A. of St. Mathew's Church, it was unanimously decided to organize as a congregation, under the name of the Victoria Church. At this meeting, a Board of Managers consisting of nine members, and at a later meeting, a Kirk-Session consisting of three members were formed, the members of the Session

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Mr. W. D. Reid, B.A. has had charge of the services during the year, and has had associated with him Mr. Geo. C. Pidgeon, B.A. of the Presbyterian College.

At the Communion held in June last, and conducted by Dr. Barclay, 110 communicants, (some connected with other churches,) sat at the Lord's table, the service throughout being most impressive.

The number on the Communicants' roll at the end of the year is 95, with the prospect of being largely added to at the next Communion service, to be held in January.

In view of the great advances made in all branches of the Church's work during the year, the congregation have fully decided to call a minister, believing that by so doing they will all the sooner arrive at the position of being self-sustaining.

The Managers have also under contemplation the enlargement of the church during the coming year. The great inconvenience of having regular services, and also the Sabbath-School in the same building, has become more apparent than ever of late, consequently they see no other way of overcoming the difficulty than by making room for our necessary requirements.

The Church Treasurer reports a balance on hand, but this will have to be applied to paying for the re-seating of the Church with moveable settees, that were much needed for the comfort of all attending the services.

In closing, we must say that the Lord has been with us through all the year, guiding and sustaining us, and giving us much encouragement and hope for the future usefulness of Victoria Church and Sabbath-School.

There is inspiration in the word "New Year," although the season may enter with a painful sense of hours wasted and irrevocably gone, yet there is gladness in the thought of a New Year with its days in which we may strive to redeem the time and, as we pause to review our work, may it only be to move on in the way of higher usefulness and to strive earnestly to perform more faithfully the duties that await us in the coming year. Our attention has been given almost entirely during the past year to Dorcas work :—105 garments have been made and distributed as follows : The Montreal Foundling and Infant Nursery, 32, The Hervey Institute, 14, The Day Nursery, 12, The Protestant Infants' Home, 7, and among our own poor, 40.

A number of ladies living in the west end of the city, finding it too far to attend the weekly meetings during the winter-time, have taken work and meet at each others houses to sew, we trust that others having the same excuse may follow their good example.

Material has been sent to the French Mission School to be made up into garments by the children.

Mr. Morris has aroused an interest amongst the Sunday-School Scholars to help us in our work and some thirty children have received garments to make up.

Twenty-five dolls were purchased for the Industrial Bazaar and when dressed were valued at \$57.00 also a collection for the same object amounted to \$188.00.

Before closing our report we desire to thank the ladies who have kindly undertaken the duty of collecting and all who by their contributions have assisted us in carrying on our work.

May the coming year be one of increased usefulness and may we through our work reveal something of our Saviour's love and tender care for the suffering children of men.

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
