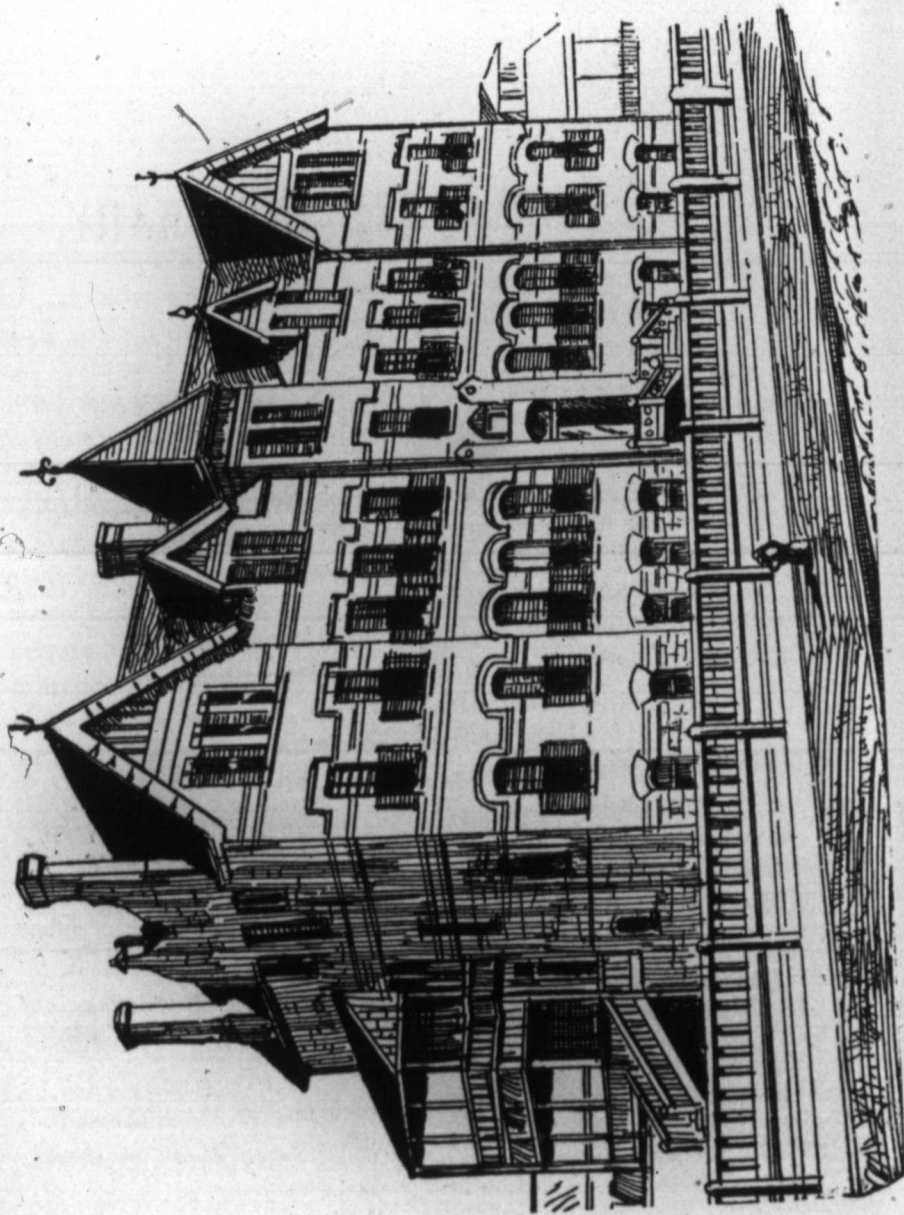

MANAGERS' REPORT, OCTOBER 26TH, 1889.

In presenting this fourteenth report of the Infants' Home and Infirmary, the managers desire to record their sense of the presence of an ever-ruling Providence in the events of the past year.

The report of an Institution such as this, must of necessity deal with very much the same details year by year, but as in households, the years are marked by special and family events, so the Infants' Home has its varied experiences, the most common being, in these large households, lack of funds. The managers finding, early in the year, that both ends would not meet, unless prompt measures were taken, and having most pleasant recollections of the success of the first "Kirmiss," decided to hold their second Kirmiss, hoping that as before a kindly public would come to their aid. In this they were not mistaken, and the Kirmiss proved a gratifying success. Mrs. Grantham, one of our managers, and for several years the able Treasurer of the Home, undertook the onerous task of convener of committees, and general superintendent of the Kirmiss programme. Her efforts were supported most warmly by the Ladies of the Board, assisted by many kind and willing friends, to all of whom, and to Mrs. Grantham in particular, the managers now desire to offer their most cordial thanks. One great reason for the extra efforts made for the support of this Home during the past three years is, that all subscriptions towards the Building Fund, had at that date expired. We owed a large sum on this building, and the interest to be met half-yearly added to the ever-increasing household expenses, necessitated very special exertions in order to meet these pressing claims.

TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

'It is extremely difficult to make the public understand that an Institution such as this cannot economize in the matter of food and warmth, and when in 1882 this our New Home enabled us to shelter a much larger number of infants and mothers, expenses proportionately grew, and from year to year, as provisions and fuel increase in price, so we find ourselves obliged to take more anxious thought as to the ways and means by which our large and helpless family is to be supported. Since 1882 this building has been the shelter and refuge of 1262 children, and 543 mothers, and if in our own houses, the plumbers, the carpenters, and other workmen, have almost yearly to be employed on the usual necessary repairs, how much more in so large a house as this, and when for the daily maintenance of our inmates, money is so urgently needed, repairs such as painting, &c., are very apt to be put off, in the hope that some chance bequest or subscription will enable us to authorize the much needed outlay. And here we would gratefully acknowledge that, not once nor twice, but many a time, just such unlooked for and unexpected aid has come in times of need. Surely this has been an answer to some earnest prayer to Him who has bidden us to "cast all our care upon Him." It would be well, indeed, if each man and woman who has the welfare of this Home at heart, would follow the example of Müller, of Bristol, and lay every want and every anxiety in connection with this Institution at the feet of Him who has said: "Ask and ye shall receive," assured that "The word of the Lord abideth for ever."

Out of the "Kirmis" proceeds a certain sum was set apart for permanent improvements. The laundry has been very greatly benefited by this arrangement; new laundry ranges have been purchased, and increased facilities for the heating of water, with other conveniences long needed, have been procured.

The laundry work for upwards of 95 to 100 inmates, is necessarily a very heavy expense, and the money devoted to this improvement has already proved of great benefit. The

summer shelter spoken of in our last report has, since its erection, been a most valuable adjunct to our Home, last year, from want of funds, it had to be used without a boarded floor. This summer, thanks to the Kirmis, the flooring has been completed, and the beneficial result, from the daily occupation of this shelter, upon the health of the children has been very marked.

The heating of this building is by steam, and we are told by competent authority that both furnace and pipes require a certain outlay each year. We are, therefore, having the furnace, radiators, and other essential parts, put in thorough repair, which expenditure will absorb a large portion of the sum set apart for the improvements. Lattice work round the verandahs has been added to insure greater privacy to the inmates, and increased safety for the older children when at play: these, with many minor repairs, and house furnishings which had been greatly needed, have been paid for by the Kirmis appropriation.

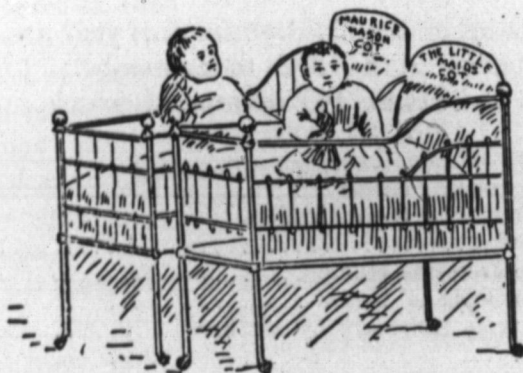
At the annual meeting last year we showed that the debt on this Home had been considerably reduced, the interest on one still large indebtedness remaining, however, a most serious anxiety; as the collections, supplemented by Government, and City grants, do not cover our necessary expenditure. We were, therefore, most thankful to find ourselves able from the "Kirmis" receipts to lay aside one-third towards the further reduction of our debt; leaving us at present with liabilities on this Home, the amount of which will be made clear to you in the Treasurer's report.

We have this year received the sum of \$1,000 from Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Mason, for the support of a Cot in perpetuity, to be known as "The Maurice Mason Cot," in memory of a little child early called to rest. Mention was made in last year's report of this liberal intention which is now carried into effect. This noble example, the practical outcome of deep feeling, might well be followed; and Cots thus endowed prove a haven of rest to destitute infants, causing a halo of love and gratitude to surround the name of such founder long years after the passing away of this generation.

Could we only free ourselves from the incubus of debt our energies would be concentrated on the improvement of the Infirmary, or Hospital part of this Home, we could afford a trained nurse and many appliances for our sick infants in which we dare not at present indulge.

How few persons realize that this Infants' Home is also an Infant's Hospital. Our sympathies go out instinctively to any plea for a sick child; but, as our managers can testify only too well, we have many a battle to fight for sick infants. So many persons will not understand that this is absolutely the only Institution where sick or dying infants are taken in, and given the benefit of nursing and of skilled medical attention. So often is it said to the managers and friends of this Home, and indeed written to them, that an Institution such as this should not exist. To these objectors we would say, that in all civilized countries the preservation and welfare of human life occupies a large proportion of their legislation, and that in the fourteen years of the existence of the Infants' Home we have cared for 2,033 infants, and, by the adoption of 97 deserted and foundling children, brought sunshine and happiness into many homes throughout this country.

Detractors of this charity should also remember that the establishment of the Infants' Home has gone far to check infanticide, child desertion, and, to a partial extent, the manifold evils of baby farming.

The statistics of the children for this year are as follows:

Of this number 51 were admitted as Infirmary patients. Drugged, neglected, and starved, in some few instances, their admission to the Infirmary has been the means of saving lives which may prove a blessing to their country, and of these some cases, by adoption, have become priceless treasures in childless homes. We have many letters each year from persons who have taken deserted infants to bring up as they would their own. Surely to these will apply the blessed words: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of these little ones, ye have done it unto Me."

During the year now closed we have taken in 65 women, of whom the record is as follows:

Of these we may say that each case is carefully considered, and the most friendless and destitute are the first admitted, provided they come within the rules of the Home. Many are taken in so enfeebled from overwork and other causes that they require both medical attention and much care. With regard to the reference to medical care, it is difficult,

in a report such as this, adequately to express the gratitude of the managers of this Home for the unvarying kindness and attention of our medical staff,—not only is time freely bestowed (a most valuable gift from a busy physician), but since January of this year each medical man has most generously donated his own prescriptions, thereby effecting to the management a large saving in the very expensive item of drugs.

One of our staff (Dr. Pyne), in consequence of increased college work, has felt obliged to give up his regular attendance. We hope that it may be possible to retain his services as one of our consulting physicians.

As the wearing apparel of both women and infants is provided by the Home, it was with much satisfaction that the managers were informed that needlework was to be part of the education of the girls in our public schools, and that the garments made in this way were to be divided among the charitable institutions of Toronto. The work done in the Wellesley Street and Jesse Ketchum schools has been arranged expressly for the Infants' Home; and we have to thank the Wellesley Street workers for a large and beautifully made addition to the wardrobes of our little inmates, also sheets and pillow-cases. The neatness and beauty of the work reflects great credit upon both teachers and pupils.

In last year's report mention is made of the Little Maids, who had given \$50 towards the support of a cradle for the year. We have the pleasure of again offering the thanks of the managers to "The Little Maids" for a second donation of \$50; also of \$25 from the same source, for the purchase of a special cot with all the necessary fittings.

Not to be outdone, and knowing the boys in the Home needed help as well as the girls, two little boys, during the past summer, handed in a donation of \$15, the proceeds of a little sale held by themselves for the Home.

During the year the ladies of the work-room have not been idle, and their steady unremitting labour of love continues to be an invaluable aid to the management of this

Home. They do not work for praise, or to be thanked; but the managers wish the ladies who form the sewing committee to feel that their kindness is appreciated.

To the vigilant care and attention of our lady superintendent, aided most faithfully by the matron Mrs. Jordan, we feel that, in a great measure, the success of our household organization is due. It requires no small measure of tact and ability to carry out the oversight of so large a family, and these qualities are possessed by Miss Boulton in no small degree.

Regular services for the nurses are conducted by the clergy of St. Luke's and the Church of the Redeemer. Bible classes through the week are continued by Miss Saunders and Miss Nightingale, while Miss Jarvis, assisted by Miss Gillespie, remains the ever-helpful teacher and friend of the nurses attending her Sunday evening Bible class. To all our kind helpers in the religious and moral work of the Home the managers desire to offer most sincere thanks.

In conclusion, we would say could the public only hear the pathetic stories told to us by applicants for admission, could they only see the piteous spectacle of the tiny waifs brought by the police to the Home, hearts would be filled with a Divine compassion, money would be ungrudgingly given; more personal help would be offered. Freed from debt the managers could enlarge this Home, and return favourable answers to the many appeals made to us on behalf of the orphan, and even worse than orphan children. Hospital and all charitable Institutions are the outcome of practical Christianity. Let the people of Toronto see that the good name they have acquired for benevolent enterprises is built upon a sure foundation, owing to the care and pains taken by them to preserve the lives of their youngest and most helpless citizens.

PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

The Medical Staff of the Infants' Home and Infirmary beg to present their Annual Report as follows:

During the year ending the 30th September, 116 infants have been admitted to the General Wards of the Home, and 51 to the Infirmary Ward.

Out of this total of 167 admissions, 43 deaths have occurred, giving an average of 25.7 per cent.

The maximum death rate per month was 7, in the months of March and August: the minimum, 3 in February. During the first three months of one year, that is, in October, November, and December, 1888, not a single death was registered in the Home.

On the other hand, out of 14 admitted last month 4, of which were foundlings, 7 were entered on the Infirmary register as in a dying state. Of these 7, 4 died last month, and the remaining 3 this month.

One foundling admitted two weeks ago, drugged and starved, in spite of all care and effort at resuscitation, survived its entrance to our doors but eight hours.

An epidemic of chicken pox broke out in the Home, in March, and ran through the whole of our little patients, one child only escaping the disorder.

Happily no deaths occurred, but we were compelled to close our doors to any children for a couple of months.

On the occasion of this outbreak, a score or more of the children were attacked simultaneously, the rash appearing in several of the wards on the same day, so that it was found impossible to practise isolation by transferring the infected ones to the annex.

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary."

II.

The object of the Home shall be, to receive and tenderly care for destitute infants under two years of age.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, their babies shall be admitted free.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Committee of thirty ladies, assisted by an Advisory Committee of three gentlemen, and the Committee shall elect annually their Presiding Officers and a Treasurer and Secretary out of their number.

V.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-laws of the Society, provided one month's notice shall be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three Officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the "Advisory Committee."

VI.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at the Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Committee. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VII.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, &c.

VIII.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the Matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an Annual Report of the conditions, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution; deposit the same in a chartered bank of the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditure, and pay out money on the order of the Committee.

IV.

The physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet-nurse shall be received permanently without their examination and approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet-nurses as possible, each nurse to be intrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a. m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

All meetings shall be held at 8 o'clock in the evening, or at such other hour as a quorum may be present, including one of the members.

The following shall be the order of business at the meetings: the minutes of the preceding meeting; reports of the various committees; the report of the Treasurer; and the report of the President; and read the reports of the various committees.

The Treasurer shall report the amount of money expended during the year, and the amount received; or, if the Treasurer is absent, the Secretary shall report the same.

The Treasurer shall report to the Institution at the next meeting of the Board, and shall also report to the Board at the next meeting of the Board.

A Committee of three members shall be appointed by the Board, to meet at 10 a. m., consisting of the President, the Secretary, and the Treasurer, to report to the Board at the next meeting of the Board. The Committee shall investigate the accounts of the various committees, and shall report to the Board at the next meeting of the Board. The Committee shall also investigate the accounts of the various committees, and shall report to the Board at the next meeting of the Board.

When the Board meets, the Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, and shall then report the amount of money expended during the year, and the amount received.

One member of the Board shall be appointed by the Board, to act as Secretary, and then only the floor shall be open for discussion.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the Officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or, in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her, before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A Committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 a.m., consisting of the President (or a Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The Committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This Committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the General Committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each Manager taking this duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the weekly Committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the Chair.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Applications for admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary Street, every Morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission.

Every child admitted must be examined by physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services for at least six months, to the Institution (or as much longer as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, to be determined by the Board) in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and child.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the visiting physician, who, if he concur in the admission shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, &c., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her first born.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these enquiries is satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection.

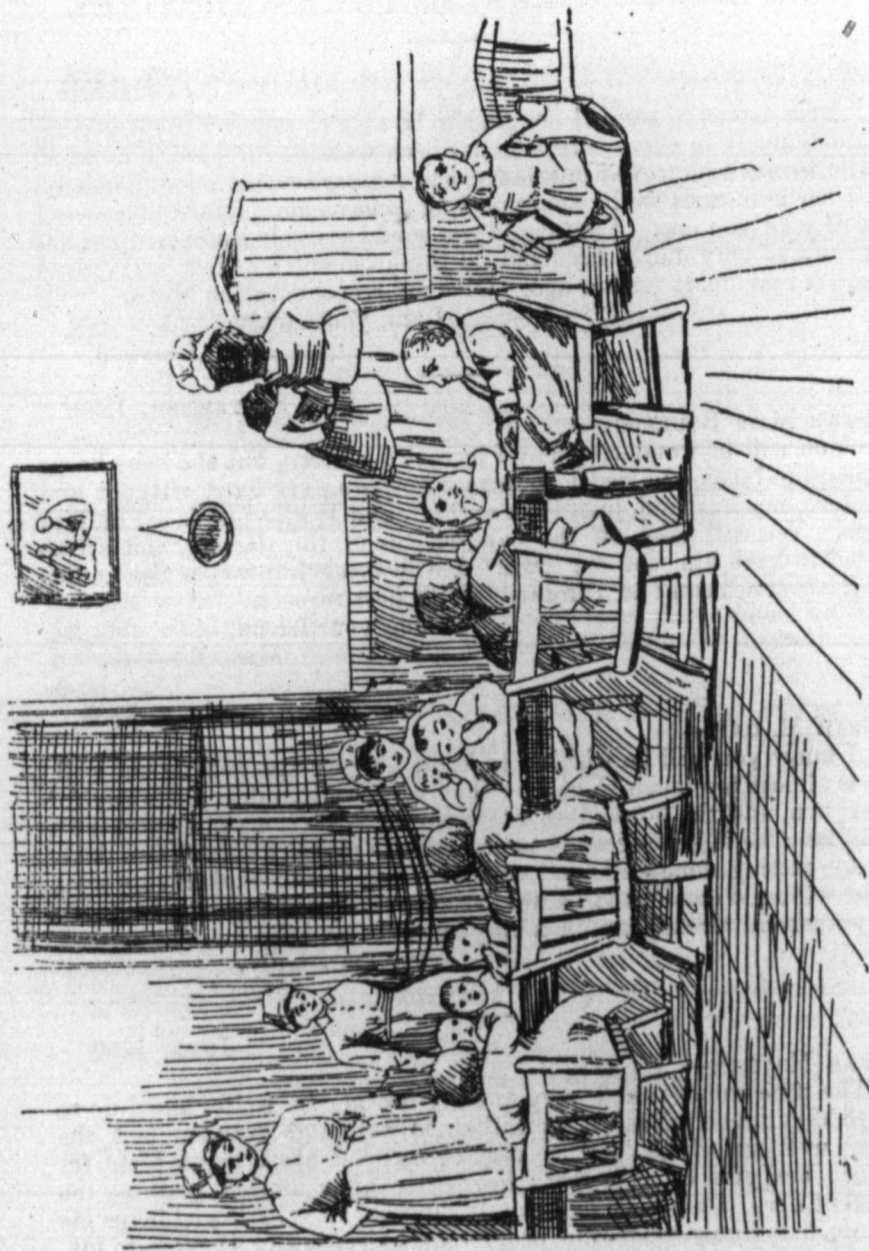
